

CROP-HAIL CHANGES ARE ORDERED

Included in the changes ordered by the Board of Insurance Commissioners effective January 2 for crop-hail insurance are the following:

1. The inclusion of fire insurance on certain grain crops. Fire insurance has been added to barley, corn, emmer, flax, oats, popcorn, rice, rye, sorghums, spelt and wheat while standing in the field or while in the bundle, shock, swath or window. There is a single premium for each of the perils of hail and fire.

2. The exclusion of loss by hail to open cotton eliminated and policy broadened to cover.

3. Expiration date on cotton extended from October 15 to November 15 and on grain sorghums, combine maize and other row crops from November 1 to November 15.

4. Notice of loss may now be sent by regular or air mail instead of by registered mail only as in the past.




