SOMETHING ELSE AGAIN

Miss Zoe Mozart, who looks over hundreds of feminine models every year in order to secure figures for a calendar manufacturer, says that the perfect face and the perfect figure have yet to be combined in one woman.

The lady probably knows her business but, for all that, she has not seen all the women.

Moreover, the idea of beauty, both as to face and figure, changes with the years. By the time a woman is found to combine what to Miss Mozart is a "perfect face and perfect figure," the chances are the popular idea will emphasize something else again.

TEACHERS ON STRIKE

Something unusual is going on throughout the nation. Teachers in Tennessee, Minnesota, Wisconsin, New Jersey and Connecticut have gone on strike, or plan to strike, for higher salaries.

Apparently, the teachers have learned something about economics. They are beginning to realize that increases will be very slow, and then meagre, unless they resort to the tactics that have proved successful in industry.

With few exceptions the teachers of the nation deserve increased compensation. With prices moving upward every day they are in immediate need of increases to meet rising costs of living. Their bills cannot be paid upon the assumption that they are engaged in a glorious profession that means much to mankind.

RECONSIDER RESOLUTIONS

The beginning of the month of December reminds us that the year 1946 will soon draw to an end and individuals interested in self-development should remember that it might be a good idea to take stock of the year's accomplishments.

Not many of us have achieved all that we expected to in the present year. While the probability is that most of us have experienced an improvement in financial affairs there are many people whose incomes have not advanced as fast as increased prices.

Nevertheless, in the present article, we do not plan to consider progress along economic lines, but would rather direct attention to the growth and development of personality.

There was a time when the approach of New Year's Day was the occasion for what was called "resolutions," which in theory were supposed to represent intelligent decisions on the part of individuals to plot regular and systematic improvements. The custom has somewhat gone out of fashion, but it is worth considering.

We have heard a great deal about planning in the past few years. In fact, some people have become so irked with the plans announced that they tend to deride all planning. Nevertheless, much is to be gained by intelligent study of conditions and the application of a planned life to the purposes and ideals of the individual.

We cannot tell our readers what their plans for 1947 should be, but we do not hesitate to suggest to serious-minded persons that they deliberately set up a plan, or program, for the year. Once the goal is established, the individual conscientiously works toward it. Despite disappointments and failures in details, the chances are that reasonable perseverance will bring compensating reward.

REMEMBER THE CHILDREN

It is not too early to call attention to the fact that many children will not enjoy the Christmas season, or share in its merriment unless the more fortunate individuals of Callahan county take it upon themselves to contribute to their happiness.

The custom that prevails in many areas of the nation to take collection in order to provide Christmas baskets for needy families is a worthy undertaking. Moreover, the effort to see that every child of tender years receives some token gift on Christmas Day is one that commands itself to right-thinking people.

Christmas Day offers us the opportunity

to forget self in attempting to provide some happiness for others. It is not an occasion to debate the justice of the fate that awaits the unfortunate. It is an occasion of happy festival, designed to share the good things of life with all people for at least one day.

The people of the United States have enjoyed an unusual prosperity in 1946. It may seem unlikely that there are families and children who need special consideration, but the fact is otherwise. In every section of the country and in towns, hamlets and cities, there are individuals who can be helped by the kindly, thoughtfulness of other people.

DISARMAMENT AGAIN?

There is talk about disarmament again, with the delegates of the nations discussing and debating various proposals designed to bring about an end to the everlasting race of armaments.

The end of the World War has been followed by considerable disarmament. The United States and Great Britain have demobilized to a large degree and even the Soviet Union has taken steps to dismiss a large number of soldiers from the Red Army.

It should be understood, very clearly, that the goal of disarmament cannot be attained unless there is greater trust and confidence among the nations of the earth. If it is too much to expect alien peoples to put their future in the faith that there will be no more aggression, disarmament may be possible if some international force is available to repress aggression. Even then, there must be complete confidence in the integrity and the fighting ability of the international force.

We do not believe that either of these conditions can be met at the present time. Consequently, any disarmament proposal that is adopted will represent little more than a careful reduction of armed forces, designed to save money, and undertaken with a close watch upon developments in other countries.

FORD LOSS \$51,600,000

The Ford Motor Company reports a loss of \$51,600,000 for the first nine months of 1946 but Ernest R. Zreech, executive vice-president, says that the loss would have been reduced to \$32,900,000 if tax rebates had been included and it had represented a full year's operating results.

It is perfectly obvious that any company requires a tremendous capital to be able to contemplate such a loss in operation. Mr. Zreech says that his company gambled millions of dollars in the hope of getting into the market ahead of competition, and that as a result of the loss, it will have to defer expenditures for manufacturing improvements and enlargements of its research facilities.

Naturally, he says that "we are going to have to earn back these losses before we can do a great many things that we would like to do."

PEPPER PROBLEMS

The first pepper shipment for civilian use since 1940 reached the United States the other day, consisting of 250 tons recently purchased by the Department of Agriculture in India at twenty-three cents a pound. This compares with the present wholesale price of seventy-eight cents.

In connection with the shipment, experts in the pepper industry state that there are only 585 tons of the hot stuff in the country, which, in a normal year, consumed 15,000 tons before the war. They warn that racketeers are flooding the country with "phony" black pepper, made of cornstarch, salt and ground cottonseed hulls, spiked with a dash of oil of pepper.

While the Government approved the use of this synthetic pepper, it requires certain standards and proper labeling. While supplies are increasing, producers in Dutch Sumatra predict shipments will not reach normal until 1950. Their trees, which produced about ninety per cent of the world's supply, were damaged or neglected during the war.

102 MILES

Army ordnance officers recently dropped a camera 102 miles, after it had gone up that distance on the tail of a rocket, and they delighted that the instrument was undamaged.

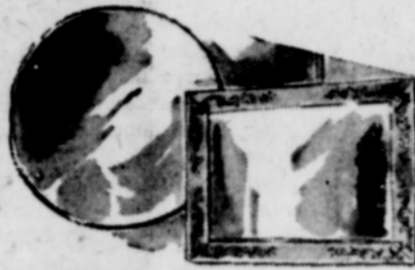
This has significance today when prices are moving into the stratosphere. Maybe some economist will talk to the Army officers and discover how to bring them down without wrecking the nation's economic machine.

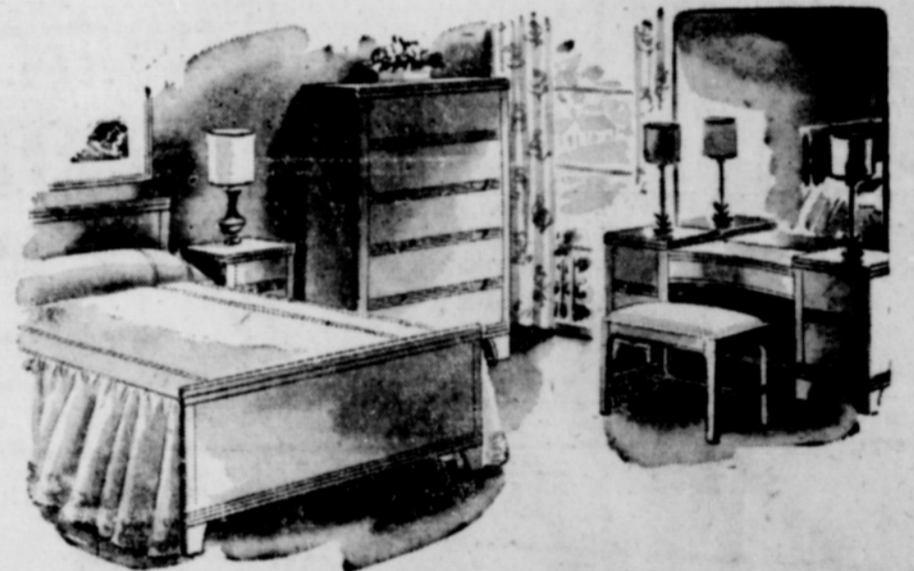

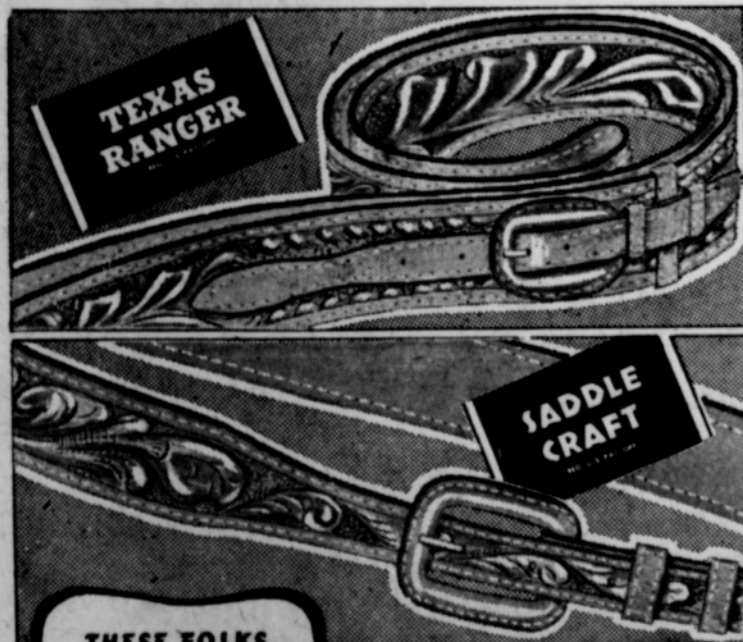
