Multitude Of Plans Made In School Board Meeting

The Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District met in a regular meeting on Tuesday, September 14 with the meeting called to order by President Ben Roming.

The Board discussed at length, the renovation project and it was noted that the construction is underway. Work has begun on window coverings and the electric work has also begun. A change was approved by the board regarding the ceiling tiles and additional stucco work in the front of the school.

Darrell Oliver made a

presentation to the Board concerning an energy management system. While the Board considered it as a good proposal, final decision was postponed until after the completion of the high school renovation project.

Superintendent Harold Horne gave a report on the final tax collection for the 1982-83 school year. Ninety-one percent of the total tax toll was collected and corrections to the current tax roll as presented by the Bailey County Appraisal District were approved.

Regarding the 1981 Market Values and Index Values of School Districts, a report given to the Board by Harold Horne indicated that the 1981 values of the total taxable value of the MISD would be \$310,522,355. The index one

value is \$211,434,160. The 1981 values reflect the findings of the state property tax board. It was agreed by the board that the findings were valid and no need for an appeal was evident at this time.

The board also approved the adult education program to be held in the Junior High School which is scheduled to begin on October 5.

In preparation for the acceptance of the Honor Board Award, plans were made for the Board to attend the convention in San Antonio to receive this award. It is also hoped by the board that they will receive the "Outstanding School Board" award as well.

City Officers Keep Up Steady Pace In September

The Muleshoe Police Department was quite busy over the past week, which took in the period of September 7 to September 14; and, included a few reports with earlier dates.

On September 6, Pablo Lira was arrested on a charge of DWI. Officer Watson made the arrest and was treated to profanity and threats, as he questioned the suspect. Force had to be used to be put the suspect in a jail cell, but no injuries were done. He was later released on \$265 bond.

Also on the 6th, Raymond Douglas Blagg was arrested in the 1200 block of American Boulevard on a public intoxication charge. He was a passenger in an auto driven by Daniel Lee Anaya. Blagg refused to listen to the Miranda and was jailed by officer Detten. He laid out his fine in the County Jail. Daniel Lee Anaya was arrested on the same date at the same time, on a charge of DWI and no liability insurance. He was also given a breath test, which he failed. He received a \$50 fine and 30 days in jail which was deferred to a 1-year probation.

A pump truck belonging to Lowe Drilling Company was reported to have had the windshield and two side glasses broken out of it on September 9. Police registered this as a criminal mischief, and have no

suspects. The amount of damage was unknown.

Also on September 6, Fry and Cox, Inc., reported the breakage of a window in their shop and on a gas pump.

On September 2, Laticia R. Daniel reported an assault and named a suspect. The suspect in question had pled guilty to a similar charge previously.

On September 7, three suspects were jailed in connection with criminal mischief.

Whirlwinds Blow In Competition By Mules 21-6

The Floydada Whirlwinds flew into town last night on a north wind blowing the Mules with a 21-6 score at the end of the last quarter of play in a ballgame that was wrought with mistakes by the Big Mules and some outstanding ball playing by the 'Winds. The Mules were held scoreless until the fourth quarter, when Gonzales bulled his way over the goal line for the Mules' only points.

In the opening kick-off, Alvarado put a foot into the ball for a 42 yard punt which was picked up by Weeks and brought back to the 31 yard line where he was dropped by Thurman Coleman. Coleman played an outstanding defensive game and was hitting every play and going hard. This kickoff return led to a short drive by the 'Winds which ended up with them punting 39 yards to the 12, where it was picked off by Darin Shaw who returned it for 4 yards. The Mules had the ball for three plays until a handoff by Gonzales to Orozco, was fumbled and the 'Winds came up with the football.

Then, on the next few plays, a short drive ended with Floydada's Salazar fumbled and handoff, and the Mules recovered, giving two turnovers in less than four minutes of the game.

The Mules then took the ball and throughout a series of seven plays, ended up with a Gonzales punt giving the ball to the Whirlwinds which started their first scoring drive. City, County Court Cases Increased Substantially

Fines paid in Municipal Court to City Judge Linda Huckaby over the period from August 24 to September 7, netted 56 paid and 60 cases filed.

Fines paid were as follows: 7 for no MVI stickers, seven for speeding, six for public intoxication, five for no liability insurance and four for each of the following: bad checks, disorderly conduct, & running a stop sign.

Three fines each were paid on each of the following offenses: failure to appear, expired license plates, criminal trespassing, no driver's license. One fine each was paid for the following: running a red

light, defective equipment, failure to control speed, minor in possession of controlled substance, exhibition of acceleration, city ordinance violation, and no protective headgear.

Out of the sixty cases filed for the two week period, ten each were for speeding and expired MVI stickers. Seven were for public intoxication, six were for running stop signs, five were for expired plates, three for criminal trespassing, and three for no drivers license, four for no liability insurance, two each disorderly conduct and two for city ordinance violations.

The theme for the 1982 observation of Farm Safety Week is "MAKE IT A SAFE HARVEST".

In the proclamation, Judge Williams said, "There is a basic set of safety practices that apply to the operation of all harvesting equipment."

- These include:
* Read and heed the operator's manual for each machine in your harvesting operation.
* Make sure all workers are trained and competent to do their jobs safely.
* Keep all shields in place. Stay away from unshielded, moving parts.
* Always disengage the

The United States still provides the cheapest domestic mail service in the industrial free world.

According to a recent study published by Pitney Bowes Inc., a leading supplier of business equipment and mailing systems, rates for letter postage range from the equivalent of 22 cents in Switzerland to 30 cents in the United States.

The Pitney Bowes report also notes that while the cost of a first-class stamp increased 33 percent to 20 cents in the three and one-half years between the price hikes of May 1978 and November 1981, this figure was less than the 45 percent increase in the consumer price index.

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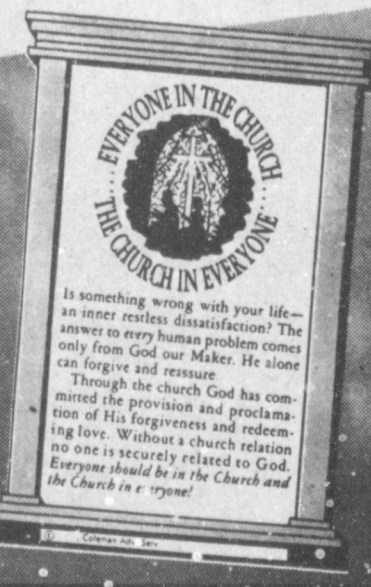

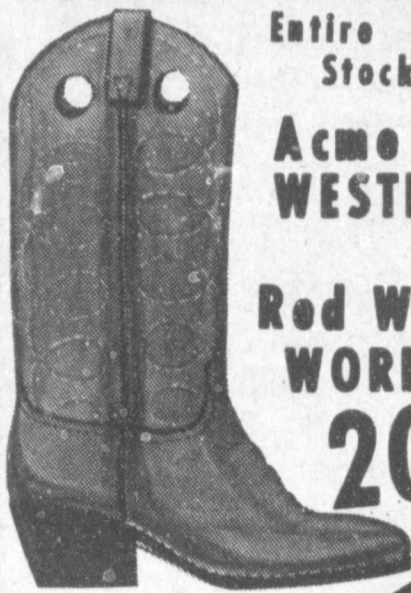

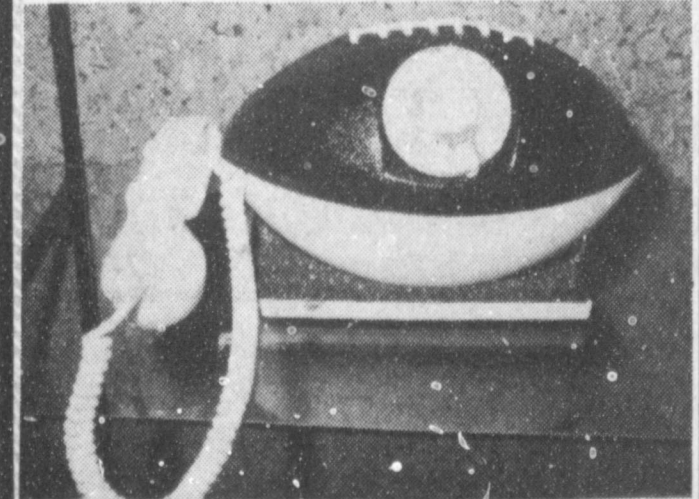

Texans May Prevent Child Abuse, Neglect

Child Abuse and Neglect can be prevented by Texans building a network of services to help families in distress, the president of the Texas Council of Child Welfare Boards declares-- "We can help parents learn how to discipline their children without injuring them," said Susan Bush of Athens.

"Where local communities support a wide range of family services, child abuse can be reduced. And, there's a bonus in keeping an abused youngster from repeating the cycle of abuse when the child grows up and becomes a parent," Bush said at a council meeting to plan the 50th anniversary in 1982 of the beginning of child protective services in Texas.

Bush and the Rev. Bill Hughes of Jourdanon head a committee to recognize State-county cooperation in child protection since 1932. Today, more than 1,800 Texans on 172 county boards offer time and service to protect children from abuse and neglect in partnership with the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Bush noted that the likelihood for abuse or neglect goes up in families under great stress from financial difficulties, marital discord, social isolation, or poor health.

"Something as simple as talking to a neighborhood father who has lost his job can defuse the frustration and guilt that otherwise might be taken out on the children," Bush said. She said an old-fashioned concern for neighbors could go a long way toward helping families cope with modern stresses that are related to many abuse cases.

"Admittedly, such informal actions aren't enough to help some families who need comprehensive therapeutic services," Bush said. "Even in those families, however, Texans can play a supportive role in programs to protect children."

- Ways to get involved:
1. Most importantly, report suspected instances of child abuse, neglect, or exploitation by calling the toll-free Child Abuse Hotline at 1-800-252-5400. It's answered day and night, seven days a week, and callers are not required to give their names.
 2. Join an organization that offers caring attention to family groups suffering from frustration and isolation.
 3. Increase your knowledge and understanding of child maltreatment, it causes and cures. Local libraries carry books and professional journals that discuss the subject.
 4. Contact a local child welfare board, as it deals with child abuse regularly, and offer your help as a

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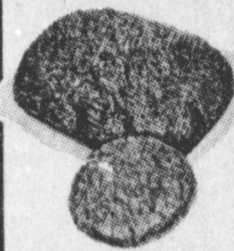

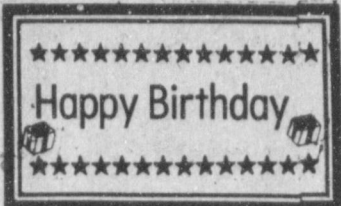

met, unsafe lane change, exhibition of acceleration, theft and one for assault.

Cases filed in municipal court for the period from September 7, until September 14, were counted at 55; cases disposed of and fines paid numbered 49.

On cases filed, nine were for bad checks, eight for no drivers license, seven for public intoxication, five for speeding, four for wreckless damage, and four for no stickers. Three cases each were filed on each of the following violations: expired plates, criminal trespassing, running stop sign, and two were filed for failure to yield right of way.

One case each was filed on each of the following violations: violation of city ordinance, exhibition of acceleration, impeding traffic, unsafe lane change, contest of speed, no liability insurance and one for possession of a controlled substance.

In cases where fines were paid the past week in municipal court, eight were for speeding, eight for public intoxication, six for no drivers license, five for expired MVI stickers, four for criminal trespassing, and four for running a stop sign. Three paid fines for no liability insurance, two each paid fines for bad checks and wreckless damage. One fine each was paid on the following violations: assault, no motorcycle license, possession of a controlled substance, violation of city ordinance, unsafe turn, exhibition of acceleration and unsafe lane change.

This leaves totals over the past three weeks for 105 fines paid and 115 cases filed in Municipal Court.

Cases filed in Justice Court with Justice of the Peace Tana Holmes for the period from September 7 to September 14 included a total of 49 cases.

Twenty two of these were for speeding violations, four for over allowed gross weight violation, three for over 34,000 pounds on a tandem axle, three for failure to stop at a stop sign, and two each for the following violation: failure to display drivers license, failure to have liability insurance, defective stop lamps & hunting wild dove with unplugged shotgun.

One case each was filed on the following violations:

do so is a major cause of harvest-time amputation accidents.

* Adjust ground speed to field and crop conditions. Watch out for obstacles, ditches, steep slopes, overhead powerlines and such.

* Keep children and non-workers off and away from equipment.

* Wear appropriate personal protective equipment when the job or job conditions call for it. Wear well-fitting clothing that gives ample skin protection and has no loose ends to be caught by moving parts.

* Take work breaks with refreshments (non-alcoholic) to reduce fatigue and restore alertness;

Joe Smetana, Texas Farm Bureau Safety Director, Waco, said, "There is a slogan that all harvest machine operators should learn to live by - LOCK IT - BLOCK IT - OR DON'T GET UNDER IT." according to Smetana, this means before crawling under the header, double check that its safety latch or jack stands are locked into place, or that it is solidly blocked. The heavy header can fall if the hydraulic force holding it up is relaxed because of system failure or someone (or something) activating the control. Such a mishap can mean serious injury. Clear obstructions or work on the header only when the engine is turned off.

SMALL BUSINESS—A RESOURCE WE MUST PROTECT

You can look around the square of any Texas town and see the backbone of the state economy—and of the national economy. It's small business and it provides half of all jobs. By the current state definition there are 260,000 in our state—that's 97% of all Texas businesses. The small business man and woman not only provide jobs and pay taxes; their independent tradition also helps explain the enduring quality of our democratic form of government.

The state of Texas recognizes the importance of small business and has programs to help it. But we can do better. For one thing, we can abolish the sales tax on utility bills which now falls basically on small business owners. Large manufacturing and processing firms don't have to pay the tax, but the grocer, retailer and florist do. It is not fair.

My opponent opposed doing away with this tax in the last session of the legislature. The tax will bring in an estimated \$220 million in 1984-85. But when you compare that with the extra \$5.1 billion the legislature will have to spend during that time, I feel we can do without the tax and the revenue it will bring. And, as Lt. Governor, I would support its repeal.

I would also support putting into effect recommendations of the small business task force initiated by the Governor. Two of these recommendations are especially appealing. One is to help small business borrow money at better rates. Most small businesses which fail do so because they are undercapitalized. To help that situation, franchise tax money would be deposited in participating banks, which would, in turn, make loans at lower rates to small businesses.

The other recommendation is that we form a group of small business development centers at colleges and universities statewide. Money for the centers would come from the U.S. Small Business Administration, the state and participating schools. The centers would provide training, counseling and other help to small business owners so that they could be more competitive in the marketplace.
