Hall-Donley Water District Confirmed In Election Saturday

Qualified voters in the south part of Donley County and north part of Hall County almost unanimously confirmed the Hall and Donley Counties Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 in an election held last Saturday at the Lesley gin office. The vote was 167 for and only 9 against. Directors elected at the same time were Dell E. Wells, David H. Hudgins, O. B. Jones, C. L. Benson and W. L. Nabers. Wells is president of the organization and Hudgins is secretary.

Wells stated his appreciation for the fine turnout for the election and the interest the land owners were taking in the project.

The election confirmed the formation of the district which encompasses most of the area of Precinct No. 2 in Hall County and an area immediately north in Donley County which is better known as the area through which John Mann, Bitter, Polecat and Oaks Creeks run and the drainage area of these creeks. This includes the Finch, Molesworth, Lazy RG and part of the JA ranches.

If this project progresses as proposed, a large number of retention dams and other conservation practices will be put into effect to hold flood waters back to avoid untold thousands of dollars of damage to rich farm land in the Brice, Lesley, Lakeview areas as well as the ranch land that lies in Donley County. The project, which if approved by the Federal Government, will cost in excess of two million dollars. The Federal government will bear the greater portion of the expense.

The project is considered one of the foremost and wisest moves to be made by landowners in this area. Water and conservation is, and will be one of the most important factors in the future development and preservation of this entire area. The floods of 1955 were evidence of what can happen to thousands of fertile acres of land. Many acres of land were lost completely along with thousands of dollars in crops. The men behind this project and the voters who confirmed this district last Saturday want to see this type of protection, for their future, become a reality.

Little League World Series In Progress

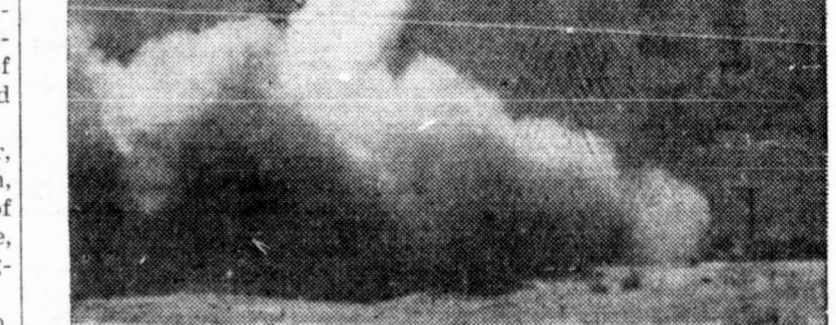

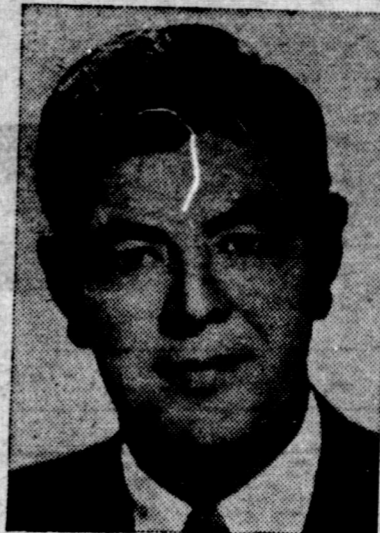

Farmers and ranchers of the Donley County Soil Conservation District are urged to consider the possibility of harvesting native grass seed this year. Several hundred acres in the area are covered with well seeded grasses such as Blue grama, Sideoats grama and others. Opportunities to harvest native grass seed such as we now have seldom occur.

Demand for native grass seed will probably be good for at least another year. Hundreds of acres of native grasses will be planted under the various Agricultural programs next year. Now is the time to begin thinking about harvesting the grasses that can be used to seed these acreages.

Information on harvesting of grass seed may be obtained from the local SCS Office.

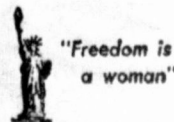

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT

AUSTIN—During much of the last century Texas was called the great land frontier. Word got around. From older regions came the restless, the ambitious, the hopeful who'd heard there was plenty of room in Texas.

Today, the sod huts and free land are gone from Texas. But the frontier is regarded by economists as greater than ever—rich and promising beyond Moses Austin's boldest dreams. A recent survey by a national magazine (U. S. News & World Report) described Texas as destined to become "the new powerhouse of the United States—an industrial empire—built on a storehouse of priceless natural resources."

Sounds wonderful. But Texas leaders, in both government and industry, have taken the position that favorable circumstances alone will not convert frontier to empire. Other states are angling, too, for energetic men with capital and know-how to start new factories humming.

And most states are not hampered, as Texas is, by a constitutional provision prohibiting use of tax money to advertise the state's advantages.

Despite this hindrance, the last Legislature, at Gov. Price Daniel's request, reactivated the Texas Industrial Commission to start the ball rolling. E. B. Germany of Dallas is Commission chairman.

In operation only four months, with a piggy bank budget of voluntary donations, the Commission is, nevertheless, making itself felt.

Its showpiece is a 68-page, two-color brochure called "A Plan of Action to Win New Industry for Your Community." This do-it-yourself manual was mailed to every Chamber of Commerce, mayor, county, judge, industrial foundation and legislator in Texas.

Letters of commendation and requests for extra copies have "poured in," according to Bob Bray, member of the governor's staff assigned to the Commission. Said a letter from the Huntsville and Walker County C of C, "Never have I seen any publication so full of excellent guidance material for communities - -"

With the letter came a contribution to carry on the Commission's work.

Next big goal is passage in November of a constitutional amendment to remove the legal shackles on financing. "Failure of the amendment," said Bray, "will handcuff the Commission. Our big job now is selling Texans on the need to sell Texas, both industry-wise and tourist-wise."

With funds and staff, the Com-

mission will be ready to go ahead on an extensive effort—already mapped out—for research, information, advertisements, films, aid to local organizations, etc.

Says Germany, "Disastrous droughts, the alarming loss of rural population and the stark realization that the state no longer can depend on its oil revenue, all emphasize the need for developing our industrial resources."

SCHOOLS "BUST OUT"

Some seam-splitting from Texas' expanding population was reflected in the reports of Texas Education Agency survey teams on conditions in the state's public schools.

As a result of the reports to the State Commission on Accreditation, nine schools were removed from the accredited list, and accreditation was withheld from six others. Fifty-one were warned they face loss of accreditation unless they improve standards.

Most of the schools' troubles seemed to stem from pupil populations and needs that outran community leadership and financing. Samples from the unfavorable reports: not enough textbooks, few or no library books, no laboratory facilities for science courses, unsanitary or outmoded facilities, use of condemned or "miserably overcrowded" buildings, teachers instructing courses in which they had had no college study.

Actually, the number of schools having trouble meeting standards was only about 3.5 per cent of the total—or 66 out of Texas' approximately 1,800 school districts.

NEW ROADS AHEAD

Better driving days are seen ahead as the State Highway Department unveiled its plans for 1959-60 interstate highway building.

A \$260,000,000 program has been authorized to add 567 miles of controlled-access highways to Texas' portion of the national network.

Of this, \$210,495,300 is earmarked for construction, \$16,272,100 for right-of-way buying and an additional \$33,222,500 for advance right-of-way buying.

Eventually, Texas is to have 3,033 miles of the interstate system within its borders.

Mr. Wilson said that the exhibit faithfully would exhibit the tremendous changes in size, population, tenancy, and horses and mules. The last generation the number of farms in Texas has dropped from most one-half — from 2,340,000 to 1,250,000, continued. "And the size of farm has doubled, from 25 acres."

He said the number of farms has dropped from almost 300,000 to 125,000. Tractors have increased from 650,000 to 277,000; and horses and mules have declined from 1,000,000 to 300,000.

"The 1958 Agrigade will faithfully the social conditions resulting from the full impact of these changes. In addition Agrigade also will present colorful, 3-dimensional stories of the twelve Texas Agriculture Extension Service Districts, state," Mr. Wilson concluded.

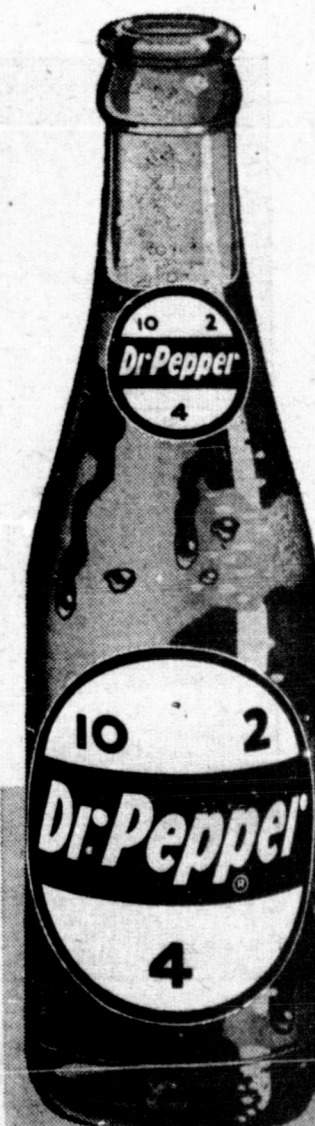

"The 1958 Agrigade will portray the vast changes that have swept through Texas agriculture during the last 33 years, specifically since the industrial awakening after World War I."

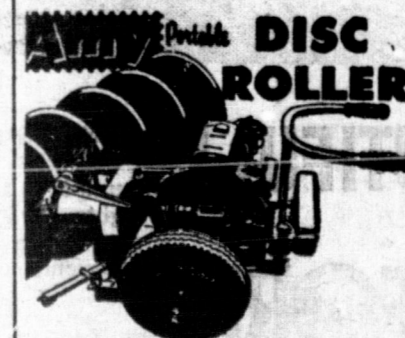

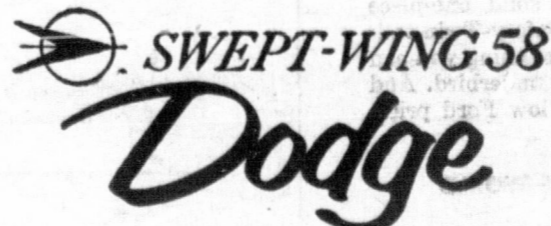

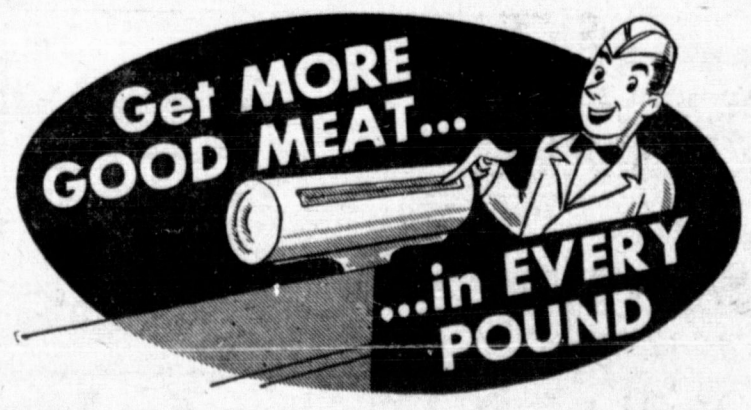

EERL Trying To Discover The Truth About "Angels"

AUSTIN—University of Texas engineers at the Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory are trying to discover the truth about "angels."

To EERL engineers, an "angel" is any unidentifiable radar signal. What they discover may explain the mysterious objects and "flying saucer" reports which periodically excite citizens. Dr. Archie W. Straiton, EERL director, said.

The "angels" research team is gaining new data on these strange occurrences by measuring returns with ultra short radars employing millimeter wavelength radiations created by EERL engineers.

Within a few seconds after one of the newly-developed radars is pointed at the sky, an unidentified target is picked up, Dr. Straiton said. "These returns last for a few seconds, without much movement, and then disappear."

Just what causes "angels" or phantom signals on the radar screen?

Charles W. Tolbert, EERL engineer supervising the project, said two possible explanations are given.

First, the unidentifiable radar signals may come from birds or insects, blown grass or spider webs circulating in the atmosphere up to about 3,000 feet.

Second, the phantom signals may come from "atmospheric turbulence, in air layers producing very sharp changes in temperature and moisture content."

"On the basis of tests conducted up to now, the best possible explanation for 'angel' returns is that isolated drops of water which sometimes form in the atmosphere serve as targets for a brief time and then disappear by evaporating," Tolbert explained.

"During the first Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall commence in January, 1959, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty (30) days of the first Regular Session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine the order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership.

Section 2. That Section 6 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 6. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 3. That Section 7 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 7. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. That Section 8 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 8. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 5. That Section 9 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 1. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Section 2. That Article XII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

Section 3. That Article XIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. That Article XIV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 5. That Article XV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

Section 1. That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 17. Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 66, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid."

Section 2. That Section 18 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 18. The Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was existing at the time of the Fiftieth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years of service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that such widow was legally married prior to January 1, 1957, to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such pension."

Section 3. That Section 19 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 19. The Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

Section 4. That Section 20 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 20. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

Section 5. That Section 21 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 21. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

Section 6. That Section 22 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 22. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

Section 7. That Section 23 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 23. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

Section 8. That Section 24 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

The Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance on behalf of persons eligible for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 61a of Article III and for persons eligible for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided in Article III, Section 61-b of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such payments; providing that the payments shall not exceed the payments out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication therefor."

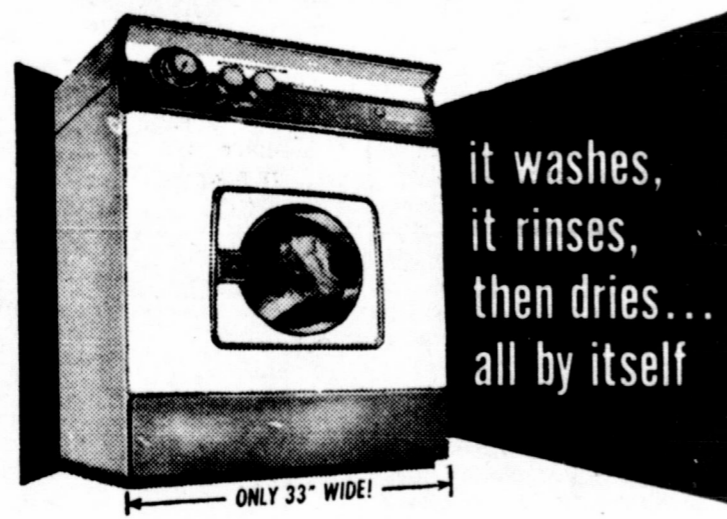
