## Revival At Brice Baptist Church Aug. 22-31st

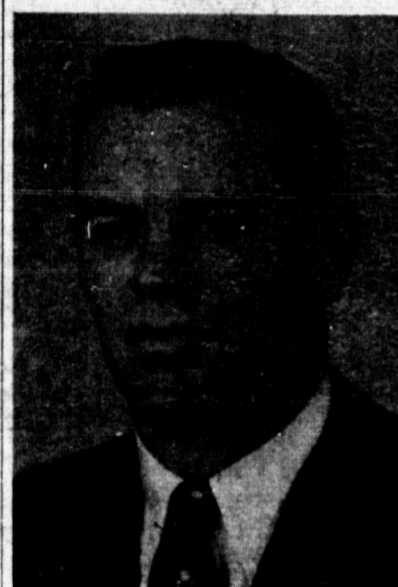

## Swimming Pool Project On County Basis

A group of Clarendon and Donley County citizens met at the district court room last Thursday night for the purpose of making some type of decision on the proposed swimming pool project. C. R. Hendricks of Ft. Worth, explained to the group the financial condition of both the City and the County and how the pool could be financed.

It was learned the with it's present bonded indebtedness, the City was in no condition to handle the project but it was pointed out that the county was in as good or better financial shape as far as bonded indebtedness was concerned than any other county in the state.

It was voted by the group present to circulate a petition asking for a county election on the project. Beryl Clinton started circulating such a petition this week at Hedley and other parts of the county.

It was brought out at the meeting that a county swimming pool project would benefit the citizens of the county more. It was pointed out that a bond issue of this nature could be handled without raising taxes unless more money was required to run the county which would necessitate a small raise in valuations.

Whatever the entire project could possibly demand, the Leader will print the facts from every angle regarding taxes and otherwise, prior to any such election. On a county-wide basis, the tax would be very small, should there be any additional raise at all.

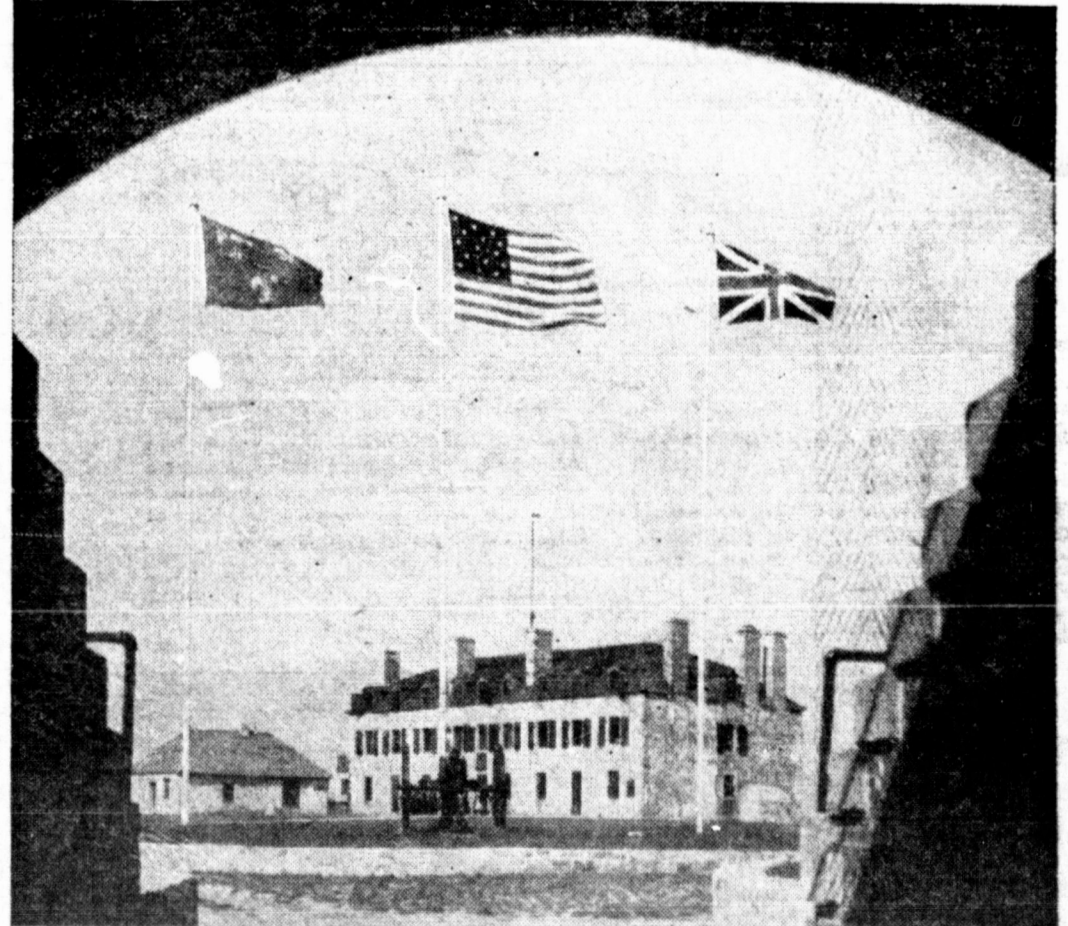

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## Irrigation Water Moving Down Level Border



## DONLEY COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Interest in irrigation has become wide spread in the Donley County Soil Conservation District

during the last few years. There are over 180 wells and over 6,200 acres of land in the District now under irrigation according to the latest report.

Sprinkler type systems are more popular in the area because of the sandy nature of the soils. It is estimated that about 80 percent of all irrigation systems in the District are of this type. However, several surface irriga-

tion systems are in operation on the heavier soils, such as are found in the Jericho Community.

Soil Conservation Service personnel have given information to a lot of these well owners as to the amount of water to apply, when to apply, how fast their soil will take water, and have also helped cooperators to plan a complete irrigation system on their farms.

**TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT**

**AIR PROBLEMS**

The Congress last week, acting

through the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, of which I am a member, favorably reported a bill designed for the purpose of meeting the challenges posed by the air problems of the future. Cumbersome methods of procedure, involving endless red tape in many instances, have been blamed by a num-

ber of air-minded people for the difficulties experienced in recent years in air traffic. These problems, of course, include the traffic crashes that resulted in the loss of many human lives.

The proposed bill is, in many respects a new approach in political philosophy. Much power has been concentrated in one individual, probably more than has ever been concentrated in an individual regarding any single segment of the economy. We have tried to temper these concentrated powers with certain safeguards that will prevent abuses or encroachments upon the constitutional rights of our people. But, I must warn that we are

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embarking upon a trial and error procedure that may produce many faults. The operations of this new air agency, known as the FAA, must be watched with the greatest alertness and vigilance.

We have undertaken to prevent its domination by the Military. Actually, the primary responsibility of the success of this operation will lie with the head of the civil government, to wit, the President of the United States, who, incidentally, is also Commander-in-Chief of all the armed forces of this nation. Under our political philosophy, it must be remembered that the President is the Commander-in-Chief of the armed forces of this nation because he is the head of the civil government. He is not the head of the civil government because he is Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces. In other words, it is highly important that this vital mode of transportation, which is not only interstate by its very nature, but also international and inter-continental, be controlled by the civil government; and, of course, that the Military demands

yield to the requirements of the civil government. Ample provision is made in the bill for full and complete use of air space for the defense of this country.

The bill is the product of the minds of the Administration, both civil and military; the air industry, itself, both in the production of aircraft and in the use of the same for commercial purposes; the private aircraft owners and pilots, and the Members of Congress who have given much study to these problems through the years. The agency will be a highly technical agency whose primary responsibility will be the lives and safety of those using the airways of this country.

We are presently on the horizon of the age of jet propelled commercial aircraft. By this means we will be able to travel from coast to coast and from continent to continent in a space of a few hours, if not minutes. Our next horizon will be the advent of space travel. It is a matter of life or death for our country, if not to us as individuals, that we keep abreast of the advance of civilization, particularly in this field.

**LOCAL AIR MATTERS**

Speaking of air matters, I received a letter from the CAA advising that, because of the air

traffic growth at the Amarillo Air Terminal, a new approach lighting system has been allocated to that terminal. This system offers the pilot of a plane a vital margin of safety while landing the aircraft at night and during bad weather. It also makes the airport capable of a faster aircraft acceptance rate. Our section of the country is particularly adapted to the use of air travel because of our widely advertised great open spaces; therefore, all air accomplishments and betterments are of tremendous importance to us, as will be evidenced by future developments.

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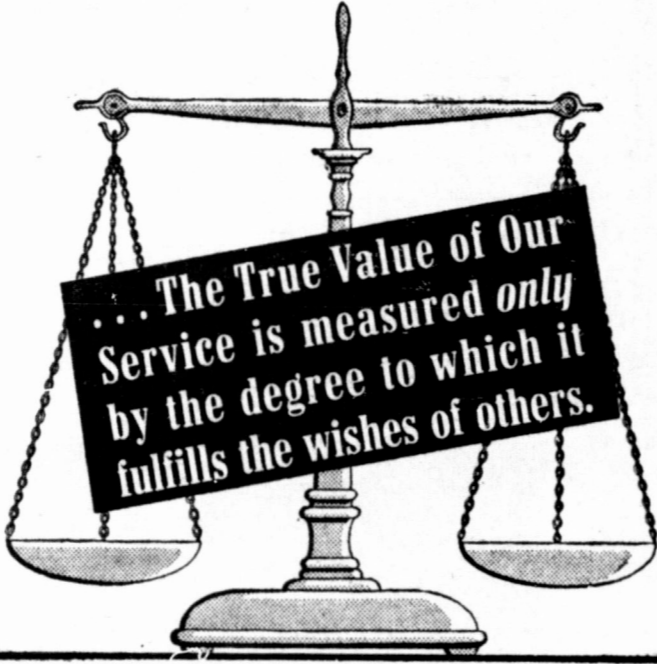
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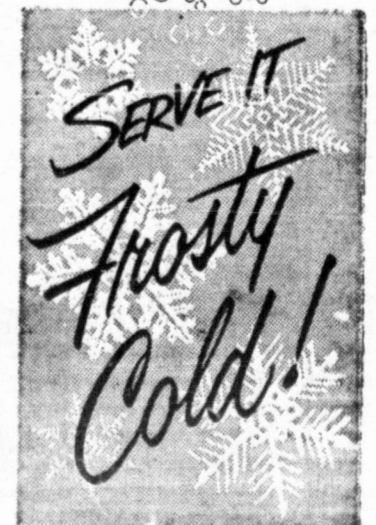

AUSTIN — Although the main bout of the political summer is over, there's still considerable commotion ahead.

Generating a little extra heat during the scorching weeks ahead will be these events:

**STATEWIDE RUNOFF:**

Only one race for statewide office, a place on the Supreme Court, remains to be decided at the Aug. 23 primary. Contenders are Robert W. Hamilton of El Paso and J. Edwin Smith of Houston.

In a one-contest race like this, the candidates' big problem is likelihood of being ignored. A tiny segment of authorized voters could tip the election.

State Democratic Chairman Jim Lindsey has reminded county chairmen that the law requires that they hold a runoff primary—even if it's just for one race. In some 100 counties there are no local races going into a runoff.

**LEGISLATIVE RUNOFFS:**

Winners of 33 legislative posts are yet to be decided.

Included are three campaigns to decide successors of retiring Senators Ottis Lock of Lubbock, Searcy Bracewell of Houston and Carlos Ashley of Llano. All of the 28 senators already definitely "in" are incumbents.

In the House, also, it appears to be a good year for incumbents. Out of a membership of 150, 101 won out in the first primary or had no opponents.

Nineteen new members were elected to the House in July, and winners of 30 seats are yet to be decided. Twelve incumbent representatives are involved in these runoffs.

**SPEAKERSHIP RACE:**

Hanging in the balance of the 30 House of Representatives runoff races is the outcome of months of persistent campaigning for one of the key posts in state government—Speaker of the House.

Speaker is elected by fellow House members. Candidates are Rep. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, seeking a second term, and Rep. Joe Burkett Jr. of Kerrville.

After the July primary, each claimed to have 45 percent of House members pledged to his side. This is not literally possible since only 80 per cent of the total membership has been elected.

But it illustrates the nip 'n tuck nature of the contest that probably won't be over until the last chip is down.

**STATE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION:**

Climax to the precinct and county conventions—and all the struggle that preceded them—will be the state meeting in San Antonio Sept. 9.

It's known traditionally as the "governor's convention" with the nominee for governor and his supporters taking the lead in deciding on officials, committees and policies for the next two years.

Gov. Price Daniel, who worked harder at rallying moderate-conservative Democrats to precinct conventions than at his own race for renomination, predicts a comfortable margin of supporters at the state meeting.

**BETTER DAYS**

More students, more prosperous pros are in prospect on the campuses of Texas state colleges and universities this fall.

Commission on Higher Education predicts a total enrollment of more than 81,000 at the 18 tax-supported colleges, up from last year's 77,913. Beginning this year a growing flood of college students is expected as the high schools turn out the "war babies" of the 1940's.

Pay raises up to 20 per cent will begin in September for the state college teachers. It will put the "average" professor's annual salary between \$5,000 and \$7,000.

**WHO MOVES THE POLES?**

A test suit is set for Aug. 12 to determine who bears the cost of moving utilities to make way for new interstate highways.

Attorney General Wilson filed suits in an Austin district court. Defendants are cities of Austin and Dallas, but the decision will ultimately affect many cities across the state.

Last Legislature passed a law permitting use of the federal-state highway funds to pay for necessary utility moving. But Wilson contends such payments

would violate the constitutional prohibition against "donating" public money to corporations and individuals.

City governments, regarded as "municipal corporations" under the law, are vitally concerned with the outcome of the case. Texas League of Municipalities has predicted an adverse ruling would result in some \$20,000,000 in utility moving costs for cities.

## Harris Hawk Kills Rats, Saves Time

AUSTIN—Meet an unexpected friend, the Harris Hawk. Texans get a detailed introduction in the March issue of "Texas Game And Fish," the official publication of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

"Brush-Country Gentlemen" by the late William Jennings, Biolo-

gist, points out that the Harris Hawk preys on rats, one of the worst destroyers of range. Since the pack rat eats a wide variety of grasses and grass seeds, it robs cattle and upland game birds of food they need to carry them through drouth and winter. The rat also consumes much prickly pear, staple food for deer and javelina in South Texas.

"Studies are now underway in parts of Texas," Jennings said, "which ultimately will determine the exact destruction to range plants by rodents. Although the exact amount of damage done by rodents in South Texas is unknown, it will run into millions of dollars just from the standpoint of livestock feed alone."

The chestnut-colored Harris Hawk, with an average wingspan of 42 inches, makes an impressive appearance as it ranges the brush country south of the Edwards Plateau in Texas. It goes as far west as California, north to Kansas and rarely Iowa, and east to Louisiana. South, it lives as far away as Central Chile and Argentina. Although its diet includes almost any animal or bird it is capable of capturing, the Harris Hawk has a natural target in the over-abundant pack rat. In keeping down the greedy small animals, the Harris Hawk plays a vital role in nature's balance, and immeasurably helps the farmer, rancher, and sportsman.

Dove Season Opens Sept. 1, Deer Nov. 16

Basic hunting regulations in Texas have been set by the Game and Fish Commission for the 1958 fall season. In general they will be very much the same as last season, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.
The regulations were approved by the Commission last week from recommendations made by biologists after they had studied conditions throughout the state, particularly in areas where regulatory authority has been granted to the Commission.

The hunting season will begin Sept. 1 for doves in the North zone. The season will extend through Oct. 20. In the South zone the season will be Oct. 1 through Nov. 19, except in the counties of the Rio Grande valley where it will be legal to shoot mourning doves for the two-day open white-winged dove season. Here the season will end Nov. 17 inclusive.
Dove hunters also get another break. The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service has authorized the possession of 20 mourning doves, after the first day. The daily bag will continue at 10.

The white-winged season begins 2 p. m. daily on Sept. 14 and 16, only, and ends at sunset on each of the two days. The bag limit is 10 per day and 10 in possession.
Deer hunters will find the white tailed season in the Edwards Plateau and South Texas areas open Nov. 16 to Dec. 31, inclusive.
Antelope seasons will be the same as last year, except that in

the Trans Pecos area three more days have been added. The dates are Oct. 1-3; 5-7, and 8-10 inclusive. The Panhandle dates for antelope are Oct. 14-16 and Oct. 17-19, covering two areas.

Quail season will remain from Dec. 1 to Jan. 16, except in a few counties where the season has been closed by the legislature. Quail season has been opened in Crockett county this year.
The turkey season will remain the same this season as last year.

A digest of the Game and Fish Laws now is being prepared and will be ready for distribution through license dealers, wardens, and sporting goods stores as soon as possible.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #31—Number Four on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas to provide that all county officials for whom four-year terms of office were authorized in 1954 must resign such office prior to announcing for a different office when more than one (1) year remains unexpired of the term for which they were elected, and providing for the filling of such vacancies in the manner now provided by law.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 65 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 65. STAGGERING TERMS OF OFFICE.—The following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the full terms provided in this Constitution: (a) District Clerks; (b) County Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) Judges of County Courts at Law, County Criminal Courts, County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (e) County Treasurers; (f) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace.

"Notwithstanding other provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two (2) years: (a) Sheriffs; (b) Assessors and Collectors of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (g) Constables. At subsequent elections, such officers shall be elected for the full terms provided in this Constitution.

"In any district, county or precinct where any of the aforementioned officers is of such nature that two (2) or more persons hold such office, with the result that candidates file for 'Place No. 1,' 'Place No. 2,' etc., the officers

elected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve for a term of two (2) years if the designation of their office is an uneven number, and for a term of four (4) years if the designation of their office is an even number. Thereafter, all such officers shall be elected for the terms provided in this Constitution.

"Provided, however, if any of the officers named herein shall announce their candidacy, or shall in fact become a candidate, in any General, Special or Primary Election, for any office of profit or trust under the laws of this State or the United States other than the office then held, at any time when the unexpired term of the office then held shall exceed one (1) year, such announcement or such candidacy shall constitute an automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant to law in the same manner as other vacancies for such offices are filled."

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE SUBMITTED TO A VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THIS STATE AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON THE FIRST TUESDAY AFTER THE FIRST MONDAY IN NOVEMBER, 1958, AT WHICH ELECTION ALL BALLOTS SHALL HAVE PRINTED THEREON: 'FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING THAT ANY DISTRICT, COUNTY, OR PRECINCT OFFICIAL SERVING A FOUR-YEAR TERM MUST RESIGN BEFORE ANNOUNCING FOR A DIFFERENT OFFICE IF THERE REMAINS UNSERVED MORE THAN ONE (1) YEAR OF THE TERM FOR WHICH HE WAS ELECTED.'

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING THAT ANY DISTRICT, COUNTY, OR PRECINCT OFFICIAL SERVING A FOUR-YEAR TERM MUST RESIGN BEFORE ANNOUNCING FOR A DIFFERENT OFFICE IF THERE REMAINS UNSERVED MORE THAN ONE (1) YEAR OF THE TERM FOR WHICH HE WAS ELECTED."

"If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed Amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
