BOY SCOUTS STUDY CONSERVATION

One organization which is interested in conservation and the future welfare of our nation is the Boy Scouts of America. Various phases of conservation have long been a part of the scout program. Over the years they have made a significant contribution in training boys in conservation, attitudes and techniques through the use of merit badges.

Original training was on Soil and Water Conservation. Over the years other merit badge courses have been developed in Wildlife Management, Forestry and Conservation of our Natural Resources. Each of these courses are designed to give the scout a basic understanding in conservation management and application.

Through the study of conservation, the boy scouts learn the wise use of soil and water and provide capable leadership for future generations in keeping our land productive and beautiful,

our people healthy and our nation strong.

Conservation and wise use of soil and moisture on cropland, grassland, and woodland is the key to keeping our land productive and beautiful, our people healthy, and our nation strong.

Our farmers and ranchers are the major ones who see that conservation is applied but it is not entirely dependent on these people. We all have a share in the job to be done. Every person and group must be aware of the needs of our land and should be a part of the total conservation movement.

GOOSE SEASON EXTENDS TO JAN. 11

AUSTIN — Wildlife biologists are expecting good numbers of geese for the 1969 season because of good nesting and hatching conditions in Canada this summer.

The season ends January 11. The possession limit is five geese or brant but is subject to restriction in different sections of the state.

West of U.S. Highway 81 the daily bag limit and possession limit is not more than one Ross's goose and, in the alternative, one white-fronted goose; or one Canada goose; or two Canada geese.

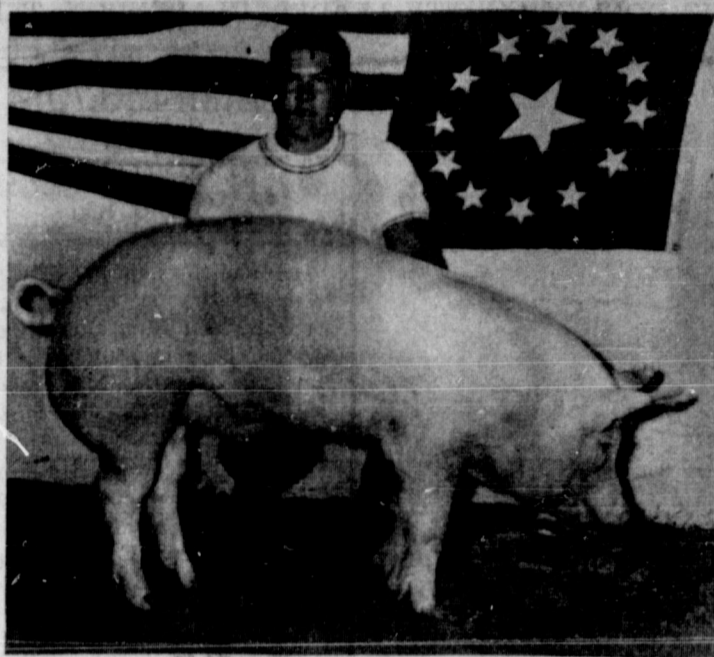
East of U.S. Highway 81 the daily bag limit is not more than one Ross's goose and, in the alternative, one Canada goose; or one white-fronted goose. The possession limit is not more than one Ross's goose and, in the alternative, two Canada geese; or one Canada and one white-fronted goose.

The shooting hours for geese and brant are ½ hour before sunrise to sunset. Sunrise and sunset are announced daily by the United States Weather Bureau.

The daily bag limits specified are the maximum number of the indicated species which may be legally killed, taken or possessed during the permitted shooting hours in one calendar day.

The possession limits specified are the maximum numbers of the indicated species which may be in one person's possession at any time. For the first day of any open season on any species the possession limit is the same as the daily bag limit.

One fully feathered wing must remain attached to dressed ducks and geese while being transported between the place taken and the personal abode of the possessor or between the place taken and a commercial

preservation facility.

No person may possess any freshly killed migratory game birds during the closed season. Hunters are required to make a reasonable effort to retrieve killed or wounded birds.

Responsibility for the wise use of resources is a part of the heritage that reposes with each new generation. Acceptance of this responsibility by a knowledgeable and capable public is a continuing need in the interest of the public and security. —Resources in Action, Agriculture/2000

PRAIRIE CHICKEN TO BE STUDIED

The Texas and Wildlife Department is embarking upon an extensive study of the Attwater's prairie chicken; landowners and hunters and other outdoorsmen are asked to help.

One of the first tasks in the study is to find out the location of the existing Attwaters. Biologists are interested in any sightings. Information concerning the location of the sighting and the landowner's name, address, and phone number should be sent to Don Frels, 105 San Jacinto, c/o Parks and Wildlife Department, La Porte, Texas 77571, or phone 471-3200.

With an estimated population of just over 1,000, the Attwater's prairie chicken is an endangered species. Although they know the prairie chicken's population is declining, biologists do not have thorough knowledge of all the causes, and until they do, they have no means to reverse the decline.

Hence, the full scale study. Frels, who is the wildlife supervisor for Region IV where the study is being made, says other agencies are concerned with the population decline and are launching projects of their own to examine various aspects of the

problem.

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and World Wildlife Fund are purchasing lands to preserve existing habitat.

Texas A&M University, in cooperation with the Caesar Kleberg Foundation, is doing experimental habitat manipulation, experimental propagation of pen-raised birds, studies on its nutritional requirements, and a chromosome study to determine the prevalence of lethal genes in individual chickens and individual colonies.

After a review of literature concerning the Attwater's prairie chicken, a comprehensive inventory of the bird will be made. Biologists will probably have to develop their own censusing technique since no satisfactory method has been developed which accurately gives the sex ratio, productivity, and population levels.

Major colonies must be located and counted annually to determine trends. By modern telemetry methods habitat requirements and habits of the Attwater's prairie chicken will be studied.

For this work, two study areas will be selected in the birds present range. Chickens will be trapped and marked. Activity will be recorded with the use of

telemetry equipment. Individuals of both sexes will be followed to determine feeding, breeding, nesting and brooding territories.

The bird will be located by triangulation once each hour for a 24-hour period, once a week and four times a day, three days per week. The locations will be marked on an aerial photograph of the area.

Biologists say they hope they can ultimately stabilize the prairie chicken population and remove it from the endangered list.

Who knows? Someday it might be restored to huntable numbers.

AGRICULTURAL BRIEFS —

TEXAS CROP REPORT—Yield prospects for most major crops continue to fall short of levels attained last year. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service says production of cotton, sorghum, rice, hay, sweet potatoes and peanuts is expected to be lower and sugar beets, corn, soybeans and Irish potatoes to be higher than last year. Lack of rainfall during the growing season in east, central and south Texas and lower harvested acres, notably for rice and peanuts, were cited as major factors in the decreased production.
