Gas Rate To Increase With Dec. Billing

The City Council has granted a 6 cent per 1000 cu. ft. increase to the City Gas Company effective with the statement local customers will receive December first. This will cover the period from October 20th to November 20, meter reading period

The Texas Railroad Commission recently granted the same increase to Lone Star Gas Co. game Friday night. November likely to get hurt, not the vic- Gate Station serving the City of Clarendon and City Gas Co. only asked for the same increase

The minimum gas rate will remain the same, \$1.25 for the first 1000 cu. ft. of gas. The sters, disguised as pirates or next 24,000 will be charged at .764 per 1000 and the next 25,000 will be .714 cents per 1000.

This is the first increase granted the gas company since 1960.


It is more important that the student be thinking about what he hears than it is that he listens intently to what the teacher




