**A COUPLE OF SAFETY** tips were passed to us this week which bear repeating. Both are aimed primarily at cleanup work on various cemeteries in this area.

The first suggestion is that care be exercised in throwing away old flower arrangements.

These arrangements often contain various lengths of wire which are used by florists in preparing a spray or pot plant. If these pieces of wire are carelessly dropped on the ground, they may be swirled up by a power mower.

When slung from a power mower, a short piece of wire can be every bit as lethal as a bullet. They are a menace both to the mower operator and to anyone else who might be in the area.

The second tip is that workers make it a point to pile trash in central locations, rather than leaving it a haphazard toss. Collecting scattered trash can be both dangerous and time-consuming.

It is entirely possible that carelessness in cleaning a cemetery lot could contribute to the need for another lot there soon.

## Session Opens Highway Project

Work on the 8.9 miles segment of Interstate 20 which extends through Callahan County beginning at the Eastland County line was formally kicked off Wednesday with a pre-construction conference.

Some 15 officials, lawmen and interested persons who will be affected by the project — which is expected to take about two years for completion — attended the session in the Callahan County courthouse.

The segment begins 3 of a mile east of Mexia Creek. Allen Construction Co. is contractor for the highway, which will be a four-lane divided structure when completed. Contract cost is some \$2,890,000.

Clearing began Monday. The same company already has one job underway in Callahan on Interstate 20.

Three detours will be required when grading work begins. All three will be zoned for 40 mph speed limit with a no-passing restriction. The detours will be in the Cooper Creek road area, in the Bushy Creek-Deep Creek area, and in the T&P overpass area.

The present lane of pavement will remain in use along most of the 8.9 miles, except through Putnam where additional work will be required.

Preston Poole Jr., of Post, son of Mr. and Mrs. Preston Poole Sr. of Clyde, was elected county attorney of Garza County in the second primary election Saturday.

Poole, a newcomer to Garza County moving there from Houston, with his wife and son, David a year ago — reached the run-off against two opponents.

A graduate of Clyde High School, and a Korean war veteran, he attended McMurry College in Abilene, and received his B.S. degree from North Texas in Denton and his law degree from the University of Houston.

## HOMER PRICE WINS FOURTH TERM AS CALLAHAN COUNTY'S SHERIFF

A write-in campaign which began late in April ended in victory for Callahan County Sheriff Homer Price Saturday as he narrowly captured nomination on the Democratic ballot for a fourth term.

The November general election is expected to be nothing but a formality for Price and other Demo nominees for county office.

Price, who got his name on the second primary ballot with a successful write-in effort just before the May 2 primary, polled 1,044 votes for sheriff Saturday.

He defeated N. L. Long Jr., a deputy sheriff who lives in Cross Plains by 45 votes in the runoff. Long received 999 votes. In the May 2 primary, when Long's name was on the bal-

# \$1 Million - Plus Is Allocated For Road Projects in Callahan

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$1,115,000 for highway construction in Callahan County during 1965-66, announced District Highway Engineer J. C. Roberts of Abilene.

He said a total of 38.3 highway miles in the county will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of E. L. Harris, resident engineer, Abilene.

This work is part of the 1965-66 Consolidated Highway Pro-

gram. More safety and less congestion for 2,067 miles of Texas highways was the objective of the \$166 million improvement program just authorized by the Texas Highway Commission.

The biennial Consolidated Highway Program is aimed at correcting traffic problems on parts of the Primary Highway System of U.S. — and State — numbered highways in Texas.

The Highway Commission called the 2-year program "vital

to our keeping pace with traffic explosion that is increasing five per cent a year". In view of the diffusion of Texas' 22 metropolitan areas — more than any state — "these city-connecting highways must continue to be systematically upgraded for the good of the cities they serve, as well as the safety and convenience of the through travelers," the commission said.

District Engineer Roberts said a total of 114.3 miles in this

highway district would be involved, at a total cost of \$4,834,000.

The following projects will take place in this county:

St. 206 and 279 from Cross Plains to Brown County Line; 3.2 miles; Grading, Structures, Surfacing; estimated cost, \$199,000.

St. 36 from Taylor County Line to U.S. 283; 16.4 miles; additional Surfacing, Surface Shoulders and Construct Climb-

ing Lanes on Sections, estimated cost, \$430,000.

St. 36; from U. S. 283 to St. 279 in Cross Plains; 16.0 miles; Additional Surfacing, Surface Shoulders and Construct Climb-

ing Lanes on Sections; estimated cost, \$426,000. St. 36 from St. 279 in Cross Plains to Eastland County Line; 2.7 miles; Additional Surfacing and Surface Shoulders; estimated cost, \$60,000.

## Care, Fast Germination Best Way To Stop Mold Seedling Disease

Black mold seedling disease has resulted in substantial losses to peanut stands in many areas of the state during the past several growing seasons. The severity of the problem has initiated research in order to find a solution for combating the disease.

Plants are not susceptible to primary attack by the disease after they have emerged from the soil and have produced green leaves. Thus, seedlings are more susceptible from the time of germination to emergence.

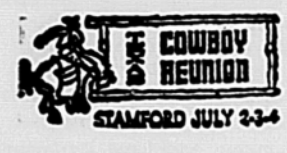
County Agent Pat C. Garner says growers should plant when conditions are most favorable for fast germination and emergence. Seed should be planted as shallow as possible so that

seedlings will not have to break through an undue amount of soil in order to emerge.

Shortening the time required for emergence reduces the time in which the plants are susceptible to attack.

Garner says that it is important to avoid injury to the seed at planting time. Injured seed tend to be more prone to infection by the disease. Care should also be taken to avoid injury to the plants. Although mechanically injured the plants are only slightly prone to infection, heat-induced wounds reduce the plant's susceptibility to a considerable extent.

High quality seed treated with a thiram type seed protectant such as Arasas 75 should be planted, suggests Garner. This, along with shallow planting when conditions are favorable for germination and emergence, will result in reduced losses due to the black mold seedling disease.

## Southeastern Portion of Texas Has Abundant Historical Sites

Are you thrilled by Texas history? If so, you will enjoy visiting some of the scores of historic spots that mark the challenging episodes of our frontier land.

The battle cry that spurred the Texans on at San Jacinto was "Remember the Alamo; Remember Goliad," and it is quite fitting that the state, many years ago, established a state park at Goliad in southeast Texas. It was here that Colonel Fannin and his men were massacred on Palm Sunday, March 27, 1836.

Goliad is situated on U. S. Highways 59, 183, and alternate 77; and can also be reached in State Highway 239 from the west.

In Goliad State Park there is a small museum of early Texas relics and the Mission Espiritu Santo de Zuniga. In 1749, this mission was moved to Goliad by the Franciscan padres to Christianize the Indians and civilize the frontier. It is open to the public.

Nearby is the Presidio La Bahia where the Goliad Declaration of Independence was drawn in 1835. Sunday mass is still celebrated there. Near La Bahia stands a monument to Colonel Fannin and his men.

Goliad became the county seat

of Goliad County in 1837. On the courthouse grounds you will find the famous "Hanging Tree."

City Park has a monument to the men who lost their lives at Goliad, erected in April, 1885, surmounted by two cannons found on the streets of the town after the Texas Revolution.

Twenty-five miles northeast of Goliad on U. S. 59 is Victoria, one of the first three towns of the Republic. Here you will find a number of beautiful antebellum homes, still in good condition, as well as the famed Dutch Windmill in Memorial Square.

If you'd like a bit of fishing to finish off your trip, drive on another 27 miles on U.S. 87 to Port Lavaca, where redfish and speckled trout abound.

AUSTIN — State Democratic party leaders here have completed advance preparations for a June 16 Texas party convention which could turn into a donnybrook or go off smooth as silk.

Action will take place at Houston's big coliseum and the swank Shamrock Hilton Hotel, convention headquarters.

Delegates and alternate delegates who will cast the 2,834 authorized votes (some counties

are sending up to 15 times their authorized strength) will be quartered in 27 hotels scattered over Houston.

Big job is selecting delegates to the August national presidential nominating convention in Atlantic City and picking Texas national Democratic committee representatives.

Big argument is whether the convention will go on record as favoring the as-yet-unwritten national Democratic platform.

## Baird Officer Will Finish AF Studies

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — Capt. Grady E. Davis Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Grady E. Davis Sr. of Baird is to graduate Friday (June 12) from the U.S. Air Force Command and Staff College at the Air University, Maxwell AFB, Ala.

Captain Davis is one of more than 500 graduates who will mark the end of more than nine months of professional military education for career Air Force captains and majors.

The captain's wife, Betty, is the daughter of Mrs. Ruby Huscher of 400 S. Phillips, Salina, Kan. He is a graduate of Baird High School.

Gov. John Connally, who claims a two-thirds to three-fourths margin of control, prefers that delegates remain silent on the liberal national program. He wants to write his own state party platform at the September state convention along moderate-to-conservative lines.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough and State AFL-CIO President Hank Brown argue the convention not only should pledge its support to President Johnson (there is no argument about that) but to his liberal program as well.

Some 26 per cent of the convention's seats are in contest.

Austin Attorney Will D. Davis, chairman of a state Democratic Executive Committee sub-panel on credentials, has instructed heads of 14 rival delegations from seven counties to send him advance written briefings on their positions.

Hearings will begin Monday (June 15) at 9 a.m. in the Shamrock. Recommendations of Davis' group will be passed along to the full SDEC, which will decide in an 8:30 a.m. Tuesday (June 16) session which delegations will be seated. The convention opens at 10 a.m.

Rival fund-raising events are scheduled Monday (June 15). The pro-Connally SDEC will stage a \$10-a-plate dinner to finance the convention. Yarborough's Gulf Coast friends have scheduled an appreciation dinner for the senior senator at the same time.

If President Johnson has any preference about how things should go, he apparently kept silent on them during his recent trip to Texas. Aides maintained to the end of the visit he did not discuss politics with his old friend Governor Connally, Senator Yarborough or anybody else.

CONGRESSIONAL REDISTRICTING — Texas Legislative Council study committee has set three hearings to gather firsthand advice from the homefolks on how to form 23 Texas congressional districts of equal population. Dates are July 9, July 10, and July 17.

They will be held in Fort Worth, Dallas and Houston. Others apparently will follow.

Legislators, political party spokesmen and the general public from counties where the meetings will be held and surrounding counties are invited to attend the sessions and give their views on how best to comply with federal court redistricting orders, said Committee Chairman Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr warned the committee that the 1965 Legislature must solve the congressional redistricting problem.

Carr said, "The more you base it on any other considerations, the greater risk you run of having to go through the same thing again in the courts."

LOAN REGULATIONS - Small loan company advertising of such terms as "lowest costs," "quickest service" and "easy payments" is "misleading" under new state regulations. All advertising claims by lenders are subject to the test of absolute accuracy.

Regulations were adopted after public hearings here and go into effect on July 1. Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank A. Miskell has announced.

Miskell lists other regulations as: No strong arm collection practices permitted. . . . Companies must keep detailed records showing all charges on loans. . . . Borrowers must be furnished copies of insurance policies purchased in connection with loans. . . . Money collected in premiums must be turned over to the insurance companies promptly.

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# Outdoors In Texas

BY VERN SANFORD

The flat bottom boat is nothing new. Under the name of skiff or pram it has been around for ages.

In Arkansas a good many years ago someone dubbed it the john boat and that name has stuck. No one knows exactly where the name originated. But it serves its purpose well.

In most of Texas about the only flat bottom boats are homemade affairs. Usually they are built for river use. Generally they are constructed of 1x12, caulked with a heavy application of tar on the inside and covered with green muck on the outside. They are the kind you find tied up under an overhanging willow on the river bank.

Now, however, the john boat, flat-bottom or square end, as you might prefer to call it, is coming into its own in Texas.

You'll find most of them in East Texas. They are numerous on such lakes as Caddo, Texarkana and Lake o' the Pines. The john boat is an easy boat to handle. It can be transported on top of the car without too much trouble.

Today john boats are being made in both aluminum and fiberglass. Weights are about the same, usually slightly more than 100 pounds. Two men can

handle one on top of a car, with relative ease. Especially the 12-foot models, which are lighter.

Most practical and popular john boat is the 14-footer. However, in Arkansas they use a great many of the 16 to 20 foot length for float fishing.

In fact, the 16-footer is almost a standard item on Arkansas streams. They have plenty of beam and ample freeboard. And they can be powered by comparatively light motors.

The john boat has ample space for carrying a duffle bag, an ice box and comfortable swivel seats for the fishermen. Three men can fish in comfort from one of these longer boats.

On East Texas lakes, however, the 12 and 14-foot boats are the most practical. In fact, they are ideal for the diversified fisherman — the man who doesn't care too much what kind of fish he catches.

One big advantage in these car-toppers is that they can be hauled right to the bank of the lake or stream, thereby eliminating long rides across open water. If you know where there is a good tree-top expanse of water you can drive up to the shoreline, slide the boat in the water, and with a small motor be in your fishing spot in a matter of minutes.

After you reach your destination manipulation of the john boat is simple, although perfection takes considerable practice and experience.

I like to watch experts fish from these boats. They sit in the front end of the boat and with a short paddle and a stirring motion, move the boat along from tree to tree with the greatest of ease.

Most of these fishermen use a comparatively short cane pole. Rigged up with a line slightly shorter than the pole, they use two hooks. One may be baited with a minnow, another with a worm or a cricket.

They move up to a brush pile or a tree stump protruding from the water, drop the hook to the

bottom and jiggle the bait a couple of times. If there is a fish around it usually hits pretty quick. If not, the fishermen quietly move on to another location.

These fishermen do not bother to string their catch. Most of them have wire baskets hanging over the sides of their boats. They drop the fish into these baskets.

In the course of a day they will get a mixed assortment of fish. Some will be bass, others large bream and crappie. Occasionally they'll pull up a good catfish or two.

This is an economical way to fish. Initial price of the boat is comparatively small. A 3-hp motor is ample and it doesn't cost too much. With a cartop boat, no trailer is involved.

Not only is transportation of the john boat simple, but so is its storage.

It can be suspended from the ceiling of your garage, completely out of the way. Then when needed, all you have to do is lower it on top of your car and tie it securely to your luggage rack.

John boats make excellent auxiliary boats. As such they certainly have earned their place in Texas.

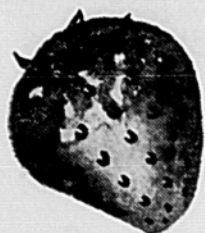

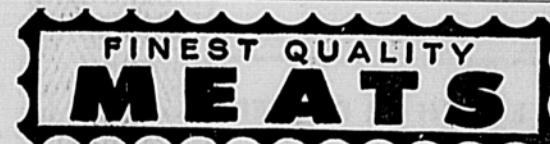
