**Construction Mishap** Kills Man at Baird

Graciano Mora, 40, of Rt. 5 Abilene, was killed about 9:45 a. m. Saturday while working on a highway construction job near Baird.

According to Bob Bailey, contractor, Mora was fatally injured when a crane's boom cable broke and the boom fell on him. Bailey said about 15 men were working on the construction at the intersection of IH 20 and U. S. 283. He said the crew was pouring concrete there where an underpass is being built.

## Girls Track Program Set

A state organization for girls track and field competition has been organized in Texas, with plans being made for district, regional and state competition.

The program was divided into two divisions, I for Class A and B schools, and II for Class 2A, 3A and 4A schools.

L. B. Howard was named director for District 8, which includes Callahan, Hardeman, Wilbarger, Wichita, Clay, Knox, Baylor, Archer, Haskell, Throckmorton, Young, Jack, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Taylor, Eastland, Erath, Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Comanche and Hamilton counties.

Running events sanctioned include 60, 100 and 220 yard dashes, 80 meter hurdles, and 440 and 880 yard relays. Field events will include 8-lb. shot put, discus, high jump, broad jump and hop-step-jump.

## Deadline Gets Near On Peanut Acreage

Final dates to request or release peanut acreage through the Callahan County ASCS office is Monday, April 5. Another date was previously announced through error.

Are present, the office does not have enough released acreage to satisfy requests for additional acreage from others. Farmers who do not plan to plant peanuts this year have been urged to release their allotment so others may use it.

March 26 is the final date for cotton producers to sign up for the 1965 program. Only producers with effective allotments larger than domestic allotments are required to sign if they wish to participate.

Producers who sign for the domestic program, but later plant and harvest the effective allotments, will not be eligible for the loan.

# Commission Okays Clyde Water Permit

A new lake for Clyde moved a big official step closer to realization Monday when the Texas Water Commission granted the city a permit for a water supply reservoir.

The way is now clear for the city to begin acquiring land for the lake, which is to be built on Upper Pecan Bayou about six miles south of Clyde. Plans for the project, drawn by engineers from the Soil Conservation Service, are nearing final approval, and should be completed by the time land arrangements have been made.

**To Contractors** Construction should go up for bids by contractors shortly after land acquisition is completed.

Clyde's permit is for use of up to 1,000 acre feet of water per year for municipal water supply and recreational purposes.

One provision to the permit was added by the water commission at Monday's hearing in Austin. The provision, considered

normal in such cases, stipulates that adjacent land owners may take water from the reservoir for domestic and livestock as long as there is no danger of pollution.

Addition of the provision eased the main objections of landowners who protested the Clyde application at the hearing, according to Hudson Smart, an Abilene attorney.

**Oppose Permit** Protests were from Mrs. A. E. Young and Robert Alvis Young, who own a portion of land to be flooded by the new lake. Smart said granting of water rights for domestic and livestock use erased their main opposition to the program.

Cost of the new lake will be shared by the City of Clyde and the Soil Conservation Service. Clyde's share will come from \$400,000 in bonds voted last March, while the SCS is participating because the dam will double as a flood retention

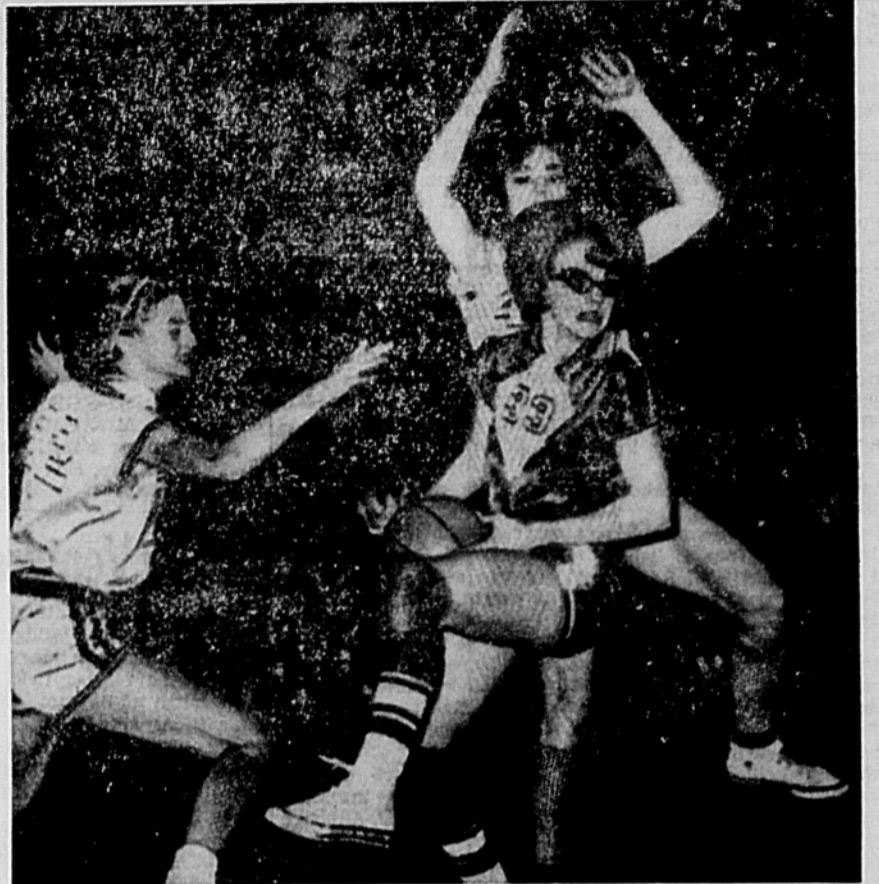
structure as well as providing a municipal water supply.

Last March, \$325,000 in revenue bonds and \$75,000 in tax bonds were okayed by Clyde voters to finance lake construction.

**Last Big Hurdle** Approval of Clyde's permit by the water commission was among the last major hurdles of the project. Further delay could come if landowners and the city cannot agree on land prices. However, in such a case, the city could initiate condemnation proceedings if necessary.

City Atty. Gaston Swofford and R. Harry Akin, an Austin attorney, represented Clyde at the hearing. Mayor Harold Holden of Clyde and Robert E. Hogan, consulting engineer from Dallas, testified as to the need for the project.

Clyde banker Lee Loper testified that a recreation area is needed badly by the commun-

# Bearettes Finish Fourth In State Cage Tourney

The long climb back toward a second straight state championship for the Baird Bearettes fell short last weekend -- but two state tournament losses did little to tarnish what otherwise was a highly successful basketball season.

Mighty Roosevelt, which went on to succeed the Bearettes as state Class A champs, burst the Baird bubble with a convincing 66-38 defeat Friday in the state semi-finals.

Then West Sabine capitalized on free throws to take third place away from Baird, 45-38, Saturday morning.

## Good Season

But despite two quick losses at the Austin tournament, the Baird girls compiled a proud record this season, including going undefeated through district play and winning a regional championship which many observers felt was entirely out of their reach.

The Bearettes started strong against unbeaten Roosevelt, taking an early lead and hold-

ing a two-point edge, 18-16 when the first quarter ended.

Although Roosevelt took the lead to stay early in the second period, the Bearettes kept the margin small until the final three minutes of the first half. That's when Roosevelt began to pull away, making it 36 to 24 by halftime.

Disaster came in the third period, however, as Roosevelt raced to 14 points while Baird could counter with only two points, both on free throws. When the fourth period opened, there was little hope for the Bearettes as they trailed by 50-26.

## Add To Edge

Roosevelt added four more points to its edge in the final eight minutes to win going away.

Dee Gregory was the big difference in the game, scoring 35 points for the winners while Alice Woolley added 18. Sally Green was highest for Baird with 13, followed by Vickey Jones with 12 and Yvonne Shel-nutt with 11.

All three of Baird's starting

guards fouled out of the game while attempting to hold down scoring by the rangy Roosevelt forwards. Drawing five fouls were Betty Corn, Sue Howard and Sharon Jeter.

West Sabine outscored Baird in all but the final quarter in claiming third place in the Saturday game. It was 15-10 after one quarter and 23-14 at half-time.

## Cut Margin

West Sabine stretched the margin to 38-26 by the end of the third, but the Bearettes scored 12 in the last quarter to 7 for the winner to leave the final deficit at seven points.

In that game, Baird outscored West Sabine from the floor, 13 field goals to 11, but the winners chucked in 23 foul shots to 12 for the Bearettes.

Judy Wright stole scoring honors for the game with 22, while teammate Susan Smith hit 16. Miss Jones racked in 21 points for Baird, Sally Green had 11, and Yvonne Shelnutt added 6.

# Outdoors In Texas

Here's an experiment that will interest you duck hunters. It's a project to determine the relative effectiveness of lead and iron-shot loads -- thus hoping to find a way to alleviate the lead poisoning losses of ducks.

For 30 days hunters and game biologists at Nilo Farms in Illinois took a long look at flying Mallards and iron-shot pellets.

Over a hundred ducks were shot during the experiment which was conducted as a joint study by Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation and the Mississippi Flyway Council.

They point out, of course, that one way is to employ a shot pellet that is not poisonous to dabbling ducks that eat lead pellets lying on shallow marsh bottoms.

Any alloy of lead, it seems, is about as poisonous as pure lead itself. On the other hand, certain heavy metals such as iron are not poisonous.

But how well will iron shoot? Not as well as lead.

Lead is dense, soft, and ballistically ideal. Iron is lighter and harder than lead. So iron pellets lose velocity rather rapidly and will score steel shotgun barrels.

But even so, there can be compensations.

Since iron is lighter than lead, it may be possible to reduce the volume of wadding in a shotgun shell and thus increase the quantity of shot to compensate for the decrease in pellet weight. The iron load would contain more pellets than a standard lead load, but would be of equivalent weight. Hence a duck may be hard-hit with the lighter pellets simply because it is hit oftener.

It also may be possible to anneal iron to such a degree that

It has little effect on shotgun barrels. From the experiments so far, iron pellets appear to be surprisingly effective. Flying mallards were shot each "test day" at widely varying ranges. Then range of each shot was recorded, the duck was later flourscoped. Kills with iron-shot ranged up to 40 yards. Ducks that were centered in the shot cloud were cleanly killed at all ranges. There were few cripples or ragged kills with iron-shot.

Until test data is analyzed by Flyway Council technicians, iron pellets really cannot be compared to the lead "control" pellets that were fired at the same time. But it did seem to these experimenting hunters that the bulk of the iron-shot Mallards were literally dead on the wing.

Many iron-shot pellets passed entirely through the big Mallards with no deformation whatever. Some Mallards were hit with as many as nine pellets, and failed to stop any.

The lead "control" shot were number 4s; the iron-shot were slightly larger than number 2 in order to achieve comparable pellet weight. Gun barrels underwent a marked change, but did not score and erode as rapidly as expected. The polyethylene shot sleeves of the Mark 5 shells did not protect the barrels from the iron pellets.

A complete report on this test will be made by the Mississippi Flyway Council. Although a study can be regarded only as preliminary, it does reveal a growing impatience with the annual lead-poisoning toll of waterfowl.

Duck hunters of Texas, of which there are many, will be interested in seeing further studies undertaken.

## Former Callahan Man Dies in California

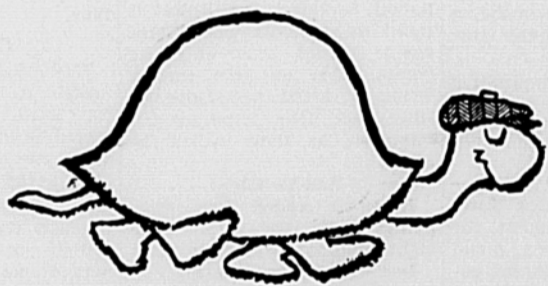
Funeral services for Leland Ray Clemmer, 63, were held on March 4 in Chowchilla, Calif. Burial was in Chowchilla District Cemetery.

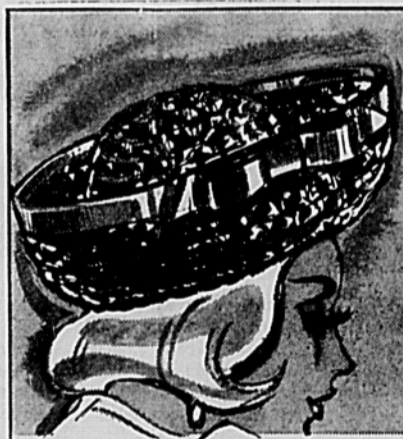

Among speakers will be Dr. Verna Mae Crutchfield of Abilene, whose subject will be "Eastern Europe Looks Toward A Better Tomorrow."

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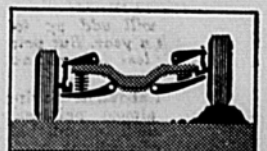
