Washington, D. C, Aug. 21 1899,—Fair tonight and tomorrow.

It is reported that Fred Cockrell of Abilene, Senator Turney of El Paso, Judges Browning and Plemons of Amarillo, will all enter the race for a congress against John H. Stephens, the present incumbent.—Floydada Gazette.

Are you in favor of McKinley militarism? If so, and there are enough like you in America, then you may prepare your boys for their sacrifice, for as sure as death and taxes they will be conscripted if they do not volunteer—and that at no very distant day.

Representative Bankhead, of Alabama, was in Washington last week. He was indignant because of a publication alleging that he attended an anti-Bryan meeting at Saratoga. Speaking of it, he said: "I haven't been in Saratoga and it is well known that Alabama is a Bryan state. We will send an instructed Bryan delegation to the next national convention. Bryan is the logical candidate, he will be unanimously nominated, and he will be elected, too."

Railroad passes to public officials are being revoked. Leroy Trice, of the International and Great Northern, issues to all, including state officers and members of the legislature, the following circular letter:

"On account of the enactment by the twenty-sixth general assembly of the law commonly known as the anti-discrimination felony law and the possible danger of the courts holding that the passenger transportation heretofore issued by this company to you

comes within the prohibition of the law, prudence suggests that we call in the transportation issued to you. You are accordingly requested to return the same and are respectfully advised that it will not be honored by this company after Aug. 25, 1899. We are endeavoring to reach a decision as to what transportation we can issue without being prosecuted for violating the law. If we find that transportation to you is not forbidden we will immediately, with pleasure, reissue transportation in your favor. You understand that a violation of this law means not less than two years in the penitentiary, and I know you will appreciate our position."

It is an outrage on the part of both the railroads and officials that free passes should have ever been given, or accepted, to and by those most able to pay. Honestly, it can be construed as nothing short of bribery. At the same time the country need expect nothing better until economic conditions are so changed as to permit everybody to make an honest living. And this can never be done until natural opportunities are open to free equal access to everybody. Free passes is robbery of all the people as much so as train robbery is of some people. One is legalized, the other is not—that's all.
