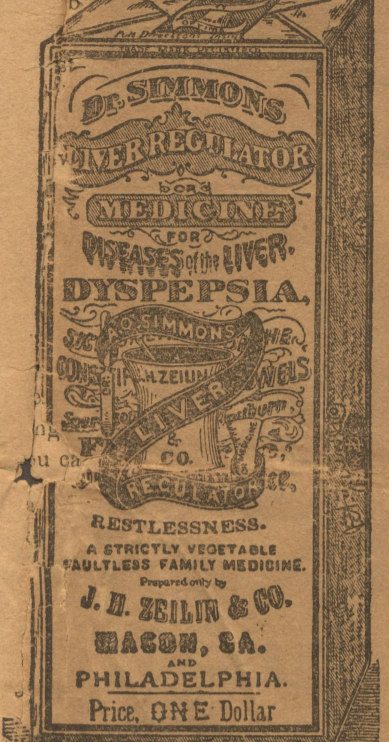

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TEXAS IMMIGRATION BOOM.

A Dallas News reporter interviewed a few days ago Col. J. F. Elliott, secretary of the State Immigration Society, with the following result:

"There is an evident widespread interest being taken in the boom throughout the state and abroad as well. I am even now in daily receipt of from twenty five to thirty five letters from our own counties and the eastern and western states. The people of the latter are making all manner of inquiries about Texas lands—farming, mineral, timber, etc. For this reason I am requesting all Texas real estate agents and owners to forward me at the Austin headquarters printed lists of such properties, that I may send the same to the inquirers, which will, of course, be done impartially to all. Only yesterday I received a letter from a wealthy and observant Texan at Los Angeles, who advises me that the bank there are full of money on deposit by prospectors who have become skittish about purchases there at the fabulous figures now prevailing in all countries. He writes that they are furthermore uneasy about a possible collapse, especially that Texas is so energetically at work offering a grade of lands for \$2.50 to \$5 per acre that are there commanding \$50 to \$100 per acre. He writes: "Send a first class man here at once in the interest of Texas, and some of these millions may be transferred to your banks to await results of investigation of what you have to present. There was a very intelligent and shrewd gentleman from Iowa who came to see us in Austin last week on this subject. He advised me that himself and a wealthy firm in his state had sold 2,600,000 acres of lands in Kansas within the last four and a half years and had settled on them several thousand immigrants. At present, he says, lands are high priced as compared with what can be done elsewhere, particularly in Texas. He is anxious now to make arrangements to turn this whole tide into Texas, and thinks that inside of three years he and they can sell as much here as they sold in Kansas since July, 1873. He says they got their remuneration by a division of the commissions with the real estate agents, just as the general passenger agents often do. Their work in Kansas netted them over \$30,000. They brought many from the East, and from Germany, Sweden, etc. I am requesting all the counties of the state to send their specimens of their products, agricultural, mineral, manufactured, etc., to place on exhibit, together with all descriptive literature and other matter that may enlist the interest of the inquirer."

"I can't say how soon the rush will come, but if you could see our correspondence from all over the country you would think you saw a cyclone boom coming this way."

A country correspondent of the Mobeetie Panhandle says:

"On Wolf creek between the 7K and Bar C ranches, a distance of ten miles, are thirteen farms. Some of them are well improved and would present a respectable appearance in the settlements. The people are wide awake and progressive. A church has been organized consisting of a dozen members, and last summer the Sunday school had an attendance of thirty-five. A house 14x30 is being erected, to be used for church, Sunday and day school purposes. When completed a concert will be given and the proceeds devoted to seating the building."

It says an exchange, we were to put a two-line local in the most obscure corner of the sheet, which stated that a certain business man charged more for his goods and kept a poorer grade of the same than his competitors, that man would employ a bullheaded slogger to come around and kill us the next morning. Canadian city is advertising for a Bakery.

Thirty dollars is the amount assessed to Wheeler county for the general immigration fund.

Canadian City now boasts of a brand new Southernland Hotel. It is three stories high and cost over \$10,000.

Immigration to the Panhandle of Texas continues, is the frequent remark of our eastern and northern exchanges.

Canadian city has a flourishing Sunday school according to the recent report made by the editor of the Crescent.

It is said that all the agricultural school land in Carson county is held down by either a supposed or an actual settler.

Wm. Cameron & Co., J. S. Mayfield & Co., and the Chicago Lumber Co., have all opened yards at the town of Panhandle in Carson county.

The Panhandle Herald says there are six hacks constantly running from Armstrong station to Panhandle City to accommodate the rush of prospectors.

Timms City folks have put up thirty tons of ice for next summer. They propose to build several brick blocks the coming season out of brick made at home.

It is reported that there are only fourteen candidates for county assessor of Hemphill county at this time. It is the promise of a big crop of such fruit.

Our pioneer Panhandle railway, the Fort Worth & Denver railway, has crossed the entire Panhandle, and has over twenty miles of track laid in the territory of New Mexico.

At the last session of the Hemphill county commissioners they ordered a bridge built over the Canadian river at Canadian City to cost \$10,000 and all the people there are happy.

The Frisco has completed a preliminary survey for a line between Fort Reno and Panhandle City, Texas, and construction will be commenced as soon as spring opens.—Dallas News.

We have it on unquestionable authority that the Southern Kansas Ry. is to push from its present terminus on toward Albuquerque in next month. This information is from the headquarters of the road.—Tascosa Pioneer.

An exchange offers the following cud for those farmers to chew who are always sighing for the "good old times": "Sixty years ago a bushel of wheat would buy only two yards of calico or shirting, now it will buy fifteen or twenty. Then a bushel of corn, would buy only a pound of nails, now it will buy ten."

The recent cold spell was one of the severest ever known in the north and west. Even the usually salubrious Texas shivered when the wind rolled by, but gentle Miami bobbed up serenely with a smile as Mr. Blizard hurled himself over Mr. Maria, bound for Panhandle City via Canadian, and felt only the whip-like crack of its tail as it passed over.—Miami Ranger.

It comes from very reliable source that the Southern Kansas is now taking preliminary steps looking to the building of its line from Fort Worth to a connection with the line from Kiowa to Panhandle city which it is said will be extended to a junction with the Fort Worth line when the latter is built to Albuquerque. As will be remembered the charter granted this road by the state of Texas calls for Fort Worth as the initial point and the headquarters of the road. The Southern Kansas of Texas is a powerful corporation, able to push the work of construction under high pressure. On to Albuquerque.—Fort Worth Gazette.

ROBERTS county organized for immigration purposes on Monday of this week at Miami.

FORT WORTH capitalists have organized a paper-mill company and applied for a charter.

WE LEARN from Dr. J. D. Stocking that the Panhandle Medical Board will meet in Canadian city February 22.

Hemphill county has organized for immigration purposes and elected W. H. Featherington, Chairman; Mr. Blakeney, Secretary; F. S. Lord, Treasurer.

TASCOSA has conquered W. M. D. Lee, and Mr. Lee consents to let the people of Tascosa have their way about the depot, and it will be built right away.

JUDGE WILLIS has appointed Dr. S. Longley, of Canadian; Dr. R. A. Field, of Mobeetie and Dr. J. D. Stocking, of Clarendon; a board of Medical examiners for this judicial district.

It is gratifying to know that the Denver, Texas and Fort Worth road has over thirty miles of track laid this way from Emory Gap and that there is only seventy miles of ground to travel over to complete the entire line.

ABOUT all the Panhandle papers have agreed on February 22, Washington's Birthday, as the time, and Canadian as the place.

THE TRACK of the Fort Worth & Denver has reached Clayton, New Mexico, at the foot of the Rabbit Ear mountain.

CHILDRESS county has organized for immigration purposes. Rev. J. G. Stewart, J. C. McCracken, C. E. Brown, W. B. Poling, G. S. Johnson, Fred Estes and W. L. R. Dickson were appointed an executive committee.

Judge B. E. Green is out for a few days in Randall county, looking after the interests of intending actual settlers and arranging to demand a reclassification of some lands erroneously reported upon.

Panhandle Unity Again. Last week we took occasion to republish a significant paragraph on this subject from the Mobeetie Panhandle. This vital theme was most vigorously set forth a few days ago at Canadian city in a speech by Hon. L. E. Finch reported by the Crescent.

Several speeches were made. Mr. Finch was called for and made a short but interesting speech on immigration and the means to be used for securing the largest results.

He dwelt in an impressive manner upon the necessity for advertising the county and the magnificent field here awaiting labor and civilization.

According to the Panhandle Herald a cyclone has struck Panhandle city. He says: "The boom has at last fairly struck Panhandle City. There are upward of two hundred carpenters and mechanics and laborers now engaged in building stores and residences in this burg."

A CHARTER has been granted by the state of Kansas to the Texas & Mexican railway. It is proposed to build a line from Kansas City through No Man's Land the Panhandle of Texas, New Mexico to El Paso, a distance of twelve hundred miles.

CARSON county has organized for immigration purposes, Col. O. H. Nelson is chairman and Dr. J. H. Carter is secretary. It was an enthusiastic meeting.

Resolved, That we request Judge Plemons to call a delegate convention for the Panhandle counties, to meet not later than February 25, 1888.

Resolved, That we favor the meeting of the convention to be held at the same time and place as the proposed Panhandle Editorial Convention, to be held at Canadian, on February 22, 1888.

A QUANAH correspondent of the Dallas News says that grading on the tap from Washburn, in Armstrong county, has reached nearly half way to Panhandle city, the terminus of the Kansas Southern railway.

Panhandle Immigration. At the Hemphill county public meeting the following resolutions were adopted: Resolved, That Hon. W. B. Plemons, Chairman of the Immigration committee for the Nineteenth Senatorial district, usually called the Panhandle district, be requested to call a delegate convention of the Panhandle counties, to be convened as soon as in the judgment of said chairmen the delegates can be selected and get to the place of meeting.

Resolved, further, That said Hon. W. B. Plemons is invited to call said convention at Canadian, and should he do so, this meeting pledges itself to do everything in the power of the people to make it profitable to the country and the stay of the delegates in Canadian pleasant.

Resolved, further, That while we believe Canadian the most convenient place for said convention, yet if it should be determined to hold it elsewhere, Hemphill county will send delegates and exert herself to make a success.

The Panhandle News

CLARENDON, TEXAS, FEB. 2, 1888.

Wheeler county has organized for immigration purposes and selected the following named citizens, as an executive committee for the county, viz: F. M. Patton, E. G. Senter, J. E. Thompson, Hon. E. Dubbs, R. T. Cole. Hon. Frank Willis and Perry Le Fors.

A Wellington, Kan., dispatch says: The tracklaying force on the Kiowa extension of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe reached Panhandle City, Texas, a few days ago, and will go no further for a few weeks. The company is building extensive yards at that point, and has commenced accumulating there the large amount of material needed for the further extension of the line. At or near Panhandle city the road will branch, one line going southwest to El Paso, on the Rio Grande, and the other due west towards Las Vegas. A junction with the California line will probably be made at Sulzbacher, a few miles south of Las Vegas. The Atchison Company will put an immense force at work on these extensions early in February, and some rapid tracklaying will be done across the great Staked Plains. The Atchison will be the pioneer line into that region, and will open up to settlement an immense area of grazing lands.

Texas has something like 30,000,000 acres of school lands to dispose of, and a little more than 4,000,000 acres, or, loosely estimating, one-seventh of these are leased for the benefit of the state school fund and foreigners at four cents an acre. The amount leased is now at the highest figure, much of the area now so held will be surrendered by the lessees at the end of the current year and very much of it is leased only to get extension of time to admit of a peaceful wind-up of ranch affairs. The leasing of the pitiful one-seventh retards settlement and sale of the entire 30,000,000 acres, and the annual proceeds to the state school fund from the lease is four cents per acre annually against the ten cents that would result from a sale—saying nothing of improvements, enhanced values and personalty, all taxable, to be added to each section on its sale. Any fool in the general land office could have leased this much of the great domain. Because the baron had to have it; no crafty commissioner nor no law can lease anything like a fair proportion of it, because it is not and never will be in demand for the purpose.—Mobeetie Panhandle.

Panhandle Counties.

For the benefit of home seekers we give the following information concerning the twenty seven counties of the Panhandle:

Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Hall and Swisher counties are yet unorganized and are attached to Donley county for land purposes. Clarendon is the county seat.

Collingsworth, Gray, Hansford, Hutchinson, Ochiltree and Roberts counties being unorganized are still

attached to Wheeler county for land purposes. Mobeetie is the county seat, where information can be had.

Castro, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Hartley, Moore, Parmer, Randall and Sherman counties are attached to Oldham county, and Tascosa is the county seat.

Childress, county seat of Childress, Mangum, county seat of Greer, Canadian, county seat of Hemphill, Lipscomb, Lipscomb county, Amarillo, Potter county.

How to get Texas Lands

As we have constant inquiries from those who are seeking to purchase a homestead out of our public lands we reply once for all, that you can buy not less than 160 acres, or 320, 480 or 640, but no more, unless you select purely grazing land without permanent water and not adapted to agriculture, of this pasture land you can buy not to exceed four sections. The dry land will cost you \$2 an acre. But you must come in person to the county seat of the county where the land lies or to which it is attached, if in an unorganized county, and call on the county clerk who will show you a public record of the classification of all unsold state lands. If on looking the ground over you find the land to suit you, you will get a blank form for an application to purchase and other information of the law and the land as may be known to him. You will then execute a sworn affidavit in your application for purchase that you want the land for a homestead for yourself and that no other person or corporation is interested in the purchase, and that you have in good faith actually settled thereon and will improve the same. You will forward your application to purchase directly to Hon. R. M. Hall, State Land Commissioner, Austin, Texas, inclosing the sum of thirty-two dollars to the order of F. R. Lubbock, state Treasurer, this is one-fortieth of the principal on a section of dry agricultural land. If you select land with permanent water on it, it will cost you \$3 per acre, which is one third more than the unwatered land. If you buy land that is valued chiefly for its timber you will pay \$5 an acre cash down. On all other lands you will pay one fortieth of the principal annually, according to the appraisal put on each section in classifying and valuing it. Each annual payment on the principal must be made on or before the first day of August, together with interest at the rate of five per cent per annum on the unpaid principal. After you have occupied the land for three consecutive years and made the required payments of principal and interest due at that date, you will be allowed to pay the balance due on the land and obtain a patent for the same, provided you make satisfactory proof that you have resided on the land for the time specified. At any time after you have settled on the land and bought it, you can sell it to another actual settler, who will be required to assume your obligation to the state. All the unsold state lands are now on the market for sale to actual settlers only for the benefit of the common school, the state university, lunatic asylum, blind asylum, the deaf and dumb asylum and the orphan asylum funds. The Donley land district is composed of the counties of Donley, Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Randall and Swisher with headquarters at Clarendon. Public lands in these counties are being culled every day. Excellent state lands can be had here and a good location secured by coming at once. The sooner you come the better you will be served. When you come call on us and we will take pleasure in telling you all we know about the Panhandle.
