Fire Destroys 3,000 Bales of Hay

Oran Bains and his son-in-law, Claudell Joy, who resides 21 miles south of Baird on the Coleman highway, had the misfortune of losing 3,000 bales of hay, valued at \$2,000, when lightning struck one stack, setting it on fire, and the flames quickly spread to three nearby stacks, during a storm last Tuesday morning.

Mr. Bains said they discovered the fire about 1:20 a. m. Neighbors and the Baird Fire Department quickly responded, and it was through the efforts of the fire department that flames did not spread to the out buildings and residence.

There is an old adage, that lightning never strikes twice in the same place, but nothing said about destroying property of the same person in separate places.

Mr. Bains also sustained a \$1,200 loss when nine big steers he owned were killed when lightning struck a barbed wire fence Friday night on the Clint McIntosh place near Oplin, that Mr. Bains has leased. He stated the steers were very near the fence, and were severely burned, also a big bull snake lying nearby was the victim of the lightning bolt.

He had sold the steers previously, when they went out to the pasture to bring them in, found them all victims of the storm. He also stated nothing was insured.

Your United Fund Helps Keep TRC Open

The Texas Rehabilitation Center, largest rehabilitation facility in the Southwest, has been included in the Baird United Fund for the coming year.

In its aid to Texans, the Texas Rehabilitation Center (Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation) treats the after-effects of such accidents and diseases as cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis, polio, fractured spines and spinal cord injuries, brain damage, arthritis, strokes, and other disabling diseases and conditions of the nerve and muscle systems.

Callahan County residents have been treated at the Center a total of 649 days since 1950. Figured at an average cost of \$30 per day, this runs into some \$19,470.

Although long known for its treatment of post-polio patients, today more than three-fourths of the patients at TRC have handicaps and severely handicapping diseases other than polio.

Rehabilitation treatment at TRC is not just a physical thing. The disabled are given psychological guidance; school is provided for children; and church services are held for all denominations in the wheel chair chapel. Each patient is provided a program individually prescribed by the medical director, who heads the skilled team of rehabilitation specialists.

A certified brace shop at the Center produces braces and appliances made exactly to each patient's measure and his doctor's prescription.

The goal for each patient is maximum rehabilitation - physically and socially - so he can live and work to the best of his abilities.

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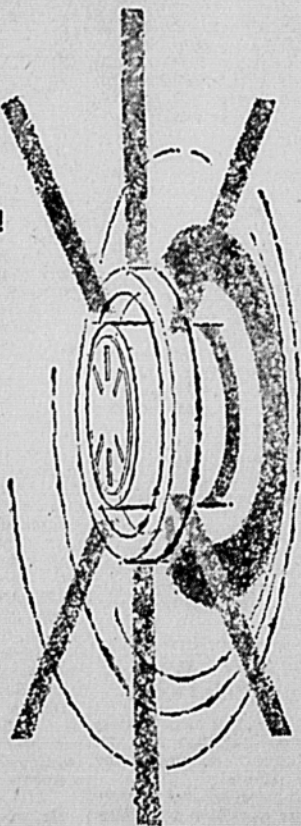

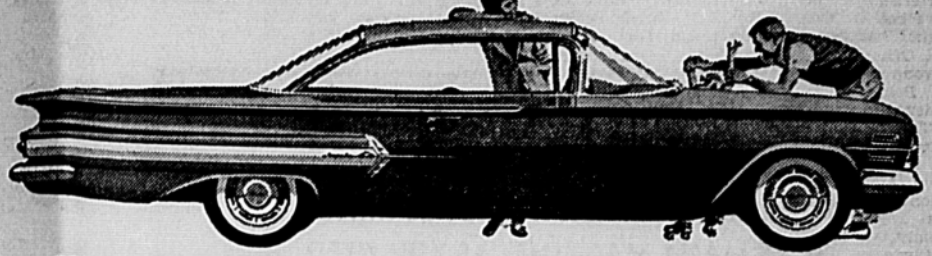

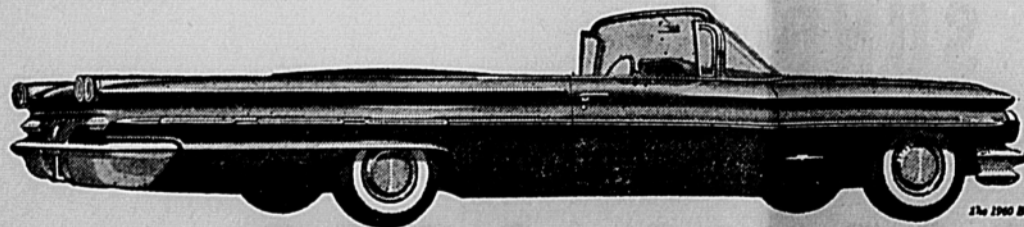

Soil Conservation District News
Conservation accomplishments in Texas Soil Conservation Districts surpassed all previous records during the 1959 fiscal year according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist of Brownwood. On June 30, 1959, over 55% of the total farms and ranches in Soil Conservation Districts and 64% of the agricultural land were covered by farmer-rancher district cooperative agreements. During the fiscal year of 1959, a State summary showed slightly more than 113,000 farm and ranch operators received assistance from the SCS in Texas through locally organized and operated SCD's. Technical assistance of the SCS is made available to landowners and operators for help in developing farm and ranch conservation plans, Soil Bank Program, Great Plains

Conservation Program, Watershed Work, ACP responsibilities and Standard Soil Surveys, with more than one half of all total time being to district assistance to farmers and ranchers in planning and applying measures on the land, Hughes reports. Progress in the Brownwood Area has likewise been unusually good during the past year in accomplishments such as watershed work, proper use on range-land, grasses grown on cropland as rotation hay and pasture, root plowing and reseedling of range-land that has become heavily infested with brush and standard soil survey work. Special emphasis for the year ahead calls for a stepped up watershed construction program that is coordinated with the conservation land treatment work of Soil Conservation Districts; continued assistance to farmers and ranchers in planning complete programs to meet needs of the land in a period that is undergoing unprecedented change in type of agriculture, and to provide technical assistance in conservation to standard soil survey work which is a part of the nation-wide soil inventory program.

ACC to Dedicate Building Oct. 31
Formal dedication services for the Citizenship Center, a three-story classroom building at ACC, will take place October 31 during Homecoming Activities. A campaign to raise \$500,000 for the new building which was begun last November, was completed this summer. Total funds subscribed to the Citizenship Center as of September 10 were \$305,297.53. The largest gift to the campaign was \$100,000 from an anonymous Texas foundation. The building will serve as the

County Agent's News

Rains measuring a total of 7½ to 8 inches fell Wednesday evening and Saturday of last week. It seems that the rains were pretty general over the county. Early planted oats and wheat and range land will be greatly

benefitted, but cotton and peanuts will suffer some damage. Stock tanks and ponds are full again. The Callahan County ASC County Committee election was held last week. Tommy Harris of Cross Plains was reelected as Chairman of the Committee. Arno Rogenstein of Putnam was named vice-chairman, and Har-

old Holden of Clyde was named the third member of the County Committee. He replaces Roy Armor of Dudley who has been a member for the past two years. Mr. Armor had asked not to be considered for the post this year. Albert Betcher, Jr. of Oplin was named first alternate and Gene Finley was named second alternate.

The 1959 Agricultural Census is scheduled to begin in Callahan County Nov. 18. The footwork of census taking will be done by "Enumerators" who will be hired locally. Each enumera-

tor will work in his own district. A group of enumerators will be supervised by a crew leader who will be responsible for training the enumerators. Each farmer and ranchman will be mailed a questionnaire which should be filled out accurately before the enumerator calls on him. The information furnished by the farmer about his farm and himself will be kept confidential and will be used for obtaining totals for counties and States. If you need help in completing the questionnaire the enumerator who calls will help you.

Now is the critical time in the life of range grasses as many are producing seed. Deferment of pastures until after frost will insure the development of a seed crop to aid in revegetation of rangelands with the better native grasses.
