After years of talk and planning and the expenditure of almost a hundred million dollars, Lake Meredith has been completed and the stored water will be carried by a 35 mile aqueduct to serve the nearby cities of Borger and Pampa.

Another aqueduct carries the water to Amarillo and a half-dozen other high-plains cities, which for years have depended entirely upon underground wa-ted for domestic purposes and

Located in Hutchinson County, Lake Meredith will cover slight-ly under 44,000 surface acres. It will be 20 miles long when fill-ed.

ed. Sanford Dam was constructed by the Bureau of Reclamation, after years of research and survey, both by government and by private agencies.

This lake presented some ma-This lake presented some ma-jor problems because much of the reservoir site was in the heart of a major natural gas field. It was necessary to exe-cute contracts with the owners of 19 pipelines and 44 produc-ing wells for relocation of the lines and capping of the wells, or retapping them by slant drill-ing.

ing.

This all has to do with the building of the lake to impound the water. But to the Texas Panhandle, it means so much more in a new recreational area. Floating docks, boat moorings, fueling facilities, trailer parking areas and other recreational facilities are being provided.

Another interesting develo Another interesting develop-ment is the work being done by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department in stocking the new lake with walleyes. Just a year ago some 2,000,000 fry were re-leased in the lake. The baby walleyes were brought down from Iowa, in an exchange agreement between the two states.

agreement between the two states.

Lake Msredith also has been stocked with black bass, crapple and catfish. The Canadian itself long has been a good cat-fish haven and natives have caught many fine cats from the river in the years gone by.

This walleye experiment has been most promising. After the first release of 500,000 in 1965, netting samples from the lake indicated good survival. Pishing for walleyes has been closed in Lake Meredith until such time as it has been shown the fish are well established.

Fine cooperation is expected from sportsmen from the area because the Panhandle long has been famous for its wildlife conservation programs. Most of the fresh water fishing that has been available to these residents has been in Colorado, New Mexica and Central Texas. So Panhandle anglers know the value of this conservation and will give it all the help possible.

Alcohol killed my son. He was just 18, not old enough to buy beer or whiskey, but it was made available to him, and as a result, he is dead.

My son, Wayne Legg, was out with two other boys on the night of December 5, 1966. At about 10 o'clock that night the fog was so thick, I had to roll down the window of my car to see where I was going. On my way home, on that foggy night, little did I know that my only son was driving toward his death.

His senses dulled by beer and whiskey, he was driving too fast on Naaman School Road north of Garland. By the time he saw the curve it was too late.

"Wayne, watch out, you'll kill all of us," one of the boys shouted. The other two were thrown clear. Wayne was killed instantly, when the car hit a dirt embankment.

My son is dead. It's too late to help him now. But what about other boys and girls? We can do something for them. If they drink, their reflexes are slowed. They take chances that they wouldn't ordinarily take. They kill themselves, and sometimes innocent bystanders as well.

When alcohol is available to them the dances.

increases. The more alcohol that is available to

increases. The more alcohol that is available to them, the more of them that are killed, hurt, or crippled for life. The number of deaths of these young people, like my son, increases and decreases with the availability of alcohol.

Regardless of whatever else may be said about it, this is true: If my son had not been drinking, he would not have been killed. If alcohol had not been made available to him, he would not have been killed.

The least we can do is to NOT MANY.

The least we can do is to NOT MAKE ALCO-HOL MORE AVAILABLE.

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

Less than five months remain for veterans of World War II to use their guarantee privileges for a loan to purchase a home, farm or for business purposes. This warning came from Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco.

Present statues provide that
the absolute cutoff date for
World War II veterans will be on
July 25, 1967. This deadline is
the result of Congessional action
which has delayed the final date
of eligibility several times.
The cutoff will not affect veterans of the Korean Conflict or
veterans who have served since
January 31, 1955, Coker pointed
out, as these veterans are covered by different legislation.
Almost seven million loans
have been guaranteed by the
Veterans Administration to veterans since the beginning of the
program following World War
II. One out of every five homes
constructed in the United States following World War II was
with VA guarantee.
The Veterans Administration
will guarantee up to 60 percent
of the purchase price of a home
for a veteran with limitation as
to the total purchase price.
Coker urged veterans planning to purchase a home to make


