Baird Bears Defeat Rule, 34-8; Meet May Tigers Tonight at May

The Baird Bears scored 20 points in the first quarter of their non-district game against Rule Friday night, and coasted most of the last half, using reserves. The final score was 34-8.

Led by fullback Tommy Higgins, who scored three times, the Bears had an easy time winning their fourth start of the year. The Bear defense proved very

tough for the visitors, holding the Bobcats to 4 yards gain in the first quarter.

Higgins opened the scoring with a three yard plunge in the first quarter following a 46 yard drive. The conversion try failed. Jud Gilliland scored the Bears second TD, completing a 34-yard pass from Cotton Barnes for the tally. Barnes plunged over for the extra points. Barnes plunged from the 3-yard line, just before the half ended, to cap to 60-yard drive and give the Bears a 20-0 lead at halftime. Rule kicked off to Baird to open the third quarter and Eddie Childers returned to Baird's 36 yard line. Higgins broke into the secondary on the left side of the line and went 64 yards for the TD. Try for point failed.

Higgins ended the Bear's scoring in the third quarter by plunging from the 1-yard line to end an 80 yard drive. He also plunged for the extra points.

Rule scored its only touchdown in the fourth quarter against the Bear reserves, when Bob Clark intercepted a pass on the 20 and ran 80 yards for the TD. Jerry Lowery plunged for the extra points.

The Bears made 11 first downs to 7 for Rule, and completed 3 out of 6 pass attempts. Rule went to the air 6 times with no completions. Baird made 291 yards to 123 for Rule.

This week, the Bears will go to May, for a conference bout with the May Tigers. Game time will be 7:30 p. m.

CofC Recaps First Year's Operations

When the Baird Chamber of Commerce was organized, in November of 1960, several objectives were set out and published as goals. There is a prevailing attitude of optimism among the Board of Directors as to the possibility of completing these objectives.

Farm to Market Road Connecting FM 604 with Old Highway 80, South of Clyde, to improve accessibility to Baird from Oplin, Denton Valley and Eula:

In January, the Highway Committee contacted the State Highway Engineer, asking for scheduling this project at an early date. The State Highway Commission recently designated this "short cut" as a job to begin immediately.

Secure Additional Housing:

Through the joint effort of the City of Baird and the Chamber of Commerce, a contract has recently been signed between the Federal Government and The Housing Authority of the City of Baird, providing for the construction of 18 low-rent dwelling units at a cost of \$200,000.00. The total cost will be financed by bonds sold by the Federal government. The project will consist of four old-age units, four 3-bedroom units, four 2-bedroom units and four 1-bedroom units. The first payment for this project has been received by the local Authority.

Secure a Doctor for Baird:

Baird now has an additional doctor with office hours Monday through Friday at the Callahan County Hospital.

Publicity:

Through the concerted efforts of your Chamber of Commerce Publicity Committee, publicity supporting Baird has been greatly increased, both locally and in the surrounding area.

Industry:

This program is perhaps the most elusive of any city - simply because of competition. It seems fair to say that no new industry has made commitments to move to Baird, but the Industrial Committee has observed the effectiveness of an alert Chamber of Commerce in securing industry for towns of comparable size. Recently Comanche entered the acquisition of a Moorman's Mineral Plant with a payroll of 150,000 per year.

Progress is contagious. The community spirit of achievement has been highly evident in the past year. We sincerely believe that this organization has been a contributing factor in giving what it takes to "get Baird over the hump." We cannot stand still; we either progress or lose ground.

Baird and vicinity is geographically and economically ready for growth -- your Chamber, a healthy, active organization is ready to take advantage of that opportunity when it presents itself.

25 True Bills Returned by 42nd District Court Grand Jury Monday

Sentences were set late Monday for two defendants who pleaded guilty after being indicted by a 42nd District Court grand jury.

S. D. Roberts, 47, of Abilene was sentenced to five years on a theft charge. The sentence was recommended by District Attorney Bill Thomas after Roberts told the court he wanted to plead guilty to stealing a boat motor from Kenneth McPherson.

Leslie Merie Thomas, 34, of Dallas, was sentenced to 52 days in county jail after pleading guilty on a second offense drunk driving charge.

The indictments were two of 24 true bills returned by the grand jury during the afternoon in their report to Judge J. R. Black. Thomas, assisted by Callahan County Attorney James Paul Shanks, had presented 14 cases. There were no cases passed on none billed by the grand jury.

Six indictments were returned against three Clyde youths charged with burglary in connection with break-in at the BBB Drug and Callahan County Co-operative, Inc., at Clyde. True bills on two counts each were Clarence Jay Haynes, 17, Mike David McKelvey, 18, and Larry Bob Bynum, all of Clyde.

Nine indictments were returned against three persons arrested recently in connection with a series of livestock thefts which led officers through six West Central Texas counties.

Carroll Wayne Williams, 40, of Cross Plains, was named in four bills charging him with goat and cattle thefts. His wife, Laura Levadell, was indicted on two bills charging goat thefts.

William D. Ferguson Dies at Brownsville

William D. Ferguson, 73, former well-known Abilene construction man, died Tuesday morning in a Brownsville hospital, after a long illness.

Mr. Ferguson, a son-in-law of W. D. Boydston of Baird, lived in Abilene several years in the 1920s, working for Wash & Burney Construction Co. They constructed several large buildings in Abilene.

He moved to Brownsville, where he formed W. D. Ferguson & Sons Construction Co. Born Nov. 15, 1887, in Elm Balleu, La., he married the former Corsey Boydston on Feb. 14, 1921, at Baird.

Funeral was held at 4 p. m. Wednesday at Darling Funeral Chapel in Brownsville, with Rev. Billy Lucas, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Buena Vista Burial Park.

Surviving are his wife; three sons, Donald of Brownsville, W. D. Jr. and Jack E. of San Antonio; three sisters, Mrs. Al Hammel, Mrs. Katherine Joiner and Mrs. A. G. Schattenburg, all of San Antonio.

W. J. Shirley Dies Of Wreck Injuries

W. J. (Bill) Shirley, 75, of Putnam, who was injured in a wreck at Putnam Saturday, Oct. 14, died at 6 p. m. Thursday in Callahan County Hospital.

Mr. Shirley was driving a pick up truck which was in collision with two cars on U. S. Highway 80 in Putnam Saturday morning. Doctors said he suffered a stroke at the time of the accident which partially paralyzed him.

Funeral was held at 3 p. m. Friday in Wylie Funeral Home Chapel in Baird with Rev. W. C. Crawford, pastor of the Putnam Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in Ross Cemetery.

Born Dec. 15, 1886, in Gunterville, Ala., he came to Texas in 1891 and to Callahan County in 1900, settling in the Cottonwood community. He moved to Putnam in 1926 and had lived there since.

Mr. Shirley was still active as a farmer before the accident.

Auto Purchasers Warned by TADA

Purchasers of automobiles have been warned to be on the lookout for vehicles with salt water damage from Hurricane Carla.

H. C. Pittman, executive vice president of the Texas Automobile Dealers Association, said, "According to reports received in our office, scores of persons throughout Texas are being victimized by unscrupulous bargain promoters who have purchased automobiles in the Gulf area, after they have been totaled by insurance companies, and are reselling them in other parts of the state to purchaser who are unaware of the salt water dam-

age." TADA is a state-wide organization of franchised automobile dealers, with headquarters in Austin.

"We have received reports of persons who have made special trips to purchase quantities of these new cars," Pittman continued. "After cleaning them up and removing the factory stickers, they are selling them without advising the purchasers of the certainty of quick deterioration from salt rust. The public in the Gulf area is educated to this type of damage and therefore most of these cars being sold in Central, North and West Texas.

"To protect themselves from such losses, automobile purchasers should beware of suspicious bargains, and should buy their automobiles only from well-known, established dealers in their own communities," Pittman stressed. "No legitimate dealer would handle such a sale. This same type of unscrupulous activity cost many hard working families their life savings when they purchased automobiles brought in from Louisiana after Hurricane Audrey," he added.







3. Are members of the family forbidden to start fires with kerosene and other flammable liquids?
4. Have you made sure that several appliances, such as the toaster, waffle iron and coffee percolator, are not connected to one outlet?

Living Room, Bedroom and Bath
1. Is there enough space around your television set for proper ventilation?
2. Has a lightning arrester -- preferably one listed by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc. -- been installed on the antenna lead-in?
2. Is your television set UL-labeled?
4. Are worn lamp and extension cords immediately replaced with new ones?
5. Have you removed extension cords strung around the room -- under rugs, over nails?
6. If there is a wood-burning fireplace, is it protected by a metal screen?
7. Is the fireplace chimney cleaned and inspected periodically?

8. If a portable heater is in use, is it turned off before you go to bed?
9. Is the portable heater placed where it cannot be tripped on or overturned?
10. If you use portable heaters or appliances, are shut-off valves installed in the metal gas pipeline?
11. Do you make it a rule never to smoke in bed?
12. Have you put the radio or any other electrical appliance out of reach of anyone bathing or clutching a water faucet?

Wheat Growers Must Sign Up by Dec. 1st

Wheat growers of Callahan County are being reminded by the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office that the period of signing up under the program continues through December 1, 1961.

Tommie Harris, Callahan Co. ASC Committee Chairman, said "It is important for farmers of the county to come into the office to get information about the 1962 wheat stabilization program."

The wheat stabilization program, recently enacted by Congress, is designated to reduce national wheat acreage by at least 10 per cent. Wheat farmers are encouraged to make additional voluntary reductions for which a higher rate of payment is available.

Chairman Harris urged farmers who are interested in the wheat stabilization program to get in touch with the ASC office. Wheat farmers of the county were given some of the details of the 1962 wheat stabilization program last week.

The ASC office, in a statement, said that farmers who participate in the program may receive an advance payment at the time of their sign-up. Up to one-half of the payment that the wheat farmers earn will be made at the time the farmer

signs to take part. This advance payment is similar to the advance payment made to feed grain farmers during the 1961 feed grain program.

Mr. Harris said that all information and help needed to take part in the wheat program may be had at the County ASC office. He also stated that the question about how long the diverted wheat or feed grain acreage may be grazed has been answered. May 1, 1962 has been designated as the final date to graze acreage diverted from the production of wheat or feed grain.
