Our earth receives a small fractional par from the Pest! When James Anthony Froude traveled in ustralia three or four years ago, says Cheser P. Dewey in the Agriculturist, he made the remarkable discovery that the complaints in regard to the devastations committed by the rabits in those colonies were overwrought and that no more rabbits were observed durng his stay than he could see about an Eng warren on a moonlight evening. Mr. bude is not a very keen observer of the facts which pass under his own eyes, and the people of those distant colonies may be ex-cused for doubting his word, and for making

the extraordinary efforts that they do to get rid of the rabbit pest, which has been so inthat upward of 180,000,000 of these animals bad been killed in three years. The money expended has been something enormous. In Victoria the parliament began in 1870 by appro-priating  $\{6,400$ , and gradually rose from years. Dended  $\{510,000$  New South Wales ex-pended  $\{510,000$  per annum for five years. In 1880 the government appropriation in South Australia was  $\{318,000$ . In New Zealand the appropriation was  $\{3200,000$  per annum. All these sums are additional to private expendi-tures, which have been very large. M. Pasteur claims that the germ of this disease which Lo imparis to the rabbit is easily mul-lified in any meat soun. He also declared hat he has proved it to be innocuous in the case of sheep, cattle, horses, and dogs, which are the domestic animals most likely to share his food with the rabbit. Whether poultry is equally exempt or not he does not say.
