## FDIC Lowers Maximum Rate

The Board of Directors of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation today lowered the maximum rate which may be paid on time deposits with multiple maturities by insured state chartered commercial banks, which are not members of the Federal Reserve System. The action, which was effective July 20, 1966, is applicable to some 7,300 banks across the country. A similar action, affecting some 6,200 Federal Reserve member banks was taken July 15 by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.

The action taken today by the Board of Directors under existing legislative authority defined "multiple maturity time deposits," and provided for a maximum rate of 5 per cent on such deposits payable in 90 days or more, and 4 per cent on such deposits payable in less than 90 days. Maximum permissible rates on other types of deposits remain unaffected.

## "WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

**Cornelius "Judges" Us**  
Bible Thought: "And Peter opened his mouth, and said, of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons: but in every nation he that feareth him and worketh righteousness, is acceptable to him." (Acts 10:34-35).

The account of Cornelius is given in Acts 10:1-11:18. The name is Roman and belonged to distinguished families in the imperial city, such as the Scipios and Sulla. Thus he was probably an Italian of Roman blood. He was evidently a man of importance in Caesarea and well known to the Jews (Acts 10:22). He was a centurion in the Italian cohort. To understand this we must note that the Roman army was divided into two broad divisions, the legions and the auxiliary forces.

Even though Cornelius was not a Christian when we first meet him in Acts 10:1, he judges many of us to be unworthy of our high calling. Let us look at some of his virtues: (1) a devout man, (2) one who feared God with all his house, (3) gave much alms to the people, and (4) prayed to God always. Verse twenty-four suggests two more: (1) he believed in punctuality, and (2) he was interested in his "kinsmen and near friends." In answer to Peter's question, "Why did you send for

me?" he exhibited another virtue: he wanted to hear all things commanded of the Lord. How much different was Cornelius to most of us today! What a good man Cornelius was. He makes the most of us today ashamed of ourselves. How many of us measure up to this standard? In face of the fact that Cornelius was a good man, he was separated from God and not a Christian. He therefore needed God's saving power, the Gospel of Christ. (Romans 1:16).

This Gospel involved God's purpose and planning, the coming of Christ as saviour of man, Christ's blood shed for man's atonement, and man's requirements in response to the Will of Christ. The Hebrew writer stated, "Though he were a Son, yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered; And being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him." (Hebrew 5:8-9). God instructed Cornelius concerning Peter's purpose when he said, "... and call for Simon, whose surname is Peter; Who shall tell thee words, whereby thou and all thy house shall be saved." (Acts 11:13-14). Cornelius gladly submitted to the commandments of the Lord (Acts 10:48). Wasn't that to be expected of this conscientious man?

"Take my life, O Father, mould it  
In obedience to thy will;  
And as ripening years unfold it,  
Help me keep it childlike still."

## Texas Highway Department Releases New Color Posters

AUSTIN — An old Chinese proverb says one picture is worth a thousand words.

The Texas Highway Department believes it, and proved it today with the release of a set of spectacular new color posters to help tell the story of Texas' varied Attractions.

The Highway Department expects the new posters will be valuable additions to its comprehensive line-up of Texas travel material.

Although they will not be available for personal use, the posters will be supplied free for display in airline, train and bus terminals, in the offices of travel agents, and at the sites of conventions and expositions where the impressive Texas vistas will be exposed to large numbers of passers-by.

The new posters depict color-saturated scenes at Caddo Lake State Park, an Indian at the Alabama-Coushatta Reser-

vation, an auburn-haired Texas beauty inspecting richly-laden grapefruit trees in the Rio Grande Valley, and a glowing sunset on Texas' subtropical coast.

Along with those entirely new scenes, three popular earlier posters have been slightly revised and reprinted. They include the Alamo, a rodeo cowboy on a bucking horse, and magnificent Santa Elena Canyon in the Big Bend National Park.

The seven newly-printed scenes will join two currently available posters which illustrate impressive El Capitan mountain in West Texas, and the sun-drenched beach of Padre Island.

In all, the posters represent another facet of more than three and one-half million pieces of printed Texas travel material which the Highway Department distributes free each year.

## Charolais-Cross Steers Gain

TERRELL — Commercial ranchers searching for increased beef production without increasing herd size or grazing facilities can get the job done with Charolais-cross steer calves.

That's the experience noted on the Nelson Bunker Hunt Ranch here this past winter when calves sired by Charolais bulls produced an extra 70 pounds of beef per head over a 217 day winter pasture program.

On Oct. 26, 1965, Manager Richard Hass put 35 straight-bred 8 month old Hereford and Angus steer calves averaging 524 pounds and 35 Charolais-Hereford and Charolais-Angus steer calves that averaged 474 pounds on winter pasture. The Charolais crosses were six to seven months of age. None of the steers received supplemental feed and all were handled the same.

On June 1, 1966, when the 70 head went into the feedlot for finishing, the Charolais-crosses had averaged 32 per cent more gain than the straightbred Hereford and Angus steers. The Charolais-crosses gained 296 pounds for an average of 1.36 pounds per day while the straightbred Hereford and Angus steers gained only 226 pounds for a daily gain of 1.04 pounds.

"All of these cattle went onto the same pasture and stayed together for the entire period," Hass stated. "The Charolais-crosses were terrific gainers -- they caught up with and passed the straightbred Herefords and Angus, and were at least a month younger in age."

The ranch, which established a purebred Charolais herd 18 months ago, runs about 5,000 steer calves through the winter on standard winter pastures of Oats and barley overseeded with vetch and button clover. The program, says Manager Hass produces gain at a cost of 10c to 11c a pound.

There could be a new loop around many Texas county commissioners courts upon a re-apportionment opinion laid down by the Texas Supreme Court in the case brought by Mayor Hank Avery of Midland.

Avery maintained that it isn't constitutional for one Midland County commissioner to represent 96 per cent of the county's population -- the City of Midland -- while the other three commissioners represented only 5 per cent of the people.

Supreme Court agreed, 8-1, but with reservations. It held that the ratio was not fair representation, but that the re-division of county precincts, which it told Dist. Judge Joe B. Dibrell of Coleman to order, could consider factors other than population.

Declining to extend the population -- only rule which the U. S. Supreme Court has applied to state legislatures, Supreme Court held that a commissioners court is not a legislative body. Court's majority wrote that the road, bridge and tax activities of the commissioners courts have more concern to rural residents than to city dwellers. In recent years, such courts have concerned themselves mainly with non-urban areas, leaving city matters to the city governments.

Supreme Court concluded that not just population, but also factors such as miles of county road, taxable values and geography, plus the "convenience of the people" set out in the Texas Constitution, can be taken into account by a commissioners court in dividing the county into four precincts. High court agreed with Judge Dibrell that the present Midland County situation obviously is arbitrary and should be declared invalid.

Case either will go back to Judge Dibrell for final decision or will be appealed to the U. S. Supreme Court by either Mayor Avery or Midland County -- since neither won a clear-cut

victory.  
**INTEGRATION WARNING** — Sixty-four Texas school districts have received letters from the federal Office of Education warning of slowness in faculty integration, reports Leon R. Graham, assistant state education commissioner.

Graham said 33 other districts around the state were notified that they had violated federal law by failing to submit plans for integrating teachers.

He said the Office of Education expects districts to employ at least one Negro teacher for each school which was previously all-white and at least one white teacher for each previously all-Negro school. Some flexibility, however, is allowed, he added.

No federal funds will be given schools which fail to comply with the regulations of the Office of Education, Graham noted, and the federal government wants full-time teachers integrated, not part-time or substitutes.

**NEW EGG REPORT** — Texas Department of Agriculture's Marketing Division begins publication of a new one-market egg price report July 19, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said.

Formerly, quotations from six separate state egg market areas were used in reporting egg prices. "Advantage of the new policy," White said, "is that the single state-wide price quotation for each grade represents a true market for the state, so the information is more useful to producers and buyers alike."

**NURSES NEEDED** — Former Gov. Allan Shivers has launched a statewide campaign to pull Texas up from rank of 46th in the United States in number of registered nurses on the job.

More than 200 civic and business volunteers from all corners of the state joined with Shivers in seeking \$12,000,000 within the next five years to recruit and teach enough nurses to make up for the 10,500 shortage now. Their meeting was the first of the Development Council of the Texas Hospital Association health careers program.

Gerald Mann of Dallas, newly appointed chairman of the development council, said the group will ask the Legislature for more funds to fight the critical shortage of nurses.

**MORE AIR SERVICE** — Texas Aeronautics Commission approved applications by two small airlines to provide three new state routes.

Houston Commuter Airlines, a new organization, will run two flights daily between Houston and Laredo with a "whistle stop" at Alice. Hood Airlines of Killeen will extend its present service to include a Houston-Ft. Worth flight and a separate Killeen-Houston run.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES** — Out of state witness in felony trials and grand jury hearings must be paid by counties up to limit of \$2,000, at usual rate for out of county witnesses, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr held. In other official opinions, Carr ruled that:
