The day care center's inception came after a survey in Clarendon of working mothers showed over ninety with children of ages for day care need.

"That was a lot of kids that grandpas or 'Aunt Mary' kept and with only two other registered licensed baby sitters in town there was a definite need for some sort of facility," explains Hill.

The Day Care Center was born of circumstances that found many families unable to improve their financial condition simply because they could find no baby-sitters.

From its beginning, with Rev. Owen McGarity's initial appearance before the Texas Panhandle Community Action Board in Amarillo seeking permission and help for the facility, the Day Care Center's future and existence has rested on dreams and commitment of a few tenacious supporters.

"Unfortunately Clarendon has a 'wait and see attitude' about new ideas and groups," says Hill, "and for that reason Day Care has just

subsisted. Many people thought it was intended only for non-profit groups."

The period spent building the Day Care Center to the point where it "could potentially qualify for Title XX funds has not been easy for Hill and the people at Community Action. But personal commitment on the part of the board that governs local activities of Day Care and Community Action has finally made an impact.

"The amount of support we receive from people and groups in this town is unbelievable now. You wouldn't believe how mothers of children at the center have chipped in, volunteered their time free when they feared there might not be a center for their children. We've got grandmothers contributing things and some mothers are starting a fund drive to raise some of the money needed to qualify for Title XX."

In order to qualify for Title XX support funds the Day Care Center must be licensed much like family

Day Care Seeks Title XX Funding

"We would like to develop this center beyond just the survival level and I think Title XX could help us do that. Right now we're just trying to exist. With Title XX we could afford to hire a director, have a better curriculum for these kids and serve more people's children better," explains Robbie Hill of the effort to get the Donley County Day Care Center certified under Title XX assistance.

Hill pointed out that initial acceptance by the state administered federally financed assistance program requires thirty percent of the yearly expenses of the center to be assumed by the local community but state welfare personnel explained that good faith would be assumed if one-twelfth of one month's amount of the sum could be raised during the transition to Title XX.

Title XX funding help applies to a number of Community Action programs in the state. Day Care Centers are just one of the programs it can fund. Hill explained the reason for seeking essentially to break the ties with Community Action in Donley County are explained by Hill.

"When Community Action began several years ago it

was seen as an initial effort to fill some basic needs in this community. We needed help for people like retired senior citizens, kids who needed a summer job to earn money just to stay in school, train people to hold down jobs and of course a place for children of working mothers. Well the services have grown and we need a better financial source to keep the Day Care Center operating," explained Hill.

"Without adequate finances Day Care has remained peripheral to the many other programs of Community Action. Hill and her staff have found themselves dividing time, filing lunch hours with taking care of pressing duties at the center.

"It's grown to the point where we need a full-time director. Under the present arrangement funding for workers at the center is through a manpower training program with helper turn overs every three to six months. Just when the children and the personnel are getting used to one another they trade and we have a whole new bunch to start over with."

homes that keep groups of children in excess of twelve now. The only hitch is that Day Care must pass two sets of standards state and federal. Federal standards are more demanding than state requirements in regard to staff ratios to children.

The center is currently working to meet the requirements for re-licensing Mrs. Wanda Minchew of the State Welfare Department, licensing representative, is working closely with Day Care in helping them to meet standards by the deadline, March 15.

Should Title XX funds become available to the center, the future of the program could be more stable. With a permanent staff Hill feels the program could conceivably obtain a permanent building of its own rather than the area now

provided in the old high school building.

"With a director employed solely for the Day Care Center, Robbie Hill and Geneva Mays, who oversee operations at the center, now would not be directly involved in day operations under Title XX funding took over.

The center would also have a separate board to answer to along with the director with Title XX funding.

The process to enter Title XX involves close cooperation with Mrs. Carol Henson, Amarillo based, fieldperson in charge of Title XX contracts with Day Care, and Bill Johnson and Carol Lindeman from Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

The greatest obstacle at times seems to be bringing the complexity of myriad regulating standards to the

simple needs of individuals who benefit or could benefit from programs administered by the state and federal government.

Hill remains confident that the struggle to see Day Care not only survive but endure will succeed. She sees the amount of community support, both financial and moral as the measure.

Beta Sigma Phi is going to help us with money from the charity ball and yesterday we had mothers volunteering their time to build a fence around the playground area to help meet licensing qualifications."

Title XX is the next rung up the ladder for a stable day care facility for Clarendon in the eyes of Hill and board members.

"It's a lifeline we've been clutching at and it seems alot closer now than it has before. With a new provision

relating to Title XX funding it is possible for us to receive one hundred per cent funding for the first few months and that would give us time to build up a small reserve to continue operating under full Title XX provisions."

Day Care is now seeking between seven and eight thousand dollars from the county at the present time, which is about three hundred and fifty dollars monthly. The bulk of this money Hill expects to gain through donations, agreements with the city and support from the county and fund drives.

Some sources of funds are not available. Title XX funds cannot be matched with other federal money until they've been "washed". In other words the funds must be in hand before they can be applied for program uses again.

"I think people are now understanding that we can make this thing go if we can involve some more people and dispell some of the misconceptions that have grown up around the Day Care Center," concluded Hill.

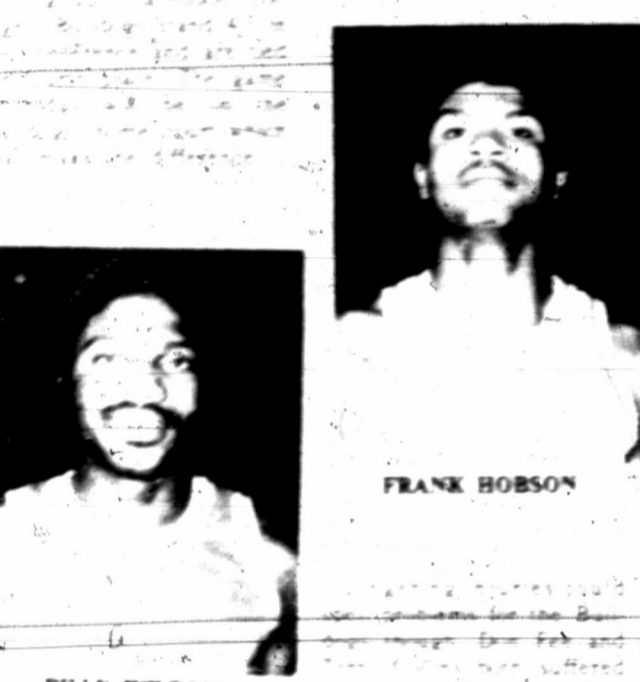

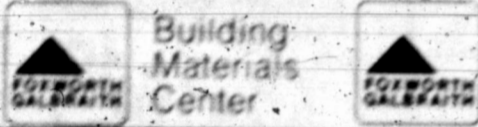

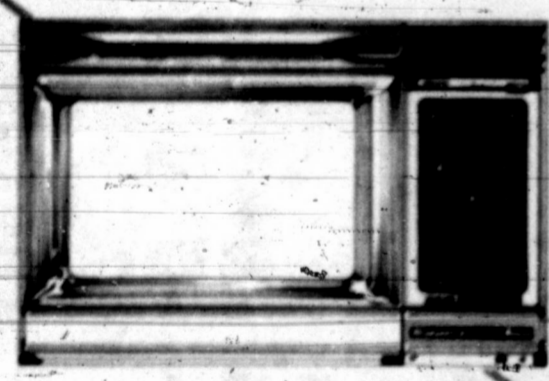

Don Stone opens art studio

Bronc Buster

"I was nearly forty-six years old when I discovered art and I hope that more people will make that same discovery," says Don Stone about his interest in art and his new art studio.

It's been a year now since Stone accidentally entered the world of studio art and canvas painting. The Church of Christ pastor's part-time career of signpainting found him with a check from a client returned for insufficient funds. Don took the sign fee in kind; the amount was paid in art supplies.

"The first thing I painted was with oils. When two days went by and the canvas was still wet I called Antonette Hamilton here in town who's worked extensively with oils. What's the matter? I had a lot to learn."

Since then Stone has completed an astonishing number of pieces all with acrylics.

Stone plans to have ten sessions per class. Each session will run two hours and meet once a week.

"I hope then my students will go home and practice on their own in their free time applying what they've learned. That way by the end of the class sessions each student would have 40-50 hours of studio art training behind them and be ready to go on their own."

The classes will start with basics Stone explains. First the color wheel and paint mixing. All work will be in acrylics. No oils for Stone; the drying period is too protracted.

"With the three primary colors and the secondary colors you make by mixing two of the primary colors and the tertiary colors obtained by mixing the primary and secondary colors you have literally the powers of creation in your hands. I know this sounds strange but I often think of painting as

being nearer the powers of the devine. You can create and it makes you look at things about you like you never saw them before.

It seem like a strange background to begin an art career as a sign painter but Stone sees it as an advantage.

"When I was five years old I saw a man paint an Eskimo Pie sign on the side of a building and I knew I wanted to do that. Of course my parents didn't see me as a sign painter and I never painted signs for any of the businesses they were in, but

I took my first contract to do twenty signs and by the time that project was finished I was hired as a sign painter for Taylor and Sons Store in Canyon.

"Eventually Stone went on his own. Though he hasn't always done signs where he held ministries, if the town did not have a commercial sign painter he did take jobs. He done signpainting in part out of a belief in it being part of a ministry, good will or public relations if you will. For twenty-five years I've painted."

"I see this studio as an

expensive hobby perhaps. It isn't a method to make money. If we pay the rent that's fine. No, I'm more concerned with the venture for art's sake, for myself and my students. This is not a commercial studio as far as I'm concerned."

What is fascinating about Stone's venture is the seeming flowering of art and interest in art consumption. Stone's commercial signpainting background has enabled him to produce a prodigious amount of art pieces. His one-man show at Farmers State Bank last fall

admittedly a low budget

show saw eighteen pieces sold and additional orders for twenty-eight commissioned pieces—all to be completed by Christmas. Stone envisions his art students beginning with the method "step-by-step" Stone hopes his students will learn a philosophy of art in the process. As for subjects Don hopes they will use things from their own experience.

"Whatever you do you start where you are; if you do well where you are you may have a chance to try somewhere else."

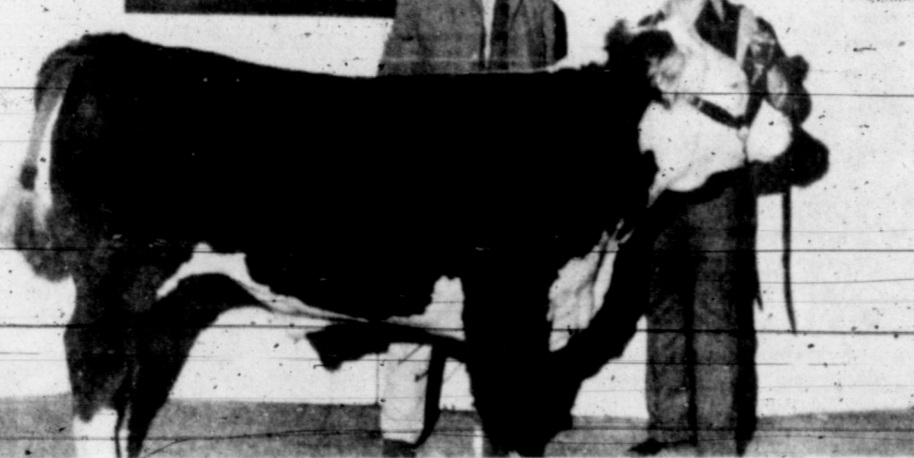

co-sponsoring tax bill

"AD VALOREM TAX RELIEF ACT OF 1977"

State Representative Phil Cates, of Shamrock, is co-sponsoring legislation being introduced by Representative Bessie Bock, II of New Braunfels. The purpose of the measure is to make available a projected \$450 million to \$500 million a year in relief funds for local tax payers in school districts across the State.

The bill, known as the "Ad Valorem Tax Relief Act of 1977," would provide that school districts receive a share of aid from a fund built from a portion of the state sales tax. One cent of the sales tax would be dedicated to the fund. Schools would receive money from this fund according to a formula based upon the district's tax rate and evaluations. To receive these funds under this formula, the district must lower its maintenance taxes, by an equal amount.

And finally, the school district, under the Tax Relief Fund measure, may not later raise their taxes without losing pro rata entitlements from this fund.

Cotton Market

Cotton market activity declined during the past week. Prices also declined for most of the period, but turned back upward at the end of the week. Most bid prices are up today, but the over-all average is still below last week's report. Demand is good, but inquiries continue light. Bid prices ranged from \$5.00 to \$7.00 cents per pound on lots showing mostly better quality cotton. Lots ranging mostly Spotted and lower Light Spotted grades were \$1.00 to \$4.00 cents per pound. Tinged and other low grade qualities ranged from 48.00 to 50.00 cents per pound.

About 3,600 samples were classed by the Altus Classing Office from the Memphis Classing Territory counties for the week ending January 17th. This brought the season total for the area to 209,900, compared with 175,000 classed by the same date last year.

Grades of cotton classed during the week from the Memphis area counties were nine per cent White, 51 per cent Light Spotted, 25 per cent Spotted and 12 per cent Tinged. The predominant grade was 42, which accounted for 36 per cent of the samples classed.

The predominant staple lengths were 30 with 18 per cent, 31 with 43 per cent and 32 with 30 per cent. Mike readings were in the 35 to 4.9 range on 68 per cent of the classings. Twenty-three per cent miked 3.4 and lower and nine per cent 5.0 and above. The season average for Mike strength readings was 84,000 pounds per square inch.
