hires more instructors School board adopts deficit budget

The Clarendon School Board Thursday night set the tax rate the same as last year's, adopted a budget with an \$8,783 deficit for the 1977-78 school year and hired another teacher and two aides.

The tax rate is \$1.50 for maintenance and 30 cents for bond indebtedness, or \$1.80 per \$100 of the assessed valuation.

School Superintendent Jeff Walker said that the \$8,783 deficit is primarily due to an \$11,400 outlay for a new school bus and to an increase in salaries.

"We have seven routes," Walker said, "and we try to replace one bus a year, so that means a bus has to last us seven years."

Walker said that the bus was due to be delivered "any time now" and that he didn't know what kind it would be because the State Board of Control is the agency responsible for buying school buses for Texas schools each year.

Other affected items in the budget included:

- an increase of \$4,700 in miscellaneous revenue above last year's total. "That includes sources that we can't categorize, such as the \$3,500 insurance claim we're expecting to cover last spring's roof damage," Walker said.
- a loss of \$2,000 which would have been Hedley's share of a salary expense for a counselor shared by the Hedley and Clarendon school districts. "They were looking at the hold card financially," Walker said, "and decided not to use the counselling service."
- an increase of \$46,755 from the state available school fund, which is CISD's share in the annual interest gained on stocks and bonds invested in by the legislature in 1891

and set aside as the permanent school fund.

- an increase of \$1,740 state-allotted revenue for Vocational Education travel expenses.
- a combining of Federal Titles II and III into Title IV, for which \$3,139 has been budgeted to buy books and visual aid materials for the library.
- a new budgeted item, "unemployment compensation," which heretofore school districts did not have to pay, according to Walker. "A new law goes into effect Jan. 1 which makes school districts liable for unemployment benefits, so we have budgeted it on the basis of half a year," he said.
- an increase of \$2,842 in federal money under Title I because of an increase in the number of local pupils who qualify as "economically disadvantaged." Walker said that 122 local pupils now qualify for the program.

The new instructors hired by the board are Jamie Deyhle, Betty Jane Hampton and Darla Slover.

- Jamie Deyhle, 23, was born in Dilley, Tex., where she was graduated from high school in 1972.

After attending Texas Tech for two years she married Charlie Deyhle and moved with him to College Station, where he studied veterinary medicine and she worked on a degree in elementary education. She received her bachelor of science degree in 1976 and taught 3-year-olds in a College Station day school that summer.

During the 1976-77 school year she was a substitute teacher for all grades in the Bryan and College Station Independent School Districts.

Jamie and Charlie moved to Clarendon three weeks ago so that Charlie could join his father's veterinary practice. However, because the couple have made frequent weekend trips to Clarendon during the past six years Jamie doesn't feel much like a stranger in town.

Jamie will be teaching Level III grades nine through 12 and two units of art.

- Darla Slover, 22, was born in Dimmitt and raised in Spring Lake, where she was graduated from high school in 1973.

After attending South Plains College for one year she married Greg Slover, who is presently assistant coach at Clarendon High School.

She was a teacher's aide at Whittier Elementary in Amarillo from 1974 through 1976 and attended WTSU for those two summers.

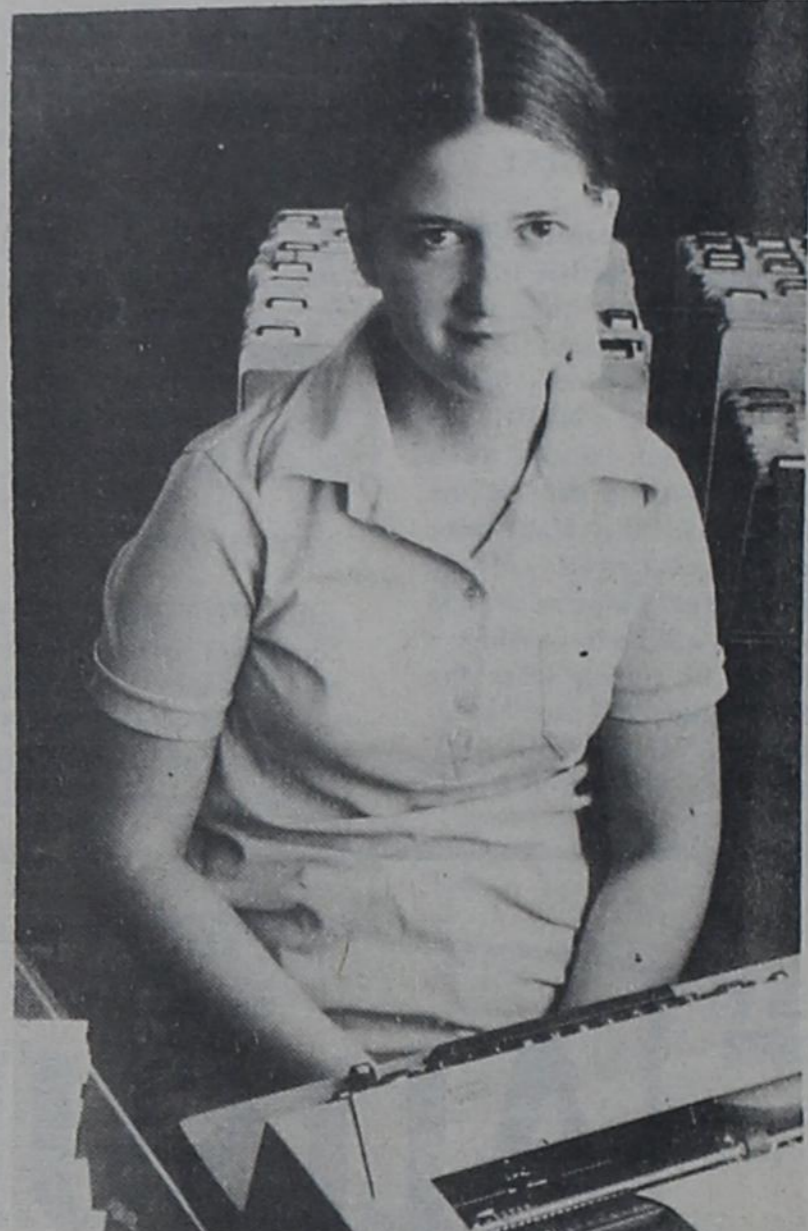
Last year she completed 15 hours at Clarendon College.

Darla and Greg like to fish and play golf together, and Darla enjoys sewing.

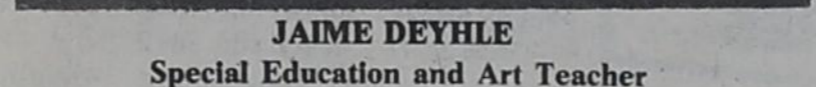
Darla will be a Level III teacher's aide.

Sheriff Behrens jails brother

O.T. Behrens, brother of Donley County Sheriff Truett Behrens and until recently the night dispatcher in the sheriff's office, was charged with drunken driving Sunday afternoon and placed in the Donley County jail, according to Clarendon City Police.

Behrens was picked up by Clarendon city patrolmen after he ran his car into the rear of a rented car driven by Pat Hughes about 4:00 p.m. Sunday as Hughes was attempting to make a left hand turn into the Dairy Queen on Hwy. 287, the police said.

Both drivers were taken to Hall County Hospital in Memphis. Hughes suffered neck and back injuries; and Behrens, minor lacerations. Behrens was released from the hospital the same day and placed in the Donley County Jail.

Clarendon Police Patrolman Steve Rogers said that Hughes is expected to be released from the hospital today.

County Attorney John Knorpp said that courthouse officials had been extraordinarily busy last week with a rash of DWI's and other offenses.

The other two persons charged with driving while intoxicated last week were Manuel Vaquera of Lelia Lake and Rogelio Maldano of Memphis.

C.L. Chadwick of Clarendon was fined for dumping trash on or near a public road, and Troy Skinner was fined for unauthorized copying of lake permits.

Smith's attorneys seek mandamus

The Donley County Hospital District was served Friday with petition for a writ of mandamus seeking the district court to order the hospital district to assess taxes above operating expenses in order to pay a settlement agreement between Dr. George W. Smith and the hospital district amounting to approximately \$50,000, according to Hospital Administrator Gerry Knight.

The earliest the district court could hear the petition would be the last quarter of 1977, barring any action of the Texas Supreme Court, to whom the hospital district has appealed to overturn the judgment, Knight said.

Three inaccuracies occurred in last week's Clarendon Press account of the auditor's report on the hospital's financial situation.

(1) It was reported that the records for the fiscal year 1974-1975 could not be audited because of inadequate record-keeping. Gerry Knight said that 1974-1975 could be audited, but the auditor could not certify the audit.

(2) It was reported that the hospital personnel between November, 1973 and October, 1974 did not know the proper procedures for admitting patients under Medicare, Medicaid and Blue-Cross-Blue Shield. Gerry Knight said that the case was that the hospital was not an approved facility under Medicare-Medicaid Blue Cross/Blue Shield from November, 1973 through May 22, 1974. Therefore, charges made on account of patients admitted as being covered under those programs during that time would not be reimbursed by Medicare-Medicaid-Blue Cross/Blue Shield.

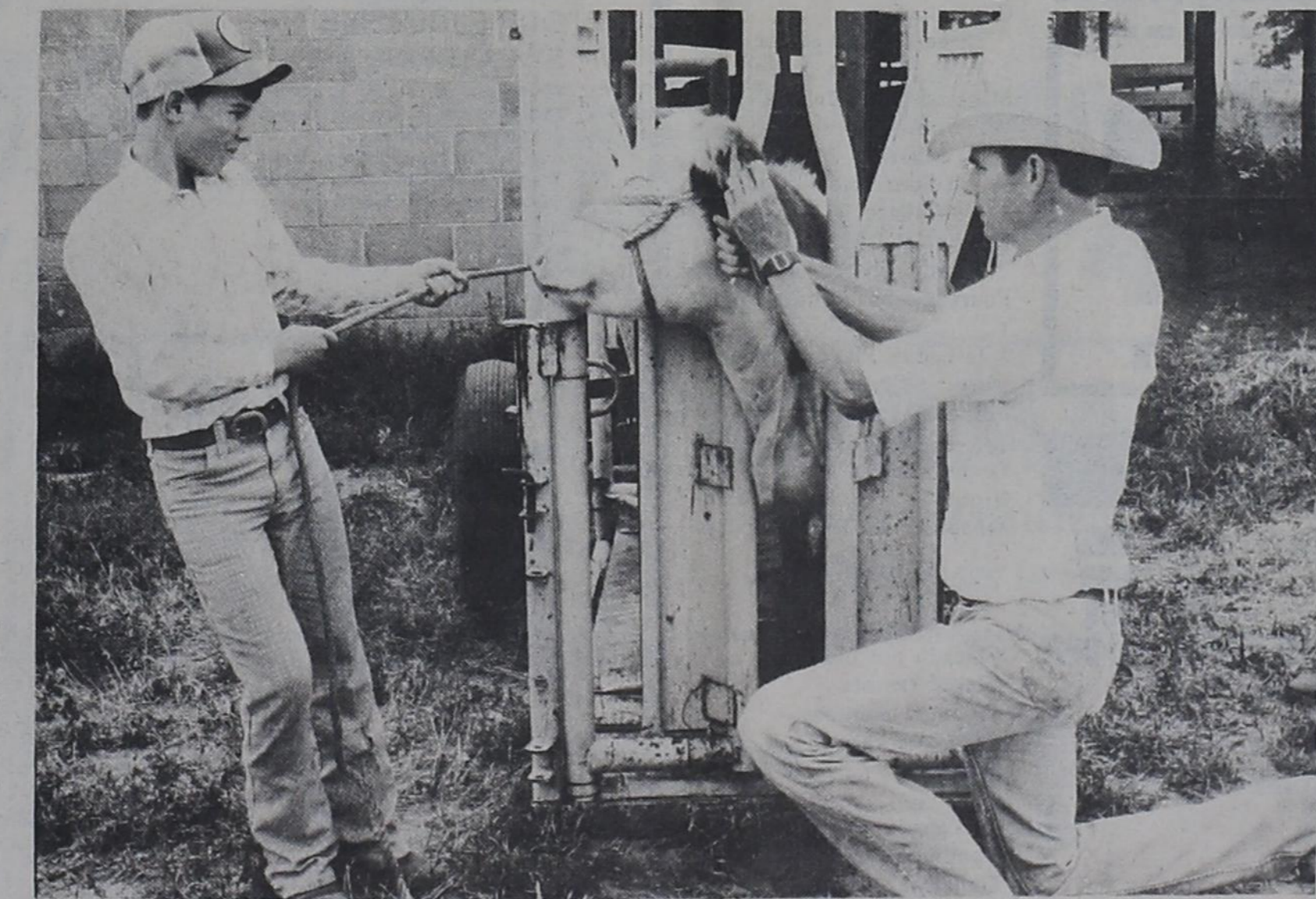
(3) The Press reported that the hospital's "acknowledged indebtedness" as of June 30, 1975 was \$105,781.10 and that its indebtedness as of June 30, 1976 was \$9,578.89. Knight said that the above figures have nothing to do with indebtedness. Rather, the \$105,781.10 was simply the deficit amount, i.e. the excess of expenses over revenues for the period ending June 30, 1975, and that the \$9,578.89 was the excess of revenues over expenses for the period ending June 30, 1976.

The Editor of the Clarendon Press regrets these errors of reporting and recognizes that it was often the same kind of misinformation that contributed to the virulent atmosphere surrounding the hospital issue of several years ago. From this point extraordinary efforts will be made to obtain the facts regarding any future hospital litigation developments and report them as accurately as possible.

Donley County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch and high school agriculture teachers Milton Mann and Bob Berry were occupied all day Thursday validating young steers for winter shows.

"If they're going to be shown at major winter shows they have to be validated in August," Gooch said.

The men were busy weighing, ear-tagging, photographing and completing state forms on 60 head of cattle owned by 4-H and FFA members.

To be validated the steers

have to be certified as belonging to 4-H'ers or FFA members and as being on feed.

Besides their validating chores, Gooch anticipated he would have to play barber for some of the steers. "We've got seven head going to Guyton tomorrow for the Five State Junior Shorthorn Show," he said. "They'll have to be clipped and trimmed."

Lisa McAnear exhibited the champion Shorthorn heifer with her October heifer calf.

Lisa and Jamie each received a trophy and a \$100 certificate to be used towards the purchase of an animal in the 1978 Five State Shorthorn Sale.

Rodney McAnear exhibi-

bited the champion Shorthorn crossbred steer, the 4th place heavyweight Shorthorn steer and the 2nd place winter heifer calf.

Lisa McAnear's heavy-weight Shorthorn steer placed 1st, and Jamie's July heifer won 2nd place.

The Clarendon Broncos played their first scrimmage game Thursday night against Sanford-Fritch.

The first game was scoreless; Sanford-Fritch scored once in the second game; and the third game between the junior varsity teams was a 1-1 tie.

"Our offensive blocking didn't look too good," admitted Clarendon Head Coach Jerry Wilson, "and we're going to have to revamp a couple of plays."

Wilson said that Clarendon's camera broke down before the freshman scrimmage was over and he had to borrow Sanford-Fritch's film in order to view the game.

"After viewing the film and evaluating it we're pleased with some of the kids," Wilson said. "We thought Billy Gardner did well as defensive secondary and Mark Wilson as defensive line backer."

"I felt like we're having good contact, but we're not staying with our blocks. Our sweep wasn't as good as it should be either. We're going to work on it this week."

"I'm also disappointed in our passing game. Going to work on it some more."

Wilson said that he is presently trying to schedule some more freshman games. "We don't have enough of them. Our junior and varsity schedules are full."

Wilson said he thought Sanford-Fritch had the nucleus for a good ball club. "Pre-season picks have indicated they'll be a strong contender for the district crown," he said.

Wilson said that both he and Mike Benway, head coach at Sanford-Fritch, thought the scrimmages were "a little ragged" and that they found a lot of mistakes to work on. "But that's the reason for a scrimmage, to find out where your flaws are," Wilson said.

Clarendon's next scrimmage will be Aug. 25 when the freshman team will play Quanah at 5:30 p.m. and the varsity team will play Groom at 7:00 p.m. here. Then on Aug. 27 the junior varsity team will play Lefors starting at 10:00 a.m. here.

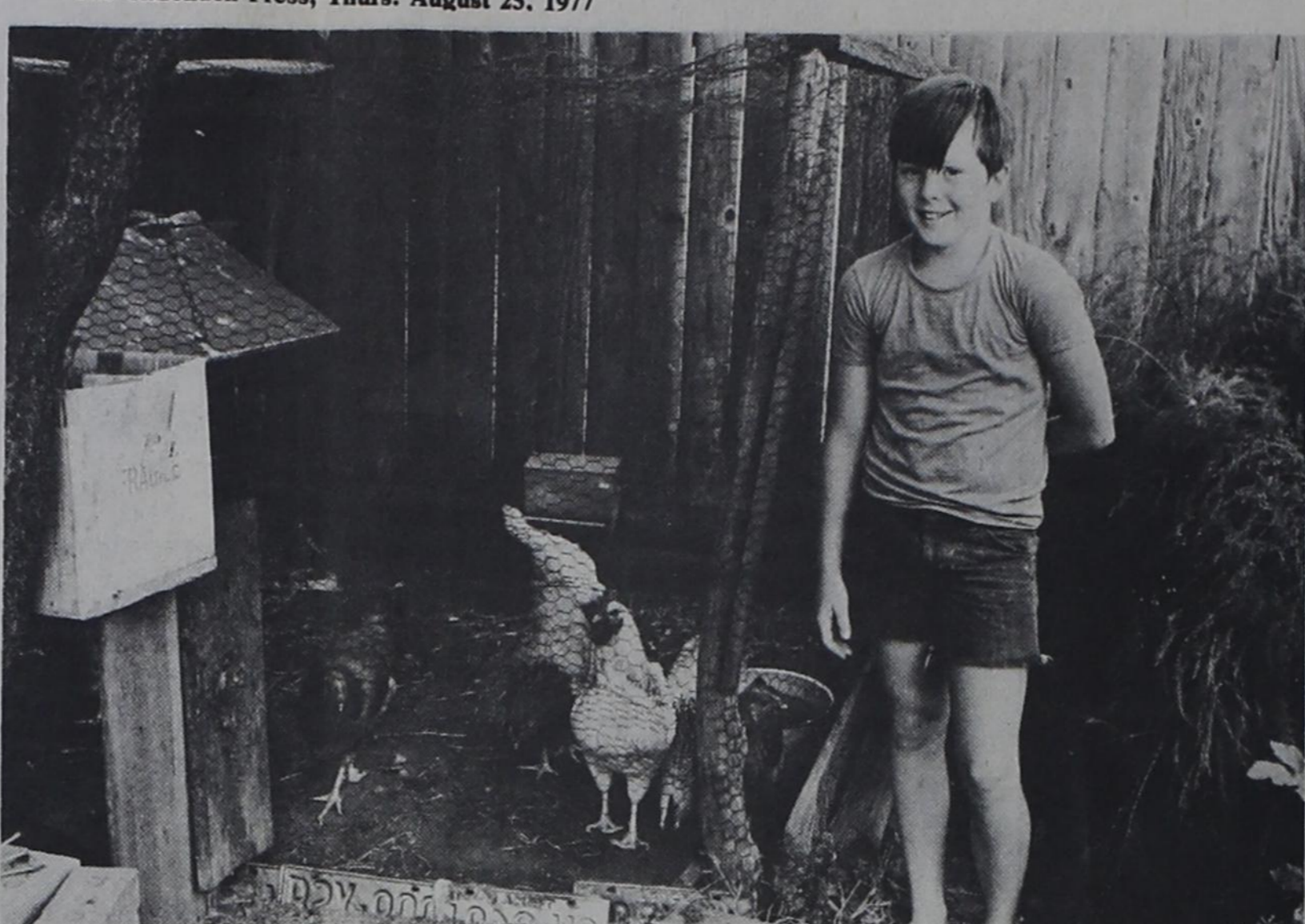
Atomic energy merit badge preview set

started crowing. That's why we call him the 'Lady Rooster.'

Raising chickens is not simply a matter of keeping them in a coop and feeding them every day, as Lynn found out. All but one of his birds contracted a foot disease which caused some or all of their toes to turn awry. Looking at them, one wonders how they can stand erect with their toes bent like nails. Also, although there hasn't been the proverbial Renard the Fox to harass the chickens, Lynn did have to cope with a opossum.

"We heard the dog barking one night, and his barking had started the roosters to crowing," Tiny related. "He just wouldn't stop when we told him to, so Lynn went out to see what the problem was. He returned saying there was a rat out there by the fence."

"Gene went out then and found out it was a opossum, so he came in to get his pistol, the only firearm he's got. I told him I didn't think he could hit a opossum with that pistol. We decided to call the police, and they all three showed up -- Shane, Danny -- and even Steve, who was off duty and just riding around with the other two. They finally killed it."

Despite all the worry and time the chickens have cost Lynn, they have also brought him something to make it worthwhile -- and not just eggs. Lynn used the chickens as the subject for his 4-H recordbook project which won for him a blue ribbon at the district 4-H meet.

Lynn Alderson's chickens as much work as fun

Lynn Alderson, 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Alderson of 511 S. Collinson, gathered the first eggs from his hens' nests three weeks ago.

Lynn doesn't know which of his four laying hens produced the first egg, but by the end of that first week he had collected 14 eggs.

"We'd try to preserve the shell of the first egg if we could figure out which one it was," said Lynn's mother, Tiny, "but it got mixed up with the other eggs."

Tiny described the procedure for preserving egg shells. "You punch a small hole in each end with a needle. Then you slowly blow the yolk and white out of the egg -- slowly, because if you blow too hard you might crack the shell."

Lynn had originally planned to raise quail. "My cousin raises them, so naturally I had to have some quail, too," he said. "He let me borrow his incubator.

Seven hatched, but they all died."

Lynn was very disappointed after that, so his mother and father suggested he try raising chickens while he still had the incubator. He got 15 eggs from a farmer and set them in the incubator. However, since the spaces in the automatic turner were designed for quail eggs they were too small for chicken eggs, and Lynn had to remember to turn them himself three times a day for the twenty-one day gestation period. On April 3 six eggs began to hatch, all of the 15 that were destined to hatch.

"From that day he ceased to be a wildlife conservationist and became a poultry farmer," Tiny said.

Out of the six eggs came two roosters and four hens. The reddish-brown hens and the white roosters with their blue-tipped tails are all about full-grown now. As the hens waddle about in a bunch

pecking at the ground the roosters strut and crow. At least two of the Aldersons' neighbors have said they appreciate the crowing, one former country boy declaring that he prefers a rooster crow to an alarm clock.

However, if people come out near the small coop the roosters will start crowing regardless of the hour. Dogs barking will set them crowing, too. "We've spoiled them, I'm afraid," Tiny said. "We pay some sort of attention to them every time we come out here, so now they expect it."

Another and younger rooster -- a seventh wheel, so to speak -- barely manages to coexist with his step-brothers and step-sisters. "If he were any smaller, they'd probably peck him to death," Tiny said.

"We call him the 'Lady Rooster,'" Lynn said. "It all started when a friend of my mom's had a guinea, a turkey and a chicken all

brooding in a tub. The chicken hen had died, and the guinea and the turkey wouldn't accept the orphaned egg; so mom's friend gave it to me."

"When the chick hatched, its cheeping went on day and night," Tiny added. "We got this one at the same age to keep the chick quiet, and then the first chick died."

The young rooster, a White Leghorn, was obviously of a different breed from the other roosters who both had full combs and blue tail feathers. "We don't know what these others are exactly," Tiny said. "They're a mixed breed."

Either for that reason or because he is a newcomer, the small rooster has been ostracized by the clannish original six. They pecked at him every time he tried to eat with them. "At first we thought he was a hen because he didn't crow," Lynn said. "Then one day I walked out here, and he

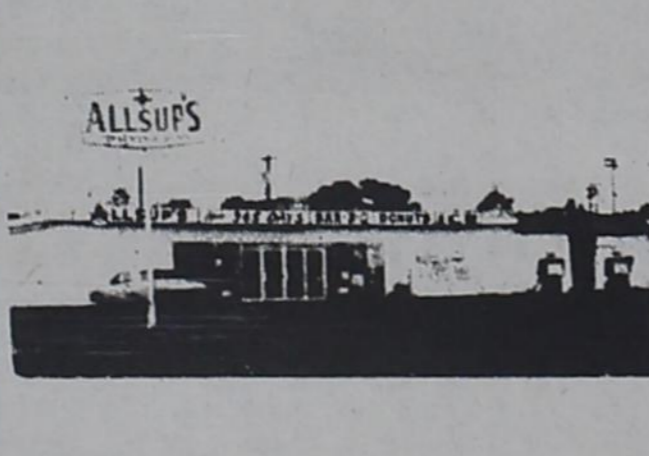

Clarendon school registration smooth go



TYRONE CALLAWAY, 6, looks bashful but eager to start his 1st grade year.

As of noon Monday approximately 560 pupils had enrolled in the Clarendon school system.

"That's not a set figure," said Clarendon High School Principal Mark Gunnels. "Some schools enroll a week later than we do, so it's possible there may be people who just moved into town and didn't expect us to enroll this week."

"Also, there are probably still some people gone on vacation."

"As it stands now we're about 20 down from what we had last year in the high school."

Both Gunnels and Clarendon Elementary School Principal Floyd Guinn agreed that it was an extraordinarily smooth enrollment process Friday.

"The kids have all been cooperative," Gunnels said. "I expected them to be a little high-strung on the first day," said Guinn. "but they've all settled in to the routine very quietly."

The only tears and holdings back reported were those of a few mothers of

children entering kindergarten. Kindergarten teacher Wanda Cornell said that it was hard for some mothers to let go of their children after keeping them at home for five years.

When a child does cry he or she is likely to keep it up for a long while. "I've had them cry for six weeks," said 1st grade teacher Nova Little.

"That doesn't happen so much now that they've been to kindergarten," said Frieda Tucker.

Nevertheless, the two 1st grade teachers have started the year off by taking what precautions they can to minimize the tear flow. On one blackboard they had written, "Please pick up town children promptly. If you don't they get upset."

Clarendon School Superintendent Jeff Walker said that so far he has drivers for all the routes except Brice, which was driven by Claude Thomas as a fill-in Monday.

The regular bus drivers are: Billy Ray Johnston, bus 2 (Lelia Lake); Loretta Harrison, bus 4 (Chamberlain); Pete Bromley, bus 5 (Naylor); Maurice Risley, bus 6 (Sherwood Shores-Jericho); Wayne Barton, bus 15 (Ashtola-Martin); and Lloyd McCord, bus 20 (Goodnight).

Superintendent Walker also said that Clarendon schools will be participating in the Free and Reduced-Price Meal program sponsored by the Texas Education Agency.

"Parents of children who meet the minimum guidelines of the program should contact their principal or me in order to apply for the Free and Reduced-Price Meal program," Walker said.

1st year school children need parents' help

First-year school children need parental encouragement. Starting school may be emotional for children and parents when six million 5- and 6-year olds enter school for the first time.

Treat going to school as routine and expected of children, but offer support and encouragement. Here are hints that may help to alleviate some of the stress:

- Do not make going to school the topic of daily conversation.
- Do not let other children frighten or tease with tales of how awful school is. Encourage the child to trust your perceptions of what school is like.
- Answer all questions about school honestly.
- Never give the impression that there is a choice about attending school. Make it clear that all children go to school.
- Show that you appreciate your child's cooperation in helping with preparations to begin school.
- Make transportation plans clear. If the child is to walk to school, go along once or twice to establish the route, or arrange for your child to walk with other children in the neighborhood.
- If the child is to ride a bus, clearly identify which bus before school starts.
- Do not get into the habit of seating your child in the classroom. This can lead to tears and clinging, which can start the child off on the wrong foot with the teacher and other children.
- If your child does cry, rest assured that in most cases the tears will stop quickly.
- For working mothers, if possible, make arrangements to be at home for the first day or two when your child gets home from school.
- Let your child know that during the school day you will be going about your usual work.
- Maintain a normal home life during the first days of school.

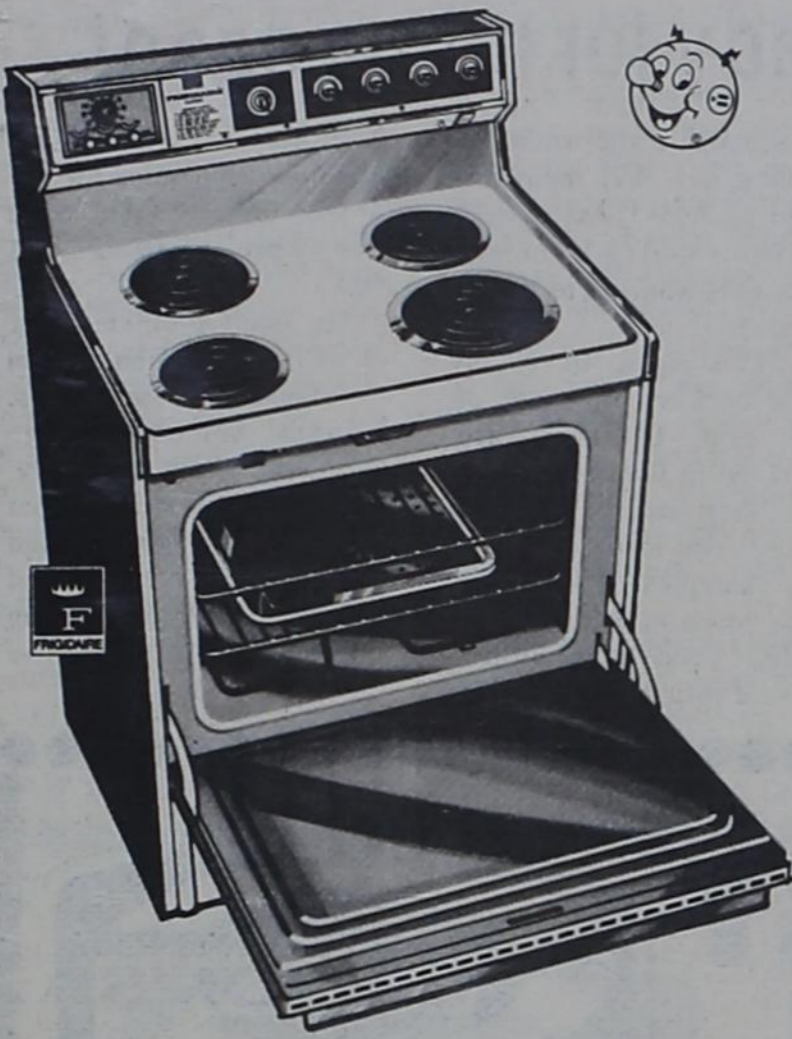

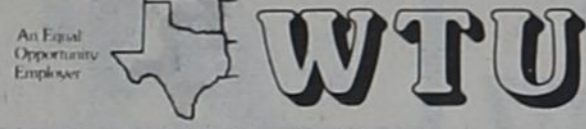

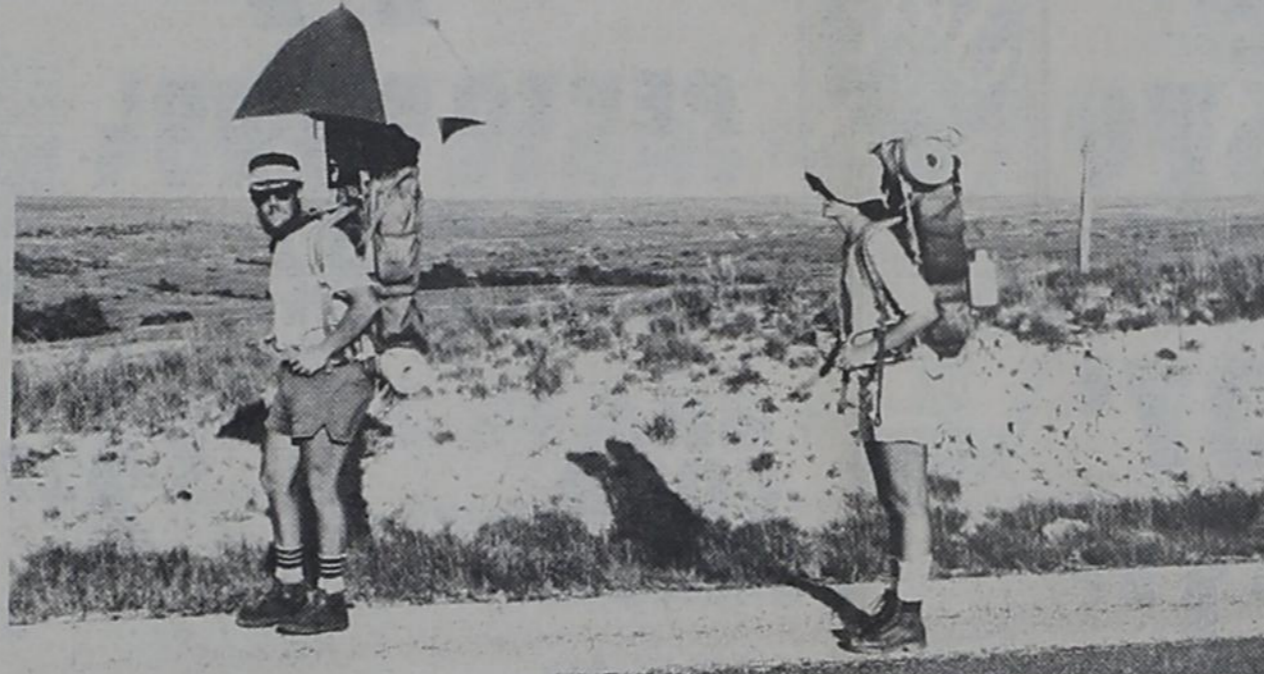

Couple walking across U.S.

It's a long walk from New Orleans to California. But Peter and Barbara Jenkins are doing it with energy and enthusiasm. The pair walked through Clarendon on Monday, August 22 and tried to pay a visit to Virginia James, but she wasn't home. They

had stayed for six months with Virginia's daughter and son-in-law in Dallas.

Over glasses of cold iced tea at Johnson's Oasis at Howardwick, they described their journey, their experiences, and their goals. Peter Jenkins actually began the trek in northern New York State in October of 1974

and worked his way to New Orleans, meeting people and photographing as he went. He told the story in the April, 1977 issue of National Geographic, entitled "A Walk Across America." While he was writing the story in New Orleans, he met Barbara Pennell, a student at the Baptist seminary. They married, and she began with him a six month long physical training regimen, and then they set out for the long way to California.

The Jenkins' inched their way through the steaming bayou land of Louisiana, warding off swarms of mosquitoes. Then up through East Texas to Dallas. From the stay in Dallas they continued and endured 105° temperatures north of Fort Worth. They were taken in by a kindly postal employee in Quanah who had noticed them while

he was on his rural route. The Jenkins's had a most pleasant week's stay there. Refreshed, they continued on through Clarendon. The last Donley County residents who saw them were the D.G. Brays, who bid the hikers a farewell from their pick-up truck as they disappeared into the distance, silhouetted against the setting sun.

Peter Jenkins will write yet another article on this second half of the walk for National Geographic and also has been signed up by publishers to write two books. Jenkins says that Texans are the friendliest and most open people that he has met. He said that as a college student in New York in the difficult early 1970's, he had been a cynic about America, ashamed to salute the flag. He had had only a myopic view of his country from a suburb community in Connecticut. Jenkins set out to find his country and himself. He found his country in the mountains and along the back roads but mostly among the everyday people whom he met and lived with along the way, like Virginia James's family. He found the 'silent majority' to be the real America. He found himself at a very moving religious revival in Mobile, Alabama, where he was, much to his surprise, born again. Since then the religious aspect has permeated the Jenkins's Mission. They literally walk with Jesus. Everything they do is in faith. They know they will not be hungry or lonely.

The Jenkins's have also learned the importance of little things like a cool glass of water. "There have been times," said Barbara Jenkins, "when I would have given \$3,000 for a glass of water or a bed to sleep on. Money no longer means anything." The couple do spend about one night a

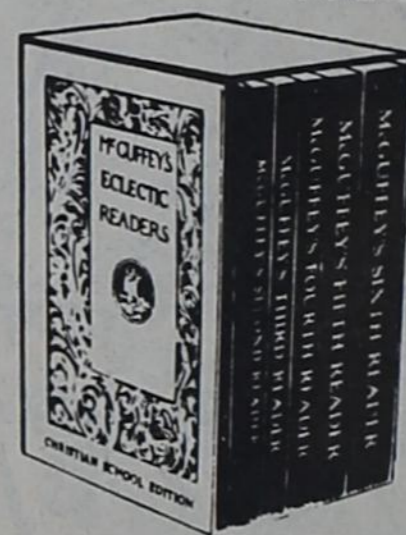
week in a motel while they are walking and stay occasionally in people's homes, working at menial jobs to fund their trip. But much of their time is on the road. They hope to arrive in northern California in about a year. In the meantime, if you see a tanned young couple toting blue back packs emblazoned with yellow crosses and an umbrella sticking up from behind, wish them God speed, offer them something cool to drink, chat with them. Don't worry. They will trust you.

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Yes, the Bible IS Our Sole Guide in Religion

The Bible, being the inspired Word of God, is our supreme, final, and all-sufficient authority in religion.

"All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works" (2 Timothy 3: 16, 17).

In view of the inspiration and all-sufficiency of the Holy Scriptures, it is surprising that some will admit the fact of the Bible's inspiration but deny its claim to furnish one "unto all good works." Millions are taught that they must submit to the "living voice of the living church." They are taught that the traditions, dogmas, creeds, and councils of men must be obeyed too.

This issue of religious authority is fundamental to our faith. All Bible believers agree that Jesus of Nazareth was acknowledged by the Heavenly Father to be his divine Son and Spokesman, as follows:

"This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased: hear ye him" (Matthew 17:5; compare Hebrews 1:1,2).

But since Jesus was not to remain upon the earth always, he promised his apostles that the Holy Spirit would be sent to be their Comforter and Teacher after he was gone:

"But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name,

he shall teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you" (John 14: 26).

"Howbeit when he the Spirit of Truth is come, he will guide you into all the truth" (John 16: 13).

These passages teach that God had a plan to preserve and extend his teaching, which had been perfectly embodied and revealed in the life and teaching of Jesus (John 5:19). The plan was for the Holy Spirit to come to earth after Jesus' death and resurrection and teach the apostles "all things" and guide them into "all truth" so they would not have to depend upon their human powers of recollection. This was God's plan to keep Christ's teaching free from error.

The New Testament reveals how the Holy Spirit did come upon the apostles in Jerusalem on the first Pentecost after the resurrection of Christ (Acts 2: 1-4,33).

As a result, the early church continued to teach, over and over, just the doctrine of the apostles of Christ since Jesus had promised that only the apostles would be taught "all things" and guided into "all truth."

Not only were the early Christians devoted exclusively to the teaching of the apostles, but they were warned—not once, but again and again—against accepting any so-called additional "revelation" (Galatians 1:8). The language is clear on this point: "But though we, or an angel from Heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that we have preached unto you, let him be accursed" (Galatians 1:8).

To restore the simplicity, purity, and beauty of New Testament Christianity in our age, we must go back to the exclusive and all-sufficient authority of the Bible: To speak where the Bible speaks and to be silent where the Bible is silent.
