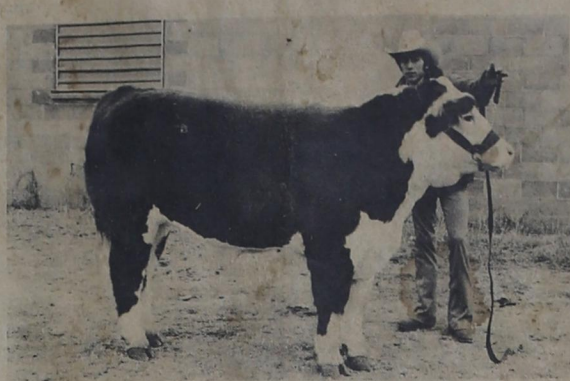

The holiday season with schools closed afforded the James F. Hayes and children, Rick, Spencer, and Mary Katherine, the opportunity to travel to New Orleans where they viewed the treasures of Tutankhamun. These treasures are currently on display at the New Orleans Museum of Art. The Hayes reported they stood in line only about thirty minutes before being admitted to the museum. The family purchased a membership with the New Orleans Museum prior to the trip and at the museum members are given priority for admission over non-members. Approximately ten thousand visit the exhibition each day and as of December 14 a total of 632,041 had visited the Tut treasures on show in New Orleans since its opening in the delta city September 18, 1977.

The treasures on display are more than 3,000 years old and were found and excavated in the Valley of the Kings a few miles away from the west bank of the Nile. The Valley of the Kings, the royal necropolis, had been part of ancient Thebes, the capital from which the Egyptian empire was ruled at the zenith of its power. Thebes, situated more than four hundred miles south of present-day Cairo had been possessed by Persians, by the Greeks of

Alexander the Great, by the Romans, by the Arabs, by the Ottoman Empire.

For centuries the Valley and its surrounding desert, wild and inaccessible had been the haunt of bandits. Only in the nineteenth century, as a measure of order was imposed, did archaeologists dare to begin excavating there.

In all, about thirty-three royal tombs had been found in the bedrock of the Valley, but every one had been pillaged long before by professional thieves. On Nov. 26, 1922, Howard Carter, archeologist of England who had explored Egypt for six years, came to a small cut in a masonry door. He thrust a candle through.

"Can you see anything?" asked Lord Carnarvon, Carter's patron.

The answer came: "Wonderful things." The discovery marked the first time modern man had seen into an ancient pharaoh's tomb. Five thousand objects were to be excavated over a period of ten years, and of that number fifty five of the treasures were carefully selected and are on display presently in New Orleans.

Tutankhamun ruled as an 18th Dynasty boy king. He ascended the throne in 1334 BC at the age of nine years and died at the age of 18 or 19. So sudden and unanticipated was his death that no tomb had been prepared; he was buried in a small tomb of only four rooms that had been built for his chief advisor, Ay.

As a visitor to the exhibition Hayes said, "One takes the trip through a reconstructed tomb. Once inside the museum you can rent a recorded lecture to use as a guide through the exhibit and this gives an added dimension to the

tour."

The first treasure to greet the visitor at the entrance of the exhibit is the head of the child king emerging from a blue lotus flower. By having this model in his tomb Tutankhamun would have the instrument that would enable him to be reborn each day as the Sun God. The features of the head are those of Tutankhamun and is made of painted wood.

In the Antechamber, Kay explained, is the white chalice cup of alabaster, featuring a half-opened lotus flower. The cup is engraved and the inscription stained reads: "May you spend millions of years, who love Thebes, sitting with your face to the north wind, your two eyes beholding happiness."

Other rooms in the simulated tomb are the Burial Chamber, The Treasury, and the Annex. Each has been covered with wall-size photographs taken in 1922 with quotations from Carter.

The highlight of the exhibit for the Hayes and probably the most famous work of art from the tomb, was the gold funerary mask. Made of solid gold, it seems to be a faithful depiction of the king; the narrow eyes, fleshy lips, and shape of the nose and chin all agree with the features visible on his mummy. The mask is inlaid with carnelian (a variety of quartz), lapis lazuli and colored glass. It was found placed directly over the bandaged face. Beads and glass paste form the large circular collar that covers the chest area. The collar was intended to provide magical protection. A ceremonial beard juts from the chin. The mask is 21 inches high and 15 inches in width. Quotations from the "Book of the Dead" are inscribed on the back and

shoulders, and a vulture and cobra at the forehead represent Tutankhamun's sovereignty over Upper and Lower Egypt.

Many other treasures on display were lavish and awe-inspiring, Hayes reported. Among them were the ceremonial chair in the Antechamber with its carving of the God of Eternity; the boat model in the Treasury Room, indicating the king's interest in navigation; the figure of the Goddess, Siskat with outstretched arms to protect the king on his journey; the king's dagger of gold and his sheath; a brightly painted wooden chest with carved and painted ivory panels; and a triple lamp formed from one piece of alabaster.

Numerous treasures were made from solid gold, but silver, ivory, ebony, alabaster, beads and colored paste materials were found in abundance.

Experts over the years have failed to agree on the circumstances of Tutankhamun's birth, marriage, reign, and death. Many believe him to be the son of Amenophis III and Tive. His 15 year-old wife was Ankhesenamun, daughter of the beautiful Nefertiti and Amenophis IV - Akhenaten, historians say.

Tutankhamun was a minor king, so the lavishness of his burial is most interesting. Many experts believe the magnificence of his entombment was due to the fact that old traditions and gods had been restored during his reign following emergence from domination by the Asiatics.

When Carter discovered the tomb he found the modest tomb had been broken into twice apparently fairly soon after burial, but that the areas were resealed.

Later, the entrance was obliterated, some believe by earth thrown from the site of burial for a later more prominent king.

Tutankhamun was considered a god by his people and they worked to see that in his burial he had food, transportation and protection of various gods to carry him safely through the underworld.

The Treasures of the Tutankhamun exhibition are on loan from the Egyptian Government coming from the Museum of Cairo. The display was made possible by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. The exhibition opened at the National Gallery of Art in Washington, DC, Nov. 15, 1976, went to Field Museum of Natural History and The

University of Chicago April 15, 1977, and will leave Jan. 15, 1978 to be shown at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the Seattle Art Museum, and the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City.

The Hayes family reported they enjoyed the Tutankhamun exhibition very much and felt the experience provided them with a better understanding and greater appreciation of Egyptian history, customs, and beliefs.

While in New Orleans the Hayes also viewed an ancient Egyptian glass display which featured some objects older than the Tutankhamun period.

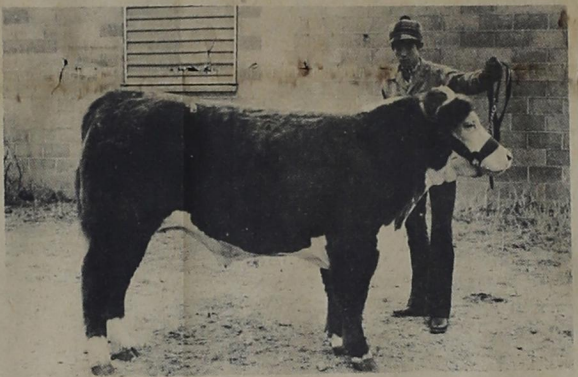

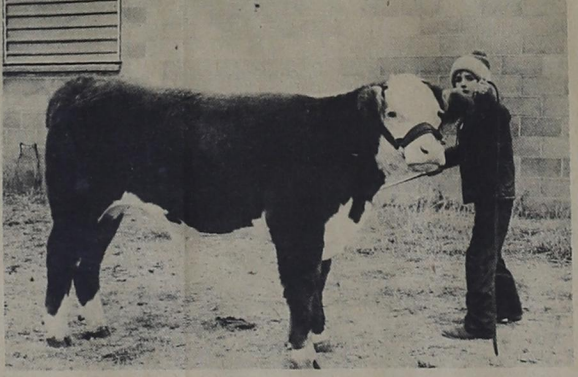

## Cotton market report

Trading was moderate again this week with growers accepting bids on about 25 percent of the cotton being offered for sale. Prices rose 50 to 100 points from last Friday's levels with mixed lots containing mostly 32 and shorter staple cotton selling for 43.00 to 44.00 cents per pounds. Lots predominating in 33 and longer staples brought 46.00 to 47.00 cents. Growers received 62.00 to 67.00 dollars per ton for cottonseed at most gin points.

About 19,000 samples were classed at Memphis for the week ending Friday, December 30. This brings the season's total to 259,000 compared to 197,000 as of this date last year.

The predominant grade was 42 with 37 percent followed by 32 with 32 percent. Staple 32 was the

# Report from the Donley County Hospital Board

**DITORS NOTE:** The following article is a news release from the Donley County Hospital Board.

The following information supplied to the taxpayers of the Donley County Hospital District by the Board of Directors in relation to past events and legal actions by and between George W. Smith, MD and the Donley County Hospital

District. The first Board of Directors of the Donley County Hospital District was

named in Chapter 699 of the 61st Texas Legislature and provision was made for future appointments by the Commissioners Court of Donley County. On April 1, 1970, the Board adopted a contract with Smith which was originally entered into

by Adair Board members in 1956. As given by minutes of the Board of Directors of the District: "A motion was made by J.R. Bartlett that the Board of Directors of the Donley County Hospital District on behalf of the Donley County Hospital District, ratify, confirm and adopt the present contract with George W. Smith, M.D. Motion was seconded by F.E. Chamberlain, Jr. Motion carried."

In the following months, various disagreements and controversies arose between the Board and Smith and on October 27, 1971, a suit was filed by the Board to ascertain title of Adair Hospital property and to void the contract with Smith. Smith followed with cross-action for a declaration that the contract was valid and certain money damages.

Approximately 18 months later and although none of the suits had actually come to trial, the Board entered into a settlement with Smith on March 5, 1973, which basically disposed of all controversies. The District agreed to pay Smith \$48,351.51 plus interest over a four (4) year period and to increase the tax rate to whatever necessary to make the payments. As given by the minutes: "After full discussion of the Settlement Agreement a motion was made by R.D. Cagle that the Board accept the Settlement Agreement as presented. Motion was seconded by Jeff Walker. Motion carried. Those voting for the motion were: Jeff Walker, J.S. Hines, R.D. Cagle, Edna Newhouse, and Lane Bownds. Those voting against the motion were: O.C. Watson and Delbert Robertson."

Also at this time the Texas

Legislature adopted an amendment submitted by the Board on May 31, 1972 which discontinued appointment of Board members and elected them by popular ballot. An election was ordered for April 7, 1973 for three (3) members.

A short time after the election the Board became divided as to whether to stand by the 1973 settlement or to go to court with the original law suits. But on April 24, 1973 a decision was reached; again from the minutes: "Following discussion of possible solution, i.e.: whether to join in the motion to reinstate the judgement to comply with the statutory law or to go to court with the original law suits, Ernest Barbee made a motion that the Board proceed with the original law suits. The motion was seconded by Lacy Noble, Barbee, Robertson, and Noble voted for the motion with Newhouse and Walker voting against; therefore the motion carried by a three (3) to two (2) vote."

About three (3) years later, a ruling was issued by the District Court on January 27, 1976 stating that the 1973 settlement was valid and the sums were owed to Smith. (The original suits still had not come to trial.) The District then filed a motion with the appellate court to overturn the 1973 settlement-judgement but on June 16, 1977, the Court of Civil Appeals of Waco rendered a decision that the 1973 settlement was valid. This decision was further appealed to the Texas Supreme Court but on November 16, 1977, the Supreme Court responded stating that they would not hear the case. This upheld the lower courts rulings in making the 1973 settlement valid which by this time had grown as it accumulated interest at 6 1/2% per year. During the Supreme Court appeal, the attorneys for Smith filed a separate suit in District Court to force the Hospital District to raise the taxes and pay as stipulated in the agreement.

Since all legal avenues had been exhausted and in an attempt to avoid raising taxes while saving as much money as possible, on December 13, 1977 in regular meeting, the Board of Directors made the following decision: "The topic of the District's legal actions concerning George W. Smith were brought to the floor and in light of the District's failure to obtain any relief from court actions, Mr. Knight and Mr. Sanders pointed out that a settlement might be reached with Dr. Smith which could save the District as much as \$13,000.00 in total costs. This topic was discussed thoroughly and a motion was made by Mr. Hermesmeyer to pass a resolution to establish a settlement agreement with George W. Smith, MD at a sum of \$56,500.00. Each respective party shall be responsible for their expenses, and controversies and claims between the District and Dr. Smith would be totally resolved by the settlement. Mr. Hermesmeyer further stated that all transactions concerning the settlement should be made public along with a detailed account of the history of the agreement. This motion was seconded by Mr. Green. With the motion made and seconded a vote was called and all members voted "aye."

Thus, with the payment of the new settlement on December 15, 1977, long years of legal actions and controversy in the District were ended. The threat of an increase in taxes was dissolved by electing to borrow monies and seek recovery over a period of years.

The purpose of this press release by the District is to inform the taxpayers of Donley County of the history of the litigation involving the Hospital District and Dr. Smith. The taxpayers of the District have a right to know how their money is being spent and the reasons behind the expenditures. The Board feels that with all controversies resolved, and after recovering financially over the next two to three years, the community should work together in recruiting physicians and reopening the hospital.

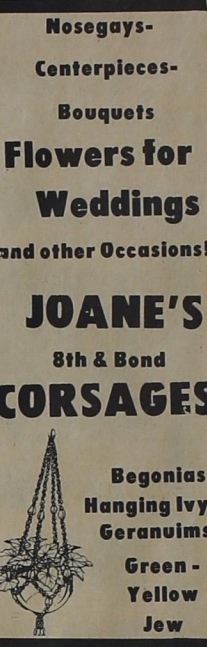

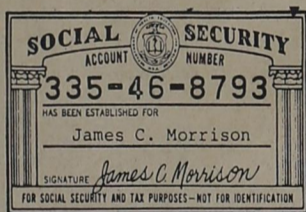
