Cotton crop top in yield and grade for County

The cotton crops of Donley County have turned white and with the recent killing freeze of 10 days evening, November 10, and in delimiting the harvest is now moving into full swing here. Growers report they expect the crop to peak in a week to ten days.

Some area growers chemically sprayed to hasten the cotton's ripening could begin an earlier date, but to present a small

percentage of the total Donley County cotton crop has been harvested. The Clarendon, Leila Lake, and Hedley areas of ginned a combined total of 13,100 bales as of Friday, November 11. Ginning is approximately a month ahead of what it was last season due to favorable weather conditions during maturing.

Farmers are reportedly receiving excellent grades and quality bales. Most farmers are making more

cotton per acre than they had expected. The land cotton reportedly is making half to one bale per acre. Irrigated cotton is producing an average of 1.5 to 2.0 bales per acre with some yields higher.

According to area ginners, much of the cotton is being graded all the way to light spotted with lengths averaging 30 to 32 inches. Farmers are well pleased with such high grades and good yields.

All three areas in Donley

County are operating "around the clock" and the gin yards are rapidly filling as area farmers move their beautiful harvest from field to gin. Growers say on an average they can produce 100 to 150 one hundred bales of cotton and each bale of cotton will yield 800 to 900 pounds of cottonseed.

The main thing that cotton farmers need is a stronger market the ginners agree.

Cotton presently is bringing between 42 1/2 cents and 43 cents per lb. Cotton market prices are depressed this year with prices for high quality cotton below prices for lower grades in 1976. Earl Shields, manager of the Leila Lake gin reported, however that at least eight thousand acres of cotton in the Leila Lake area was under contract for as much as 57 cents per lb.

The cotton will not cover the cost of ginning this

year. Cottons it is currently bringing \$60.862 per ton. Producers will probably lack between \$10-\$20 per bale for cottonseed to pay ginning fee.

The reason for the drop in seed prices is said to be due to the depression of the total world oil market and its reportedly connected with the yield of soybeans in Brazil and the palm oil production in the Far East.

County favors Price, Simpson; approves three of seven amendments

Former Congressman Bob Price of Pampa led Donley County for state governor on 31st District Wednesday, Nov. 9. Price received 167 votes while State Representative Bob Simpson of Amarillo placed second with 156 votes. Third in the race was Mel Phillips with 133. Burk Whiteberg and Jim Brandon placed fourth and fifth respectively. Brandon of Amarillo is a Republican.

Voting was held in the county as was the runoff in all Panhandle counties within the 31st District. Over the district Bob Simpson placed first, followed by Price, Brandon, Phillip and Whiteburg.

The date of the runoff election has been set by the governor. The runoff election is to be Saturday, December 10. Absentee voting will begin Wednesday, November 20, and will continue thru Friday, December 6th.

In the Absentee election county voters followed the state trend in five of the seven proposed amendments, but was contrary to

the trend on Amendment No. 7. Judicial Commission Powers, On Amendment No. 4 Historical Property Tax Relief Donley voters were nearly evenly divided with 262 for, 263 against.

Over the state Prop No. 1 Criminal Appeals Court Expansion carried by 72.9 percent against 27.1 percent against. Prop No. 2 Veterans Land Fund Increase carried 59.3 percent for to 40.7 percent against. Prop No. 3 Death of Bail carried 83.4 percent for and 16.6 against. Prop No. 4 Historical Property Tax Relief carried 55.1 percent for and 44.9 percent against. Prop No. 5 Authorize Marketing Associations failed 47.4 percent for and 52.6 percent against. Prop No. 6 Automobile Electronic Funds Transfer failed 45.5 percent for and 54.5 percent against. Prop No. 7 Expand Judicial Commission Powers, carried 66.7 percent for and 33.3 percent against.

Quail season opens; deer & turkey to open

The open season for hunting quail in Donley County is Nov. 12 thru Feb. 12, according to information provided by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Hunters may take twelve quail per day and the possession limit is thirty-six. On the first day of an open season the possession limit is the same as the daily bag limit.

A reasonable effort must be made to return all wounded game birds and these birds shall become a part of the legal bag limit. All birds taken into possession must be kept in a suitable condition.

It is illegal to refuse a game warden permission to search your automobile, game bag or other receptacle.

Acreage information due at ASCS office

The United States Commodity Credit Corporation has announced the deadline for farm operators to report 1977 acreages of all crops. If the 1977 acreages are not reported by December 15, 1977, the farm could be penalized for program benefits for 1978.

Complete crop acreage information is required for the 1978 cotton program. Failure to report the acreage will result in the farm being a non-reporter for this year.

- 1. General fee 4 percent
- 2. Warehouse receiving charge \$1.00 per ton
- 3. County office service charge \$1.00 per ton plus \$25 per ton
- 4. Express charge \$4.00 per ton plus \$1.00 per ton

All gin managers in Donley County have signed the contract for ginning and storage. The agreement indicates they are using certification ginning and storage.

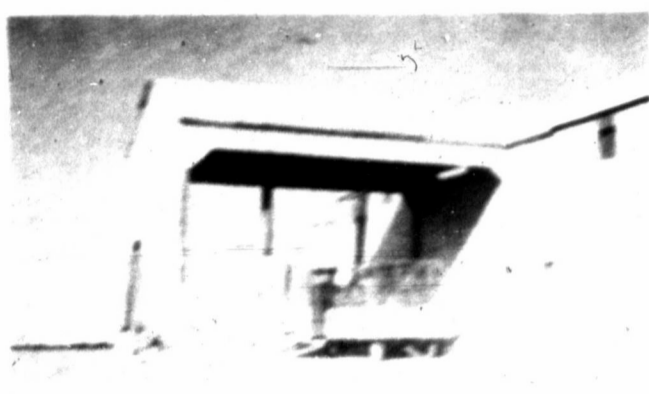
As soon as you have completed cotton harvest

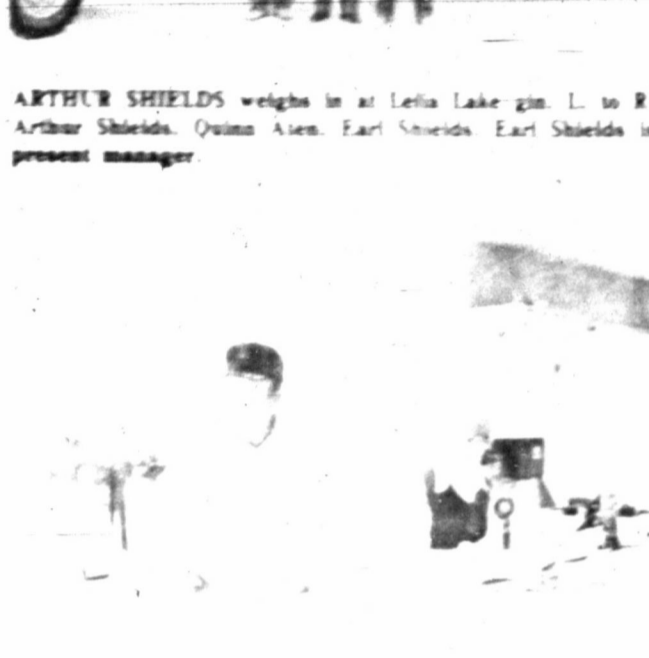

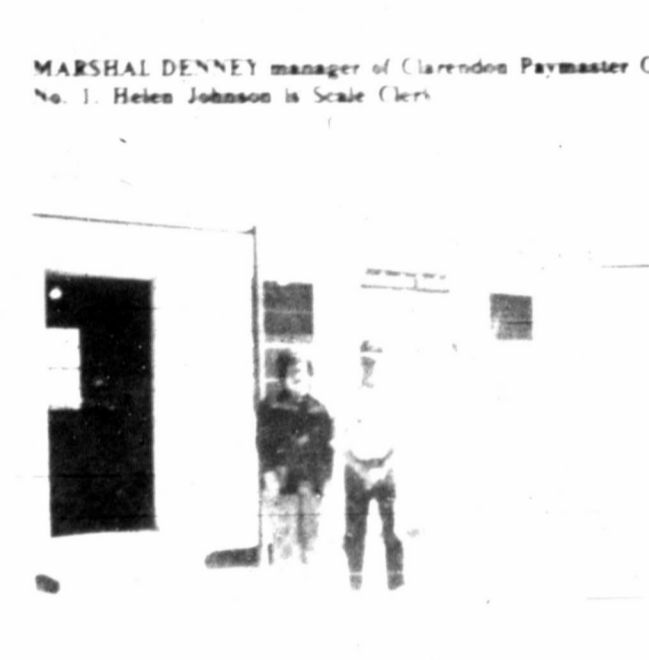

A&M research center serves Panhandle

The newly dedicated Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Amarillo serves the entire Panhandle area.

The smart new facility houses approximately 25 staff members of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The \$855,000 A&M Center is strategically located on a 26-acre site adjacent to the A&M Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory. Besides the offices, the Center contains a modern auditorium, educational classrooms for teaching and conferences, a rather complete feedlot, disease research facility and other research laboratories.

A&M's new Amarillo Center also provides regional educational facilities for the Extension Service. District I educational programs for county Extension agents are coordinated by Paul Gross and Mrs. Sue Farris. District Extension agents serving the 20-county area. These programs relate to agriculture, home economics and family living, 4-H and youth community resource development and other related educational areas.

The Extension Service

through its county agent system reaches into every community and Panhandle county with educational programs designed to meet the needs and interests of local people.

In cooperation with the specialists in the county Extension staff members take findings of the Experiment Station and USDA to the people to help them enhance their quality of life and improve their position economically.

Agents working in agriculture and home economics jointly conduct 4-H and youth programs and community resource development projects. Panhandle 4-H projects have the two-fold objective of providing learning experiences for youth and encouraging the development of desirable mental, emotional, moral, physical and social traits in each member. The learning experiences are guided by volunteer adult leaders and youth leaders who have received special training from county Extension agents and specialists.

During the past year, more than 4,135 youth from 9 to 19 years participated in 4-H

programs in District I. They were assisted by 4,135 youth of junior and adult leaders. District I of the Extension Service has the largest number of Home Demonstration Clubs in the state at present, out-reaching the other 13 districts. Programs in many timely subjects are selected by club members and planned in cooperation with Extension specialists and agents.

The A&M Center at Amarillo serves the upper 20 Panhandle counties, bringing a wide variety of educational programs to meet the needs and interests of local people.

Total cash receipts in the 20 counties amount to \$808,678,000, points out District Agent Gross.

Donley County cash agricultural receipts amount to \$13,340,000 and is served by Ronald Gosch and Cynthia Manning.

The fire ant kills many harmful cotton insects

In a study conducted by Texas A&M University, the fire ant was found to be an effective predator of many harmful cotton insects. The study was conducted in a cotton field in the Panhandle of Texas.

The fire ant was observed to kill up to 85 percent of the young boll weevils with a weekly average of 96 percent. Fire ants and other predators were able to find and eat an average of 93 percent of the bollworm eggs on cotton, sometimes taking 100 percent, according to Dr. Winfield Sterling, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

In a dryland cotton field containing large numbers of fire ants, where no insecticides were used for the control of any pest, 1,810 pounds of seed cotton were produced, compared to only 577 pounds in adjacent fields treated with insecticides for boll weevils and bollworm-bud worms.

The reason for the low yields where insecticides were used may be blamed on the damage caused by the insecticide-resistant bollworm and other pests. The insecticide also greatly reduced numbers of fire ants available to help control pests.

Insecticides failed to control the bollworm, but when fire ants were not used, fire ants and other predators were effective not only in preventing damage and saving cost of insecticides, but also in considerably increasing yields.

The fire ant shows certain characteristics that make it a preferred predator of cotton insect pests. Sterling says it tends to colonize the fields in a fairly uniform distribution so that at average densities of greater than five fire ants per foot of row, any foot of row sample selected from any location in the field will have more than a 90 percent chance of being infested.

USDA cotton report

Trading in cotton futures was active at the close of the week as the volume of cotton available for sale grew. Physical prices for most grades ranged from 41.00 to 44.00 cents per pound, most qualities bringing 250 to 300 points over the loan. As present prices of any premium grade are paid for grades higher than 32 or staples longer than 32, buyers received an average of \$1.20 per 100 pounds. About 10,000 samples were classified in Memphis for the week ending Friday, November 11, bringing the season volume to 400. This compares with 375 of this date last year.

Light spotted grades made up 28 percent of the samples classed while the grades made up 32 percent. The premium part of the week was 32 with 4 percent, 42 with 24 percent, 31 with 17 percent and 41 with 12 percent. Most staple lengths were 31 with 47 percent and 32 with 24 percent. Moisture ranged from 10.5 to 11.5 percent. The desirable range is 10.5 to 11.5 percent. The samples tested 8.5 percent picked above and 7.5 percent picked below the range. Average price for the week was 40 cents per square foot.

hunt deer or turkey except those persons under 17 or over 65 years of age, persons hunting on land where they reside or disced veterans, may hunt deer or turkey is a holder of the \$1.25 resident exempt hunting license.

All Texas hunters contain deer and turkey tags which must be filed out and attached to the deer and or turkey carcass immediately upon possession by the hunter.

To qualify for the resident license, an applicant must have been residing in Texas for more than six months immediately preceding application for a license. Members of the Armed Forces with proof of assignment on active duty at any federal installation within the state for a period of more than 30 days may purchase a resident license.

Hunting license fees include: resident hunting \$5.25; combination hunting and fishing \$8.75; non-resident small game hunting \$37.75; non-resident general hunting \$100.75. A non-resident small game hunting license will allow out-of-state hunters to participate during the legal season for quail, pheasant, and other small game. The non-resident general hunting license will allow out-of-state hunters to hunt all legal species of game including small game, deer and turkey.

State traffic death rate nears pre-55 MPH high

Texas' traffic death rate is slowly approaching the high figures reached before the 55 miles-per-hour speed law became effective in 1973, a Department of Public Safety spokesman says. DPS statisticians said Friday that deaths on Texas streets and highways so far this year total 2,908 compared to 2,654 in 1976, a 10 per cent increase. DPS statisticians said there have been 2,555 accidents this year in which

deaths occurred, compared to 2,291 last year, an increase of 12 per cent, up from the 11 per cent increase at the end of August.

Martin Baptist last of rural churches

Fifty years ago before the days of consolidated schools, when rural population was high and transportation not so advanced as today, when paved roads and four-wheel drive vehicles were not even a dream, Donley County was composed of a number of little settlements or communities. Out of these communities commonly sprang small towns with post offices, schools, grocery stores and gas stations. People in these communities often shared common ideals and goals. The school house not only met the needs of education, but served as the community center - as a place for neighborly gatherings, entertainment, and spiritual training. Such was the typical rural community of days gone by.

Of all the many thriving rural communities that once dotted Donley County one church group continues to meet each Sunday as it did some fifty odd years ago. This group being the people of the Martin community. They still gather at the once community school to hold Sunday worship services and mid-week worship services. They hold fellowship suppers, community parties, elections, and even a once a year barbecue.

Through the years many changes have occurred. The church group of today is a member of the Southern Baptist Association, in the early days it was a union church where peoples of several denominations worshipped together. The building once owned by the school district, consolidated and sold in 1949, today is the property of the Martin Baptist. While the church has never had a baptistry the congregation of one hundred members has managed with Kelly Creek a not too great a distance away. The congregation has taken on new faces with time, but continues strong in membership and attendance. The church record board shows an average Sunday School attendance of 55 each Lord's Day. People drive from points far and near in the county to worship in the little rural church. Located five miles west of Clarendon, North off highway 287, the church stands a shrine to the era of the active rural community.

Minnie Cannon is the church's only remaining charter member, and she recalls that Martin has had four school buildings through the years. She says the second and third buildings were both destroyed by fire, and the present building erected in 1944. Each of the four buildings doubled as a place of worship and as a center of education, and according to Minnie the land where the buildings have stood was given by Martin for whom the community was named. During the early days circuit preachers held worship services and revivals in the community. Since the church has been organized as a Baptist church from time to time the congregation has faithfully been served by resident ministers who occupied the old teacherage. Serving the church today and making his home in the teacherage as many of his predecessors is Charlie Floyd present pastor. Others who presently serve as church officers include: Bud White, Chairman of Deacons; B.B. Osborn, Sunday School Superintendent; Jack Leeper, Song Director; Pete Land, Treasurer; Billy Hicks, Clerk; and Dorothy Reynolds, Pianist.
