## Nationwide farm rally today on Capitol Hill; local farmers participate

Several local farmers have gone to Washington, D.C. to carry their protest for higher prices to Congress. Leaving from Clarendon Sunday via two Winnebagos were Paul Bell, Larry Watson, Monte McAneer, David McAneer, and Ronnie McAneer. Traveling with this group were five farmers from Memphis and one from Wellington.

Another group of local farmers left Tuesday. Leaving by plane from Amarillo were Max and Helen Johnson and Nolan and Sue Salmon.

The local people will join half a million farmers from across the nation to participate in a three-day

nationwide farm rally on January 18-20 on Capitol Hill. There they will ask their own and other congressmen to support requests for reasonable return on cost of production for products produced and will air their grievances over the way farm problems are being handled by the present administration. Also, members of the American Agriculture Movement will lay down to lawmakers' ideas for a new farm bill.

The local farm group carried with them data on cost of production for each crop produced in the county compared to current farm

prices. U.S.D.A. statistics reveal that farmers are presently receiving 62% parity for farm prices. This percentage is lower than in the depression when parity was at 80%. The highest percentage farmers have received was shortly after the depression, then parity reached 108%.

Statistics from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service show that Texas agriculture lost 2,000 farms last year. This is a trend that has continued since 1967. These farms were lost because of slumping markets and high production

costs. In meetings with politicians across the state farmers have received notable support for the American Agriculture Movement. Governor Dolph Briscoe and House Speaker Bill Clayton, both candidates for re-election, issued a joint statement offering their "support in securing 100% parity in the marketplace for American agriculture products." Attorney General John Hill, who is challenging Briscoe in the Democratic Primary pledged to support full parity for farm products. Hill said, "What's good for

Texas farmers is good for Texas. The U.S. is the Saudi Arabia of the world in food - we are the market. We should set the price of our products for the rest of the world to follow, then take the appropriate measure to support the prices."

Joe Hubenak, a candidate for State Agriculture Commissioner, announced his support for 100 per cent parity, which would keep farmers from losing any money on their investment.

State Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown, a candidate for re-election, has also publicly sympathized with the financial plight of

the farmers. Farmers plan to stay in Washington as long as it takes to talk with Congressmen. Appointments with congressmen and other officials for the farmers from this area as well as those from other parts of the state are being arranged by the

Contributions from local business firms are helping defray trip costs for the farmers making the trip to Washington.

## New ambulance will provide better service

A new 1978 Chevrolet van type ambulance has been purchased by Associated Ambulance Authority to meet the demands for rendering better medical services to the people of this area. The ambulance is fully equipped to meet licensing requirements of the state. It has a dual battery system, separate heating and cooling systems for patient and driver compartments, both portable and built-in suction devices, portable and piped-in oxygen, 110 volt converter for life support systems, a cot plus a fold away cot, 10 ton porta-power hydraulic device to use to open or pry at wrecks, a complete radio system so patient attendants can be in direct contact with Emergency Receiving Center in a distant town, an intercom between back and front compartments, loading lights on both sides, a high rise roof, regular lights

inside plus four fluorescent lights and spot lights inside, 10 ply tires.

The ambulance does not have a cardiac monitor, but has all the equipment necessary so that one could be added later.

The actual cost of the ambulance was \$19,400; however, 60% of the cost was funded by the federal government. The City, County, and Hospital District each contributed \$1,500 and the ambulance fund since 1972 had accumulated \$4,000. The portion funded locally amounted to \$8,194.

The old ambulance is a 1972 model van type vehicle. It will be used to transfer patients and as a back-up ambulance. This ambulance was purchased five years ago from Alderson Chevrolet at dealer cost. Less than \$4,000 was required for purchase and conversion for this ambulance.

## Emergency Medical Technician's training workshop to be offered at Clarendon College

Clarendon College will offer a workshop for people desiring training necessary to become certified Emergency Medical Technicians. The course will meet on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 7:00 p.m. - 10:00 p.m. Beginning January 24 in room 102 at the College Academic Center.

The training will be taught by Marshal Peters, Bobby Watson, and Tommy Anderson, certified Emergency Medical Technicians from Wellington.

A total of one-hundred thirty clock hours of training will be required for completion of the course. There will be thirty regular three hour classroom meetings plus forty hours of clinical observation. Clinical Observations will be made in Amarillo at Northwest Texas Emergency Receiving Center and at other stations in the hospital.

Clinical observations will begin about the middle of March and probably will be on Friday evenings or weekends. One of the three Emergency Medical Technicians teaching the course will accompany each group of students to the observations to explain and answer questions.

Cost to the people of Donley County will be nothing. The course is being offered as a service to the community through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and by \$1,000 donations made by Jimmy Khun of Greenbelt Water Authority, the City of Clarendon, and Donley County governing bodies. Monies donated purchased equipment necessary for the training.

People living outside the county may take the course for a fee of \$15.00 which is the normal out of district fee

charged. All students will be required to purchase a textbook and workbook.

The first class offered to people desiring to become Emergency Medical Technicians will be limited to thirty. While the course is open to anyone desiring the

training priority will be given to city, county, and water authority people who are in some way closely associated with rendering emergency medical services; ie law enforcement officers, firemen, hospital service personnel, emergency vehicle operators, security officers.

## Who are Shriners?

Shriners are red-fezzed jolly men. Known to children because of the annual Shrine Circus and to the average citizen because of the East-West, North-South college all-star football games, and the Shrine Bowl of the Carolinas.

Crippled and burned children know them for the twenty-one hospitals they own and operate. Anyone who has seen one of their colorful parades never forgets the clowns, motorcycles, bands and colorful costumes.

Membership in the Shrine is diversified. Its roll of names includes former President Gerald R. Ford, former President Harry Truman, Roy Rogers and John Wayne.

Shriners support government and a belief in God. To become a Shriner a potential member must complete a series of tests admitting him to each of three Masonic degrees. After becoming a "Master Mason" an aspiring Shriner must then proceed through the rituals of the Scottish or York Rites. Only after all of this, a Mason may apply to be a Shriner.

The Shrine was formed in 1872 for fellowship and fraternity. Today it has approximately 980,000 members - the largest membership in its history.

Founded by an actor, Billy Florence and a Civil War Surgeon, Dr. Walter M. Fleming in New York City the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine meet today in 180 Temples in the United States, Canada and Mexico.

In the 46th annual session of the Imperial Council (the Shriners governing body), in 1920 at Portland, Oregon Imperial Potentate W. Freeland Kendrick presented a formal resolution to establish a Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children. This resolution was adopted and as a result established "The World's greatest Philanthropy."

Sept. 16, 1922 the first Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children opened in Shreveport, Louisiana. Over the years the Shrine Hospital network expanded to become twenty-one hospitals extending from Canada to

Mexico City and from Honolulu to Boston.

In 1953 the Shrine decided to expand its facilities of services and a series of studies revealed the need for ways and means of treating seriously burned children.

Nov. 1, 1963 a seven-bed wing in the John Sealy Hospital at Galveston was opened as a interim operation in the care of violent burns in children. In 1964 the Shriners opened a seven-bed ward in Cincinnati and a five-bed ward in Massachusetts under the Harvard Medical School. These three wards were later incorporated into separate operations and became Shriners Burns Institutes. Thirty-bed units were opened March 20, 1966 in Galveston; February 16, 1968 in Cincinnati; and November 2, 1968 in Boston.

The Burns Institute of the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children have a three fold purpose - (1) to save children's lives and restore their bodies through intensive care to prevent the crippling effects of severe burns, (2) to undertake research in burns therapy; to advance medicine's ability to care for and treat children with violent burns, and (3) to instruct medical personnel in the care and treatment of burned children. To better carry out the purpose of treatment, reasearch and teaching, each institute is affiliated with an outstanding Medical School.

Late in 1974 the Shrine expanded its medical field by opening a Shrine Genetics Center at the Montreal Unit. Shriners Hospitals, in a fight to find the cause for crippling in children. Since that time a second research center known as Clinical Genetic Center has opened at the Houston Unit.

In September 1977 a research laboratory was opened at the Montreal Unit to investigate joint diseases that affect children, especially juvenile rheumatoid arthritis. The \$1.5 million laboratory contains both a transmission and a scanning electron microscope.

AT the Chicago Unit extensive research is being

done with cerebral palsy patients. The Unit recently received approval for a new

\$11 million dollar building.

There are 1,065 beds in the Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children (90 of them in Burns Institutes). In an average year this 21 Hospital network treats nearly 9,000 children on an in-patient basis, thousands more as out-patients, at a total operating cost to the Shrine in excess of \$40,000,000 annually.

Since the first Shriners Hospital opened more than 200,000 children have been cured or substantially helped. There have been more than 300,000 operations performed, more than 225,000 braces and prosthesis applied, nearly 2,500,000 x-rays and photos taken, nearly 5,500,000 physiotherapy treatments given and more than 2,000,000 clinic visits.

Shrine Hospital Units have from 30 to 80 beds, making them small enough to be able to know and care about each of their patients as well as to provide the highest quality medical care. Since 1967 there has been a significant trend to include research programs in the work of the Orthopedic Units. The \$20,000 spent on Orthopedic research in 1967 has been increased to \$750,000 in the 1978 budget.

Shrine hospitals are open to all children, regardless of race or creed without cost to the patient or parent. To receive admission to a Shriners hospital for Crippled Children, contact a Shriner or the Recorder at the nearest Shrine Temple. The Shrine Temple located nearest Clarendon is Khiva in Amarillo.

In its great philanthropy the Shrine not only found its soul but discovered the soul is the spirit of the Shrine. The amount of dollars spent is insignificant when weighed against returning young patients to their rightful place in society. Shrine Nobles throughout North America firmly believe that "Never does a Shriner stand so tall as when he stoops to help a crippled child."

The knife is manufactured by the Schrade Cutlery Corporation, New York, and is insured for one year against loss.

The "Uncle Henry" knife is hand crafted throughout from premium material. The blade is constructed from special analysis, high carbon steel and is electronically heated, then tempered and honed to meet the "Uncle Henry" standards. When finished, it will hold a razor sharp edge throughout the toughest cutting job.

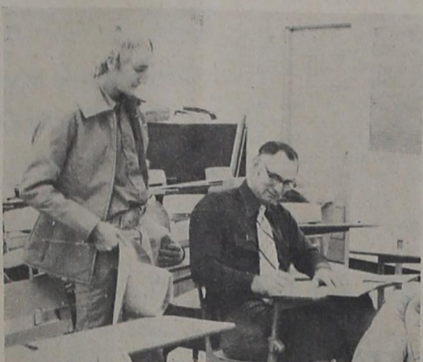

## Fifth Grade Students observe Muster Day

## Cotton market report

Moderate trading was reported again this week as growers accepted bids on about 25 to 30 percent of their offerings. Prices increased slightly with mixed lots containing mostly 32 and shorter staple cotton selling for 43.50 to 44.00 cents per pound. Lots predominating in 33 and longer staples brought 45.00 to 47.50 cents. Growers continued to receive 62.00 to 67.00 dollars per ton for cottonseed at most gin points.

About 35,000 samples were classed at Memphis this week, bringing the season's total to 326,000. This is the largest number of samples ever classed at the Memphis office. The previous record was 278,000, set in 1973.

Light spotted grades made up 76 percent of the total, while white grades accounted for 15 percent and spotted grades made up nine percent. The predominant grades were 32 and 42, each comprising one-third of the samples classed. Twenty percent was reduced in grade due to bark or grass content.

Staple 32 was the predominant length with 71 percent while staple 31 made up 24 percent. Micronaire readings were in the desirable range of 3.5 - 4.9 on 82 percent of the samples

tested. Four percent miked 5.0 and higher and 14 percent miked 3.4 and lower. Average pressley was 85,000 pounds per square inch.

The Memphis office is scheduled to stop receiving samples on Wednesday, January 18. Additional reports on the Memphis area crop will be issued by the Altus, Oklahoma Classing Office.

A -- VA will guarantee up to 50 per cent of a loan to purchase a mobile home and the lot on which to locate it, but direct loans aren't made.

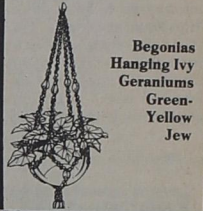

## Tips from Cynthia "Health Quackery"

Prime targets for "miracle cures" are arthritis, cancer and diabetes. These diseases are chronic, and victims will often try ANYTHING. Sometimes the quack remedies are relatively harmless-except, of course, for the money they cost. But when the drug, medical device, or treatment is not harmful in itself, it can be harmful when its use postpones the start of legitimate treatment. In some cases, health quackery has led to serious problems, even death.

Pain from arthritis can be severe and sufferers will try any treatment or drug to reduce the pain. The Arthritis Foundation estimates that \$485 million a year is spent on worthless treatment—drugs, medical devices, dietary supplements, and special clinics.

Cancer is the second leading cause of death in the United States and is often a terrifying disease. Many cancers, if detected and treated early, can be cured by recognized means --

surgery, radiation, and medication. The patient with the most to lose through quackery is the one who has cancer in an early stage. While the cancer is under fraudulent treatment, it has time to grow and possibly spread beyond control. The patient may lose his life. Some quack doctors have falsely diagnosed "cancer" and then taken credit for "miracle" cures.

Diabetes is also a prime target for quackery because of the difficulties some patients have in following the diabetic regimen. Diabetes can be controlled, and the patient can live a normal life by following procedures set down by a reputable doctor.

If you are in any doubt, ask yourself these questions--and if the answer to any of the questions is "Yes", then you could be a potential victim of quackery:

1. Is the product or service being offered a "secret remedy" or not available from other sources?
2. Does the sponsor claim that he is battling the medical profession which does not accept his wonderful discovery?
3. Is the remedy being sold from door to door, by a

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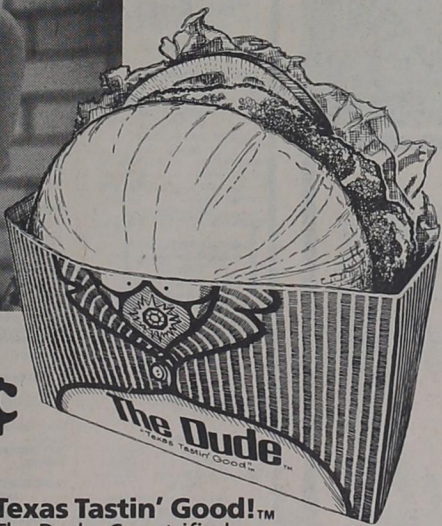

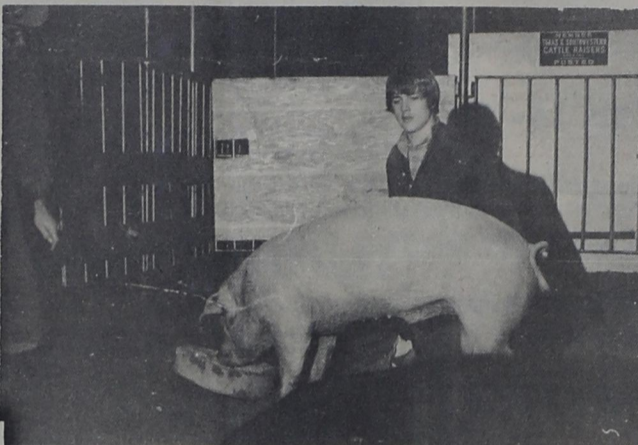

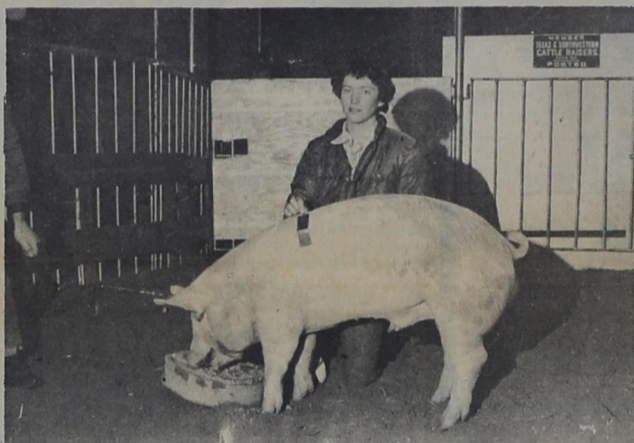
