Coach Townsend said his charges would be in fair shape for the contest, and that fans could be assured of an interesting game. He failed to predict the outcome of the game, but said that the game as well as the season depended upon keeping the top 12 or 13 boys in playing condition. Cotton Barnes, starting quarterback on the Baird 11, will be at his position despite a cut hand received in the scrimmage last week with Jim Ned. The Bears will field a line averaging 154½ pounds per man and a backfield averaging 163.

he team will average approximately 158 pounds per man. Coach Townsend said that the probable starters were: Jud Gillard and Johnny Higgins or Phillip Garcia at ends; tackles, Edwin Ault and Tally Windham; guards, Tommy Vines and Danny Ross; center, Robert Martin; quarterback, Calvin Barnes; halfbacks, Tenell Scott and Eddie Childers and fullback, Tommy Higgins. Harold M. Graves, 68, 1201 Briarwood, died in St. Ann's Hospital at 7:15 a.m. Sunday following an illness of several weeks.

Mr. Graves, a retired dry goods merchant, was born at Mansfield, Texas, Dec. 2, 1893 and moved to Jones County with his parents at an early age, settling north of Anson in the Plainview community.

He married Naomia Conner on May 21, 1918 in Tarrant County. He was a farmer while in the Plainview community but entered the dry goods business at Harlingen, where he lived for a number of years. He returned to Anson in 1933 and worked for the Heidenheimer Dry Goods firm until 1947, when he moved to Abilene, where he was co-owner of Jack's Men and Boy's Store on Chestnut St. He retired in April of this year.

He was a veteran of World War I, having served overseas. He was a member of the Woodlawn Church of Christ, the Woodmen of the World, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion.

Funeral was held at 10 a.m. Monday at Woodlawn Church of Christ, 3085 N. 10th, with Wayland Miller, minister, officiating. Burial was in Mr. Hope Cemetery in Anson with Lawrence Funeral Home in charge.

Survivors include his wife, one son, Charles of Anson, one daughter, Mrs. Virgil Sowell of Roswell, N. M., and two grandchildren.

Committee Urges All to Take Vaccine

Two recent polio cases in the area have caused the Callahan County Polio Immunization Committee to double their efforts to get everyone in the county to take advantage of the free vaccine which is to be Sunday, September 16 in all county areas.

Plans call for the Sabin type oral vaccine to be given at the high school cafeteria in Baird, the schools in Putnam and at the Cross Plains school cafeteria. Clyde will give the vaccine at the same time, probably at the community building.

E. Elton Ables, chairman of the Baird campaign, urged everyone regardless of age, to take advantage of the opportunity to immunize themselves and their families against the disease. The vaccine is given free, but donation will be accepted. It was estimated that the cost of the vaccine would be about 25 cents per dose.

Dr. M. D. Couch will be in charge of the Baird station it was announced. Mrs. J. L. Ault, public school nurse, will assist anywhere in the county that needs assistance. Byron Richardson is in charge of the Cross Plains campaign and Mrs. Grady Pruet will handle arrangements at Putnam.

Additional information will be released next week, it was reported by the committee.

A. H. Turner Buys Butane Co. Here

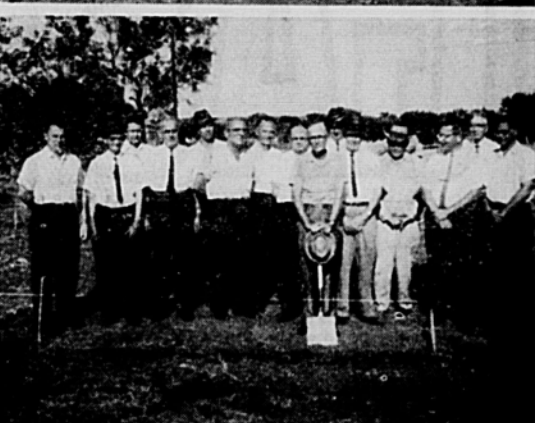

Callahan Co. Jail Receives Medallion

The first Historical Building Medallion for Callahan County has been awarded for the First County Jail located in Baird. The announcement was made concerning this award by Mrs. L. E. Dudley of Abilene, member of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

Historical Building Medallions are awarded by the State of Texas for structures of historical, architectural or cultural significance to the area in which they exist. Since the inauguration of the Medallion program in March of this year, over 120 counties have structures with Medallions.

The first County Jail, located at the rear of the Callahan County Courthouse, was originally constructed at old Belle Plains, which was the county seat, in 1878. The building was of rock construction. Each rock was moved from Belle Plains to Baird and reconstructed in 1883. The jail was built soon after the county was organized in 1877. Prior to its construction, all prisoners were taken to the jail at Albany. After the arrival of the Texas and Pacific Railroad, and the selection of Baird as the county site, the jail was moved to Baird at the expense of the citizens of Baird.

The grey aluminum Medallions are fourteen inches in diameter. Red, white and blue stars and the words "State Historical Survey Committee" encircle a raised map of Texas.

The Medallion was sponsored by the Baird Chamber of Commerce and the Callahan County Survey Committee.

His father, John Crawford preceded him in death.

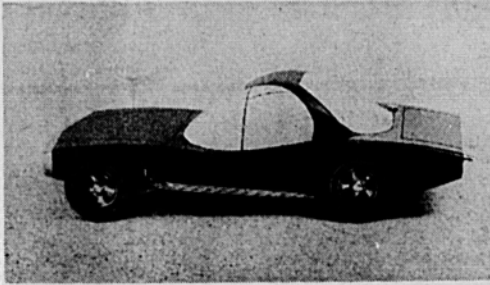
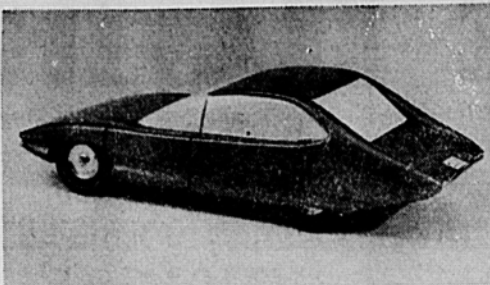
"Shall the City Council of the City of Baird, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of \$123,000.00 maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than Thirty (30) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Five (5%) per cent per annum, for the purpose of improving and extending the City's Sewer System, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the City's Waterworks and Sewer System."

2. That said election shall be held at the City Hall within said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as officers of said election, to-wit: C. E. Andrews, Presiding Judge, Mrs. Vada Bennett, Assistant Judge,

Mrs. Cubelle Harris, Clerk, Mrs. H. D. Driskill, Clerk.

3. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and only legally

qualified electors who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.

4. The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS."

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS."

5. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Secretary, shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty-Fourth Legislature, supra.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the City Hall and at two other public places within said City not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for holding said election. He shall also cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws governing general elections.

On the other hand, only "experts" can give the court their opinions. Aren't most people expert in some things? Most people are qualified to give opinions on such everyday things as speed, time, sound, and the like. Sometimes where impressions are hard to describe a witness may have to talk in terms of opinions about such things as the force of a blow, distance of a sound, the amount of light, the degree of cold or heat, weight, size, health, temper, fear, and the like.

We can express the opinion that Jones "looks like the man" who did a crime, or that his footfalls or his voice were those of Jones. Courts admit such ev-

So too, one can testify about his friends' sanity or handwriting and sometimes your own motives.

But most often the court rely on certain skilled persons like physicians or engineers for "expert opinions" especially in complex or technical cases.

Problems in using experts: They may not agree. They may give opinions on the "ultimate" fact which the jury itself must decide (the extent of injuries, who is the father, what caused the explosion.)

Do the experts here invade the jury's province? As a rule, no. Before a court will let the expert testify he must show his special knowledge, say, in science, art, trade. Even so, the judge and jury decide issues of the trial, not the experts alone.

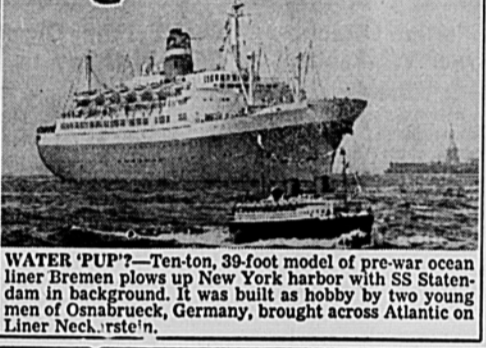

Wool Growers to Vote On Marketing

The referendum of wool and lamb producers coming up in September is to determine their disapproval of a new agreement to continue financing an advertising and market-development program for wool and lambs, Tommie Harris, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said recently.

He emphasized that the outcome of the referendum will not affect continuation of the wool incentive payment program, which was extended for 4 years under legislation enacted last summer.

According to the Chairman, the advertising, promotional, and related market development activities to enlarge or improve the market for wool and lamb are carried out under terms of an agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc., as authorized by law.

Under previous agreements approved by wool growers voting in referendums in 1955 and 1959, the deductions from producer wool payments to finance the market - development program have amounted to 1 cent per pound for shorn wool and 5 cents per hundredweight for lambs. Under the new agreement, the deductions cannot exceed these rates.

Ballots will be mailed between September 4 and 7, to producers in Callahan County, and all ballots should be received by September 10. The voting will take place over the 2 week period starting September 10, and all ballots must be received by the ASCS county office not later than September 21 in order to be counted.

Producers eligible to vote in the referendum are all those who have owned sheep or lambs 6 months of age or older for any one period of at least 30 days since January 1, 1962. Each producer will report the number of sheep and lambs on his ballot. Approval by producers having at least two-thirds of the volume of production represented by votes in the referendum will be required if the agreement is to be extended.

Peace Corps Needs Farm Trained Youths

Volunteers with farm backgrounds, rural youth, or vocational training in Agriculture, as well as those with more advanced agricultural training, are being requested through the Peace Corps for service in the Dominican Republic, Senegal, Niger and Morocco, says Travis Allen, Agricultural Extension Agent for Callahan County.

Selection for Peace Corps Volunteers to serve in these areas will begin soon. In the Dominican Republic, those selected will be assigned to community development work, rural youth work, livestock improvement, conservation and as Cooperative Assistants. Those assigned to Senegal, Niger and Morocco will work in Agricultural Extension, soil conservation, pasture improvement, irrigation, and livestock and dairy improvement. Training for these projects will begin this fall.

Peace Corps projects in these countries present the opportunity for American farmers or people with agricultural backgrounds and training to engage in general extension work, youth activities and specialized areas in new and challenging surroundings.

The Peace Corps provides all expenses for persons who are accepted for service. This includes transportation, housing, food, medical care, and incidentals. Volunteers also receive \$75 per month for each month's service, or a total of \$1800 after two years' service.

The irreplaceable gift of sight is being lost to one American every 20 minutes.

If that figure, estimated by the National Society for the prevention of Blindness, holds true for all population of the nation, it means four Texans are blind every day.

September is Sight - Saving Month throughout the land.

Even as you read this, some man, woman, or child is standing on the brink of permanent darkness, about to join the 392,500 other Americans who are already enduring the bleak enormity of blindness.

What causes blindness? There are two major contributing factors: disease and accidents. Neglect exaggerates both of these.

Blindness brought on through neglect really is no worse than that caused by accident or disease. But somehow it seems worse. It's so unnecessary.

If all children were given a thorough eye examination prior to entering school for the first time, and if all visual defects were corrected or placed under treatment at that time, a major step in the prevention of blindness in childhood would be taken. One of every four school children are said to need some form of eye care.

But a single examination is not enough. A child grows quickly. His eyes, like every body organ, are constantly changing. Sometimes the change is for the worse.

As for disease - caused blindness, modern surgical methods now restore or improve vision in 19 of 20 cases of cataract, the leading cause of blindness in the United States.

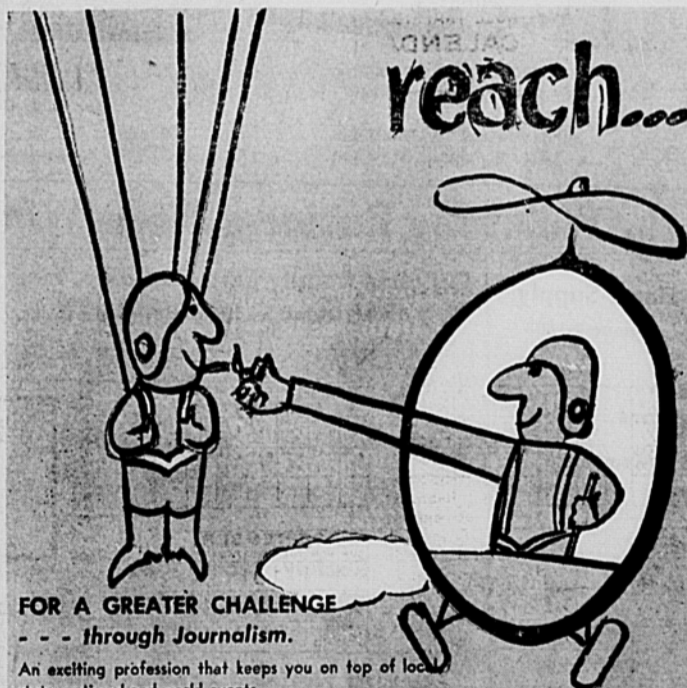

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN - Senator Culp Krueger of El Campo, a newspaper publisher and radio station owner, is planning to "put the big pot in the little one" sure-ly when he becomes Govern-ment-for-a-day on September 8.

Krueger not only is inviting all his friends and neighbors to help him celebrate the event at El Campo, but he is bringing a lot of state officials to show his hometown folks how govern-ment works.

At least a dozen state boards will have their September meet-ings in El Campo. For example, the State Highway Commission will be on hand to explain why by-pass loop highways are good for small towns.

Theme of the state agency meetings and exhibits will be "Program of Progress for the Towns of Texas".

Senator Krueger's aim is to show that rural districts like his can be, and are being helped by the state government.

He has drawn fire from a colleague, Sen. Doyle Willis of Fort Worth, for having a lot of state officials and employees make the trek to El Campo for the day. But he's going ahead with his plans, and many state agencies are cooperating.

WHAT'S AN INDUSTRY? — School Land Board is going to have to decide before long what the Legislature meant when it said state-owned islands and submerged lands along the in-land waters of Texas could be leased by the Land Board for industrial purposes only.

For example, Port Aransas wants to lease some state land for a city airport. Is that an "industrial" use?

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, chairman of the board, thinks it is. He wants to give a liberal interpretation to the term.

A study of the law by the At-torney General's department has provided no judicial inter-pretations by Texas courts of the term "industrial." But they

can take their choice from courts of other states. There the interpretations range from "manufacturing only" to one case where the courts held that rice farming was an industrial activity.

CONVENTION TIME — Dem-ocratic and Republican leaders are busy planning their state party conventions to be held on September 18. Republicans meet in Fort Worth, Democrats meet in El Paso.

For the first time in many years careful attention is being paid to the party platforms.

Two big endorsements given to John Connally, the Democratic nominee for governor hinge on what the platform says. The State AFL-CIO and Political As-sociation of Spanish - Speaking Organizations both want to make sure the platform is not in opposition to some of their hoped for legislation before their endorsements take effect.

Because many Texans remain undecided, both parties hope to gain votes by what they say in their platforms. But the prob-lem is the same as usual. They have to keep the friends they now have, while trying to at-tract new ones.

So, the careful, slow and de-mandin process of democracy goes on and on.

BRIBERY? — Headlines told of possible pay-offs to former Texas Railroad Commission of-ficials working in the East Tex-as Field as the House General Investigating Committee delved into the crooked-hole scandal at public hearings.

Legislators headed by Rep. Charles Ballman of Borger are trying to find out what new laws are needed to stop such things. They have found that it is not a violation of criminal law to ignore Railroad Commission reg-ulations by taking oil from un-der a neighbor's lease. It is merely a civil offense for which the state can try to collect \$1,000 a day for each day of violation. Theft is of course against the law. Federal law prohibits the transportation in interstate commerce of illegally - produc-ed oil. But even that is a fine legal point in this situation.

Bribery is an offense, but hard to prove. Reports to the Rail-road Commission must be sworn to, but in the land and insur-ance scandals the courts held that if the notary public didn't make the swearer hold up his hand and take an oath, it was

Attorneys for some of the oil operators laid a predicate as a defense against possible con-tempt charges growing out of perjury or failure of some wit-ness to appear, by contending that the investigating commit-tee was illegal. Argument is based on the fact that three of its five members did not run for re-election to the House.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson, who headed the investigation, ex-plaind the legal shortcomings to the committee. Previously, he had briefed district attorneys in counties in which crooked-hole drilling has been found.

So grand jury action may be expected next in this scandal which may make peanuts out of the Billie Sol Estes affair.

ANOTHER PARK -- The sov-erty - stricken State Parks sys-tem, which doesn't have enough money to hire someone to pick up paper in some of its parks, is getting two more huge park areas. It will not be able to de-velop them unless the Legisla-ture loosens the purse-strings.

International Boundary and Water Commission, which is building a huge new reservoir on the Rio Grande near Del Rio, notified the Parks Board that it will give a 550-acre tract for a state park.

Parks Board has hopes of getting 2,700 acres on Dam "B" in the Piney Woods country from the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers. It wants to develop seven camping and boating areas around Dam "B", to be called Town Bluff State Park. Name comes from a town that was once the port through which supplies came to Tyler County before the railroads ar-rived.

SEWER PLANT Grants — A total of \$3,200,000 in Federal grants to 46 Texas cities to im-prove their sewerage disposal plants will be parceled out by the State Health Department and the Texas Water Pollution Control Board early this month.

Congress has stepped up its efforts to help cities obtain health - protecting sewer sys-tems. Federal grants, a max-imum of 30 per cent of the cost, go up to \$250,000.

SALTY WATER — Further supervision over oil operators was announced by the Texas Water Commission. It ruled that oilmen must get its approval be-fore they inject salt water back into reservoirs from which it came.

Notice was given during hear-ings before the Railroad Com-mission at which oil operators asked permission to use oil wells for salt water injection. Earlier the Railroad Commission, in-formed by water people that oil-field salt water disposal pits were polluting the Colorado River, ordered oilmen to quit using pits.

But Chief Engineer John Van-dertulp said the water situation would not be improved if wells used to send the salt water deep underground had poor or faulty casings. He insisted that wells

stocks and bonds.

Investments are now advised by a group of leading bankers and investment experts. The Chase Manhattan Bank of New York is hired to advise on in-vestments. Income from invest-ments was almost \$17,000,000 this year — enough to pay the re-tirement benefits to the 13,000 teachers or their survivors who are collecting from the fund. This year, 1,229 more retired.

The teacher retirement fund is larger than either the perma-nent school fund or the univer-sity permanent fund.

SLANT-HOLES And Loop - Holes — Atty. Gen. Will Wilson says that in many cases present laws against false swearing on official documents "will not sup-port prosecution," due to their weaknesses.

Wilson's conclusions were reached as a result of investiga-tion of East Texas slant-hole drilling. In some cases, he says, false affidavits came from as many as four different expert sources to the effect that crook-ed wells actually were straight.

The Attorney General says that definite proof of the false swearing offense is difficult be-cause notary public who signed the oath often is an employee of the accused person.

"JUST SUPPOSIN" — Most popular game today, among em-ployees under the Capitol dome, is "just supposin" what would happen if Texans elect a Repub-lican governor.

Would it mean filling appoint-ive state offices and boards with Republicans and giving the GOP preponderance in state govern-ment?

Most "political experts" warn that the Cox bid in November must be taken seriously. Desci-sion to "ride the fence" until af-ter the November election is being heard more frequently. This, from long-time employees as well as some members of the Senate and House who are pop-ular back home but who also are

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being realistic about the streng-th of the Cox following in their home districts.

LBJ TEACHER — Vice Pres-ident Lyndon B. Johnson can al-ways go back to teaching school. J. W. Edgar, Texas Commis-sioner of Education, has presented him with a lifetime certificate to teach in either elementary or high school.

Johnson started teaching grade school in Cotulla, and later taught high school at Houston.

SPECIAL SESSION Talked — Gov. Price Daniel has agreed to discuss the possibility of a special session of the legislature with the head of a House com-tee investigating slanted oil wells.

Rep. Charles Ballman of Bor-ger, chairman of the House General Investigating Commit-tee, has asked the Governor for a conference to discuss a poss-ible special session.

However, the governor pointed out to Ballman that he has authorized the Railroad Com-mission to use additional avail-able funds from present approp-riations to continue the com-mission's work in the slant-hole probe.

Other state officials gave little support to the House com-mit-tee's request for a special ses-sion.

W. J. Murray, Railroad Com-mission Chairman, said, "if we tried to pass any new laws now we wouldn't know where the loopholes are."

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson said he would have to confer with the Railroad Commission to deter-mine if regulation can be hand-led under the present rule-mak-ing powers, "before I would say a special session is necessary."

NEW CAR Insurance Plan — Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Ama-rillo, whose heckling led the State Board of Insurance to abandon the safe driving plan of auto insurance, says he will try next year to pass a new law on the subject.

He wants the board to take insurance company profits into account in setting insurance rates.

Presently, the Board takes losses and expenses into account then allows the companies five per cent for taxes and profits.

COMMISSION Criticized — Rep. James Cotton of Weather-ford, who is likely to head the House Appropriations Commit-tee for a second term starting next year, is gunning for the Commission on Higher Educa-tion.

He thinks it is playing politics by recommending the creation of many new state colleges.

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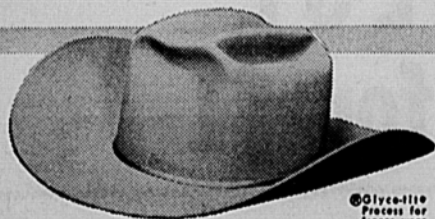
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
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
