Senator John Tower to visit Clarendon

Thursday morning, November 3, at 10:30 a.m. in the Farmers State Bank Hospitality Room Senator John Tower will be present for a town hall meeting. Tower wishes to personally meet citizens of Clarendon and Donley County and learn of their concerns regarding national government policy. Tower has expressed his desire to more adequately represent the people of Texas in Washington. He plans to tour twenty-one cities in four days and spend an hour in each town answering questions the people have. This is the first time Tower has been in Clarendon and he is looking forward to meeting as many people as possible. Mrs. Tower will accompany her

husband. Tower was born in Houston and was graduated from Beaumont High School. He enlisted in the Navy, became a Chief Petty Officer, and is the only enlisted reservist in Congress. Tower attended Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas, receiving a bachelor's degree in political science. He earned a master's degree in political science from Southern Methodist University in Dallas and did post-graduate work at the University of London. A former professor of government at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls, Tower won a special election in 1961 for the Senate seat of Lyndon B. Johnson. Tower was re-elected by 200,000

votes in 1966 and is elected in 1972 by more than 300,000 votes. As chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, Tower is a key member of the GOP leadership in the Senate. He now ranks 6th in seniority among Republicans. Tower is senior Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee and second ranking on the Senate Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs Committee. Tower also is a member of the newly formed Senate Ethics Committee and the Joint Committee on Defense Production. In addition, Tower serves on the National Transportation Policy Study Commission. Tower is a trustee for Southwestern University and

Southern Methodist University. He is past Worthy Grand Master of Kappa Sigma Fraternity. He is a 32nd degree Mason and Shriner and is a member of the American Assn. of University Professors, the American Legion, the Texas Historical Society, the Texas

Philosophical Society, the University Kiwanis Club and the Methodist Church. He makes his home in Wichita Falls with his wife and three children.

In 1974 he resigned from his position with Foxworth Galbraith, so he could remain in Clarendon. Since that time he has worked as a self-employed carpenter and cabinet maker until receiving the present position with the City of Clarendon as City Superintendent. Michels has been employed with the City of Clarendon the three years he has lived here, and has served as interim superintendent for the City of Clarendon the past several months, doing very satisfactory work. Michels is a native of Wisconsin. Before moving to Clarendon he had lived in Waco. He has a wife, Barbara, who is employed by the Clarendon Rest Home, and one daughter, Toni, age 10. She is a fifth grade student in Clarendon schools.

Events planned in the rodeo include: 1. Barrel Race following the same pattern as rodeo and horse shows, one man to the cycle. 2. Pole Bending following the same pattern as rodeo and horse shows, one man to the cycle. 3. Reel Race, four cycles, four men, four times around the arena, must stop and dismount to pass flag.

One cycle at a time in arena. Points will be divided between riders. 4. Steer Tag Pulling, steers will be in arena. Must ride cycle to steer, dismount, remove tag and ride back across finish line, one man to the cycle. 5. Goat sacking, two men to the cycle. Up to ten goats at a time will be released, depending on the number of entries. The same number of cycles will enter the arena, ride to the opposite end of the arena. The riders will dismount, catch a goat, put him in a sack and ride back across the finish line.

All events will be timed; trophies will be presented through third place. The relay race will be supported \$0.25 for each team depending on the number of entries, and an all-around trophy will go to the high point rider.

All proceeds from this fun filled rodeo will go toward a livestock show barn and sales arena for the Hall Co. 4H Clubs. Admission for adults will be \$1.00, for youth under 12 will be \$1.00. Everyone is invited to this evening of fun.

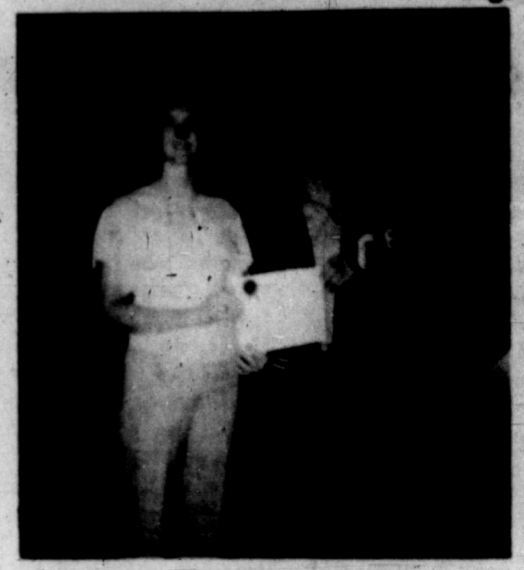

Home buyers should not 'wait 'til next year'

The average cost of a new single-family home has increased more than 100 per cent in 10 years, and this trend is likely to continue, says Kenneth E. Graeber, economist in real estate with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. His information is based on recent U.S. Department of Commerce reports.

Given population and inflation trends, Graeber projects an average home appreciation rate of 8 per cent annually. "If the trend continues, homes selling for \$35,000 today might sell for \$63,000 in 10 years," contends the Texas A&M University System specialist.

"Many families have postponed purchasing a home in hopes of saving up to buy or build their 'dream' home. However, inflation may prevent these indi-

viduals from ever owning their own home," notes Graeber.

Studies indicate that buyers of similar income levels who previously owned homes pay 20 to 30 per cent more for homes than buyers who previously rented. "This is, in part, due to an accumulation of equity in the first home which can be reinvested in the next," points out the economist.

"Other individuals have postponed purchase until interest rates decline. Any benefits gained by waiting for lower interest rates could be offset if homes cost increased.

"A properly selected and cared-for home will remain one of the better investments for most families," contends Graeber. "The motto of 'Wait 'Til Next Year' might best be reserved for football."

Halloween is the strangest holiday of the entire year. On the eve of Nov. 1, children in many lands dress as goblins or witches, knock on doors, and announce "trick or treat."

Where did the custom of "trick or treat" originate? Here is the intriguing answer from history. The American celebrations rests upon Scottish and Irish folk customs which can be traced from pre-Christian times. Although Halloween has become a night of frolicking fun, superstitious spells, and eerie games which people take only half seriously, its beginnings were quite otherwise. The earliest Halloween celebrations were held by the Druids in honor of Saman, Lord of the Dead, whose festival fell on Nov. 1. The Druids believed the Lord of the Dead called together wicked spirits on the eve of this festival, and that they returned to their original homes to be entertained with food. If food and shelter were not provided, these spirits, it was believed, would cast spells and cause havoc toward those failing to fulfill their requests. If they were satisfied with the offerings they received, they left in peace. This sort of Halloween festival was observed throughout the ancient world. Although some aspects of the Halloween festival varied with each country, the overall pattern and purpose remained the same.

How did Halloween come to be observed by the Christian world? In A.D. 610 the Roman Pantheon, a pagan edifice, was converted into a Christian shrine. An annual festival was instituted to commemorate the event. The day chosen was May 13. The Christian professing populace now paid homage to saints for whom it was dedicated and offered prayer for saints who had died. This day became known as "All Saints Day." "All Saints Day" continued to be held in May in Rome until A.D. 834. At this time the name and

date were changed. The time of celebration was altered to the first of Nov. and it was then called "all Hallows" from where we get the name Halloween.

As the Roman empire grew and took more and more nations under its rule, decisions had to be made concerning their festivals. People from some of the conquered nations followed pagan traditions while others, including the Romans observed Christian customs. Roman emperors realized how essential it was to have a unified empire. In an effort to convert the pagans certain ancient practices and celebrations which many of these uncultured people brought with them, were allowed with certain alterations. Halloween was one of them. Thus many people were persuaded to transfer their devotion from their former gods to the Christian God. In time, many of the old superstitious customs were blended and incorporated

with the new faith.

In our own day what comes to your mind when you think about Halloween? You probably picture weird and frightening masks or persons portrayed as witches and demons. Maybe you think of pumpkins hollowed out in the shape of eerie-looking faces with lighted candles inside to help bring out the more frightful side of these carvings. Generally you envision children, dressed up in revolting costumes going from door to door yelling "trick or treat."

As we anticipate another celebration of this old custom, let us remember its only a time of harmless fun to be enjoyed by the kiddies. Have a safe and happy Halloween!

Mrs. F.M. Roberson, Mrs. J.W. Moffett and the Reeds. G.W. Brewer became the first resident minister to the church. Other ministers who have faithfully served include: T.B. Milholland, Perkins Cooper, J.M. Standridge, Joe Crumley, Claude Smith, M.F. Manchester, Robert Bankus, Wallace Layton, W.T. Hines, Doyle Williams, Robert Copeland, Bert Wells, John I. Daves, Eugene Clapp, Robert C. Jones, Tom Watters, and Don Stone, the present minister.

Church membership over the years has grown considerably from seventeen in the beginning to 144 in 1954 to 184 presently. According to records of the church register, the greatest growth of membership in recent years was during the ministry of Robert C. Jones. During the last five years attendance and contributions have greatly increased, and in these same five years the benevolent and evangelistic programs of the church have been largely expanded.

Sept. 1977 all indebtedness on the present building was paid. Present elders of the church are: Earl Shields, Doug Burgess, Bright Newhouse, and Elvis White. Deacons of the church are: H.G. Bobbitt, Harold Browning, Doug McGuire, Don Robinson, Donald White, Ira Page, Arthur Shields, and Mark Allen.
