Postal employee retires after almost forty years service

E. A. Tipton, or "Tip" as he is known to many Clarendon residents, was recognized Friday, November 4, 1977 in a brief ceremony at the Post Office for his 39 1/2 years of service, upon his retirement.

Tipton began his employment with the postal department on July 1, 1938 and put in all the years of his Post Office experience here in Clarendon.

For 8 years Tipton was Star Route Carrier from Clarendon on what is now known as the Brice Route. Then the road was not paved

and the average weight of the mail bag on this route, per day was 372 pounds! Antelope Flat had a school on the route and Brice was a bustling community. There were many rural homes between Antelope Flat and Brice and between Brice and Clarendon.

After a period of 8 years Tip became substitute postal clerk in the post office and later became regular clerk.

Before the present Post Office was housed in its own building, it's site was moved up and down Kearney Street on the West side of the two and three hundred blocks. In

those days leases were let on a ten year basis and the Post Office was located in the building at the present site of Pauline Morris' tax office, the Bob Marrs Saddle Shop and in the south section of John's ready to wear. With the erection of the new building no more leases were let up and down Kearney St.

Not only the site of the Post Office has changed over the years, but during his time in this Clarendon office post cards went from 1 cent to 9 cents, first class and local postage from 2 cents to 13 cents.

Six different Postmasters

came and went while Tipton was with the Post Office; Charles Bugbee, Walter Taylor, J.C. Estlack, Ray Moore, Mike McCully, and the present postmaster, Bob McCombs.

Tipton came to Clarendon in February, 1919 - and although not a native qualifies as an old timer. He and his wife, Verdie, have two children, Stella Ann Schaffer, of McLean and Eddie Tipton of Amarillo, and five grandchildren.

Fishing and hunting are hobbies of the Tiptons and Tip says he is making no plans-- he is going to do each

day whatever he decides to do- or- not to do. He looks forward to this time of his own.

Bronchos lose to Cyclones 21-0

The Cyclones came out running from an unbalanced line and after picking up a first down, they were also forced to punt.
Ricky Guy punted the ball down to the Bronchos eight-yard line. After picking up a first down, Gardner fumbled on a sweep play and the Cyclones' Donald Ray (Mathews) recovered on Clarendon's 21-yd line. The Cyclones gave the ball to Kirk Fields on the first play but he was stopped by Keith Topper for no gain. On second down they attempted a pass which was too high for end Ricky Guy. The next pass play was complete to

Scott Vacca down to the Bronchos 9-yd line. It took the Cyclones 3 plays from there to score on an off-tackle play by Fields. Wesley Johnson kicked the extra point and with 3:21 left in the first quarter, Memphis led 7 to 0.
With a bit of razzle-dazzle on the ensuing kickoff, Billy Gardner returned the ball to the mid-field area. The Bronchos took the ball from there and started their march to the end zone. But the Bronchos were denied their score when John Hall fumbled inside the Cyclones' 20-yd line.
This ended the first quarter with the Cyclones still on top 7 to 0. The

Bronchos were able to hold the Cyclones and they were forced to punt. The Bronchos took over on their own thirty-five yd line. The Bronchos drove the ball down to the Cyclones' thirty-four yard line when they had to give the ball up on downs. From this point the Cyclones drove the ball down to the Bronchos 11-yd line. From there Irven Thomas intercepted a Randall Shahan pass on the 1 and returned it to the Bronchos twenty as the first half ended.
The Memphis Cyclones came back after the half time intermission to completely dominate the ball game as they took the second half kickoff and drove the ball down the field for their second touchdown. The touchdown was set up by a Randall Shahan pass to his favorite receiver, Scott Vacca, that was completed on the one-yard line. It took Fields one play to barely put the ball in the end zone. Again Johnson kicked the extra point and the Cyclones increased their lead to 14 to 0. Their drive had consumed 5 minutes and 48 seconds. Broncho Kelly Choate returned the kickoff to the Bronchos' forty. Clarendon was unable to move the ball and had to punt. Memphis took the ball and marched down the field with Fields picking up most of the yardage. With one second left in the third quarter, Donald Ray Mathews scored from 3 yds out to give the Cyclones a 20 to 0 lead. Again Johnson added the extra point to make it 21 to 0.
The fourth quarter was scoreless with Memphis in

control most of the time. The Bronchos only managed to run 13 plays in the final 12 minutes. The Bronchos had one drive stopped when Gary McClellan pitched the ball behind Billy Gardner and Memphis recovered on their own 47. But Memphis returned the favor when Rodney Hall fumbled on the Bronchos one-yard line.
First half play has been one of Bronchos' concerns in the last few ball games but this was not the case Friday night. At the end of the first half the Bronchos had 88 yds rushing to Memphis' 93. A fumble in the Bronchos' own territory set up Memphis only touchdown the first half. In the second half Memphis played such good ball control that they limited the Bronchos to only 4 plays during the third quarter and 13 in the fourth.
Memphis, in previous games, had always been a big play club, they would break the long ones. Against Childress they had two touchdowns of 85 and 50 yds, against Crowell they had a 65 and 62 yarder, against Quannah they had a 40 and 35 yarder and against Shamrock they had a 85, 35 and a 60 yarder. Friday night Memphis showed a ball control offense that picked un

yardage and controlled the clock. Their longest play of the night was a 24-yard pass play to set up their second touchdown. "We told the kids if we could eliminate the big play and control the ball we could beat them. We did the first but we could not get control of the ball and when we did we would fumble it right back," stated Coach Wilson.

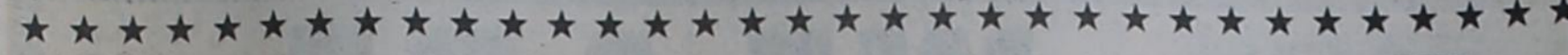

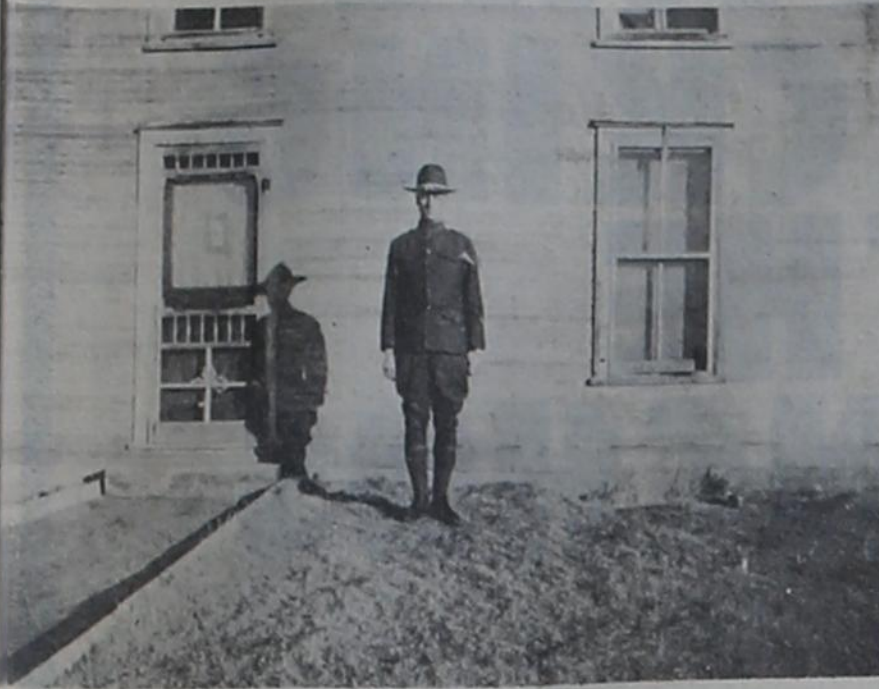

Lest we forget - Veterans Day 1977

That men may remember the price paid for liberty and virtue thoughts are turned to Veterans' Day. Friday, November 11, commemorates the patriotic holiday that originated seventy years ago and was called Armistice Day.

November 11, 1918 news of the world was the end had come to the "war that was to end all wars." The truce between the Allies and Germany had been signed at 11:00 A.M. in a railroad dining car in the Forest of Compiegne, France.

Good news brought celebrations. Clarendon was a typical American town. Historians' records say the town sounded its fire whistle and people gathered in the streets. Schools were dismissed, patriotic songs were sung, the Kaiser was burned in effigy, and men and women danced the "snake dance" from one end of Kearney Street to the other.

The day of November 11 marked the close of nineteen months of war involvement for the United States. It was

the American soldiers who in that year supplied the deciding "extra". The Doughboy stopped the Germans; he kept the war from being lost; and then he tipped the balance. Winston Churchill wrote in 1927: "The moral consequence of the United States joining the Allies was indeed the deciding cause in the conflict."

U.S. casualties were minute in comparison to nearly a million British dead and nearly a million and a half French. But the Americans fought magnificently where the danger and need were greatest. Two Texas Divisions saw World War I, the 90th and 36th. The 90th suffered 9,710 casualties and the 36th by contrast suffered 2,601 casualties. The roster in the Donley County Court House lists 314 served from Donley County and 14 have the gold star.

"The war to end all wars" proved to be but an illusive dream of man. In less than two decades the job of winning another war had to be repeated.

In 1954 Congress changed the name of Armistice Day to Veterans' Day that the day would honor veterans of all foreign wars. Lest we forget we tell and retell the stories of valor of our Veterans. We preserve them in the volumes of the historian, on the canvas of the artist and we chisel them in stone that all men may remember.

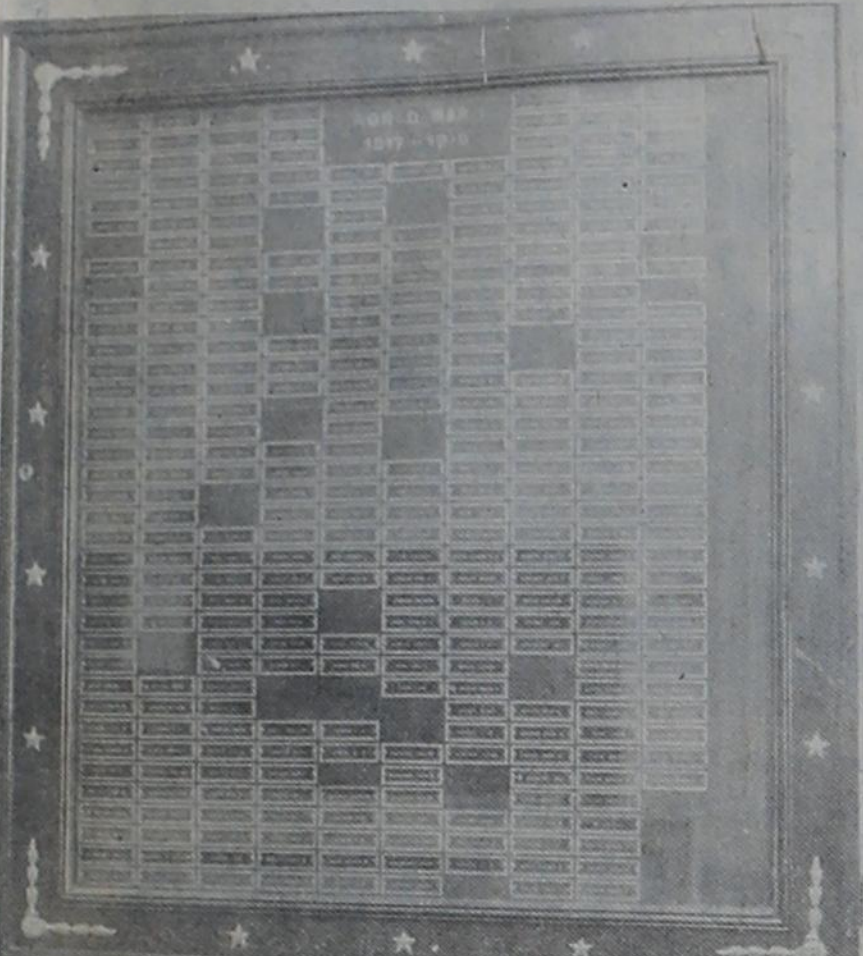

WORLD WAR I roster in Donley County Courthouse of soldiers who served from this county.



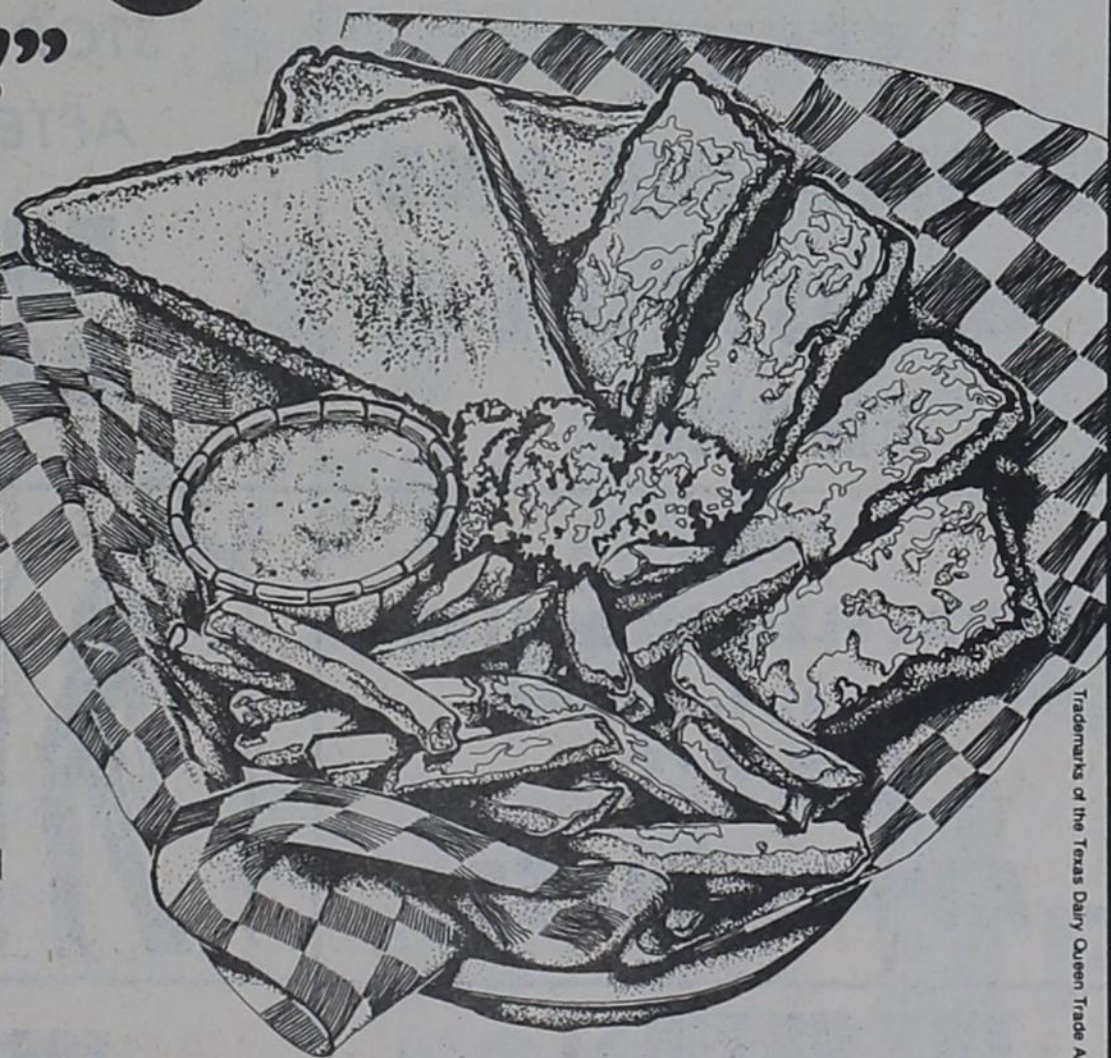

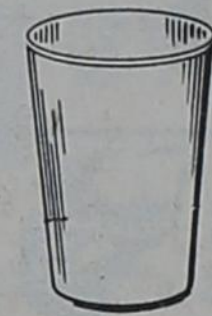

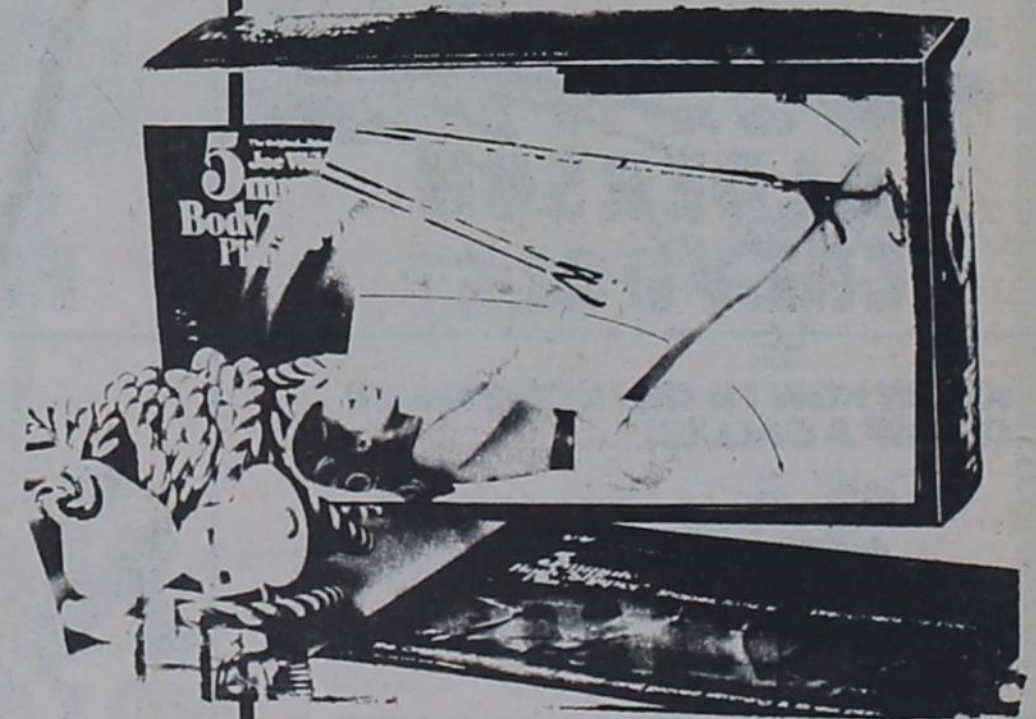

Crop and livestock reports needed

From mid-November to early January, thousands of Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the final acreage, yield and production of crops and end-of-the-year livestock and poultry numbers for the State of Texas and for each county.

Reliable information on what is produced, how much, and where is important to farmers, ranchers, and others in making production and marketing decisions and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture. It is also the basis for determining allotment and payment levels to producers by USDA under various

commodity programs. Cooperation by producers is the key to all crop and livestock estimates. Farmers and ranchers have recognized the need for accurate and timely statistics by participation in the program since its start over a century ago. All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate. This is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

County statistics for 1976 and January 1, 1977, are available on Livestock, Poultry, Dairy, Field Crops, Small Grains, Cotton, Vegetables, Fruits and Pecans, and Cash Receipts from the Sale of Texas Farm Commodities. Bulletins can be obtained from the Texas Crop and Livestock Re-

porting Service, P.O. Box 70, Austin, Texas 78767, or by writing Reagan V. Brown, Commissioner of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

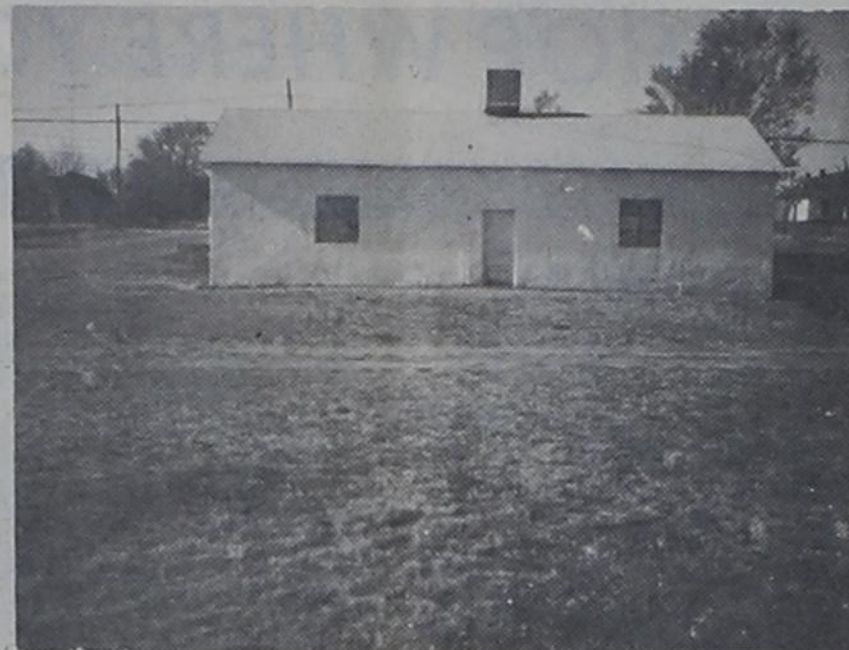

Boots for Fall

By Cynthia Manning

Step into boots this fall - in fashion and with warm, dry feet. Boots lend the finishing touch to any costume-skirts, dresses, gauchos or pants. Boots are usually expensive, so consider them an investment and choose style, height, fabric and color with PURPOSE in mind. To wear from season to season, select a classic style and a basic or neutral (earthy) color. For fashion wear, style is probably the first consideration, and for functional boots, look for quality--in both construction and fabric. While suede or leather boots may be the most comfortable--because natural fibers "breathe"--boots made of rubber or vinyl are more water resistant, especially those that are molded without seams. However, suede and leather can be treated--at the factory or at home--to repel water. Special sprays will shed light rain and snow (but heavy rain and snow will generally still soak through). For greater warmth and dryness, seams should be securely stitched, sturdily made, and lined. Smooth tricort linings make a boot easy to pull on and off and may provide adequate warmth for mild winter weather. Pile linings provide greater warmth; the denser the pile, the greater the warmth. Pile may be wool or synthetic. Synthetic linings may be more durable, but are not as absorbent as wool, often leaving feet with a clammy feeling. Boots with ridged or skid resistant soles, whether leather or synthetic, are safer on ice and snow. Avoid

To assure fit, try on both boots. Sizes vary from brand to brand. Be sure that boot tops provide adequate width for your calves, whether pull-on or zip-up style. Pile-lined boots may fit more snugly; you may need a slightly larger size. Also remember in selecting boots: --trim and ornaments should be firmly attached. --back seam should be centered and firmly stitched. --zipper closure should work smoothly and have a protective placket underneath. --inside should be free of rough spots, wrinkles, bulky seams or loose threads. smooth soles.

Arthritis seminar to be held

Are you a victim of arthritis? If you are, you may be interested in attending an Arthritis Seminar on Thursday, November 17 at 7:30 p.m. in the Harned Sisters Auditorium at Clarendon College.

The Seminar will be conducted by Dr. Kenneth Johnston and Dr. Steward from the Arthritis Foundation in Amarillo. The program will deal with the causes of arthritis, the warning signs and symptoms, common forms of the disease, usual methods of treatment, and quackery related to arthritis. There will also be an opportunity to ask questions at the end of the seminar.

20, 230,000 Americans have arthritis. It is a disease that hits one out of every four families. More than two billion dollars a year is spent on medical care for arthritis. Although it is seldom a cause of death, arthritis brings pain and disability to several times more people than do cancer, high blood pressure or coronary heart disease. If you are not a victim of arthritis you may have family members who are. Attend the Arthritis Seminar and find out more about this crippling disease. The Seminar is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension

Service and supported by the Senior Citizens Center of Clarendon. Education programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socio-economic levels, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Trading was moderately active this week with the volume of cotton available for sale increasing. Prices for most lots rose to an average of 300 - 350 points over government loan rates early in the week but by Friday averaged 200 - 250 points over the loan, about the same level as the previous Friday. At present, very little premium is being paid for grades higher than 32 or staples longer than 32. Growers received an average of \$62 per ton for cottonseed. About 11,700 samples were classed at Memphis for the week ending Friday, November 4, bringing the season's total to 16,900. The Memphis office had not yet opened as of this date last year. White grades accounted for 40 percent of the week's classing, while light spotted grades made up 58 percent. The predominant grades were 32 with 39 percent and 31 with 26 percent. Major staple lengths were 32 with 46 percent and 31 with 30

percent. Micronaire readings were in the desirable range on 82 percent of the samples tested. Ten percent miked 5.0 - 5.2 and six percent miked 5.3 and above. Average pressley for the week was 87 pounds per square inch.

Children born in America today are expected to live approximately to the year 2050, according to Metropolitan Life. The expectation of life at birth in the United States reached a new high of 72.8 years in 1976. From 1970 to 1976 the average expected lifetime increased by 2.1 years, compared with a gain of only 0.8 years in the 1960's. A male child born in 1976 is expected to live 68.9 years, and a female is expected to live 76.7 years. This represents gains of 1.9 years and 2.1 years, respectively since 1970.

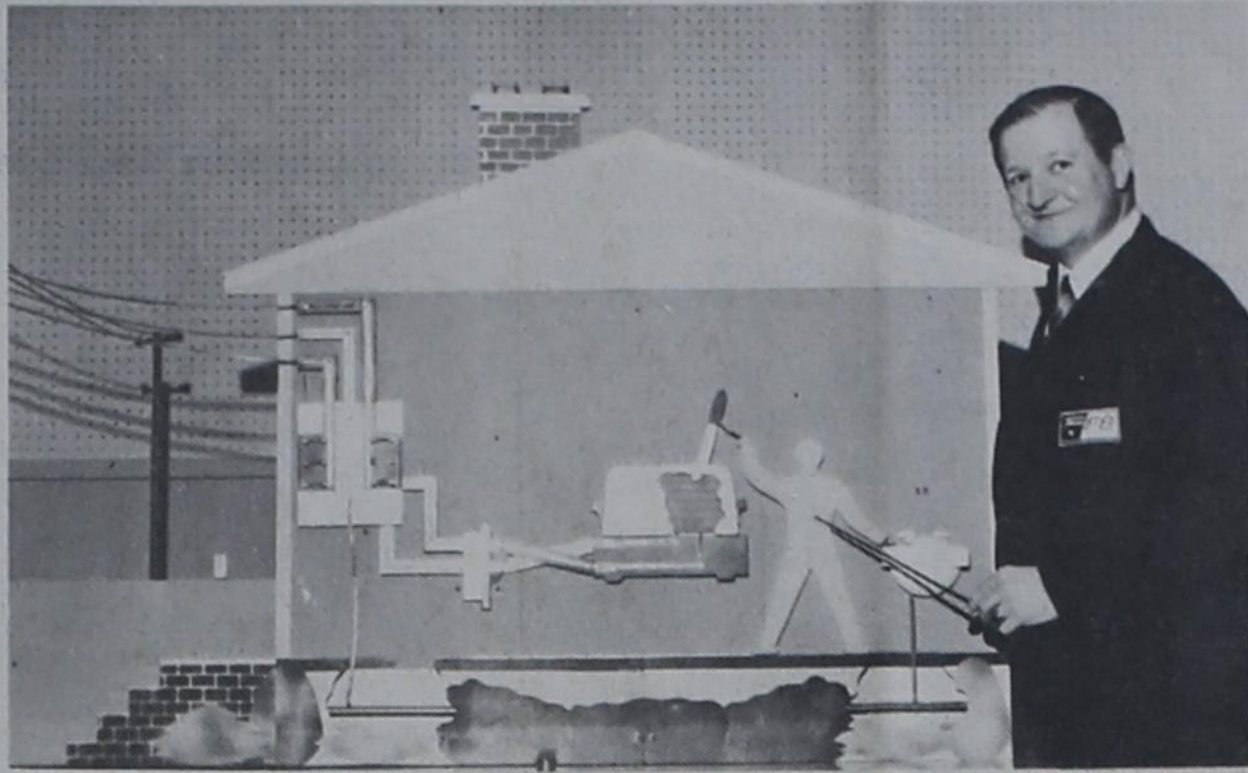

Farm Bureau presents program

Farm Bureau presented a program recently on electric shock for Clarendon and Hedley High Schools according to Ted Shaller, agent for Donley County.

Sudden-death hazards were animated by Joe L. Smetana, Waco Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau as part of a graphic electric shock prevention demonstration held at Hedley and Clarendon schools.

The average modern home has 120-volt or 240-volt, 60-cycle alternating household electrical current with a capacity of over 100 amperes. Electricity is constantly seeking ground. Unfortunately the human body can complete the electrical circuit. Medical authorities agree that if the amount of current required to light a 15-watt bulb, which is only 1/10 of an ampere, should flow through your heart, death might result in just one second.

Smetana achieved the animated effect of electric shock to the human body, via arm-to-arm and arm-to-feet with the use of a special plastic figure representing man - the "misuser" of electricity. The plastic man, several household appliances and portable power tools have special wiring and bulbs that actually light up - producing the animation.

With each sequence of accident producing events, both inside and outside the "danger house", Smetana offered prevention and protective methods such as: (1) make sure the entire electrical system is grounded; (2) ground all major appliances; (3) maintain and don't break off the 3-prong plug; (4) attach the grounding "pig tail" wire on adaptors; (5) use "double insulated" portable power

tools; (6) use ground fault interrupters; (7) disconnect electric power before servicing or cleaning; (8) be extra cautious of electric service and power lines when moving equipment, aluminum or metal ladders and pipes; when children fly kits model airplanes etc; when vehicles collide with electric

power poles. Regarding first aid - Smetana warns - "with high voltage shock, primary first aid is mouth to mouth resuscitation to restore breathing; however, with low voltage (household current) shock, the victim usually requires heart-lung resuscitation to restore both heart beat and breathing.

Schooling is important to your health

The more education you have, reports the Health Institute, the less likely you are to suffer serious disabilities that prevent you from working for extended periods. According to government studies, people with only a little formal education have a far greater chance of being disabled and unable to

work than those with, for instance, a college degree. Census figures show the group with the largest percentage of work disabled persons are those whose education stopped at elementary school. But as education increases, the percentage of disabled workers decreases, the Census study showed.

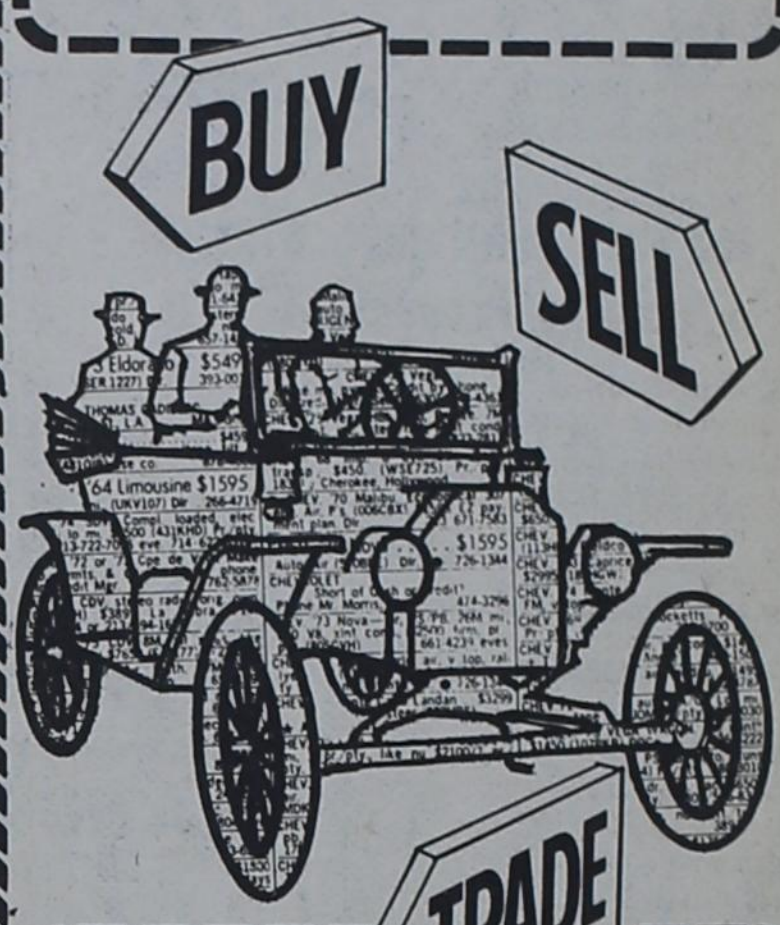

Increasing tax burdens

Future tax bites will consume up to 37.5 percent of total U.S. output by the year 2000, according to a forecast by the Library of Congress. The present tax burden is 30.8 percent. The median family, the study notes, paid 10.9 percent of its income for federal income taxes in 1975; this will increase to 13.9 percent by 1985. In dollars, this will be a jump from \$1,496 to \$4,254. At the end of the century, the forecast is 14.6 percent or \$11,351 in that year's dollars.
