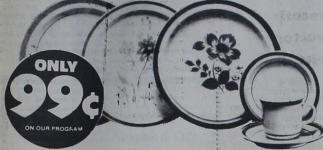

What's Burning in Maurine's Kitchen

By MAURINE BUTTS

Here's my recipe for an easy Lasagna. The ease of this recipe makes it a great "fix early and reheat" dish. And as we all know, the longer you let the recipe set, the longer the spices have to develop their full flavor. The secret to this recipe is allowing it to set 25 to 30 minutes before serving.

Quick Lasagna
1 lb ground beef

1 jar Thick'n Zesty Ragù sauce
1 16 oz carton small curd cottage cheese
2 cups mozzarella cheese, grated
1/2 c chopped onion
1 t salt
9 lasagna noodles, cooked

Brown meat with onion and salt. After brown, add Ragù sauce; simmer. Prepare noodles. Grease a 9x15x2 pan and layer the bottom with 3 noodles. Divide meat sauce in two and put one half on top of noodles. Top with one cup cheese and 1/2 of carton cottage cheese. Repeat process. Top recipe with last three noodles. Cook in a 325 degrees oven for 25 to 30 minutes. Allow recipe to set 25 to 30 minutes. Before serving remove top noodles.

Drying". The below edited article deals with preserving freshly cut flowers indefinitely. The article suggests that flowers should be picked at their peak for best appearance after drying. Before noon is the preferable time of day for picking. Oven drying preserves memories as well as flowers. You can save wedding or anniversary arrangements, special corsages and birthday party posies.

How to microwave flower dry
Things you will need: fresh flowers, silica gel, florist wire, green floral tape, thick white glue.

Tools and equipment: microwave oven, small soft paintbrush, scissors, flat glass baking pan, coffee cup. Note: use any glass, paper or oven-proof dish. Never use metal in a microwave oven.

1. Choose flowers bright in color, very fresh, half-open firm and with thick petals.

Note: Red flowers tend to turn a deep wine color after drying.
2. Cut flowers, leaving 1/2 inch stem. (Leaves should be dried separately and then added to

the stems of flowers.)

3. To use silica gel: Pour the grains into a baking pan and place flowers over them. Spread silica gel evenly between the petals filling every space. Cover flowers completely with grains. Petals should not be exposed to the air.

4. Bake flowers in oven as follows: Put a coffee cup filled with water in the corner of the oven. Place flowers in the oven and heat for 2 to 3 minutes. Time

may vary with different flowers. After heating, remove flowers and let them cool for 15 to 20 minutes. If stem and base still has moisture trapped in it, bury base and stem area only in silica gel and place in oven for about 1 minute longer.

Use brush to remove all silica gel grains

Note: It's best not to use flowers that are fuzzy because the silica gel sticks to the petals and makes it difficult to remove the grains.

5. When the flowers are dry,

use florist wire for the stems. Use floral tape to wrap entire length of wire. Spread glue over the loop and place flowers into position. Cut wire the length desired for flower arrangements.

Note: Pine cones may also be dried using this procedure. Just put the pine cones in the oven for 2 minutes. After they have cooled, paint them or use them in making wreaths.

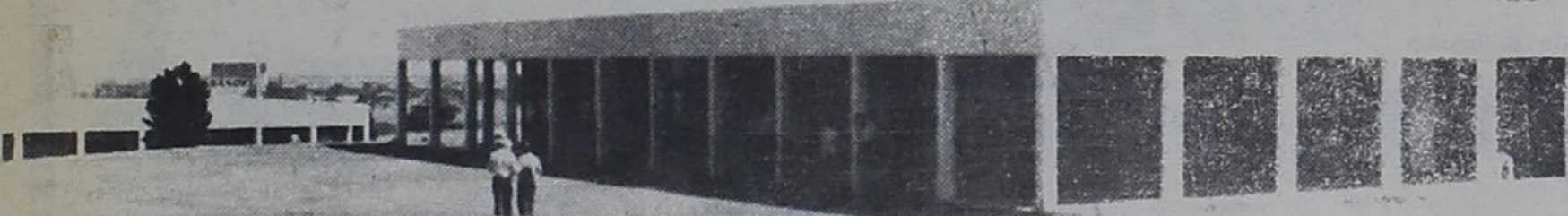

CLARENDON COLLEGE



CLARENDON COLLEGE - Glee Club

BACK IN THE DAYS OF the late 1800's, institutions of higher learning were relatively few and far between the still-young West. A number of colleges had sprung up in Texas, but most of them were in the southern and central parts of the state.

The Panhandle—a vast and rich expanse comprising more area than the entire state of Mississippi—was attracting settlers by the thousands. As the population increased at a rapid pace, the need for a college in the area increased just as steadily.

The citizens of Clarendon, a small town in the southeastern part of the Panhandle, saw the need for such an institution. They decided something should be done. The perseverance and determination of the early-day citizens of the city resulted in the founding of the first college in the Panhandle.

A committee of townsfolk started a subscription campaign in the summer of 1897 to build the college. This list was presented by a special committee to the District Conference of the Methodist Church, South, which met in Memphis, Texas in November of that year. The group offered to erect a two-story brick building on a four-acre campus which would in turn be deeded to the church.

The Conference received a similar offer for a college at Goodnight, a small town located 20 miles to the west of Clarendon. Rev. W.B. McKeown, a member of the Conference Board of Education, was assigned to investigate the proposals.

Rev. McKeown recommended that the Clarendon project be placed on the list of Methodist schools. Rev. J.W. Adkisson was elected its first president and classes scheduled for the fall of 1898.

The promised building was not complete when Fall arrived, but classes opened as scheduled on September 5

in the Methodist Church. Harwood Beville was credited with being the "first student" at Clarendon College and University Training School when he allegedly won a foot race for the honor.

All 75 students who enrolled the first year were grade school pupils. Each was eligible to enter public school, but their parents preferred to send them to Clarendon College because "there can't be a college without student." They had contributed to the construction of the college and were making sure it would be a success.

It was the same Rev. McKeown who recommended that the college be built in Clarendon who inspired the following editorial in the Clarendon Press:

"His bishop assigned him to the Panhandle territory where rattlesnakes and sinners outnumbered Christians 15 to 1. But the story of his ministry was one of the sagas of the Old West. McKeown supplemented his Bible with a pair of six-shooters and tackled the West on its own terms and won the respect of its citizens. He preached in bar-rooms, railroad stations or in the open—wherever there was an audience to listen."

It was this indomitable spirit which prompted the continued growth of the college. The enrollment increased steadily and today the Panhandle boasts many who proudly proclaim Clarendon College as their alma mater.

Clarendon College was 27 years old when its first real trouble began to brew. It became a four-year college in 1925, but after two years in this status, it soon became apparent that something must change.

The school's indebtedness had been paid, but the material improvements requested by the Methodist Conference had not been completed. Only part of the

endowment for the college had been promised and not enough funds were available to complete the gymnasium for which the corner stone had been laid. There had been rumors from the beginning of the school term that the college might be moved from Clarendon.

It was at this juncture that Dr. R.E.L. Morgan, president, requested the Northwest Texas Conference of the Methodist Church to name a committee to settle the question once and for all. Despite the pledges of the citizens of Clarendon to endow the college with the needed funds if it would remain in Clarendon, the Committee announced on March 1, 1927.

The proposal hit a snag, however, when suitable finances could not be arranged in Amarillo and the Conference voted to give the original endowment for Clarendon College to McMurry College in Abilene.

Thus came the end of one era—and the beginning of another.

The citizens of Clarendon, sticking by their determination for a college of their own, proposed and carried by a margin of 343 to 2 a bond issue for \$42,000.00 to purchase the physical assets of defunct Clarendon College. The Clarendon Independent School District now owned a college and Clarendon Municipal Junior College opened its doors in September, 1928. It took up where its predecessor left off and has fulfilled the educational needs of the area for forty-four years.

Athletics have played a large part in the life of Clarendon College and its junior college successor. The original college was credited with bringing the first intercollegiate football game to the Panhandle in 1903 when it fielded a "team" (which had never played a game) against a team from Goodnight College. The Clarendon squad pulled an

upset and won the skirmish to the tune of 16 to 10. The grid sport has long since made its demise, but other activities such as basketball, tennis, track, and volleyball have gained eminence among the college's athletes. The Clarendon College Bulldogs are rated as one of the better small school teams in the area.

It has been a long and up-hill climb for the college which was founded in a virgin territory for higher education. But, based on the premise that education can best be offered in the familiar and home-like atmosphere of a small institution where "the individual is a name-not a number," the college has continued to grow and prosper. Today, Clarendon College, a fully-accredited Class A institution, is keeping pace with the times by offering a complete, up-to-date curriculum. Enrollment has grown steadily.

In 1965, Clarendon College was the recipient of an endowment from the estate of Etta and Ida Harned in the amount of \$336,341.55. The Harned Sisters, pioneer residents of Clarendon, were always strong supporters of the college and were particularly interested in the furtherance of music education.

AS A RESULT of the Harned Sisters Endowment, the college was able to purchase some thirty acres of land for the site of a new campus. Construction of a \$1,480,000.00 plant was completed and the new campus boasts completely modern facilities, including a housing complex with dormitories, a student union building, bookstore and cafeteria. The new academic plant includes class rooms and laboratories, administrative offices, library, auditorium, and gymnasium.

The new campus officially opened in 1968 offering courses leading to the first two years of the academic baccalaureate degree. In 1973, the vocational-technical facility was completed on campus and five vo-tech programs were offered: Automobile-Mechanics, Cosmetology, Electronics, Ranch and Feedlot Operations, and Vocational Nursing. These programs were developed to meet the identified needs of the Clarendon community and the surrounding area. Adult-Vocational and Community Service classes are also offered upon request. In the fall semester of 1975, the college had a record enrollment of 530 students.

In 1978, the Clarendon College-Pampa Center was opened. The facility is located at 900 North Frost in Pampa. The Pampa Center is a great asset to the City of Pampa and has proved to be a valuable addition to the college, also. In 1979, a vocational nursing school in Shamrock was added to the Clarendon College programs. Off-campus classes have been offered in Childress, Wellington and Wheeler in recent years. The highest enrollment in the history of the college was 802 during the fall semester of 1979.

Clarendon is proud of its college and thousands of alumni scattered throughout the land are quick to proclaim the merits of the small school. The complete story cannot be told in a few pages, but Ethel Harvey, a former resident of Clarendon, ably recorded many of the glorious memories, of the oldest college in the Panhandle in a book, The Athens of the Panhandle. Those memories, as is Miss

Harvey's book, can well be dedicated to those doctory pioneers of education "whose lives were devoted to guiding youth in the search for knowledge."

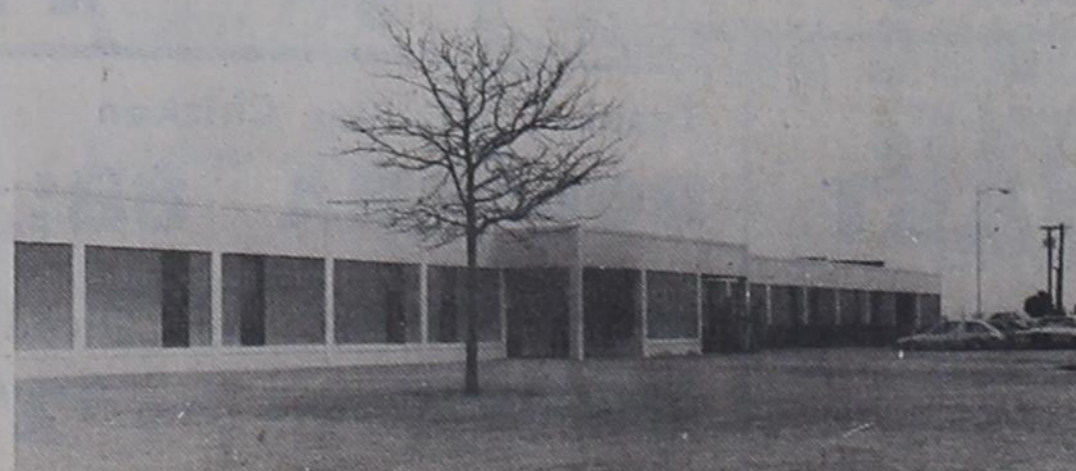

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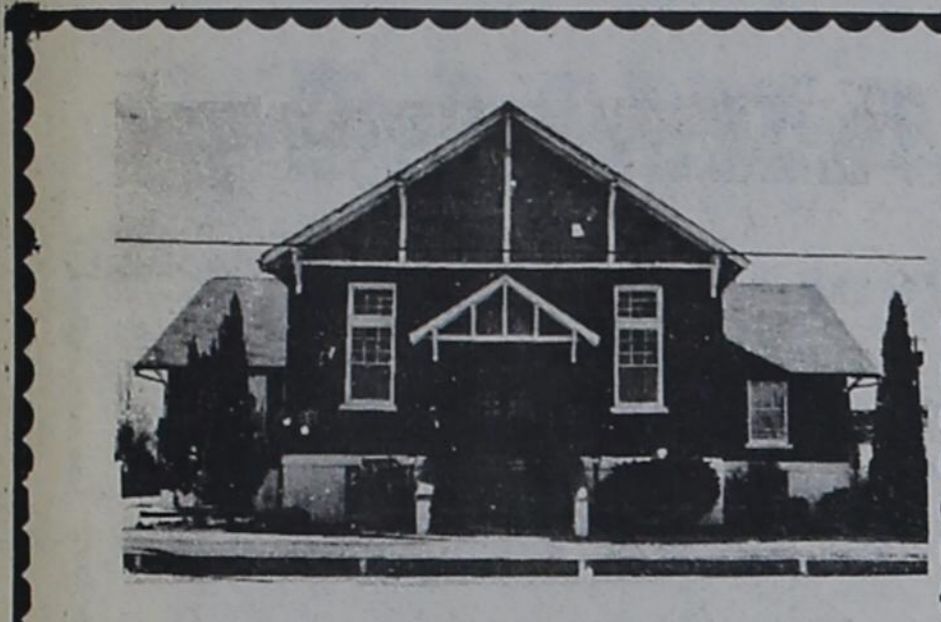

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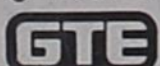

Bronchos place 5th at Dumas

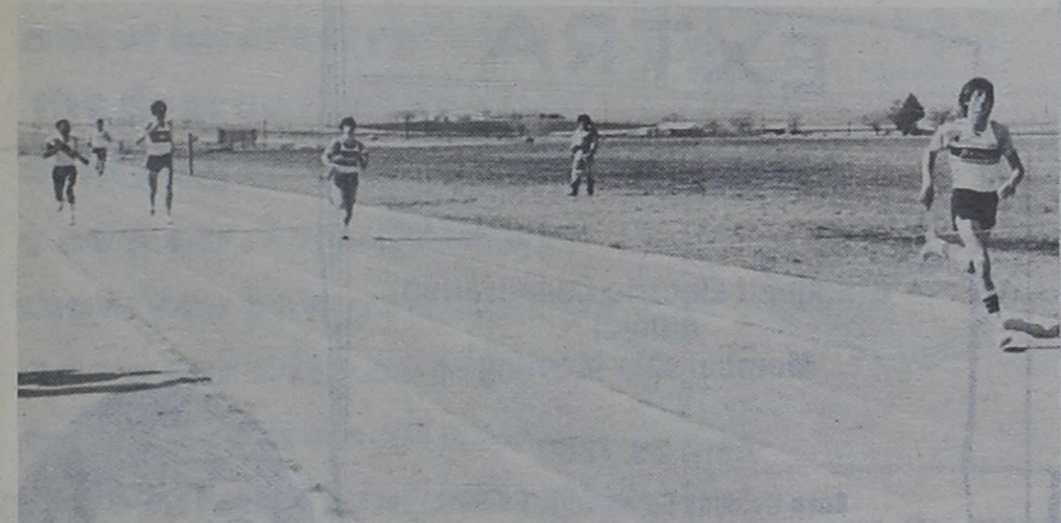
