## EMS service getting two new ambulances

Two new Crestline Commander ambulances are expected to arrive at the Associated Ambulance Authority on March 18.

The ambulances cost a total of \$252,000, which will be partially paid for with the help of a \$35,000 grant from the Texas Department of State Health and \$24,000 that the ambulance service has saved for the purchases. The sale and trade-in of two older ambulances will provide about \$10,000, and the balance will be covered by a five-year note.

"Everyone on the hospital board is thrilled about the new ambulances," Donley County Hospital District Administrator Anna Howard said. "We're ready for them to get here."

The need for the new ambulances is due to two of the present units' mechanical problems and constant malfunctioning. All three ambulances are out of warranty, so repairs to them require out of pocket

"The board figured it would be cheaper to go ahead and get the new ambulances," Howard said. "The 2004 ambulance that will be traded in has been malfunctioning since

2005, and it actually has been a part of a litigation process because of continuous malfunction."

Another reason the hospital board decided to purchase the ambulances now is because new emission laws and requirements going into effect starting in 2011 are going to cause ambulances to go up in price by \$5,000-8,000 per unit.

"We decided it would be more economical to go ahead and get the ambulances now because of the increased cost of ambulances in the future," Howard said.

Over the past seven years, the number of calls to the ambulance station have gradually increased from 553 total calls in 2003 to 749 in 2009. From the beginning of this year, there have already been 104 ambulance calls.

"Usually January and February are our slow months," Howard said. "If it keeps it up, then we could very well get into the 900s, which is a large amount for a small rural ambulance department."

Howard said the increase in calls is possibly due to the economy. "People can't afford to go to the

## Primary elections to be held Tuesday

Voters will celebrate Texas Independence Day next Tuesday by heading to the polls and casting ballots in party primaries.

Polling places for the Democratic Primary are as follows: Precinct 101 - Clarendon College Bairfield Activity Center, Precinct 102 - Howardwick City Hall, Precinct 201 - Donley County Courthouse Judge's Office, Precinct 301 & 302 - Hedley Lions Club, and Precinct 401 - Burton Memorial Library.

Republican polling places are: Precinct 101 - Clarendon College Bairfield Activity, Precinct 102 -Howardwick City Hall, Precinct 201 Donley County Courthouse Commissioners Courtroom, Precinct 301 - Assembly of God Fellowship Hall, Precinct 303 - Hedley Senior Citizens Center, and Precinct 401 -Church of Christ Family Life Center.

Early voting for both parties continues at the County Clerk's office in the Courthouse Annex through this Friday. As of Tuesday morning, 96 Republicans had cast early ballots, and 23 Democrats had voted.

Local Democrats have one contested race on their ballot. Colleen Owens and Doug Wright are vying for the party's nomination for Pct. 3&4 Justice of the Peace.

Donley County Republicans have two contested races on their ballot this year. Incumbent Donnie Hall is being challenged by Mitchell Martin for the nomination to run for County Commissioner of Precinct 2.

Three men - Joe Hall, Dan Sawyer, and Bill Spier - are seeking the Republican nomination to run for County Commissioner of Precinct 4.

Other candidates on the Republican ballot include Denise Bertrand for Pct. 3&4 Justice of the Peace, Janette Gail Wagner Cox for County/ District Clerk, and incumbent Wanda Smith for County Treasurer. Tom Stauder also appears on the Republican ballot to continue as party chairman.

Balloting next Tuesday will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Check your voter's registration card to see what precinct you should vote in.

## Sign-up period still underway

The sign-up period continues for citizens who might wish to serve as candidates for any of seven local boards holding elections this May.

The filing deadline for these offices is March 8, 2010; and the elections will be held May 8.

The City of Clarendon will hold an election to choose the three aldermen for two-year terms, and the City of Howardwick will also elect three aldermen for two-year terms.

The City of Hedley will choose a mayor and four aldermen. The mayor and two aldermen positions are full two-year terms. Two other positions are unexpired terms.

Three positions on the Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees are up this year. Those seats are threeyear terms.

Two full terms and one unexpired term are up on the Hedley ISD Board of Trustees. The full terms are for three years, and the unexpired term has one year remaining.

The Clarendon College Board of Regents has three seats up for election this year. Those positions are six-year terms.

The Donley County Hospital District will select four two-year positions on its board, Places 4, 5, 6, and 7. All local offices are elected atlarge, but hospital board candidates must sign up for a specific place.

## Missions to Moon worth defending

Surprisingly, it was not the first moon landing, itself, that initially captivated my teenage attention during NASA's early Apollo flights. It was when American astronauts circled the moon a mission or two before the actual landing.

I distinctly remember looking up at the moon in a cold Christmas sky shortly after I had heard the news of that mission, utterly astonished as this experience brought home to me the reality of what had just happened: human beings had actually flown that far out into space, around the very moon I was now looking at and returned to earth safely. And this was not science fiction!

Philosophy at its best is born in wonder—just as the Ancients believed. And as the line between science and philosophy has only been drawn in modern times, the same can be said for the sciences.

A medieval assumption underlying the modern university is what Robert Nisbet has called "The Academic Dogma". It is simply the belief that knowledge itself is an unqualified good, to be valued for its own sake and not just because it leads to economic development. Something within us as human beings-and, yes, something especially within the American spiritwants to see new frontiers opened, wants to see the envelope pushed in new and exciting directions.

And it is interesting that the very phrase "push the envelope" comes, I believe, from the early days of the space program. From the very beginning, that is what this program has been about. So I was not happy to hear last week that the Obama Administration, in its new budget, has decided to defund NASA's efforts to return to the moon and has, at the same time, ordered the space agency to focus more resources and effort toward finding supporting evidence for the scientifically questionable thesis of man-caused global warming.

NASA's entire budget for the current year is just shy of 19 billion dollars. Not an insignificant amount. But, in the larger picture, what is it compared to the nearly trillion dollar TARP and stimulus bills? Although, to be fair, I guess we can say that some of the monies in these bills was space related— at least in a metaphorical sense— since so much stimulus money seems to have fallen down a black hole.

At least with NASA, we know where the money is going and there is something to be said for the fact that the government has a legitimate interest in funding basic research for reasons stated above.

I suspect that a reason for the Administration's defunding of NASA's moon efforts can be seen in a line from a song that came out shortly after the first moon missions. The artist, Larry Norman, whose music and Christian message I liked, at times dipped his lyrical pen too deeply into the ink-well of liberal politics. And so he wrote: "You say we beat the Russians to the moon. But I say you starved your children to do it."


His meaning was clear, money that could have gone for social programs had instead gone to NASA to fund the moon missions. As the Obama Administration has the same socialist, redistributionist goals, should we wonder now at its contemporary attempts to partially defund similar programs?

One wonders what our Founding Fathers would have thought of Obama's NASA decision. And perhaps the writings of one of the greatest of them all holds a clue.

Even before his ascension to the Presidency, Thomas Jefferson had long dreamed of sending expeditions to explore the western parts of the continent. While in a secret letter to Congress intended to obtain the funds necessary for the Lewis and Clark expedition, he emphasized "the interests of commerce" with native peoples as a principal reason for the funding, and officially downplayed "advancing the geographical knowledge of our continent," the Monticello website makes it clear that the latter was of prime interest to him. "Jefferson," the website explains, " also was fascinated by the prospect of what could be learned about the geography of the West, the lives and languages of the Native Americans, the plants and animals, the soil, the rocks, the weather, and how they differed from those in the East"

So, would Barack Obama in an earlier era have defunded Lewis and Clark? Perhaps not - especially if this President thought that they could bring back any evidence, real or contrived, supporting man-made climate change. But he has grounded the program that made our spirits soar for nearly five decades. And I have to feel sorry for today's teenagers who will no longer be able to look with pride to the distant stars as Americans astronauts "slip the surly bonds of earth ... and touch the face of God."



## States are answer to health care

Proposals for the federal takeover of health care are reported to be on life support. But even if the congressional leadership opts to pull the plug, that does not mean the very real problems with health care should go unresolved.

Now is the time for our best laboratories of innovation, the 50 states, to take the lead. There is much that can be done in Texas without federal action to lower costs and improve access.

While Texas has added 18,000 physicians in the six years since voters approved comprehensive medical liability reform, more needs to be done to increase the pool of providers, particularly in primary care.

Texas laws place more restrictions than most other states on the services that can be provided by non-M.D. professionals such as advanced practice nurses, podiatrists, optometrists and audiologists. This limits the options patients have in selecting providers that may be less expensive, more accessible, or simply meet their personal preference.

The recent trend toward retail clinics, conveniently located in pharmacies and discount stores, allows for such convenient, low-cost, primary care with proven and safe outcomes. Allowing these medical providers to practice according to their education and training would immediately give many Texans increased access to care at no cost to the state.

If the goal is truly to lower the cost of health care, it is mystifying that

Congress sought to further restrict health savings accounts (HSAs) instead of pushing the system toward HSAs and other forms of consumer-driven health plans (CDHPs).

The American Academy of Actuaries summarized that HSAs lowered costs 12 percent in the first year and cut in half the rate of inflation in subsequent years. The Texas Legislature should lead the way by creating an HSA option in all state employee and teacher plans, allowing the savings accounts built up under HSAs to be carried over into retirees' supplemental plans. The result would be an immediate savings for active employee coverage and a gradual but steady reduction in the unfunded liability for retiree coverage.

Free-market reformers have long been calling for states to rein in the number of mandates on private insurance pointing to the added costs. Allowing individuals to purchase health insurance across state lines would be an effective way for consumers to bypass state mandates and decide which coverage suits them best. In fact, a University of Minnesota study estimated that allowing New Jersey residents to purchase in other states could mean 49 percent of their uninsured would have coverage.

Texas should also prod the federal government to transform Medicaid into a block grant, fairly apportioned and without strings attached. Medicaid costs are suffocating state budgets to the point where even liberal governors have chafed at federal plans to expand Medicaid eligibility. In Texas, the growth in Medicaid costs will demand an additional \$4 billion when the legislature meets next year.

Federal micromanagement has created an incredibly complex and expensive entitlement program in Medicaid. Absent reform, this unsustainable program will become markedly worse as the states' aging populations increase the already high cost of long-term care.

States could consider a slidingscale, voucher program for the poor who are uninsured or uninsurable to purchase individual or employer-provided insurance. By putting recipients into the private insurance pool, access to care would be greatly improved because doctors would again be willing to see patients currently on Medicaid.

Washington's penchant for onesize-fits-all policies is at the core of the congressional stalemate over health care, as well as the public's intensifying frustration with national politicians on a spending spree. This opens yet another opportunity for Texas to show leadership and provide a superior alternative. The solutions that expand access to health care at more affordable costs come by empowering individuals rather than the federal government.



The rise in calls has caused two, even three ambulances to be out running at the same time.

"The two new units are a necessity," Howard said. "It has become a regular thing that both ambulances are running together. We need two ambulances that don't malfunction due to this increase in yearly calls."

The Ambulance Authority is looking forward to the new ambulances arrival.

"We're just waiting patiently waiting now, hoping the units don't break down before the new ones get here," Howard said.







#### Clarendon man earns wind energy degree



Bridges were constructed out of balsa wood sticks and glue and were designed to span a distance of 20 cm. Sheila Spielhofer and Kelsey Mullins won the contest by building a bridge with a mass of 17.64 grams (a little over half an ounce) that held 48.5 pounds of weight. David Roberts and Matthew Henderson placed second in the contest even though their bridge held more weight. Their 29.94 gram bridge (a bit over one ounce) held nearly 72 pounds of weight. The contest was judged based on the ratio of the weight held to the mass of the bridge, so Spielhofer and Mullins ratio of 2.75 pounds/gram beat out Roberts and Henderson's ratio of 2.4 pounds/gram. ## APPRAISAL DISTRICT ACCEPTING PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS

Almost everyone with personal property in the Donley Appraisal District has now been mailed rendition forms. A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. Please complete the listing of your taxable personal property and return the forms by the 15th of April. All personal property must be rendered each year even if there has been no change from the prior year. You should include cars, pickups, trucks, RV's, motorcycles, travel trailers, and airplanes.

If you own a business, you should also render your business inventory held for resale and other business related equipment.

The rendition must be signed, and you may, although it is not required, list an opinion of market value. If you give your opinion of your property's value and the appraisal district believes the value is higher, you will be notified in writing of the higher value and told how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

File your rendition with the appraisal district office at 307 S Sully or mail to P O Box 1220, Clarendon TX 79226.







## Drugs in the News

Popular Blood Pressure Drug and Dementia

A study recently published in the British Medical Journal showed a link between a class of blood pressure medications, called angiotensin receptor blockers (ARBs), and a lower incidence of dementia and Alzheimer's disease. This study compared the records of over 800,000 veterans, 65 years and older with heart disease, who were taking different drugs for high blood pressure. They found that those who took an ARB were 16% less likely to develop Alzheimer's and 24% less likely to develop dementia compared to veterans taking other blood pressure medications. Of those individuals who already had Alzheimer's, those taking ARBs had significantly lower rates of nursing home admissions. The ARBs used in this study included valsartan (Diovan), candesartan (Atacand), losartan (Cozar), and irbesartan (Avapro).

According to the US Centers for Disease Control, 5.3 million Americans suffer from Alzheimer's. Risk factors associated with dementia and Alzheimer's that can be managed with lifestyle modifications and drug therapy include high blood pressure, diabetes, and high cholesterol.





WHAT IF CHRIST REALLY MEANT WHAT HE SAID?

Our nation, contrary to what our president has said, is a nation founded on Christian values. If a person in our country dies in our country without knowing Christ, he is without excuse. If clear statements of Christ were followed, there would be much less, if any division amongst people professing Christianity.
