

Uses Women on Grandjury Claiming Mixed Body Does Better Job

In charging his grandjury recently, Judge Parker of Lewis county Kentucky at Vanceburg, did not mince words about conditions of his section. The paragraph Gov. Allred says: "When I said below was taken from the Vanceburg Herald, it being a part of the Judge's charge.

"Since the last term of this Court there has been a widespread violation of the law in our fair County. Two murders have been committed, numerous shootings, and two young men have lost lives in hit-and-run automobile accidents that look very suspicious. A stop must be put to crime in our County, if we are to keep our fair name. Liquor has played a prominent part or most if not all of the shootings and killings. I desire to call your attention especially to the Drunken Drivers of automobiles, one of the most serious as well as the most violated crimes in our County, if a stop is not put to same, it will soon be unsafe for your child as well as yourself and all others to venture out to Church or school on a public highway. All who are guilty of this crime should be speedily indicted and I promise you that no mercy will be shown by the Court in disposing of their cases and revoking their right to drive. We must do all in our power to make our streets and highways



This was an increase of 100 compared with the number of fatalities in the same period last year and an increase of 128 compared with the corresponding period in 1935.

Persons injured totaled 2,496 for the first half of 1937, an increase of 226 compared with the corresponding period in 1936 and an increase of 331 compared with the same period in 1935.




