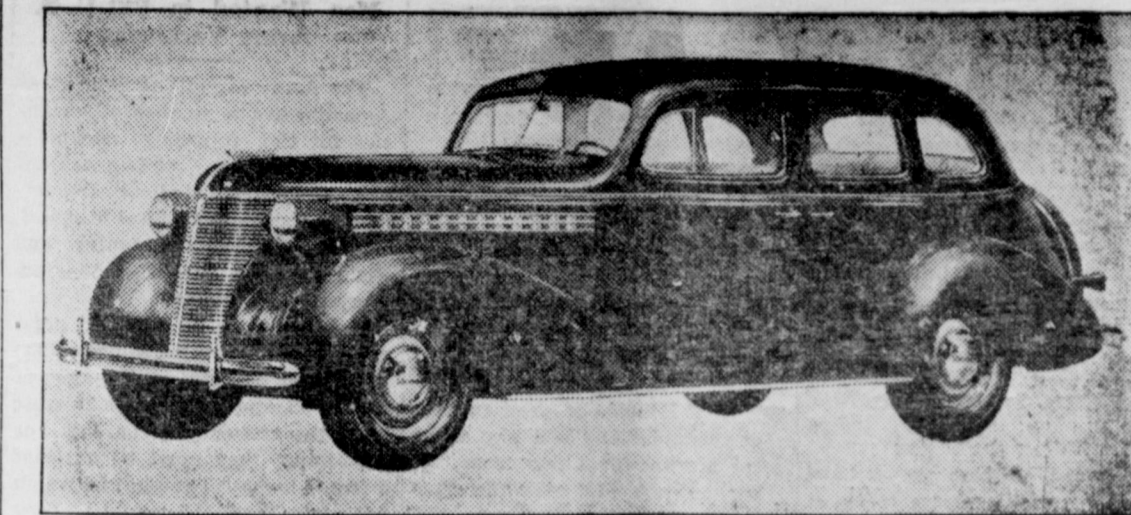

AMARILLO, Oct. 27.—The Santa Fe railway system today announced a business uptrend for the year when they released figures showing carloadings for the week ending Oct. 23 were 26,313 compared with 25,546 for the same week in 1936.
