RUNKLE—Joseph Dantel Runkle, 83, died at his home at Sipe Springs at 11 o'clock Sunday night. Funeral services were held at the Methodist church at Sipe Springs at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon with Rev. Fisher of Burkett officiating. Interment was at Sipe Springs with Mitcham Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Mr. Runkle was born in Missouri July 26, 1852. He moved to Burleson county, Texas, with his parents, while a small boy, settling near Caldwell. He moved to Sipe Springs in 1892 and lived the rest

of his life there. He was married in 1872 to Miss Ellen Rhymes of Caldwell. Surviving are his wife and five children: J. S. Hepburn's Advance Fashions Lavish In "Break of Hearts"

Smart costumes, ranking from enchanting intimate attire to de luxe evening gowns, are displayed by Katharine Hepburn in "Break of Hearts," her current RKO Radio Picture showing at the Lyric Sunday and Monday, July 14 and 15, in which Charles Boyer is costarred.

Designed by Bernard Newman, internationally famous creator of women's clothes, the costumes have been skillfully fashioned to reflect the vivid personality of the star. Outstanding among the lovely gowns worn by Miss Hepburn is an evening ensemble of glittering silver tissue that creates the impression that the wearer is walking in an aura of brilliant light. The outfit is designed with a three-quarter length coat, accordion pleated, and hung from a deep yoke. The coat ties at the throat with a self-material bow.

Second only to the silver gown in beauty is a black evening dress of crepe satin and sequin-trimmed net. The deep test of McDonald and Campbell on the Smith tract, 3 1-2 miles south of Zephyr, was drilling with a 10-inch hole in white lime at 2,625 feet this week. Two Comanche Men Die Of Gun Wounds

Within the past week two Comanche men have died from gunshot wounds. A. P. Kallina, 37, was found Friday afternoon on highway No. 10 about a mile east of Comanche in a dying condition. A bullet had entered his head above the right ear and ranged through his head, and there were powder burns on his head. A .38 calibre pistol was in the car. Kallina was rushed to Medical Arts Hospital where he died late Friday evening. Jim Slack, 45, insurance salesman, was found dead with two bullet wounds in his body Tuesday

noon within half a mile from the spot where Kallina had been found. A .38 calibre pistol was found on the floor of the car and an unfinished note was found on the car seat beside the body. A verdict of suicide was returned by Justice of the Peace George C. Wetzel at an inquest Tuesday afternoon. Kallina was principal of Comanche high school from 1928 through 1932. Following that he was superintendent of Lamkin, Comanche county, school, for two years. For a year he was in the grocery business at Comanche, closing his store about two months ago. His wife and a six-year old daughter survive. He was a graduate of San Marcos Teachers Col-

lege and came to Garwood, Texas. Slack had lived most of his life in Dallas, and his wife, his father and sisters.
