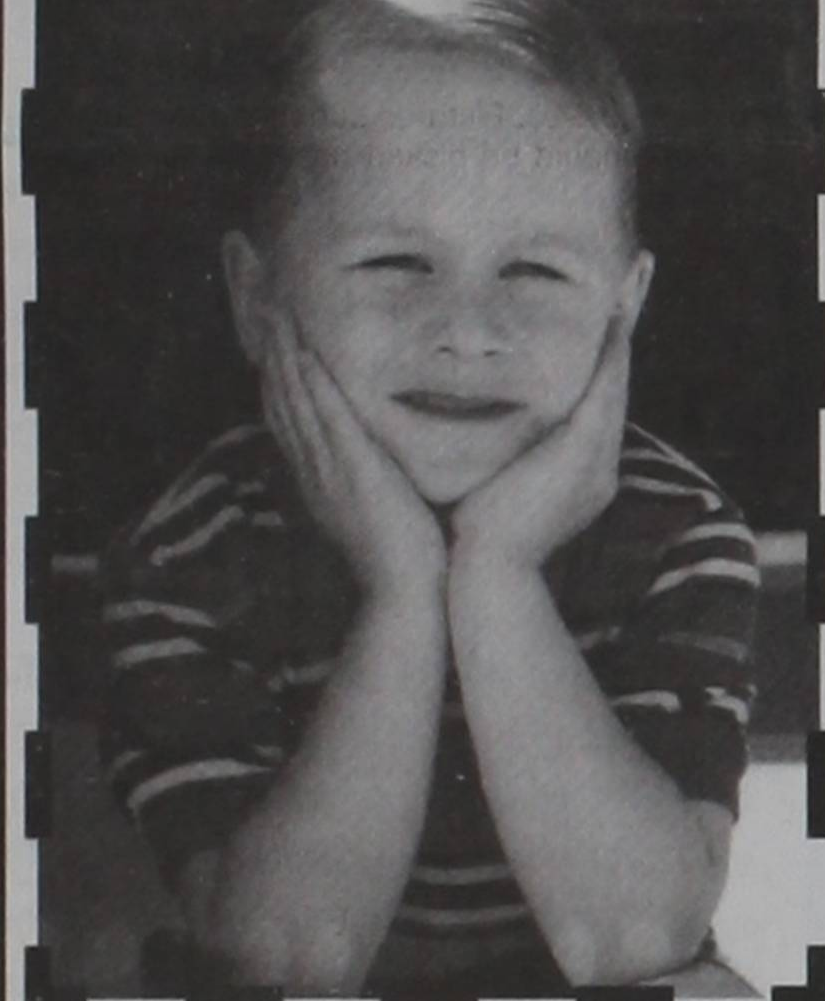

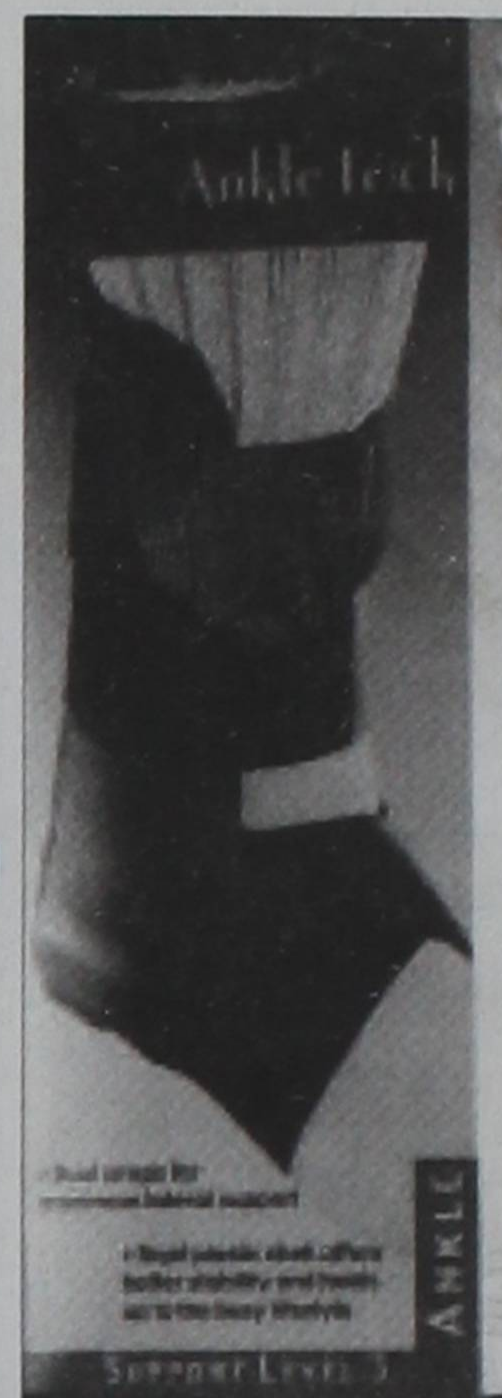

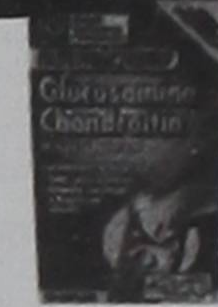

## Broncos win again, 40 - 21

They are in it to win it, and the Broncos' performance in the their three-game road trip proves that fact.

Unstoppable for the moment, the Broncos are pulling together as a team and have an intensity that makes other teams drool. Their latest victims were the Sunray Bobcats who had defeated the Broncos the past eight years. Led by the dominating force of the senior squad, the Broncos whipped the Bobcats 40-21 and left them stunned and shaken.

Senior signal caller Johnny Gaines continues to roll as he has guided his team to three big victories in a tough series on the road.

According to head coach Gary Jack, the Sunray game was the fourth out of six games that the Broncos have scored over 40 points a game and in those three games, the Broncos racked up 137 points to only 62 for their opponents. Right now, that is huge for the Clarendon team. They have one more game until the beginning of district play, which will begin October 22 at home.

"We are just a little banged up

from some very physical games," Jack said.

"It will be good to have an open day (next week) so we can get healed up and ready for district. We want to get a big win over Gruver (this Friday) and go into district at 6-1."

The Broncos stunned Sunray early on with huge hits by Chris Crump and Bradley Watson.

"Chris waxed a guy on a kick off," Jack said.

"Bradley Watson got a big hit, and then Chris got another big hit. It pretty much shut their intensity down.

"They didn't quit, but the first quarter we opened up with a 20-7 lead and they just never got any closer."

The Broncos scored on their first four possessions of the game as they racked up 414 total yards of offense. Chris Crump crossed the goal line first on a 13-yard run, and Wes Williams turned six on a huge 68-yard run.

Johnny Gaines capped the first quarter scoring with a 26-yard run. Mike Crump added a score to the rally in the second quarter on a one-yard run to go up by 12 points at the

break. Chris Crump and Williams added the last two scores of the game on one and fifteen yard runs respectively.

"I was tickled to death with the win," Jack said. "We've had six very physical games in a row. Right now, we're hitting on all cylinders offensively. It's been a good stretch for us."

The Broncos set the tone for the game early and according to Jack, the offensive line did a great job blocking for the run and protecting for the pass.

Jacob Pigg, Trent White, R.J. Nino, Coby Braughton, David Roberts, Clayton Shields, and Jayson Pigg are all part of that determined line.

Defensively, the Broncos had huge hits and an overall great performance. Williams had 13 tackles and one sack, Gaines had 11 tackles, and Brayden Phillips had 8 tackles and one interception.

"A lot of people played well at different times," Jack said. "I was really pleased with their play."

The Broncos will host the Gruver Greyhounds Friday night in Bronco Stadium for Homecoming. The game will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Caleb Cobb topped off the scoring when he went three yards for the score.

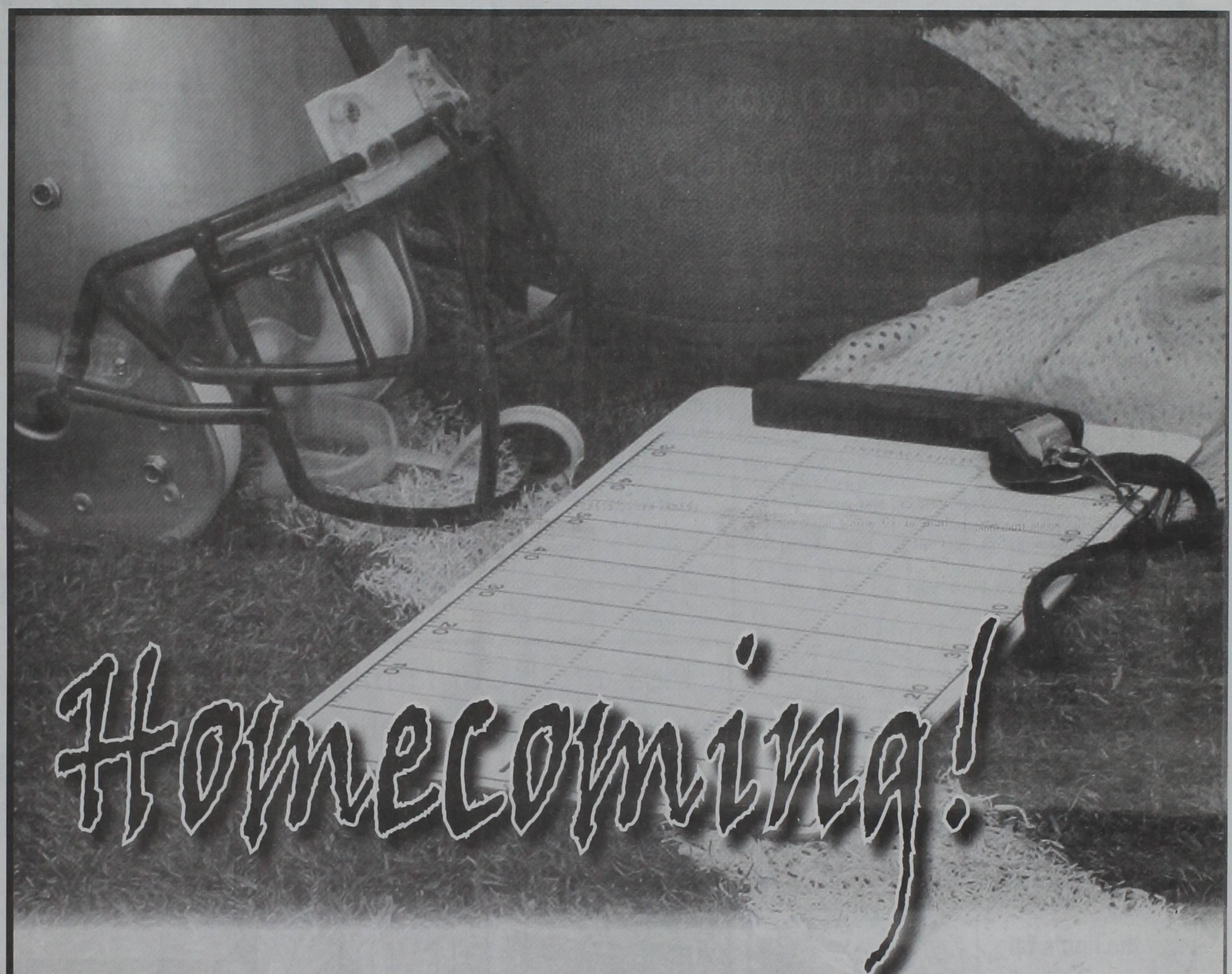

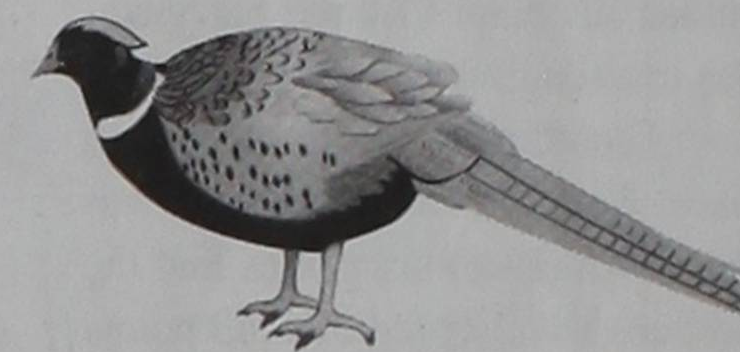

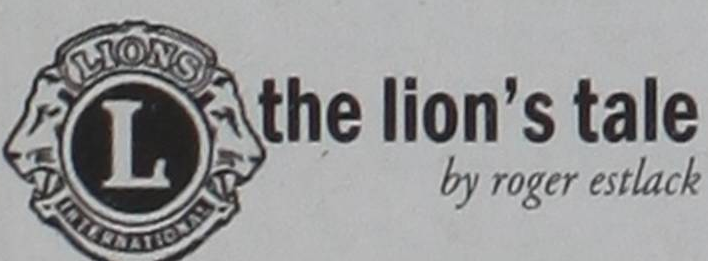

**TxDOT makes it easier to report road problems**

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) launched a new reporting system this week that makes it easier and faster for Texans to report maintenance issues on Texas highways.

The new, more efficient system also gives citizens a better opportunity to be a part of the maintenance solution by providing several million additional pairs of eyes to help TxDOT crews identify problems and preserve the state's expansive transportation infrastructure.

TxDOT's newly launched "Report a Pothole" initiative is available online at [www.txdot.gov](http://www.txdot.gov) or the toll-free number at 888.885.8248.

With just a click of a mouse or a quick phone call, citizens can report a pothole, including the location of the damage.

The new system is part of the agency's ongoing move toward transparency and better customer service, said Amadeo Saenz, TxDOT executive director.

"But it's also about enlisting Texans to help us maintain the state's transportation system," Saenz added. "Citizens reporting problems on the highways—it just makes sense. It's like an extension of our maintenance forces. In today's environment of diminishing resources, it helps to have every citizen engaged."

Operators will answer phone lines from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. CDT Monday through Friday. Evening and weekend calls will go to voice-mail and be returned the next morning or on the first working day of the following week.

"All of the finalists have Panhandle roots, and most still have relatives living in the area," Auvenshine said.

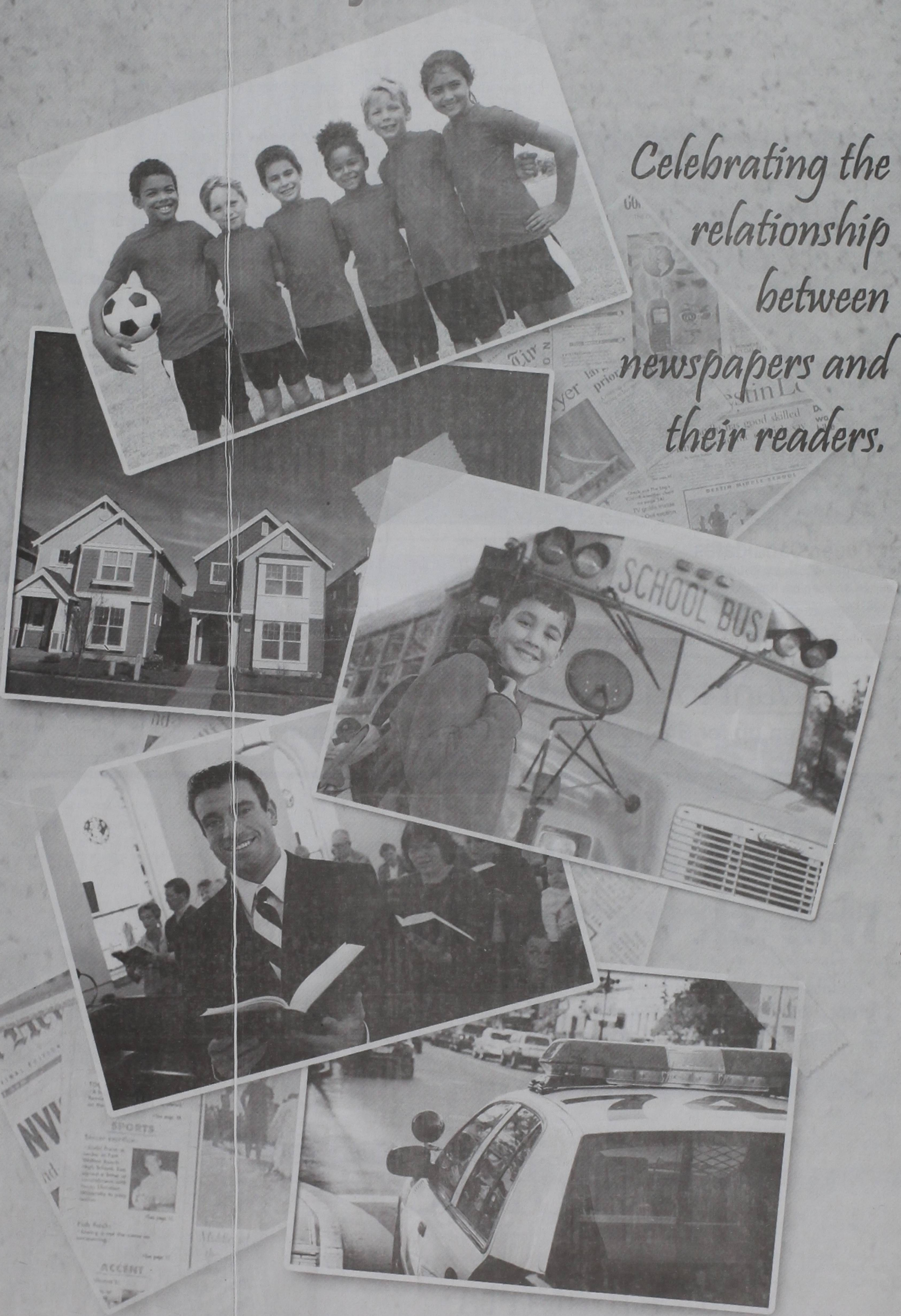
Interviews for the finalists are scheduled October 25-29, and the public will have an opportunity to meet each candidate.

## National Fire Prevention Week October 3-9

PAMPA — As the country marks National Fire Prevention Week October 3-9 the American Red Cross Eastern TX Panhandle Chapter is urging everyone to help save lives by making sure their home is protected by smoke alarms.

"The largest percentage of home fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms or alarms that don't work," said Jana Gregory, CEO, Eastern TX Panhandle Chapter. "Smoke alarms provide a few minutes of advance warning in the event of a home fire, and that extra time can save lives."

People who do not have smoke alarms in their home should have them installed, and those with smoke alarms should make sure they have been properly maintained and updated.

Smoke alarms should be installed on every level of the home, as well as inside bedrooms, and outside sleeping areas of the home.

People should test their smoke alarms once a month by pushing the test button, and replace alarm batteries at least once a year. Other smoke alarm safety recommendations include:

- Installing a new smoke alarm battery immediately if an alarm chirps, warning that the battery is low.

- Teaching children what the smoke alarm sounds like, and what they should do when they hear it.

- Keeping the alarm clean by vacuuming over and around it regularly. Dust and debris can interfere with the alarm's operation. Do not paint over the smoke alarm.

- Moving the alarm farther away from the kitchen or bathroom if the device is sounding nuisance alarms. Never disable a smoke alarm.

The Red Cross also recommends that families create and practice a home fire escape plan, which

should include at least two escape routes for every room in the home. Families should choose a convenient meeting place outside of the home and practice their escape plan at least twice a year with all family members.

Nationally, the Red Cross responds to thousands of local fires throughout the country every year. Last year, the Eastern TX Panhandle Chapter responded to 38 fires across our 11 counties.

The Red Cross reminds people of the following fire safety tips they should take:

- Keep all sources of fuel (paper, clothing, bedding, and carpets or rugs) at least three feet away from all heat sources when cooking, or using alternative heating like a space heater.

- Don't leave the kitchen while frying, grilling or broiling food, and don't leave home while cooking.

- Keep matches and lighters

away from and out of the reach of children.

- If a fire occurs, get out and stay out. Call the fire department from a cell phone or neighbor's home.

- If smoke or fire blocks the first escape route, use a second way. If someone must exit through smoke, they should crawl low under the smoke to the exit.

If escaping through a closed door, feel the door before opening it. If the door is warm, get out a different way.

- If smoke, heat, or flames block the way out, stay in the room with the door closed. Signal for help using a brightly colored cloth at the window.

If there is a telephone in the room, call the fire department and tell them the location.

### PPHM to give tour of Adobe Walls Battle Site

CANYON — As part of Texas Archeology Month, Dr. Jeff Indeek, Chief Curator and Curator of Archeology, Paleontology, Ethnology, Geology, and Biology at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, will give a walking tour of the Adobe Walls Battle site, telling about the history of the battle, both lore and fact.

Indeek will also talk about artifacts excavated from the site, which are now housed at PPHM.

The site is in rural Hutchinson County, so participants will need to pre-register with the museum to receive a map of the specific location as well as other information. The site is primitive with no water or restroom facilities, so participants will need to plan accordingly.

The site was the catalyst for the Red River War, a series of U.S. military and Indian skirmishes during 1874-1875 that resulted in the return to reservations for most Southern Plains Indians.

## Drugs in the News

### A New Form of Gout Relief

The FDA recently approved a new drug for the treatment of gout. It is indicated in persons who have failed to respond to traditional treatments. Krystexxa, contains the active ingredient pegloticase, which is an enzyme that works by lowering uric acid levels. In randomized clinical trials Krystexxa administered as an intravenous infusion has been shown to lower gout flares by approximately 40% when dosed every two-weeks. The Gout Outcomes and Uric Acid Treatment studies demonstrated a complete response for gout tophus (deposition of uric acid crystals in body tissues, joints, and bones) in study participants within 6-months of treatment. Krystexxa may prove to be a valuable alternative for the estimated 300,000 cases of gout with disabling and crippling symptoms that are not adequately managed with conventional gout treatment.

Gout is classified as a type of inflammatory arthritis. This condition is caused by an excessive build-up of uric acid (body waste) in the joints, most often the big toe. Symptoms of gout typically occur suddenly, often with severe burning sensation and pain.

## meeting for Oct. 28

Landowners who were not accepted into the Conservation Reserve Program for one reason or another are invited to attend an "After the CRP" meeting on October 28 in Amarillo.

"Since the time for applying or reapplying for the CRP has come and gone, producers who have land that for some reason or another was not accepted into the program now face a difficult question: What do I do now?" said Brandon Boughen, Texas AgriLife Extension Service agent in Potter County.

"This conference addresses economically viable options for producers and landowners so they can make the best decision for themselves and their land," Boughen said.

The conference will be from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the AgriLife Extension office in Potter County, 3301 E. 10th Ave.

The program is free, and a noon lunch will be provided, but RSVPs are requested by Oct. 25. Call the AgriLife Extension office at 806-373-0713.

Open to residents and land-

owners of Potter, Randall, Oldham, Deaf Smith and Armstrong counties, the program will provide wildlife habitat, grazing, cropping and economic information for individuals who have land that has come out of contract or will come out of the federal program, Boughen said.

Ken Cearley, AgriLife Extension wildlife specialist, land management with wildlife in mind.

Dede Jones, AgriLife Extension risk management specialist, economic decisions.

Dr. Brent Bean, AgriLife Extension agronomist, cropping options.

Adam Acker, U.S. Department of Agriculture-Farm Service Agency, program information and question-and-answer session.

Attendees will be eligible to get three Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units: 2.5 hours of general and 0.5 hours of drift management.

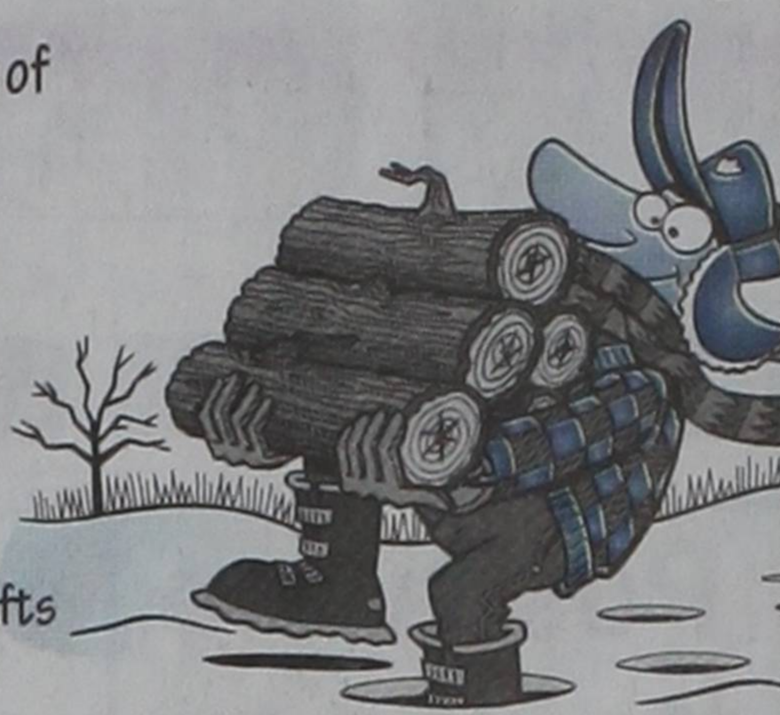

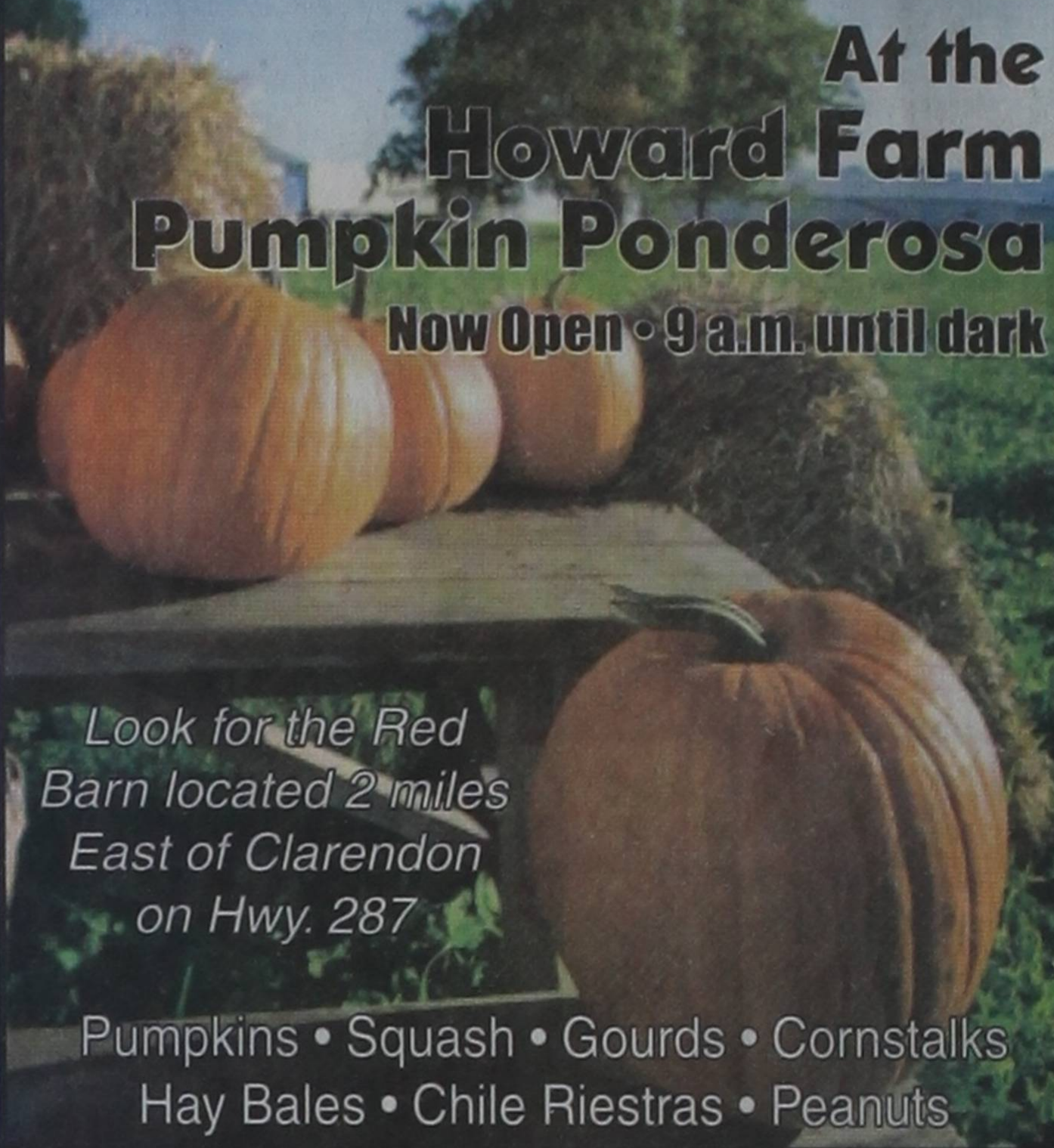
