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LIBRARY NOTES

More people consider reading their favorite recreation than choose any other diversion. Reading is named as a favorite spare-time diversion by 41 per cent of adults. In Poland it is estimated that 70 percent of all libraries were destroyed or stolen during the war. Russia has reported the loss of more than 55,000,000 volumes in the Ukraine alone. Half of the libraries of Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia were damaged. In China and the Philippines, the Japanese systematically destroyed every book they could lay hands on—excepting those which they removed to Japan. A complete list of destroyed or seriously damaged libraries would number hundreds. The American Book Center from its quarters in the Library of Congress expects to ship from one to three million books

and journals to these countries. The Library of Congress makes displays of interesting things from week to week. On National Aviation Day, August 19, will be shown a letter from Carter Glass, Secretary of the Treasury, to President Wilson in Paris, sent in 1919 via the first airplane to cross the Atlantic Ocean. Librarians from various countries come to the U. S. for observation and study—as the world becomes more library conscious. Among these just now is one from Australia, one from New Germany. Zealand, one from China and one from the House of Representatives acted favorably last week on a bill to increase the authorization for appropriations for books for the adult blind from \$500,000 per year to \$1,125,000. The Library of Congress has placed an order for 1000 Falking book Machines of a new model to be delivered in November and December. These will fill only a fraction of the need. Among the material which the

Germans removed to Bavaria for safe keeping and which is now in possession of the Library of Congress is Hitler's Private library. One of the most popular writers of fiction today is Frances Parkinson Keyes. Several of her books are on our shelves and we have just placed her latest "The River Road" among them. The River Road is the beautiful winding road beside the mighty Mississippi in southern Louisiana and the story is the saga of sugar, the time during World War II. Mrs. Keyes is a Virginian by birth, a New Englander by ancestry and marriage and a Washingtonian through force of political circumstances. She has traveled widely—has written much besides fiction, but is best known in that field. Her first novel was published in 1919, and she has written thirteen others since then. Her novels have been translated into six languages—she first entered the ranks of best-sellers in England. Gertrude Stein of literary fame died in Paris last week, and it is expected she will be buried in France, where she had lived for more than 40 of her 72 years. 

Final USO Drive Now Underway

In typical style Texans are accepting their responsibility to put the state over the top in the next and final USO drive, Governor Coke R. Stevenson, General Chairman, said today.

Texas' share of the \$19,000,000 quota is \$800,000. Stevenson added, "We are particularly pleased with the manner in which Texans are accepting the responsibility of leadership in the counties thru out the state. These leaders are providing the backbone of the organization necessary to make this drive a success."

Stevenson pointed out that there are still approximately 125,000 Texans in the service and we certainly cannot overlook our responsibility to them. He said, "We cannot overlook our responsibility to these men who are helping us win the peace. Morale problems in the armed forces are greater now than ever before and I feel that we owe as much to those in uniform now, as those who served during, the combat phase of this war."

Colonel Carl L. Phinney said, upon accepting his appointment as Campaign Chairman, "I have seen what the USO contributed over here and over there and now I am more than glad to serve in this capacity and help those who are still in uniform." He added, "The continuation of USO thru the year 1947 comes about thru urgent requests from both the Secretaries of War and Navy and the head of the Veterans' Administration." The program for this final year of operation will be to serve veterans in hospitals, men on occupation duty overseas, and those in training, or in transit, here at home. In keeping with the National USO policy of terminating its services where the need no longer exists, the number in operation has already been reduced from 85 to 26. At the same time, however, USO is expanding its operations overseas. Since VJ day eleven clubs have been opened in the Philippines; three in China; and seven or eight clubs

have been opened in Japan to date.

H. J. R. No. 49 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

H. J. R. No. 62 House Joint Resolution proposed an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b...

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund...

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State of Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have not been used for the purchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest of deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."
