LIBRARY NOTES

The establishment of good public library systems throughout the world will be the best possible insurance for the continued existence of democracy.

The mayor of Rio de Janeiro has authorized the establishment of twenty public libraries throughout the city. They will have no reading rooms but will lend books for ten days free to anyone who can identify himself.

Citizens of Dana, Indiana and vicinity have founded an organization known as the Ernie Pyle Memorial Library—with the purpose of making the library a national shrine in honor of the late columnist.

Nevil Shute has a new book, "Most Secret." This is his eighth book, and each one is different, but each one very interesting.

Perhaps the best known is "The Pied Piper" which became so well known through the screen version. His latest before this, "Pastoral," also became a best seller. Since Nevil Shute is a Lt. Commander in the Royal Navy, and "Most Secret" was held up by the British Admiralty for several months, it is safe to assume that it has some factual foundation. All of his books are on our shelves and are popular with our readers.

J. Frank Dobie, author of a "Texan in England," has returned

## NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

### REGISTRATION OF FIREARMS

The Bureau of Internal Revenue, United States Treasury Department, desires to bring to your attention that, under the provisions of the National Firearms Act, it is mandatory that certain types of firearms, as hereinafter described, be registered with the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C.:

Firearms of the automatic type, such as machine guns, sub-machine guns, or any type of gun from which a number of shots or bullets may be discharged with one continuous pull of the trigger.

Many of these firearms brought or sent into this country from abroad by members of the armed forces and merchant marine, either with or without certificates signed by commanding officers, have not been registered. Persons having in their possession firearms of the types described should immediately contact in person, by phone, or mail, the nearest Investigator in Charge of the Alcohol Tax Unit, Bureau of Internal Revenue, United States Treasury Department, who for the State of Texas is:

Investigator in Charge, Alcohol Tax Unit, P.O. box 5566 Bureau of Internal Revenue, U. S. Treasury Department 583 U. S. Terminal Annex Bldg. Dallas, Texas.

This official will furnish details relative to all provisions of the National Firearms Act and will provide Forms 6 (Firearms) and assist in the preparation thereof, as well as furnish information concerning the rendering of the firearms unserviceable, which it is requested be done as a matter of public safety.

It is illegal to transfer firearms of the types described except by the payment of the \$200 tax as provided by law. However, if the firearms are rendered unserviceable, they may be transferred tax-free as war trophies upon submission of the proper form to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C.

The National Firearms Act provides a penalty of a fine not to exceed \$2,000, or imprisonment not to exceed 5 years, or both, in the event any person is convicted on a charge of violating any provision of the Act, which includes failure to register a firearm of the type described and transfer of such firearm without payment of the \$200 tax.

## MOOS OF THE MOMENT

BY UNCLE BOB

There are some things which need a scrub, barn floors, barn walls or maybe boys' ears. But one "scrub" we can get along without is a scrub cow.

Some years ago, the USDA estimated that there were ten million scrubs in United States dairy herds. They figured these cows cost dairy farmers a billion dollars—half of it in the cost of feed and the other half in labor, housing, equipment and so on. Return from these cows probably didn't equal anywhere near this cost of feed, care and shelter.

That's a lot of cash to go down the throats of low-producing animals. You can't go out and knock ten million cows in the head, but every dairyman can improve his own situation, by eliminating boarders from his herd or replacing these scrubs with better producers.

All the colleges have figures which show that the high-producing cow is the cheapest cow to own, in the long run. Take Idaho's figures, for instance. Careful check of many cows showed that a cow with an annual fat production of 150 pounds cost \$46 to feed and returned \$27 above this to pay for labor, shelter and all other costs.

A cow producing 200 pounds of fat had a feed cost of \$50, returned \$45 over this cost. So it went in each fat production bracket until we get to the 450-pound cow. This animal cost \$75 to feed, but returned \$134 over feed cost and for every dollar's worth of feed brought its owner \$2.80! The owner of such a cow gets a good return for his labor after paying all expenses.



You don't have to be any better at figuring than I am to see clearly that these better cows are the ones to have in your own herd. There's a lot less work to milking ten 250-pound cows than there is to milking twenty 175-pound cows. Total butterfat production would be the same in these two cases, but total profit would be much greater with the ten heavier producers.

We still need lots of milk but in view of the feed and labor situations on farms, now would be a mighty good time to check each cow in your herd, find out which ones are returning very little over cost, and get rid of such boarders.

And along that line, you need accurate records to help decide which cows can be eliminated. The September-October Kraftsman included a fine barn chart, printed on heavy paper, which is just the thing you'll want to keep track of each cow's record. If you did not get the issue, write Uncle Bob at 500 Peshigo Court, Chicago 90, Ill., and ask for a barn chart.



Somebody figured out a few years back that in view of labor and equipment shortages it would be impossible for dairy farmers to produce as much milk as was needed during the war. But the dairy farmer didn't know it was impossible, so he just went ahead and did it.

So now that this job has been done, we can all turn to the next one—supplying a lot of consumers who gladly cut their consumption during the war years, in order to help supply a bigger need, and who are hungry now for high quality dairy products.

With the large production of milk now available for civilian use we have an opportunity to boost consumption of dairy products a lot higher than ever before. Authorities on nutrition tell us that the American people never have used as much milk and dairy products as they really need.

High quality dairy products will do much to encourage greater consumption. There's no surer way to bring the consumer back for more cheese, more milk, more butter, or more ice cream than to give her a product with a flavor and quality she can't resist.

Quality of dairy products of course starts on the farm so in the next few issues of this column I am going over again the step-by-step program of producing quality milk which we've talked about before. Sanitation and proper handling are the two points which tell the story.

Clean barns, clean cows, clean utensils and clean workers, proper cooling and handling are some of the things we'll bring up again, with some new angles and some new literature to talk about on these important points.

**WORTH WHILE COMMENTS**

**CATTLE GRUBS CAUSE HEAVY LOSSES**

Cattle grubs collect a big toll in money from Texas farmers yearly. Grubs also take a heavy toll indirectly from non-farm people. This is in the form of meat which the grubs make unfit for eating. Paul Gregg, entomologist for the A&M College Extension Service, estimates that grubs levy a tax of about five million dollars a year upon Texas cattle growers.

Here's the way he figures it. About 840-thousand of the two million Texas cattle slaughtered yearly are grubby, and these animals are discounted an average of nearly four dollars each. This is the main item of loss. But the remainder of the five million is in damaged hides, a reduction of twenty five per cent in milk flow, and greater expense in feeding stock affected by grubs.

And here's what the parasites take from folks who eat the meat: An average of two pounds per infested animal is destroyed. Gregg estimates that this would be sufficient for the meat ration of forty six hundred persons. And the leather lost because of damage by the grubs is sufficient to make about one million pairs of shoes. The money represented in the loss of meat and hides falls upon the cattle producers, but during meat and shoe rationing the consumer also has a large interest in the problem of controlling the parasite.

Gregg says that rotenone and sulphur is the most effective treatment for grubs. This mixture may be applied as a dust or spray,

and as dip when both grubs and lice are to be controlled. The time that the first treatment for control of grubs should be given varies according to section of the state.

The most desirable period is October 20th to December 1st in the Panhandle and West Texas. For more complete information see your county agricultural agent, or write to Gregg at College Station.

Technicolor sound arc welding films were obtained from mechanical Engineering Department of A&M College. These training films were very effective in aiding college instructors to show college students, war workers and military trainees, the fundamentals of arc welding. These films are ideal for educational and entertainment purposes.

Newt L. Cooper, Field Engineer, Big Three Welding Equipment Company, Ft. Worth, had charge of the discussion and discussed with group the farm value of electric welding and types of equipment suitable for farm work.

The group was composed of farmers, ranchmen, merchants, mechanics, agricultural leaders, and vocational agricultural students of Clarendon.
