### Bobby Philley Named Class A Player Of The Week

The following is a reprint from the Amarillo News Wednesday morning. We are always proud to see one of our local youth honored for their efforts.

The amazing Clarendon Bronchos, the surprise club of District 1-A this season, perhaps can tag much of their success on Bob Philley, who helped pace his club to its sixth win of the season by edging Canadian 14-7 last week. By scoring both touchdowns for the Bronchos and thereby helping upset a good Canadian club, Philley was selected as the Daily News' Class A Player of the Week.

Clarendon wasn't given much of a chance, by the pre-season experts, to win as many as they lost. But Ray Moore's hustling crew has thus far posted a 6-3 season mark.

Philley's work against the Canadian Wildcats was nothing unusual for him. He had, against the great McLean Tigers, scored one of the six-pointers as the Bronchos scored 28 points against the Tigers—the most scored upon them this campaign.

He has been one of the most consistent ball toters and scorers for Clarendon this term. Against Canadian, Philley scored from six-yards out in the first period to put the Bronchos out front.

In the second quarter, the Wildcats tied it up and in the third chapter, Philley broke loose for 41-yards to score the deciding touchdown.

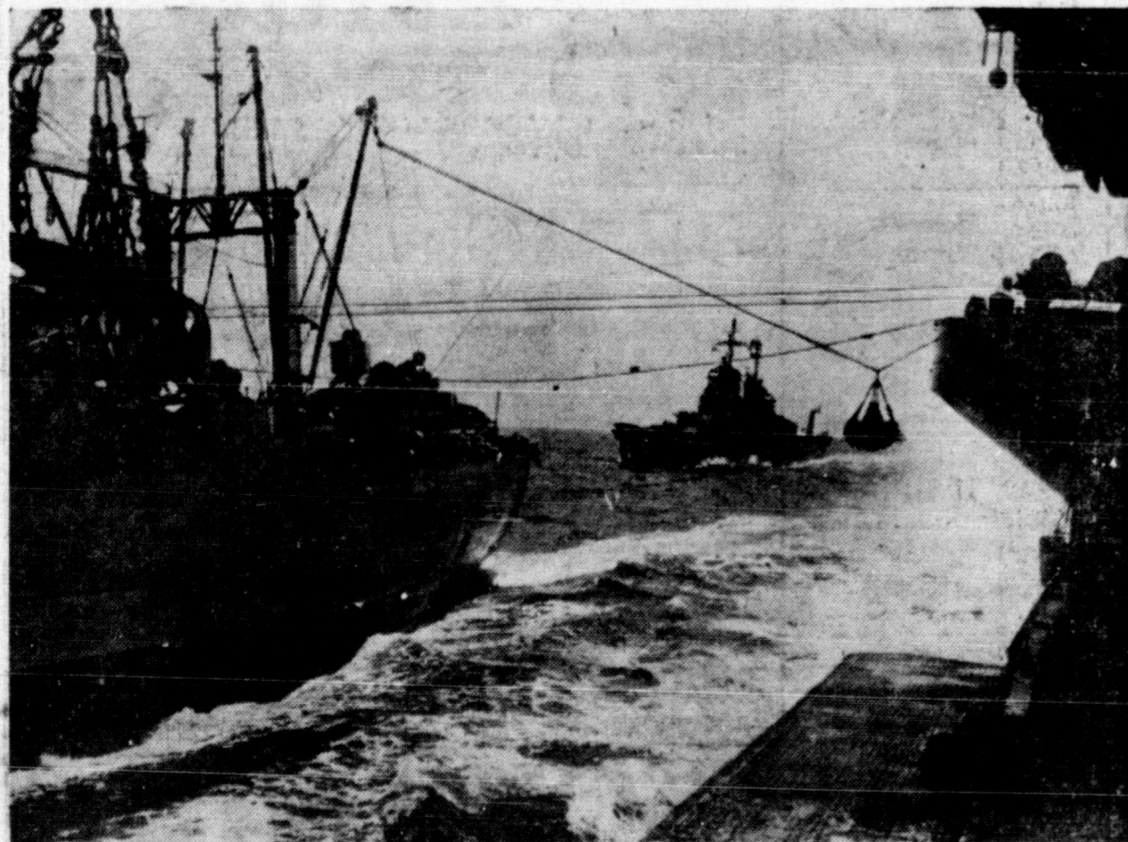

### 10,800 Bales Cotton Ginned In Donley To Date

According to a report Wednesday from W. H. Monroe, office manager for the Texas Employment Commission at Childress, 10,800 bales of cotton have been ginned in Donley County to date. This figure is estimated to be some 85 to 95 percent of the year's crop. Strippers are now being used rather extensively and harvest crews are beginning to leave the area, Monroe stated.

# FARM NEWS

## '55 COTTON ALLOTMENT SET FOR STATE

Texas' acreage allotment for 1955-crop upland cotton is 7,612,779 acres. This compares with 7,990,000 acres in cultivation for the 1954 crop on July 1. This acreage represents the State's share of the national cotton allotment of 18,113,208 acres, proclaimed by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson on October 14. The National allotment is the acreage which, at average yields, is required to produce an amount of cotton equal to the national marketing quota. Because of large cotton supplies, the national quota was set at the minimum of 10 million bales (standard bales of 500 pounds gross weight).

The state allotment will now be apportioned among counties and the county allotments among

farms according to provisions of the law. Individual farm acreage allotments will be made available to cotton producers before December 14, when cotton growers will vote on whether or not to use quotas on their 1955 crop. At least two-thirds of the growers voting must approve quotas if they are to continue in effect.

**GRAIN SORGHUM LOANS**  
To date we have made 86 grain sorghum loans, which indicates that a better crop of grain was raised than most producers expected a few months ago. The 86 loans have amounted to \$85,976.25.

**WINTER HEATING EQUIPMENT**  
Farmers should check their heating equipment and condition it for winter service before cold weather begins. It is suggested that this precaution may be the means of preventing property losses from fire during the winter.

## Make Courtesy Your Code of The Road

The popularity of books on etiquette indicates that, by-and-large, people are interested in manners. And a little observation of our friends and acquaintances will prove that most of them act courteously in the greater part of their dealings with their fellow men.

But there's one whole phase of courtesy that's sadly neglected—that phase is MOTOR manners.

When an individual opens the door of his car and slips behind the wheel, he too often changes from an apparently courteous, law-abiding citizen into an "auto-intoxicated" boor (i.e. a motorist drunk with the power at his command).

This lightning-like change has been the subject of some very funny jokes, cartoons, and stories. But there's nothing funny about its effect on traffic safety. The driver suffering from "auto-intoxication" is a menace on the road.

What causes "auto-intoxication"? There's no adequate answer to this question. But it seems to spring from a strange quirk in some people's thinking—a quirk that sets driving apart from other phases of living, making it something to which the ethics governing ordinary living do not apply.

As long as there are individuals who think this way, Texas will be plagued by senseless traffic accidents—accidents that could be avoided if the people involved would look at things from the other fellow's point of view.

Courteous conduct on the highway is far more important than courteous conduct in the living

room. It can mean the difference between life and death.

During March the Texas Safety Association is making an intensive effort to bring this fact home to the people of Texas. We urge all to support the Code of the Road program the Texas Safety Association is sponsoring in cooperation with the National Safety Council, the Inter-Industry Highway Safety Committee, and the National Committee for Traffic Safety. This program will be a success if everyone will take to heart the slogan: "Make Courtesy Your Code of the Road."

AUSTIN — Except in Dallas County, Texas voters heavily backed the Democrats and the 11 constitutional amendments at the November 2 election. In Dallas County, Republican Bruce Alger pushed into the win

column, defeating Wallace Savage, former state Democratic chairman, in the fifth district race for Congress.

Among amendments to the constitution, Texans okayed women jurors, more pay for state legislators, hiked terms for office holders to four years and upped expenditures for the state's senior citizens.

Governor Allan Shivers and Senator Lyndon B. Johnson came through with heavy majorities.

**Johnson Cooperative**  
In Austin for the election, Johnson, now assured of majority leader of the senate declared that the Democrats would continue their cooperation with President Eisenhower.

**More Taxes Inevitable**  
Legislative tax talk continued with two state officials believing that the convening legislature

will have to wrestle one way or another with taxation measures. State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert reports that spending from the general fund now exceeds the income rate.

He says the state has no choice except to provide additional revenue in some manner.

Representative Waggoner Carr of Lubbock voiced the same opinion, but hoped that government spending could be trimmed in some places.

**School Poll Stopped**  
A survey of high school students to determine feelings about segregation was stopped by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd after the poll was made public.

Shepperd said he halted surveys in Marshall and Waco high schools because public attention was influencing answers.

Results were to be used as part of the brief he is preparing for the Supreme Court in the public school segregation matter.

**Auto Inspections**  
By waiting until deadline time draws near, Texas motorists are causing a potential jam at official auto inspection stations. Colonel Homer Garrison Jr.

Texas Department of Public Safety Director, said that Texans are now 100,000 behind last year's figures. That means motorists will soon start stacking up at inspection stations, he said.

Garrison urged drivers to get inspections now and avoid the predicted jams. Inspection deadline is April 15.

**Turnpike Approved**  
A proposed \$58.5 million turnpike between Dallas and Fort Worth has been approved as a sound financial investment with construction to start next year.

Toll-road experts told the Texas Turnpike Authority that at the ratio of revenue to cost, the project would be one of the best in existence.

**Loan Firms Warned**  
The GI warning of "shape up or ship out" has been handed Texas loan firms by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd.

Shepperd's criticism of present operating practices of many loan and credit insurance sellers came at a meeting with representatives of state firms.

He said there was a growing tendency from some companies to "gouge borrowers" with high interest and service charges.

**Cigarette Sales Drop**  
Texas cigarette tax stamp sales for October fell a quarter million dollars below totals of October 1953, State Treasurer Jesse James reports.

Liquor tax stamp sales increased slightly during the month.

**Radar Warnings**  
A new traffic sign will soon make its appearance on state highways.

It's the warning, "speed limits radar enforced."

Texas Department of Public Safety Director Homer Garrison Jr. said the new caution boards will be placed on all approaches to highway stretches covered by radar-equipped patrol cars.

"Operation Radar" is planned to begin in mid-November on the main highways.

**Bid Investigation**  
Identical bids on electrical equipment received by the Austin City Council will be looked into by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd.

However, the investigation will not reach the congressional level as Council-woman Emma Long advocated.

Shepperd said that he is now gathering information from cities over the state that have experienced noncompetitive bidding. The Austin bids, from four different firms, will be included, he said.

Mrs. Long attempted to get the

council to back a request for a congressional investigation, but was outvoted.

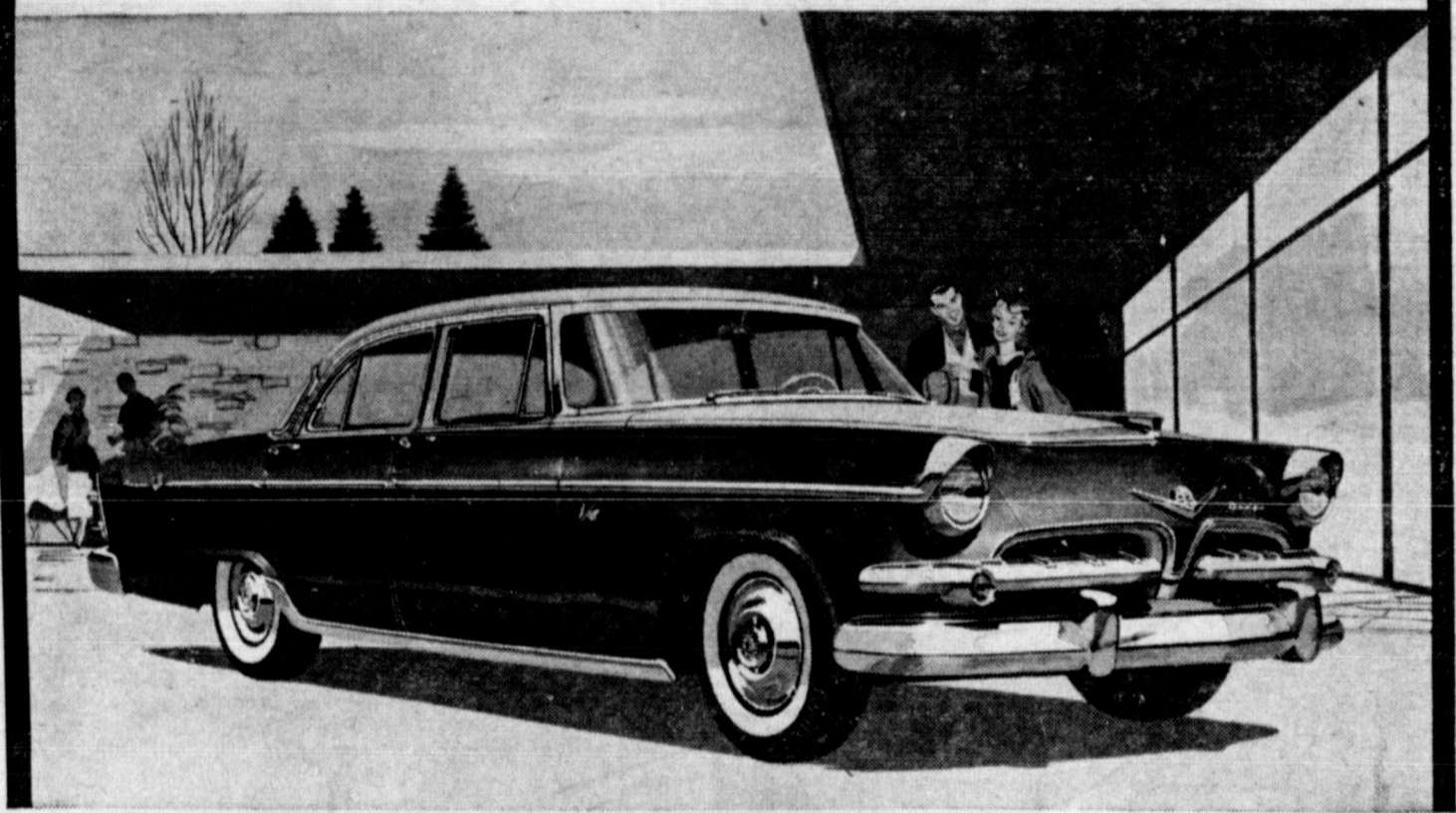

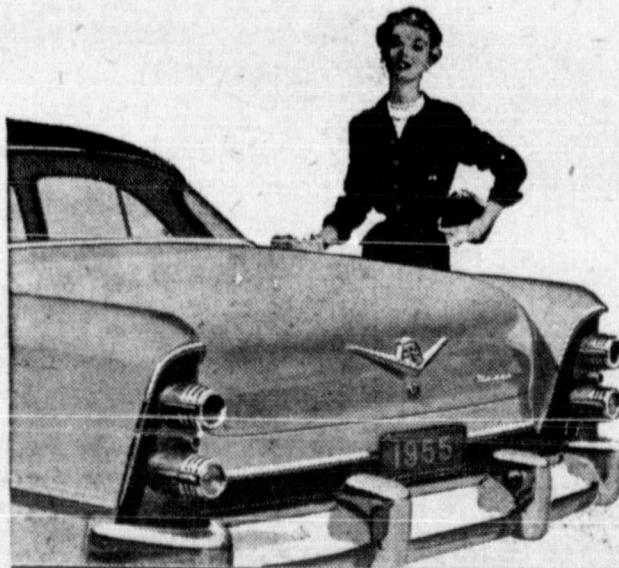

### Value of Grassland Farming

Texas Department of Agriculture

If you were going to put a price on Texas' tremendous acreage of grassland, how would you

determine its value? It would be impossible — for our grass is a priceless commodity.

Without improved grasslands, this nation would have a less total amount of food. Our diets would include less milk, butter,

cheese and meat. Our overall production of all farm commodities would experience an alarming drop.

The term "grassland farming" is not a new one, but it is a factor often neglected when compiling

statistics on the agricultural wealth of Texas. This state has more than 100 million acres of grass, forest and pastureland and much of it is unimproved. The farmer who is a good manager can double or triple production on hundreds of thousands of these acres through liming, fertilization and reseeding with more productive grasses and legumes.

These improved grasslands can be invaluable when made a part of the crop rotation system. Tests show that land planted to legumes and grasses for a year help assure a longer period of maximum production on cultivated crops. No schemes have yet been devised for agriculture that will maintain soil organic matter better than plans based on adequate proportions of grasses in crop rotations.

Experiments have shown that on much land, improved forage crops can produce as much livestock feed per acre, at lower cost and with less labor, than corn and other feed grains. In North Carolina, for example, on land capable of producing 50 bushels of corn per acre, improved pastures produced the feed equivalent of 87 bushels of corn. Wheat yielded the feed equivalent of 30 bushels of corn. Oats and barley yielded the feed equivalent of 24 bushels of corn.

Even more conclusive evidence of the worth of grassland crops is the fact that returns per man hour of labor were calculated at \$23.09 from improved pastures, as compared with only \$5.81 from wheat, \$3.69 from corn and \$2.79 from oats. Studies in the middle-western states have shown similar results.

Grassland agriculture can make enormous contributions to increased food production during times of national emergency. The

Army To Release Eligible Personnel Prior To Christmas New Year Season

Army personnel whose release from active military service would normally take place during the Christmas-New Year period will, with some exceptions, be separated between December 13 and 17 in order that they may spend the holidays at home, the

Department of the Army has advised Fourth Army headquarters.

Officers and enlisted men who return from overseas and are scheduled for separation during the holiday season period will be separated as soon after arrival as possible. To preclude overseas returnees from reporting for reassignment during the Christmas holiday period, leave for this period has been authorized.

The release policy applies only to personnel scheduled for separation during the December 13

to 17 period who are in the continental United States or its territories. Early departure from overseas stations to meet provisions of the policy is not authorized.

Exceptions to the policy are officers being released from active duty for purpose of reenlistment and retirement, who will continue to be processed in accordance with instructions issued in each case; non-regular Medical Corps, Dental Corps and Veterinary Corps officers who have not completed 21 months' active duty prior to release; enlisted personnel of Reserve components desiring to complete Reserve obligations, who may be retained until expiration of their terms of ser-

vice; enlisted personnel inducted or enlisted under provisions of the Universal Military Training and Service Act, as amended, who are eligible for release prior to completing two years' active military service, but who must complete 21 months' active duty.

Quarter Million Set For Big Game

AUSTIN—Reports to the Game and Fish Commission headquarters indicate that an army of about a quarter of a million deer hunters is ready for the annual fall venison derby.

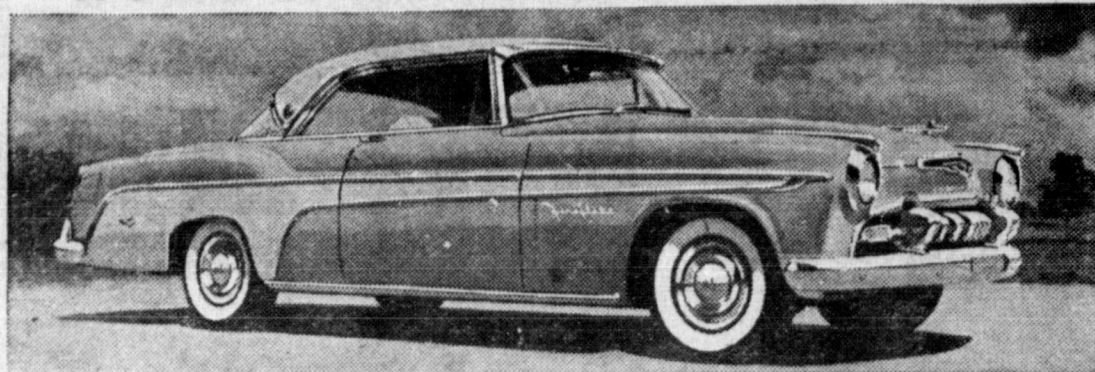
The Executive Secretary of the Commission said indications point to "a very good season considering the ravages of the long drought," and estimated the combined bag will be "about 40,000 bucks."

The statewide season in the areas covered by the General State Law ranges from November 16 through December 31. The twenty-eight county regulatory Panhandle area has a ten-day season beginning November 14. The West of the Pecos regulatory area, comprising nine counties, shoots from November 20 through November 25 inclusive. A nine-county Possum Kingdom group hunts from November 16 through November 30, inclusive.

There are so many other local county seasons that the Executive Secretary advised hunters to study a Game Law Digest, available through license dealers, or contact their local Game Wardens, or both.

Two buck deer may be taken under the General State Law but the other periods provide for only one male deer per person per season. A legal buck deer is described as one "with a pronged horn." Hunters were cautioned to know their horns since late re-

ports from the Hill Country, which comprises the main deer area, show an unusual population of spike bucks, or one year olds, running to as high as 40 per cent of the entire deer herds in most areas.

A feature of this year's overall deer harvest will be the taking of more than 2,000 antlerless deer in Mason, Gillespie and Llano counties in a move to reduce overpopulation and reduce the herd dieoff caused by shortage of food from the drought. Dates for this hunt are December 1 to 15, inclusive. Special permits are required. Interested hunters should write the Chambers of Commerce

at Fredericksburg, Mason or Llano.

Another innovation will be the harvest of fifty surplus buck deer on the Kerr Wildlife Management Area near Kerrville. A drawing was held to determine eligible hunters for this free shoot from November 16 through November 20, inclusive.

The Executive Secretary said landowners and ranchers reported "a normal interest" in deer leases. He urged hunters to observe the law requiring tags attached to their licenses to be af-

fixed to their bucks.

Coinciding with the deer shoot, is the wild turkey season under the General State Law and under assorted county laws. The General State Law limit is three gobblers. The limit varies under regional and county laws. Deep South Texas reported the best turkey population.

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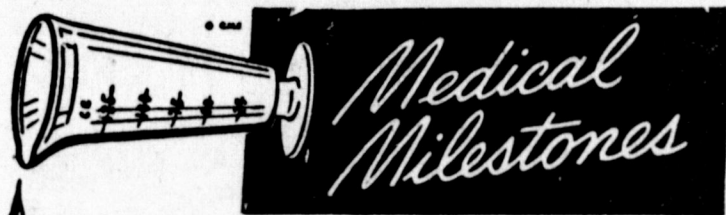

SOCIAL SECURITY FOR FARM FAMILIES

The 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act now bring Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance to most farm families.

These amendments go into effect January 1, 1955 and make two main changes concerning farm people. These major changes will be explained below:

Coverage of Farm Employees If you hire farm help on your farm, or if you do farm work for other farmers, the following changes are important to you:

1. Whether farm work is covered for social security purposes, starting January 1, 1955, depends

on the amount of cash wages earned, not on the number of days worked. Any employee paid \$100 or more in cash wages for farm work during a calendar year is covered for social security purposes.

2. If you are a farm worker and have earned this social security

coverage, be sure to show your social security card to your employer. If you are the employer, be sure to demand that you see the worker's card so you can copy his name and number directly from the card. You must have this information when the social security tax return is made, and

only by copying the name and number directly from the card can you be sure you have this information accurately.

3. Cash wages of less than \$100 in a year are not covered for social security purposes and will not be reported.

1. If your net profits are as much as \$400 in 1955, you will make a social security report on these profits early in 1956 when you file your 1955 income tax returns.

2. Even if your net profits are less than \$400 in a year you may, on a voluntary basis, report for social security purposes up to 1/2 of your gross income before expenses, not to exceed \$900.

3. This voluntary coverage applies only if you have net profits of less than \$400 — coverage is compulsory if your net profits are as much as \$400.

Purpose of Federal Old-Age And Survivors Insurance

1. To pay retirement insurance to covered employees after reaching age 65, and in some cases to the wife or children of such persons.

2. To pay survivors insurance, in monthly payments, to the survivors of deceased workers.

How The Program Is Financed

1. For employees, the tax rate is 2% of the cash wages paid, with the employer paying a matching tax of 2%.

2. For the self-employed farm operator, the tax rate is 3% of net profits up to a maximum of \$4200 per year.

Any social security office will be glad to supply further information. The social security office for the Texas Panhandle is located in room 324 of the New Post Office Building in Amarillo. Regular visits, at least one a month, are made from that office to practically all County Seat Towns in the Panhandle. 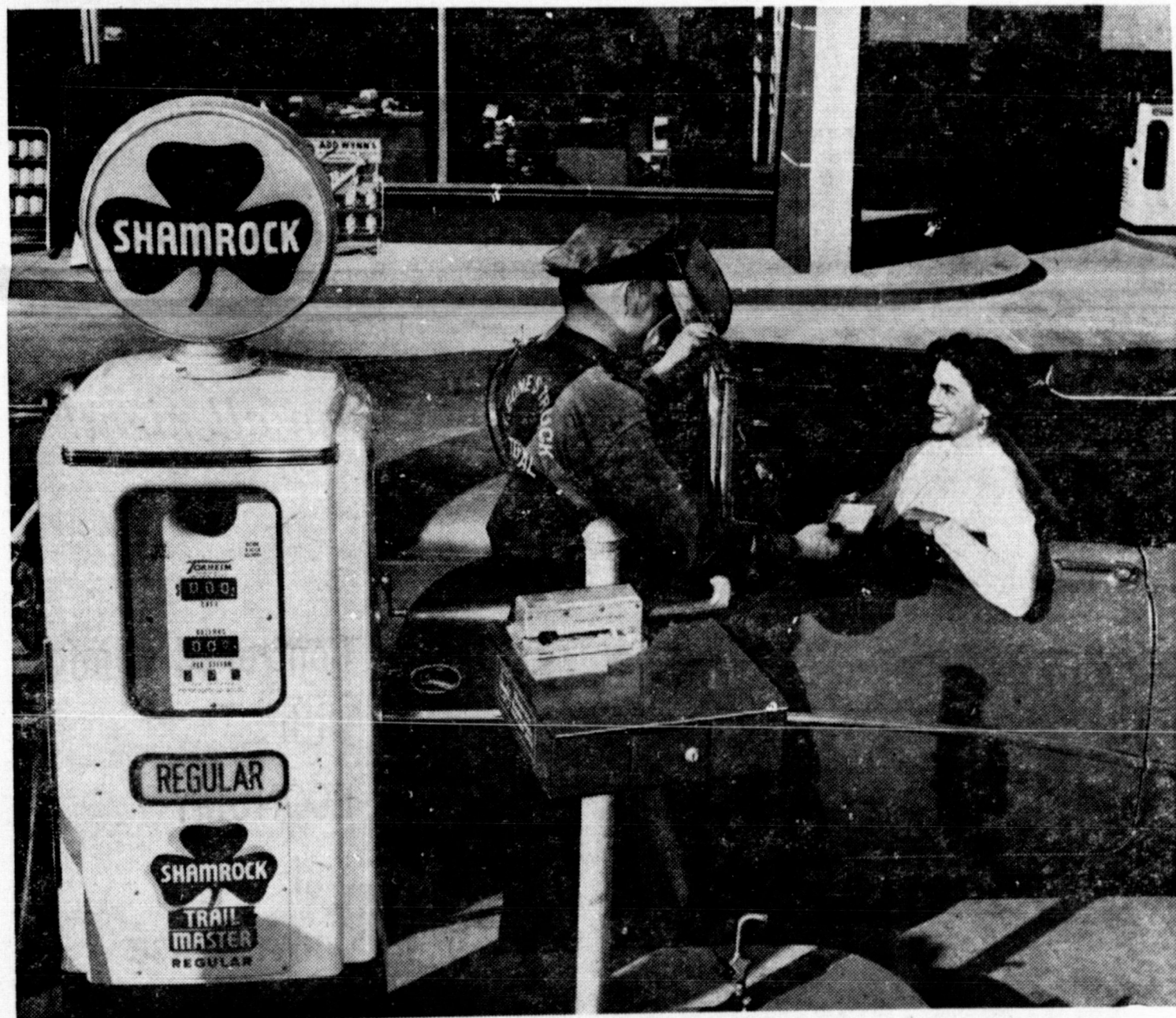

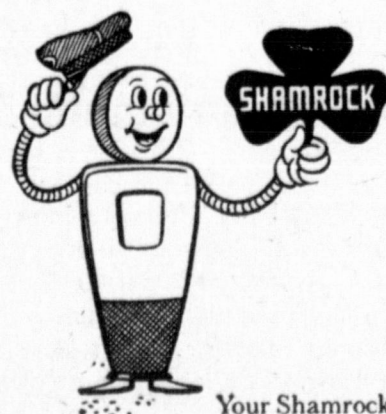

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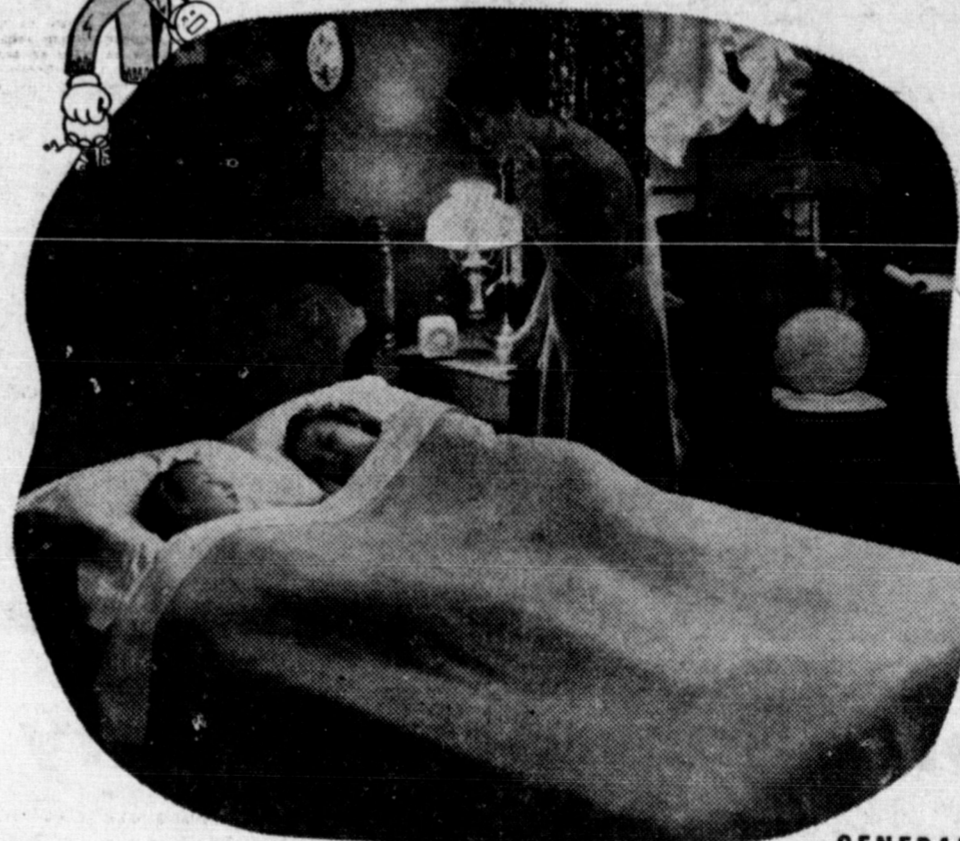
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
