Special to the Amarillo News.

Hereford, Texas, Aug 11—A fine rain fell here last Friday, which insures good crops and fine grass.

Hereford continues to grow steadily. At present there are four dwelling houses going up. In fact, there has never been a time since the town started that there were not from one to seven houses under construction. Furgerson Bros sold out their ranch and cattle, except the 2-year-old steers, the consideration being \$17,600, all cash. They will either go into the hardware business here or take stock in the bank which is being organized. The latter will be known as the Hereford National Bank and will be composed of Deaf Smith county stockmen.

E Carter sold to B T Bell, of Dimmitt, the first part of the week, his entire flock of sheep, the consideration being \$9,000. Mr Carter is building a nice residence in town in which to spend his declining days.

Deaf Smith county yearling steers were sold last week to a Kansas man at prices ranging from \$20 to \$24 per head.

The Hereford school building was sold last week to Mr Clayton, of Big Springs, who will transform it into a dwelling. The contract will be let in a few days for the erection of a \$3,500 school building to take the place of the old one, the latter being entirely too small to accommodate the increased number of pupils.

There has been considerable excitement through this part of the country for the last week or two about what is believed to be buried treasure. About a month ago three suspicious looking men came into this country and at once began going back and forth across the prairie between the Tera Blanco and the Pallo-duro creeks, refusing to tell their business. Sometimes they would put up the plea that they were hunting work, but they always refused to work when it was offered them. A farmer whose place they seemed to hang around very close, took it upon himself to investigate, and, on following their trail, he found they were digging great holes in the ground at various places. It is believed they are looking for treasure that was probably buried by California immigrants in Indian times.
