1958 SOIL BANK WHEAT ACREAGE RESERVE

Notices of your 1958 Wheat Acreage Reserve payment rates were mailed on August 12th. The sign up period for 1958 Wheat Acreage Reserve will be between August 26th and October 4th.

A Soil Bank Base must be established for your farm before you sign a wheat acreage Reserve agreement. If you think you might be interested in placing some or all of your wheat acreage in the Soil Bank for 1958, please come by the office so that a Base can be established for your farm.

The Soil Bank Base must be approved by the County Committee before you sign an agreement. Your base will be determined by the crops planted on your farm in 1956 and 1957. It would help if you make a list of all crops you have on your farm this year. You will need to be able to tell whether the crops were harvested, cut for hay or grazed off for each year. You must account for your entire cropland.

If you have a Conservation Reserve Contract on your farm, your Soil Bank Base is already established and will NOT change.

There is a limitation of \$3,000.00 on the total amount of 1958 Acreage Reserve payments which may be made to any one producer. This limit applies to the total of all (both cotton and wheat in Donley County) Acreage Reserve payments. Except for the \$3,000.00 limitation on the total Acreage Reserve payments to any one producer, no limitation is placed on the number of acres which may be offered for the 1958 program.

Board Approves Budget For 1957-58

The Board of Trustees of the Clarendon Independent School District, at a special budget hearing on Monday night, August 19, audited and approved the budget for the local system for the 1957-58 school year. The budget for this year, \$264,845.00, represents a reduction of \$16,503.00 from last year's expenditure of \$281,348.00. Major items reduced this year include furniture and equipment, new buildings and additions, and the purchase of new school buses. Last year the elementary school was furnished with new furniture almost throughout and some new furniture was purchased for the high school. A total amount of \$16,166.00 was spent for furniture and equipment last year as compared to a budget of only \$2,000.00 for this year. During last school year an amount of \$5,636.00 was spent on the new fieldhouse and this year's proposed budget shows no amount for new buildings. Also, last year four new school buses were purchased at a cost of \$15,020.00, and it is contemplated to buy only two this year at an approximate cost of \$8,000.00.

The only item on the budget that shows any appreciable increase this year is in teacher's salaries. Last year \$134,393.00 was spent on salaries and this year the amount will be \$150,670.00, an increase of \$16,277.00. The increase is caused by the \$399.00 raise granted teachers during the last session of the Legislature, and also some teachers in the system have received higher degrees during the summer which merits higher salaries.

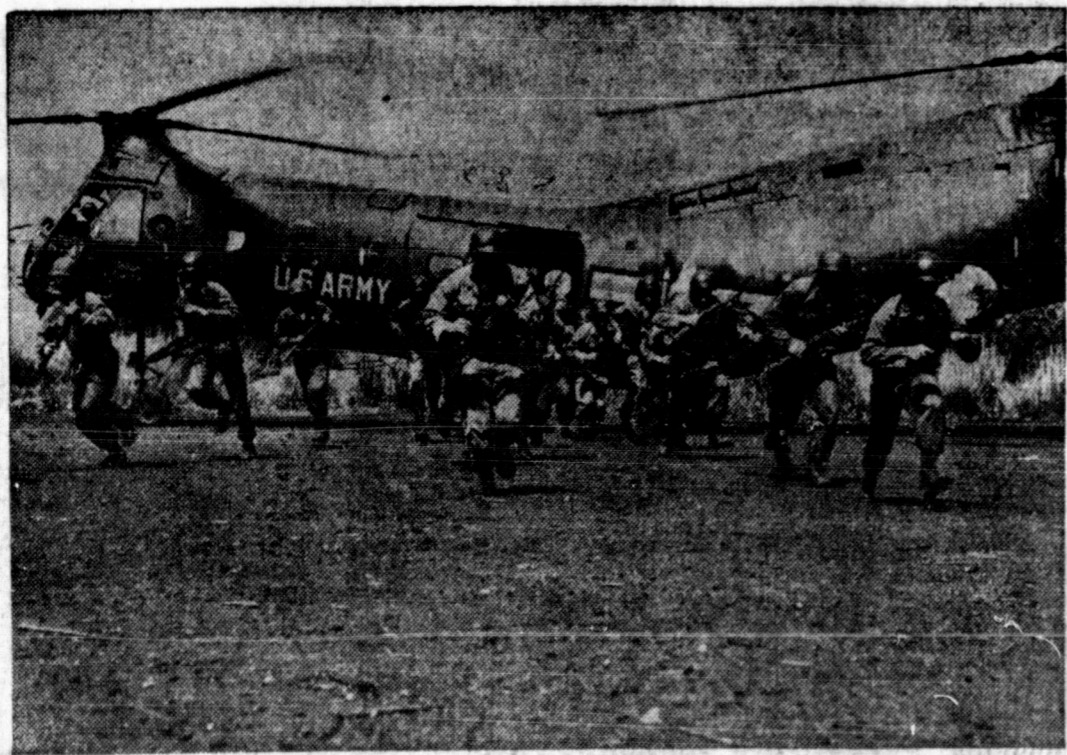

EFFICIENT USE OF IRRIGATION WATER

There are many factors that enter into obtaining efficiency in the use of irrigation water. There are varieties of sorghums or cotton better suited to dry land than to irrigation. Also we may get our planting dates wrong. These factors plus when to water, how much, and when to stop watering affect efficiency of irrigation. Watering cotton after the last week in August has definitely been proven to decrease cash income because it damages both grade and staple. High yields of sorghums and cotton under irrigation remove large quantities of plant food from the soil. The productivity can be maintained by growing legumes and supplying commercial fertilizers in a combination.

Sprinkler irrigation is the method of irrigation best suited to the super coarse textured land just off the high plains in our vicinity. This type of system allows you to use rainfall since sloping hilly land can be farmed on the contour with terraces.

Field leveling is another method used on the high plains to increase the returns from irrigation water. This method is used on flatter lands and areas leveled vary from 10 to 80 acres in a block. After a piece of land has been field leveled, you may grow row crops and furrow irrigate or put up temporary borders for drilled crops. Field leveling provides for a more flexible means of farming and watering.

The most widely used method of irrigation today is furrow irrigation. As a rule its efficiency is lower than any of the other methods of irrigation. There is no dirt moving expense to prepare the land for irrigation so this is the easiest and least efficient system used. For correct furrow irrigation, the grade should not exceed two tenths of a foot per 100 feet of length. Water should be applied four times as fast as soil will take it until water reaches end of run. Then after water reaches the end of the row, the amount of water applied should be cut back to equal the intake rate of the soil.

Information is available to you through Donley County Soil Conservation District, if you need help in figuring out an efficient irrigation system.

The Houston Endowment Foundation was created by Mr. and Mrs. Jesse H. Jones. This week we received a book from this Foundation, "Fifty Billion Dollars - My Thirteen Years with RFC". It will be an excellent biography to read and realize that miracles are still with us.

"The Peyton Place" by Grace Metalious was purchased by the Library, but it seems to be "quite a stinker" as the young generation would say. Mrs. Metalious - to quote from "Cosmopolitan" - has separated from her husband, and found some one more congenial. Her husband was principal of the school where they lived, but lost his position when her book was published. Horse Trading Is Not A Lost Art In West Texas

The West Texas Utilities Company needed a site for a new power plant in the Abilene-San Angelo area. Sweetwater owns Oak Creek Lake which is almost half way between Abilene and San Angelo. The Gulf Oil Corporation had purchased water rights to assist Sweetwater in the building of Oak Creek and to provide additional water for its refinery operations in Sweetwater.

A trade was made. A three-cornered deal, mutually beneficial to all participants was worked out. The West Texas Utilities Company purchased one half of the Gulf Oil Corporation's water rights at the lake, approximately one and a half million gallons per day.

Since WTU's new plant will be of the circulation type, which takes water in on one side of the plant, uses it to condense steam and discharges the water on the other side of the plant, the water will actually be used at the lake and Sweetwater will be relieved of its contract obligation to the oil company of pumping one and a half million gallons of water daily from the lake to the city limits.

The utility company obtained a central site for a plant on a 40,000 acre-foot lake adjacent to an existing 138,000 volt transmission line.

The oil company, by selling its surplus water rights, can recover a part of its cost.

The Gulf Oil Corporation's contract with the City of Sweetwater for the purchase of water was for a 30-year period extending from March 1, 1954, to March 1, 1984. During that time, WTU will purchase water directly from the oil company. A contract providing for the purchase of water directly from the City of Sweetwater after March 1, 1984, has been negotiated.

WTU Expansion Plans For Next 5 Years Calls For Expenditure of An Estimated \$51,000,000

West Texas Utilities Company today announced plans to spend an estimated \$51,000,000 during the next five years for construction of new electrical facilities in West Texas.

Cal Young, WTU President, said the company's expansion plans were based on recently completed surveys and studies which indicate that West Texas will greatly increase its use of electricity by 1961.

"Most of the proposed five-year outlay will go for the construction of new plants and installation of additional generating equipment, new transmission lines and expanded distribution facilities," Young said.

New generating equipment for WTU, including one new power plant, is expected to cost over \$22,500,000 and will increase by more than two-thirds the company's system generating capability.

WTU plans to spend almost \$15 million during the next five years for the construction and improvement of distribution facilities. Another \$11,500,000 has been allocated for the building of new high voltage transmission lines connecting WTU power plants and load centers. The remainder of the planned expenditure will be used primarily for general construction and improvement of WTU facilities.

"Electric power consumption is an accurate barometer of the health and prosperity of any area. Our undertaking this comprehensive construction program is indicative of our continued confidence in the future of the area we serve," Young said. "We are determined to do whatever is necessary to maintain a dependable supply of economical electric power for the anticipated industrial expansion of the area as well as for the expected increase in requirements of our domestic and commercial customers."

The announcement of the construction plans begins the second decade of the long-range expansion program begun at the end of World War II. Since then, WTU has invested \$60 million for new facilities and for enlarging existing facilities to provide electric power for West Texas.

Since 1946, the number of electric customers has increased 43%, from 72,860 to 104,000. The peak load has more than tripled, increasing from 73,400 kilowatts to 243,500 kilowatts. During the de-

cade, the company's generating capability has almost tripled, increasing from 83,190 to 250,700 kilowatts.

Estimates of future growth indicate that by 1961 the peak load will increase to 366,000 kilowatts. The new generating facilities covered by this five-year construction program will add 170,500 kilowatts to the company's system generating capability. Upon completion of the program in 1961, the company will have available a total generating capability of 421,000 kilowatts, almost 70% greater than the current generating capability.

It was pointed out that since World War II, not only has the number of residential customers increased by almost 47% but individual customers, by adding electrical appliances such as ranges, dryers, air conditioning units, television and other new appliances, have doubled their use of electric service. It is estimated that by 1961, the residential customer's usage will have increased another 50%.

WTU is also interested in the development of nuclear power. Paralleling the present \$51 million power development program, the company is participating in nuclear research activities.

Young pointed out that West Texas Utilities has for some time been associated with the Sargent and Lundy group, designers of nuclear installations at Argonne National Laboratories, Lemont, Illinois. More recently, WTU joined with 10 other private utility companies in Texas to form the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

This non-profit Foundation recently completed arrangements with General Dynamics Corporation for a four-year, \$10 million research program in the field of controlled thermonuclear reactions.

Young added that in the immediate future it was not likely

that nuclear fuels would become economically competitive with natural gas for electric production.

WTU's construction program is already underway. Work of installing a 5,000 kilowatt gas turbine unit at WTU's gas turbine station northwest of Fort Stockton began earlier this year. The new gas turbine unit will be in service in 1958.

Construction for the addition of major steam units at the company's Paint Creek and Rio Pecos Plants will begin this fall.

A 53,000 kilowatt steam turbine unit will be added at the Paint Creek Plant on Lake Stamford in Haskell County. Construction will begin next month. The unit is scheduled to be in operation in May, 1959, increasing the plant's capability to 126,000 kilowatts.

At the Rio Pecos Plant near McCamey, a 36,500 kilowatt steam unit will be added. Work is scheduled to begin this fall. The new steam unit to be added to the plant is designed for use with a 5,000 kilowatt gas turbine unit now at the plant. The three 6,000 kilowatt steam units now operating at the plant will be maintained, for peak load use. On completion of installation of the new unit in the spring of 1959, the Rio Pecos Plant will have a capability of 59,500 kilowatts.

Construction of other new power plants will begin early next year.

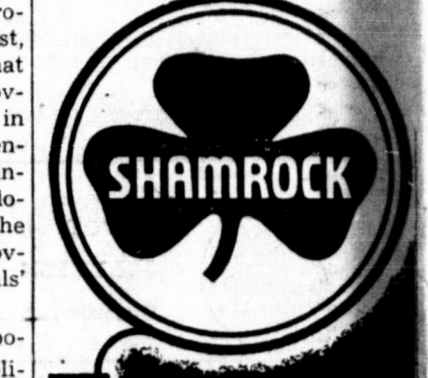

CIVIL RIGHTS
A civil rights bill has passed
both the House and Senate. Al-
though each House passed a dif-
ferent version of the original bill,
the fact remains this is the first
time since reconstruction days
following the war between the
states that a bill bearing such
title has passed both Houses.
Whether or not the title, "Civil
Rights", is a rank misnomer, has
been the subject of heated debate
in many quarters, both inside
and outside the halls of Congress.
The simple truth is that many of
the most vociferous proponents
of this bill are more interested
in passing the title of the bill
than they are interested in the
contents of the bill. As originally
drawn, the bill was intended to
create in the federal government,
acting by and through the At-
torney General, a plenipotentiary
force capable of reconstructing
the post Civil War reconstruction
days—the power to enforce fed-
eral edicts by bayonet. As a polit-
ical device, it was designed spe-
cifically as bait to woo minority
bloes. How successful it will be
politically can only be determin-
ed in the future. However, no one
should be misled by the many
maneuvers which are going on
in Washington at the present
time. I refer to the threats and
counter-threats between the par-
ties and officials thereof, includ-
ing the President. Much has been
said about a presidential veto.
The President has not, to my
knowledge, indicated he would
veto the bill. He did say formerly
that he did not intend to yield
concerning his views against a
jury trial amendment. It is the

consensus of opinion here that
the President did not mean he
would veto the legislation if it
contained a jury trial amendment,
but that he would continue to
oppose the right of trial by jury
in contempt proceedings. It is en-
tirely possible he would veto a
bill including the right of trial by
jury in such cases, but the feel-
ing seems to be, as I said before,
that the contents of the bill is
not the primary objective. The
primary objective is to obtain
the passage of a law at federal
level entitled, "Civil Rights Law".
Such accomplishment would pro-
vide two important results. First,
it will provide the opening that
the advocates of centralized gov-
ernment have so long sought in
our political philosophy; the en-
try of the federal government in-
to a phase of our political philo-
sophy that could result in the
pre-emption by the federal gov-
ernment of all the individuals'
political rights.
Secondly, it would create a po-
litical platform from which pol-
iticians could take credit for help-
ing to pass such a bill and assure
their listeners they would work
for amendments to the law which
would do away with the right of
trial by jury and other matters

unacceptable to advocates of
centralized government.
For these reasons, you can un-
derstand why the proponents are
more interested in immediate
passage of the title of the bill
than its contents.
Texas' first railroad building
charter was granted Dec. 18, 1836.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 61a of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to newly aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to newly aged, needy blind, and needy children, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 61a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 61a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Law, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person, and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Sub-section (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sub-section (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Sub-section, and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 4-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Sub-section, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to newly aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to newly aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

"AGAINST THE Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to newly aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to newly aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

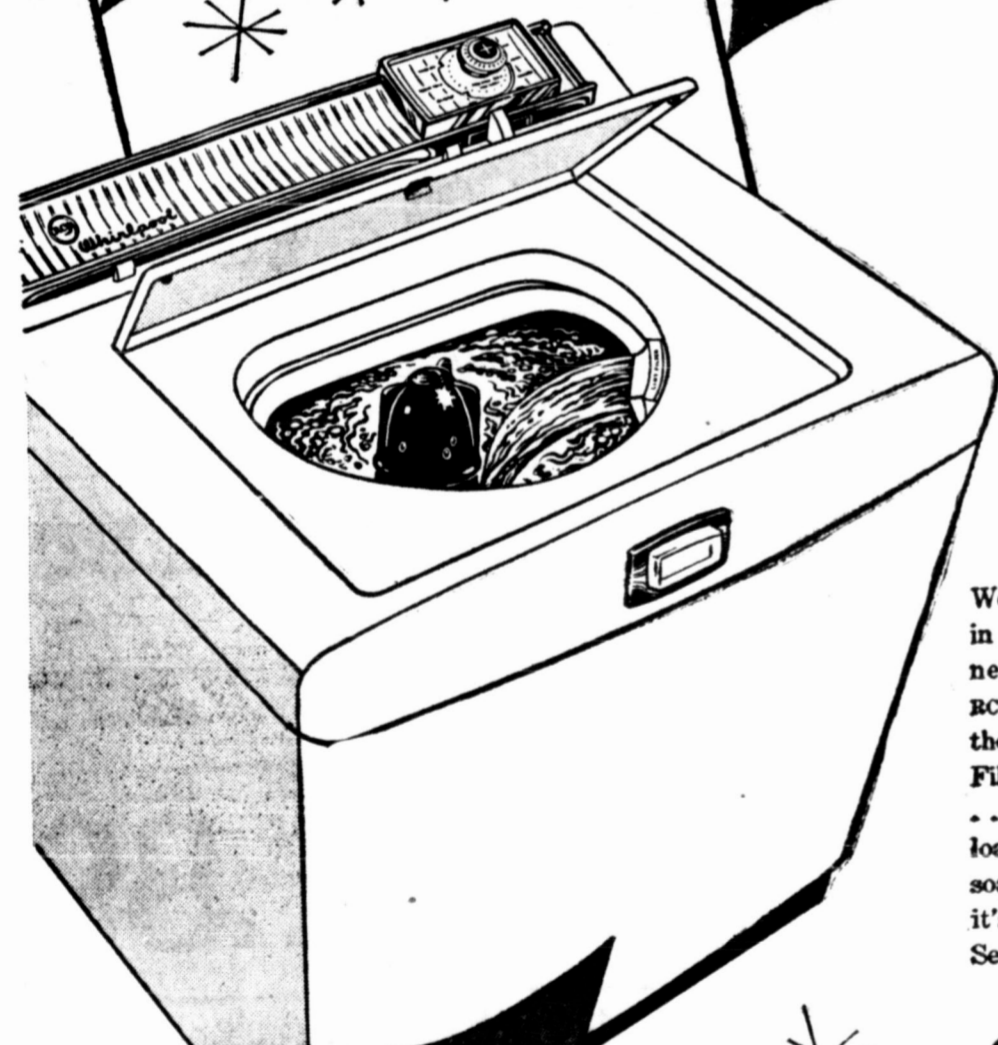

Detailed Weather Forecasts Possible For Two or Three Days In Advance - Maybe?

AUSTIN — Even with modern electronic computers, the weatherman cannot accurately forecast day-by-day variations in the weather more than one week in advance, University of Texas Meteorologist K. H. Jehn says.

"Many persons tend to believe that the computer is the final achievement in weather forecasting. They think that present weather conditions can be fed into the computer, which will then produce a perfect forecast. That is not the case, however. Computers may answer certain problems faster, but they are not necessarily more accurate than man," Jehn says.

Explaining just what the public may expect from professional meteorologists, Jehn says that detailed weather forecasts are possible for two or three days in advance, but the reliability of the prediction decreases progressively after the first day.

Individuals or organizations sometimes publish forecasts for conditions more than one month in advance, but they are misleading the public if they do not clearly describe the forecasts as experimental and of unproved value, he added.

Weathermen now have a hard time pinpointing tornadoes and other severe local storms. Such forecasts usually cover a much wider range in both time and space than is actually affected by a particular storm. Current research with electronic equipment is encouraging, however, Jehn says. Such research points toward improvement in weather bureau facilities for alerting the public to impending tornadoes and thus saving lives and property.

 AUSTIN—House members are rather short on enthusiasm for a special session of the Legislature, says Speaker Waggoner Carr.
 In a poll of the House, Carr received 101 answers from 149 members. Seventy said they didn't feel a special session necessary. Seventeen said they thought it was necessary; and 12 said they were willing to leave it up to the governor.

In announcing the poll results, Carr emphasized that he's all for lobby control and water conservation, the two measures Gov. Price Daniel has said he wants passed. House members, Carr reminded, approved both lobby and water bills last session.

But, said Carr, he still isn't convinced the state can afford the extra session without new taxes.

In reply, Governor Daniel repeated a previous statement that \$603,312 is on hand for legislative expenses, or more than twice what a short session would cost.

Outlook probably is this: A special session will be held. There'll be no open rebellion, though possibly a little legislative foot-dragging.

NEW LAND TROUBLE
 Who, if anyone, should pay the back taxes on land bought under the Veterans Land program, then forfeited by the purchaser?

State and local officials are in disagreement. Lack of specific legislation on this subject has resulted in two lawsuits.

In the early days of the land program a lot of veterans apparently bought land at more than it really was worth. When the drought came and things got tough, many fell behind on taxes and payments, finally had to give up and let the land go back to the Veterans Land Board. In time the board re-sold such tracts to other veterans.

Local taxing units, such as the Bexar - Atascosa - Medina Water District, say somebody has to pay the piper. It demands payment of the back taxes unpaid by the first purchaser and of the taxes that accumulated during the period when the land was forfeited to the state. Without this money, say district officials, they'll have a hard time paying off their bonds.

Viewpoint of the state, however, is that taxes ceased when the land returned to the board and that the resale was free of tax debt.

SCHOOL "WASTES" CITED
 Need for a little overhauling here and there in the Gilmer-Aikin school aid program is suggested in a new Texas Research League report.

Under the "minimum foundation" program the state contributes the money necessary to bring the smaller, poorer districts up to standard.

Research League pointed out that (1) under the scholastic apportionment formula (so much per pupil) some districts actually receive more money than their minimum foundation needs. And (2) guaranteed state contributions discourage local efforts to improve by raising taxes.

It's a system, says the League, that tends to perpetuate "educationally inadequate" districts.

HARRISON NAMED
 William A. Harrison, 47, apparently is to be the key man in a program designed to provide Texas with model insurance regulation.

Harrison, who has been serving temporarily without pay since June 21, was named by the Insurance Board to a two-year term, beginning Sept. 1. Senate must confirm the appointment.

The former assistant state auditor moves into the second highest paid job in Texas government—\$20,000 per year.

One of his first tasks will be to expand the department's staff of insurance company examiners. Recent legislation provided for 26 new men, bringing the staff to 65. Former department officials had complained they didn't have enough examiners to keep tabs on the thousands of companies operating in Texas.

IT'LL COST US TOO
 Texans who think the federal government is going to take care of all their highway problems now are due for disillusionment.

So says State Highway Commissioner Chairman Marshall Formby. Interstate highways paid for with federal funds will take care of only 16 per cent of the

state's traffic load, said Formby. Bringing the other 84 per cent of state roads to first-class condition will cost \$2,000,000,000.

With present funds of \$80,000,000 to \$90,000,000 a year, it'll take 22 years, he said. And by that time we'll need more four-lane roads.

U. S. SENATOR FROM TEXAS

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson told his fellow-Senators, in discussing the civil rights bill, he could not have voted for the bill that came to the Senate from the House of Representatives.

"But the bill, as amended by the Senate, seeks to solve the problem of 1957—not to reopen the wounds of 1865," he added. Speaking to the Senate a few minutes before vote on final passage of the much-amended bill, Senator Johnson announced that he would vote for it because it was effective legislation and protected the rights of the people.

"We do not have to dispense with basic rights—such as the jury trial—in order to have effective legislation," he declared. "Never before has a bill been debated so thoroughly in this Senate. And out of that debate has come something even more important than legislation."

"This has been a debate which has opened closed minds throughout the country. This has been a debate which has made people everywhere reexamine hard and fast positions.

"For the first time in my memory, this issue has been lifted from the field of partisan politics. It has been considered in terms of human beings and the effect of our laws upon them."

Only 18 votes were cast against the bill in the Senate.
