DOG TOYS FOR CHRISTMAS

No need to stick to the bone shape . . . you can cut circles or boots, leaving the top of the boot unlaced so that it can be filled with cubed dog

A tug-of-war toy is also easy to make provided you can get hold of one of Dad's or Junior's old belts. Cut off the buckle and punch a hole at the edge where the buckle was. Secure the two ends of the belt together by lacing a leather shoelace through the punched hole on the one side and the belt notch on the other.


