## NOTICE TO ALL FISHERMEN

This notice may be of interest to a large number of people of this area who like to fish but are unaware of the new State fishing law which went into effect Sept. 1, 1957. We dug this information up after one of our good citizens was given a ticket lastweek end for fishing with a rod, reel and using worms for bait here in our own county. Our good citizen was assessed a fine of \$27.50 in Justice of the Peace Court here.

The main substance of the new law is as follows: It shall be unlawful for any person to fish in any of the waters of this state without first having procured a resident fishing license. The cost of which is \$2.15 and may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Exceptions to the law is as follows: No person under 17 and no person over 65 shall be required to possess the license. No license required when fishing on own property or that where person resides. No license required of persons fishing with trotline, throw lines or ordinary pole and line having no reel or other winding device attached when fishing in the county of his residence. The fine for violation is not less than \$10 nor more than \$100.

This law means that any person between 17 and 64 that plans to use any fishing device other than ordinary pole and line, trot line or throw line, should acquire a fishing license to fish in his own county unless on own property.

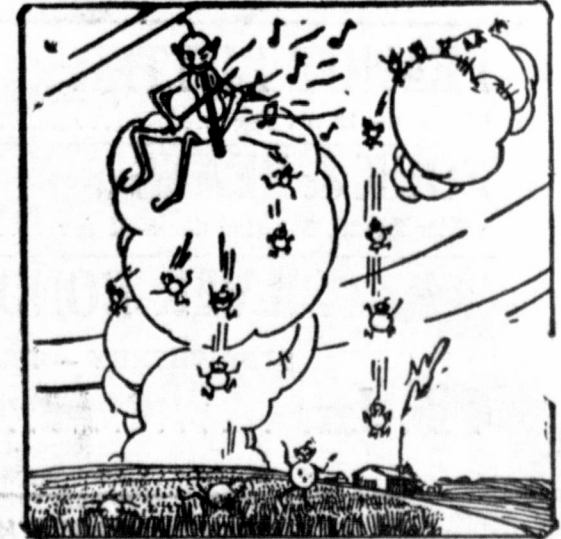

# FARM NEWS

from the County ASC Committee

## SOIL BANK ACREAGE RESERVE

If you have oats, barley, or any other small grain on the acreage you put in the Soil Bank, it must be destroyed by plowing under or shredded before maturity, but in no event later than May 10, 1958.

The Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee urged local farmers to be careful about their responsibilities under the Acreage Reserve of the Soil Bank during the coming crop season if they want to get the full benefit of that program. In a planting season reminder to farmers, the Committee pointed out that the signer of the Acreage Reserve agreement has undertaken a binding commitment to hold his reserve tract out of production during the 1958 growing season.

"It will be too bad," the Committee said, "if a farmer goes into the Acreage Reserve conscientiously and means to comply, but fails to keep informed about requirements and deadlines and loses his payment through care-

lessness."

With regard to the Acreage Reserve tract (land on the farm diverted from allotment crops to the Reserve), the Committee cited three main requirements as follows:

- (1) **Planting.**  
No crop may be planted on the Acreage Reserve before Jan. 1, 1959, except that with the approval of the State Committee certain crops may be planted in the fall of 1958 for harvest in 1959 or later, where that is the normal practice;
- (2) **Grazing.**  
The Acreage Reserve may not be grazed before Jan. 1, 1959, except under certain emergency conditions and with a reduction of the farmer's payment. Leasing of the land to others for grazing purposes is prohibited; and
- (3) **Harvesting.**  
No crop may be harvested from the Acreage Reserve during calendar year 1958.

In addition to observing these requirements on land placed in the Acreage Reserve, the Committee said, the farmer must comply with any other acreage allotments on his farm and must keep within the farm's total permitted acreage. The permitted acreage is the Soil Bank base — two-year

average of grain and row-cropless land placed in the Soil Bank. By willfully failing to comply with his Acreage Reserve agreement, the Committee said a farmer will lose his payment, and may, under certain circumstances, be subject to a civil penalty equal to 50 per cent of the payment he would otherwise have earned.

**Excess Wheat Acreage**

There are a large number of wheat farms that have been given notice of overplanting. The final date for destroying excess wheat acreage is May 10, 1958. This seems a long time away, however, it will soon pass. Weather conditions are always uncertain. It is safest to attend to the matter well before the closing date. Remaining overplanted on wheat allotments or "permitted" acres will generally: (1) involve marketing quota penalties; (2) no commodity is eligible for price supports if the allotment is exceeded; (3) and no payment for 1958 Wheat Acreage Reserve for your farm can be made until all excess wheat is destroyed.

**Wool Program.**

The 1957 marketing year for Incentive Payments on shorn wool is drawing to a close, however, if you have a Bill of Sale for shorn wool showing any date between April 1, 1957 through March 31, 1958, you are eligible to file an application, provided it is filed by April 30, 1958.

During World War I, Dr. Wiggins served at the Central Officers' Training School at Waco, and following the war, he reentered Hardin-Simmons and received his B.A. degree in 1919.

In 1920, Dr. Wiggins returned to Canadian as principal-coach, and two years later he became superintendent of schools there. During the years 1925-30, he received the M.A. degree at Yale, did graduate work at the University of Chicago, and returned to Yale for the Ph.D. degree.

From 1926 until 1935, Dr. Wiggins was professor of education and dean of students at Hardin-Simmons. He holds the LL.D. degrees from Hardin-Simmons and Texas Tech.

The speaker was named president of Texas Western College in 1935, a post he held until 1948, when he became president of Texas Tech. He resigned the presidency of the Lubbock college in 1952 to become executive vice-president and director of the Citizens National Bank in Lubbock.

Dr. Wiggins is a member of the Board of Directors of the Harvest Queen Mills and Elevator Company of Plainview, the Texas Tech Foundation, the Medical

Research Foundation of Texas, Inc., Hardin-Simmons University, and the Independent Petroleum Association of America.

He is a member of the Baptist Church, Phi Delta Kappa, Kappa Delta P, Phi Delta Theta, Lubbock Country Club, and the Lubbock Club. He is listed in "Who's Who in America" and the Biographical Encyclopedia of the World.

Peace Officers To Hold Convention May 8th At Boys Ranch

Peace officers from a five-state area will hold their fifth annual United Peace Officers of America convention Thursday, May 8, at Cal Farley's famous Boys Ranch.

The organization was formed in 1953 for the purpose of helping to raise funds for a school building at Boys Ranch, and since that time the peace officers have continued their interest in this unique home for homeless and so-called delinquent boys.

Members of United Peace Officers of America include all Texas highway patrolmen, sheriff's departments and city law enforcement officers as well as peace officers from every state in the union and parts of Canada.

Because members of UPOA recognized that Boys Ranch was rehabilitating boys who in many instances otherwise might have become problems for their own departments to handle, the organization, in its first resolution, stated one of its chief aims was to assist in the building program at the Ranch. As a result of their first campaign, sufficient money was raised to begin construction on Boys Ranch Independent School and, with other help, the school was completed in 1955.

The building, a fireproof structure of steel and Colorado stone, has three wings and is built to accommodate 500 boys, the eventual goal of the Ranch. Wings consist of the grade school wing, where there are seven classrooms and a library; the high school wing, with five classrooms, a library and audio-visual room; and the vocational wing, where the science laboratory, barber shop and six classrooms are lo-

cated.

In addition to the regular curriculum, the school offers extensive vocational training for its 236 students. It is a fully accredited, 12-grade system, employing 15 teachers.

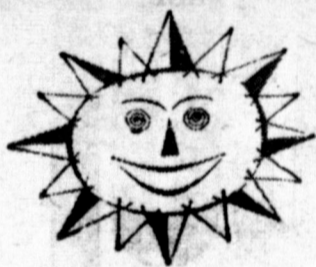

### Plans Underway For Memorial Hospital At Groom

Plans have been made and work is underway in soliciting funds to build a Memorial Hospital in Groom. The proposed structure is for sixteen beds, and to be so arranged to care for ten additional patients in case of emergency. The building and equipment will be completely modern and fireproof.

Ownership of the new hospital would rest entirely with duly elected community directors and officers and the hospital would be operated as a non-profit organization.

The building and equipment will cost approximately \$200,000.00. Half of this amount will be supplied through funds made available under the Hill-Burton law passed by Congress to assist in construction of hospitals operated on a non-profit basis and built under responsible organizations. This will leave \$100,000.00 to be raised by individual donations.

The Groom Osteopathic Hospital has served a large area for the past twelve years but the demands for more beds and more facilities makes the need of a larger and more modern hospital necessary.

The City of Groom has agreed to assume the responsibility as the sponsoring organization, and the drive for funds is under the direction of a committee composed of Mayor James C. Ludwig, C. L. Culver, banker; L. M. Britten, farmer; and Dr. John L. Witt. Dr. Witt, president of the Groom National Bank, said he would be happy to receive contributions and that all letters would be acknowledged.

Co. to its Northwest corner; THENCE West with the South line of Section 120, Block 2, T & P Ry. Co. Survey to its Southwest corner; THENCE North along the West lines of Section 120, T & P Ry. Co., Block 2, and Section 12, Block 2, J. Poitevent to the South line of Block B, John G. Adair

Survey, crossing Block 1, C. L. Benson, and Section 5, Block X, W. H. Martin, and intersecting the South line of Section 6, Block B, John G. Adair, East of its Southwest corner and East of the Northwest corner of Section 5, Block X; THENCE West to the Southwest corner of Section 6, Block B, John G. Adair; THENCE North with its West line to the Southwest corner of Section 11, Block B, John G. Adair; THENCE North to the Northwest corner of said Section 11; THENCE West to a point in the East line of Section 8, W. H. Martin; THENCE North to the Northeast corner of said Section 8, W. H. IV. That the number of landowners within the boundaries, above set out, is more than fifty and accordingly this petition is sufficient if same is signed by fifty or more of such land owners.

V. That the proposed district is to be organized under the Provisions of Section 59, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided in Chapter 25, General Laws, enacted by the 39th Legislature at its regular session in 1925, and all amendments thereto.

VI. That the purpose of the organization of the District shall be for, and include all works, plants and facilities, and appliances if any and all manner incident to, helpful or necessary, in the control-

ing, storing, preserving and distribution of its waters and flood waters, the waters of its creeks and streams, for irrigation power, and all other useful purposes, the reclamation and the irrigation of its arid, semi-arid and other lands needing irrigation, the reclamation and drainage, the conservation and development of its waters, and the preservation and conservation of all such natural resources of the State; and to control, abate and amend any shortage or any harmful excess of water and to protect, preserve, and when necessary restore the purity and the sanitary condition of waters within said District.

VII. That without limitation upon the general powers of the District, above set forth which may be employed in the future, the District's first project will be to provide, dams, reservoirs, checks, and all works, facilities, plants and appliances incident to, helpful or necessary in the controlling, storing, preserving, and distributing the waters and floodwaters from the watershed and of the creeks, channels and rivers in the District in such manner as will result in the preservation and conservation of the natural resources of the area and the control or abatement of harmful excesses of water. In this connection the general nature of the work to be done is the construction of a series of dams, reservoirs and checks within the limits of the said District with the aid and assistance of the United States Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service.

VIII. That a necessity exists for the organization of said district and for the accomplishment of its first project, in order to preserve, conserve and put to beneficial use the natural resources of the area, and in order to control and abate harmful excesses of water and the erosion and waste accompanying same.

IX. That the purposes of the proposed District are practicable and feasible due to the nature of the soil and contour of the land within the area of the proposed District. The District and its project will serve and be a benefit to all of the land lying within said District and will be a public benefit and utility. The resulting benefits to the land, land owners and citizens of the District will greatly exceed the cost. The topography of the land presents no feature which would make this project impracticable from an engineering standpoint.

X. Petitioners state that the services of the engineers of the United States Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service, have been secured in connection with the planning of the proposed District's first project and said engineers have estimated that the cost thereof will be approximately \$2,700,000.00.

XI. That upon estimates, plans, specifications and advice of the engineers of the United States Soil Conservation Service, petitioners represent that a complete system of soil conservation dams and reservoirs may be provided within the District as its first project, and said petitioners will, at the hearing requested, demonstrate to the Board the purpose, utility, feasibility, need and necessity for the District and its proposed work in reasonable detail and with reasonable certainty.

WHEREFORE, your petitioners have caused this petition to be filed in triplicate, one with the

County Clerk of Hall County, one with the County Clerk of Donley County, and one with the Board to which this petition is directed, and petitioners respectfully pray that said Board of Water Engineers make and enter an order for a hearing on such petition before said Board, as provided by law, and that a date be fixed for such hearing and that notice of such hearing be given as provided by law. Petitioners further pray that upon a hearing of this petition, it be in all things granted and that the proposed Water Control and Improvement District be created and that said Board of Water Engineers appoint directors for said District, as provided by law, and your petitioners hereby further pray for all such matters and relief and orders necessary and appropriate in the premises to which they may be entitled even though not specifically mentioned herein.

DONLEY COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Numerous cooperators of the Donley County SCD planted winter cover crops for soil conditioning and improvement and protection against wind and water erosion. Some of the cooperators known to have seeded cover crops last fall are A. M. Moss, S. J. Tolbert, F. L. Hutson, C. B. Morris, J. D. Swift, and O. J. Rackley.

Rye grass appears to be one of the most popular cover crops in the district this winter. C. B. Morris seeded one field to rye grass and vetch and one to small grains which he is grazing. One of the few plantings of Austrian Winter Peas in the district was made by O. J. Rackley. Plantings of winter legumes for cover crops were scarce this year, probably due to the poor results experienced from many of these crops during the recent drought years.

Farmers should be selecting their summer cover crops soon. Brabham and Chinese red cowpeas and mung beans usually give good results when seeded with milo. These legumes will remain after the grain harvest, furnishing good protection to the soil and also serving as a soil improving crop. Common millet also serves as a good summer cover crop. When grazed moderately, it will help to maintain the physical condition of the soil and prevent erosion. The local SCS technicians will be glad to assist you in selecting the summer cover crop best suited to your individual need and soil capability.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN—Next summer's campaigners are tuning up to play from a familiar score—the conservative vs. liberal melody Texas voters have been hearing for years.

But, like the rock 'n roll version of a Stephen Foster song, it may sound different. Campaign pitches will have to keep time to the fast beat of 1958's new issues. Such as "curing the recession" and "catching up in education."

On the federal level, talk is of cutting taxes to give the people more money to spend. Here in Texas, it's raising taxes to give the state more money to spend.

In a situation like this, a voter can get confused.

For each issue, there'll be several choruses—more or less drowning each other out. Some will chant of searing away recession with large-scale government spending. Others will say the only way is to give business a break.

For schools, soem are calling for a nationwide program to require more work from students, provide better teachers at better pay, more lab equipment, scholarships for promising students, etc. But many Texans say "never" to any scheme that would eat away at local control over schools.

On how to get money to bail out the state treasury, there are already a number of tunes being struck up—sales taxes, income taxes, corporation taxes, more economy in government—but no prospect of close harmony.

**COWBOY HAT IN RING**  
One morning, in between pouring his coffee and finishing his bacon, William A. Blakely decided to run for the U. S. Senate. Blakely served as junior U. S. senator for four months last year

as the appointee of former Gov. Allan Shivers. He was not a candidate in the special election when Ralph Yarborough was named to succeed him.

Son of Oklahoma homesteaders who had to "work out" for other farmers, Blakely-parlayed a little grit into a lot of money—in law, banking, real estate, ranching, oil, gas, insurance and an air line.

He'll not be troubled by most candidates' sorest problem—raising campaign funds.

Incumbent Yarborough has made statements leaving the door open for either of two courses—running for another Senate term or a fourth try at the governorship.

**PURSE-WATCHER NEEDED**  
Texas' governor should have some power to keep a hand on state purse strings after the Legislature leaves.

So says Vernon McGee, director of the Legislative Budget Board. McGee heads the board with responsibility for studying the fiscal needs of all state departments and making recommendations to the Legislature.

Under present system, McGee pointed out, after the Legislature makes its appropriations, only the individual department heads are responsible for how the money is spent. Many administrators are admirably "tight-fisted," McGee said, but others will spend money, that could be saved for later needs, just because they have it. McGee's recommendation: give the governor authority to ask for

periodic reports from departments and to cut from their budgets items no longer necessary.

Most other states have this system, said McGee.

**STILL TOO MUCH OIL**

Despite severe cuts in production, Texas is still producing more oil than anyone wants to buy. It could mean even deeper cuts and more idle drilling rigs next month.

Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson noted an increase of 1,208,000 barrels in stocks of crude oil. It shows, he said, that April's lowest-in-history, 8-day production pattern was needed.

He suggested that new wells coming in may make an even lower pattern necessary for May.

**SET TO GO**

Texas Highway Department is poised for a \$38,000,000 speed-up in road building if a new stepped-up federal aid bill becomes law.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said the bill, sent to the President by Congress, would en-

able Texas to avoid a summer lull in highway construction. Texas has already planned the projects in anticipation of the money, said Greer.

Designed as an anti-recession measure, the bill specifies the extra money must be spent within 12 months.

It won't put all the unemployed people to work, said Greer, but it will stimulate the economy. And, he added, it's not a "leaf-raking job."

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## TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT

Ten persons, representing themselves as former Members of the Cuban Congress, have sent a memorandum to the Members of the United States Congress. This memorandum includes statements of a very serious nature, insofar as the United States is concerned. For instance, the second paragraph of the letter is as follows:

"There is at present a widespread belief in Cuba that the United States Government is supporting Batista's ruthless dictatorship in contradiction to the repeatedly declared American policy in favor of world freedom and democracy. This belief is buttressing Batista's dictatorship, prolonging the terrible civil war now ravaging the country and seriously impairing the prestige and good-will of the United States in Cuba."

You will note that the statements contained in that paragraph are conclusions of the writers and not factual; however

this paragraph is followed by another paragraph containing four subheads purporting to document supporting facts. A close observation of the matter contained in the four subheads reveals the assumption of facts rather than the documentation thereof.

The information has been sent out by one Dr. Lincoln Rodon, 5121 Alton Road, Miami Beach, Florida, and he is joined by 9 others. The gravity of the charges would certainly warrant a full investigation by the Department of State, the Department of Justice, and the Department of Defense.

### THE REORGANIZATION OF THE DEFENSE DEPARTMENT

The President's proposal to reorganize the Defense Department will probably cause major firestorms on Capitol Hill. There is a decided division of opinion as to the role that should be played by civilians in the military setup. It is accepted that the military has always been very jealous of what it considers its jurisdiction. This applies not only to the military as a whole, but to the several departments of the military, to wit, the Army, the Air Force and the Navy. In fact, there have been rumors of jealousies cropping up between the different branches of

each of the departments. It is these inter-service rivalries that could be the major factor prompting the President's new proposal. It will be remembered that it was only a few years ago that our military establishment was reorganized and the Office of Secretary of Defense created. This new office was given cabinet status and replaced the former Secretary of War and Secretary of the Navy. That reorganization was supposed to answer a lot of the inter-service problems and unify under one command the operations of our military. The purpose to be accomplished was a more effective military operation at less cost to the taxpayer.

It has been argued many times that unification was not accomplished by that reorganization and that costs were not reduced but increased; that the actual result was nothing more than the creation of a new and additional department of the military. It would certainly be safe to say that the sought after result was not accomplished by the previous reorganization; otherwise, there would be no need for the new proposals of the President. Whether or not the President is right in this new approach is not the controlling question in my mind. The fact is that something must be done in order to clarify our entire military establishment. Our national security program now consumes over 60c of each tax dollar. In other words, the security program is slated to re-

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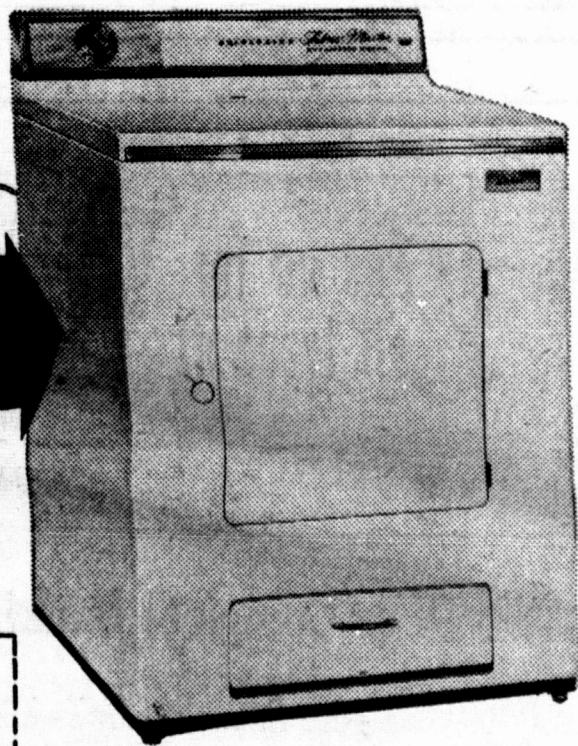
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
