

Farm Bureau makes strides during 1994 election year

DALLAS – The property rights movement made great strides forward in 1994, as Dexas farmers and ranchers discovered a "sense of activsm." that was the message delivered this past week by Bob Stallman, president of Texas Farm Bureau, at that organization's annual convention in Dallas.

"It was the year the environmental extremists and their allies in government reached too far, seeking more power and more of your freedom," Stallman said. "Not long ago, many of us believed the great extremist juggernaut could not be stopped. This year it has been slowed to a crawl." election of George W. Bush as governor.

Stallman said the property rights debate will center on developing and changing regulatory programs that protect the environment without compromising property rights.

The Farm Bureau also outlined the organization's goals in the writing of the 1995 farm bill.

Pinting out that farm program payments have been halved since 1986, Stallman said, "The \$12 billion used to support agriculture in 1994 may sound like alot in political speech, but frankly, it is a very small investment in food security for America."

Further drastic cuts in farm programs, Stallman said, would leave U.S. farmers comgupeting against the governments of other nations that continue to subsidize agriculture. This, he said, would hurt U.S. peritformance in the balance of trade. the U.S. exports more agriculture goods than it imports.

Stallman emphasized that Farm Bureau will work to preserve a farm program safety net for farmers that has already reached minimal proportions. More than 1,200 farmers Spring Cleaning? Sell Those Unwanted Items In The Classifieds Call 272-4536



Stallman, a rice farmer from Columbus, said there is an opportunity to "tame the regulatory beast that threatens so much of what is right and good in this country."

The president of Texas' largest farm organization noted that Farm Bureau was politically active in 1994, and was successful in most races in which the organization's political action group became involved. He stressed the Texas Farm Bureau Friends of Agriculture Fund's (AGFUND) involvement in the successful

Minding your own business

It was somewhere in the early part of my sales career that I first heard about the 80-20 sales rule. This therorizes that if you are a typical salesperson for an average company 80 percent of your sales will come from 20 percent of your customers.

I don't recall whether I heard about the rule in a sales seminar or read it in a book. I do remember going over my sales records to see if the rule was true for my company and customers. As I recall, my numbers were in the ballpark and certainly close enough to validate the 80-20 rule in my mind.

Over the years, I've discovered that the 80-20 sales rule is accurate for many businesses. I've observed it in many different industries and various sizes of businesses. I've worked with several clients who were amazed when it proved true for their firm.

For me, the awareness of this rule changed the way I thought about and reacted to my best customers. I raised the

level of care I gave the 20 percent who created the bulk of my business. I worked hard to see that they received our best efforts.

Above all else I wanted to ensure that this small but poweful group of customers was satisfied completely. I still

think it is good business practice today.

Other 80-20 thoughts Recently one of my clients observed that 80 percent of his problems came from 20 percent of his customers. He complained that this small group of customers was hard to please. "They are whiners," he said. "They demand added service, additional care and constant attention. I often wonder if they're worth the trouble."

Consider your own situation. Could it be that the 80-20 rule also applies to other areas in your business as well?

Check it out. You may find that the 20 percent of customers who generate most of your sales demand special price

concessions and other considerations that actually lower your profits significantly.

Is it possible that 80 percent of the important work accomplished by your company is done by 20 percent of your work force? Wouldn't you like

to know which 20 percent and why they are more productive?

Is it conceivable that 20 percent of your advertising and promotion produces 80 percent of the results? If so, why is this promotion so effective and how can we improve the other 80 percent?

Can you trace 80 percent of your costs to only 20 percent of your expense items? Do you have a method of tracking this to see if it is true? What would you do differently if it was?

Are 80 percent of your slow accounts receivable traceable to 20 percent of your credit accounts? How can your improve your collection efforts?

Finally, would 80 percent of our success be attributable





Perry says to play it fire safe during holidays

AUSTIN- As cooler weather and holiday festivities appoach, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry reminds Texans to review and practice fire safety measures around the house.

"With all the holiday activities, it's easy to get destracted and that's when accidents occur," Perry said. "But if we just take a few minutes to remind ourselves about the safe way to do things, we can all have a happy holiday season."

Fire safety becomes important as people use fireplaces, put up Christmas trees and decorate with candles. Before building a fire, make sure your chimney is clean and in good repair. Check the roof and gutters to be sure they are clear of debris such as leaves or other items thet might catch fire.

Christmas tress are a frequent source of fire problems. Perry said buying a Texas grown tree can lessen that risk.

"Many Texas Christmas tree farms allow people to come and cut their own tree. This makes for a great family outing and assures you a fresh tree. Texas trees on a lot have usually been cut within the previ-

ous three days, as opposed to trees shipped in from other states that may have been cut weeds before. Buying a Texas Christmas trees will give you a fresher, longer-lasting tree and help our Texas growers," Perry said.

The Texas Christmas Tree Growers Association publishes a directory of tree farms, available through the Texas Department of Agriculture or your local extension office, top make finding that special Christmas tree easier.

Once you find that special tree it should be watered daily to prevent drying out. Use caution with lights and don't leave them on unattended. Check lights each year for fraying or other wear. Never use candles on a tree.

heaters and be sure to use them in ventilated areas to prevent carbon monoxide build up.

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Defective appliances and overloaded circuits are major causes of home fires. Check power cords frequently and replace them if they are damaged.

Keep matches and lighters away from small children. Children should never be left alone near an open fire, fireplace or heater.

Plan an escape route in case of fire and practice with your family. Have a designated spot to meet outside the house.

Install a fire extinguisher in the kitchen and know how to use it before an emergency arises.

Watch clothing when working to prevent sleeves from coming in contact with a burner.

"This is a great time to review safety habits with yourg children," Perry said. "Talk to them about proper use of fire and matches. Review the family plan for getting out of the house in case of fire. Practice safe habits yourself, like wearing protective eye wear when cutting fireward





Better Business Bureau

Not all 800 number telephone information or entertainment services are free, and some services reached by calling an international telephone number are billed at exorbitant rates, according to a new pamphlet from the Federal Trade Commission titled "800 and International Telephone Number Scams".

Most 800 number serves are free, according to the pamphlet. Recent regulatory changes however, allow providers to advertise an 800 number for a service that is paid for with a credit card or other billing arrangements before the service is provided.

These 800 number services that do charge are supposed to provide a security method, such as a personal identification number to ensure the charges are authorized. Consumers have been contacting the Better Business Bureau with complaints expressing surprise that there could be charges for calling an 800 number; alleging insufficient disclosure of the charges; or easy access for unauthorized persons to make the calls. To get a copy of the FTC pamphlet, write to Public Reference, Federal Trade Commission, Washington, DC 20580 or call 202-326-2222.

Here are some tips to consider when purchasing bulk meat. Carcass beef is normally sold by its "hanging" weight. This weight includes approximately 25% fat and bone. Quality grades relate to tenderness and flavor and include, in decreasing order, USDA Prime, Choice, Good, Standard, Commercial, utility, Cutter and Canner.

Consumers should disre gard any other discriptive meat terms other than government grading. Understand all costs that are included in the proce dure per pound. Don't be influenced by "free bonus offer of pork chops, turkey, chicken, etc. Their cost may be included in the price of what you buy. Arrange to select meat and have it cut the same day while you are present. Most reliable dealers will allow you to be present when your selection of meat is cut and wrapped.

Read and understand the terms of the contract before signing making sure it includes the USDA grade, type and quantity of various cuts and call the BBB at 763-0459 to check the company's reliability report.

PTA joins efforts to combat crime among youth

AUSTIN – "The legislative positions recently adopted by the 85th Annual Texas Parent Teacher Association Convention delegates provide evidence that youth crime and violence are weighing heavily on the minds and lives of parents and treachers," said newly elected Texas PTA President Charlotte Travis of San Antonio.

"In the last legislative session, PTA did not have a position on concealed weapons, but this year the message is loud and clear from convention delegates that Texas PTA opposes legislation to legalize concealed weapons," Travis stated. Due to the personal campaign of members in the Richardson ISD Council of PTAs who have been affected by juvenile crime, more than 800, 000 PTA members now support their efforts to combat juvenile violence by calling for tougher sentences for young criminals, trigger locks on guns to prevent them from being fired accidentally, a ban on carrying concealed weapons, and holding parents more accountable for their children's crimes. Other Texas PTA positions dealing with violence prevention encourage manufacturers of toy guns to make toy guns of brightly colored materials and unrealistic design so that toy guns cannot be confused with real guns, and support the training of children, faculty and staff in nonviolent conflict resolution techniques. To enhance the position on violence awareness and prevention, Texas PTA has written legislation to guarantee parents the right to have a safe school environment for their child, to opt their child out of corporal punishment, to disalldw the video taping or tape recording of their child, and to have access to the school records of their child.
