



Muenster High wins first in UIL competition

Muenster High School students won first place in the UIL Academic Literary Spring Meet held last Wednesday and Friday at Cooke County College in Gainesville. This decisive victory was scored over nine other schools in District 17A. Those schools were Lindsay, Era, Saint Jo, Forestburg, Paradise, Ponder, Slidell, Prairie Valley and Alvord.

"Our victory was the result of very hard work by students and teachers. Also contributing is the fact that we had many students place in several of the six places for each event. Sometimes, all three students (the number that is entered from each school) would place in three of the six places that could earn points," said Charles R. Coffey, Muenster school superintendent.

Those students who placed in the top three of each event will continue to compete on the regional level later this month.

April 5 marks opening of new Center Restaurant and Tavern

Area residents joined owners and employees of the new Center Restaurant and Tavern in watching each day's progress in more than a year's work, from clearing of the land to the first day of business, when early morning customers were welcomed on Wednesday, April 5.

And area residents and hometown friends joined in sending their admiration and congratulations to the owners, Phil Endres, Stan Endres and Jacob Pagel, and their families. The new Center offers the addition of a service that has no equal anywhere in the area.

The fine new building, whose decor and theme is ethnic in spirit, offering service that is family oriented, is the culmination of a dream that began several years ago. "The land was purchased," said Phil, "in early 1988; and ground work was started a year ago."

The site is just about across the highway from their former location.

"The new Center gives us approximately 50 percent increase of seating space for dining, enhanced by a bier garden and gazebo enclosed by a cedar fence, on the ground level. Also an upper level balcony, with office, conference room, and game room with pool tables. There is also an ample parking area," said Stan and Jacob.

From the parking area, where an elevated logo and sign dominate a landscaped plot, guests enter the building through

the front door flanked on one side by The Center's marble cornerstone and headed by a bright, attractive, hand-lettered greeting: "Willkommen," which bids them "Enter and Be Welcome."

From the tile-floored front entrance, guests enter a lobby/sales area where locally handmade crafts are displayed and sold. German crafts and beautiful mugs are also available. There is a display of home-canned fruits and vegetables that typical German homes proudly consider of beauty equal to floral arrangements. Also, there is a refrigerated case where Pagel sausage, Muenster cheese and The Center's trademark homemade pies are available.

Turning to the left, guests enter the carpeted, spacious dining areas. "Colors in the art work, scrolls, borders and floral patterns on the ivory walls are done in a lovely, restful shade of blue (it's German name is Sad Blue)," said the artist, Terri Hillhouse, "complemented with soft, subdued earth tones and a few pastels."

The carpet is deep blue with a tiny beige pattern.

Furniture in all seating areas is matched. Chairs are of hard rock beechwood with light oak finish. Matching tables have formica tops.

Windows that surround on two sides are enhanced with window flower planters on the outside and inside marble window sills to hold potted blooming plants and greenery, giving a greenhouse effect.

Chandeliers in all guest areas are identical, made of heavy black wrought iron circles with 10 simulated spokes, each holding a hurricane globe and light with scrollwork.

A treasured antique hutch with marble top has been fitted to serve as a waitress station for tea, coffee and service.

A section of the area can be reserved for small dinner parties. Emphasis is placed on ethnic hospitality and atmosphere. Music is piped throughout to all areas.

The menu features fine wines, **Please See CENTER, Page 7**

"Charges," said Chief Tompkins, "are pending against a young individual from Nocona."

City wants more plans before it will rezone

At the Monday City Council meeting, councilmen received recommendation from the City Zoning Board to rezone the southeast corner of block 57 from R-1 to I-1 (residential to light industrial). That piece of property is southeast of Community Lumber Company bordered by Walnut Street on the east and the Cross Street right of way on the south, Community Lumber on the west and the Swirczynski residence on the north.

Neighborhood residents led by spokesman Hank Walterscheid protested that change indicated conflicting stories about the potential uses of the land and concerns for their neighborhood quality and street usage. Walterscheid suggested that a building permit be allowed for a special use if necessary but not rezone the whole section. Another resident stated that the owners of the area should be required to erect an eight-foot privacy and security fence around the area even now to hide the current condition and keep children away from the hazards.

The council decided to deny the zoning board recommendation. They will request detailed plans and specifications for the intended use of the land before considering

rezoning. Mayor Henscheid assured the neighbors that he was told the owners of the property, Community Lumber Co., would clean up the area as soon as it was dry enough to work in the area.

Concerning a different site, the house at 318 E. Sixth received a special exception, non-transferable, to allow usage as a Bed and Breakfast.

Werner Becker Sr. received approval to construct a dwelling on more than 40 percent of the lot in block 9 on North Walnut Street.

The Council received a favorable audit of its financial condition performed by W. Scott Whaley Company. Notable areas were a tax collection rate of 98 percent of taxes levied, accounts payable all in order and good equity in the

various funds. The auditing firm said that the Muenster financial statement did represent a fair picture of the city's financial condition.

Other action taken by the council:

- Approved semi-annual library contribution of \$2,000.00.
- Moved the date of the next City Council meeting to Monday, May 8, 7:30 p.m., so to be after the council election.
- Approved payment of bills totaling \$13,310.49.
- Discussed establishing a fine schedule for violations of the animal control ordinance.
- Discussed possible purchase of a used tractor with loader and box blade having greater capacity than the percent tractor.

Moss Lake claims two

A 52-year-old Cooke County man died Monday night while attempting to save his 7-year-old grandson from drowning.

John C. Macon of Moss Lake was pronounced dead at the scene about 9:05 p.m. by Justice of the Peace Dorothy Smith.

Macon's grandson, John White, died about 10:25 p.m. at Harris Hospital in Fort Worth where he was transported at the scene by helicopter following the accident, said a hospital spokeswoman.

Cooke County Emergency

Management Service paramedics received a call about 7 p.m. that two people were in the water at a small inlet on the west side of Moss Lake near a covered bridge known as the Red Bridge in the Whispering Hills Addition. It took about five minutes for a Moss Lake diver to recover the boy, who had been under water about 20 minutes and was found just underneath the surface, said Jeff McCrory, CCEMS shift captain.

Macon, who was nearby when the accident occurred and had jumped into the water to save the boy, was recovered about 45 minutes later around 8:30 p.m. by emergency rescue divers, said Justice of the Peace Dorothy Smith. He apparently broke his neck while attempting the rescue in about 15 foot of water that contained numerous logs and underbrush, she said.

The accident occurred while the

boy was fishing and playing on the metal bridge with another 7-year-old companion. The young witness told authorities he and White were swinging on the banisters of the bridge when White slipped and fell into the water, Mrs. Smith said.

White was not breathing and had no pulse when pulled from the water, but paramedics were able to establish a heartbeat after working on him about 15 minutes. McCrory said they were able to initially revive White because the water temperature was still very cold, which slows the body's degenerative processes.

Mother of Louise Moody dies March 27

Ernestine Freeman, a native of Wills Point, Texas in Van Zandt County, and a longtime resident of Saint Jo, died on March 27, 1989 at 8:45 p.m. at Denton Regional Medical Center, following a lengthy illness.

She was born on Aug. 30, 1903. Her parents were Henry Greathouse and Fannie (Hagen) Greathouse.

Survivors include the one daughter, Louise Moody of Muenster, and one son, Charles Ellis. There are three grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Ernestine Freeman was a homemaker and a member of the Southern Baptist Faith.

Graveside services were held on March 29, 1989, officiated by Rev. Tim Williams. McCoy Funeral Home directed interment in Mountain Park Cemetery.

John Kubicek dies at age 78

Mass of Christian Burial was offered for John Edward Kubicek of Valley View on Wednesday, April 6, at 10 a.m. in St. John's Catholic Church, with Father Gerald Cooney officiating.

Interment was in Valley View Cemetery under direction of Vernie Keel Funeral Home.


Kubicek, age 78, died Monday evening, April 6, at Denton Regional Medical Center.



Library hours are Tuesday, 8:30-5:00; Wednesday, 2:30-5:30; and Thursday, 8:30-5:00.



Tuesday also brought McGruff, the Crime Dog to elementary students. Children watched and sang along with the video "Just Say No."

On Wednesday, Ryan Bayer, Don Park and Tony Grewing were selected by council members to present an anti-drug program for preschool through 8th grade. The high school boys gave short presentations to each of these classes, described alternatives to drinking, recited the "Just Say No" pledge, distributed buttons and stickers and Dum-Dum suckers with the attached note, "Don't be a dumb-dumb, just say no."

Also on Wednesday, a sudden siren brought students out of class. A wrecked car in front of grade school held two high school seniors, Lisa Hamric and Chad Fleitman. Police Chief Helen Tompkins talked about how alcohol can affect individuals. She said a wreck could suddenly happen on a road you have driven all your life, especially after drinking. Students watched as the two seniors were removed from the wreckage.

The three days of special projects made the students aware of the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and was considered a great success by students and faculty.



Webelos Scouts win Pushmobile Derby



Farmers face May 1 deadline

Farmers, ranchers and other landowners may be able to reduce their property taxes by filing an application for an agricultural appraisal of their farm or ranch by the May 1 deadline.

If a person has already filed for an agricultural appraisal with the Cooke County Appraisal District, there is no need to reapply, officials said.

If the land qualifies as a farm or ranch, the land will be taxed on its capacity to produce crops, livestock, or timber, instead of its value on the real estate market.

This can lower property taxes, said officials with the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

In order to qualify for an agricultural appraisal, the land must meet the following characteristics:

- The land must be used principally for agriculture. This includes producing crops, livestock, poultry, fish and other products of the soil.

- The farm or ranch must meet "degree of intensity" standards designed to make sure the owner is putting in at least as much investment, labor, and other material

into the operation as is typical for producers in the area.

- The land must have been used for farming, ranching or timber production for five of the past seven years.

If the owner changes the use of the land or sells land that has an agricultural appraisal, a special rollback tax may be applied in some circumstances.

The Cooke County Tax Appraisal District has application forms available and more information about agricultural appraisals. Call 665-7651 for more information.

Sandmann elected new director

Jack House, Pete Prescher and Ed Schad received plaques of appreciation for 20 years of service as directors of the Red River Farm Co-op during the 24th annual stockholders meeting March 30 at the Gainesville Civic Center.

Frank Sandmann was elected as a new director to replace Prescher, who chose not to seek re-election. Jack House and Leonard Bayer were re-elected as directors at the meeting attended by about 325 people.

For the first time in its history, the co-op ended the year with \$1 million in gross income. A major increase in sales was seen in fertilizer application, which increased from \$49,773 for 1987 to \$70,107 for 1988. Newer and upgraded equipment which can handle larger loads and a stable price were reasons cited for the sales increase in that area by Charles Whittington, Co-op manager for the past 14 years.

Sales have increased every year during those past 14 years, said Whittington. "The co-op is the business that you own, and it has gone a long way in those few short years," he told members. "The leadership and the patrons are the ones who make it go," said Co-op President Gene Deckard.

Whittington said the co-op hopes to begin a retirement program within the next few years. The goal is to begin with a retirement of 68 and eventually lower it to 65 as funding becomes available.

The co-op listed 1988 total assets at \$1.855 million, compared to \$1.517 million in 1987. Net earnings for 1988 before patronage dividends were listed at \$336,481, an increase from \$267,280 for 1987.

Officers for 1989 include Deckard as president; Mike Fuhrmann, vice president; and Ed Schad, secretary. Directors for 1989 include Kenneth Hutson, Jack House, Leonard Bayer, Kenneth Hoedebeck, Frank Sandmann, Clyde and Yeatts.

Door prizes were given away to close out the program. Winners of \$100 savings bonds from North Texas Bank & Trust included W.D. Gibson, Sue Downe, Mary Bengfort and Willa Deckard.
