### Order of Names.

There was discussion in some counties regarding the order of names of the ballot in the second primary—as to whether the names should be in the order of the primary or the one receiving the greatest number of votes first on the ticket. Brown county committee did not do either of the above, but drew again for places on the ticket as in the first primary. This is a separate and distinct election from the first primary and the procedure should be the same, members of the committee pointed out.

Since the first primary little talk has been heard on local politics, but nevertheless an active campaign is being waged quietly by the candidates and their friends that are in the runoff. Most of the candidates are following the plan of meetings and talking to the individual voters instead of talking to groups from the stump.

### PECULIAR LEGAL ANGLE INVOLVED IN RECENT TRIAL BEFORE MILLER

BRADY, Texas, August 10.—A peculiar legal angle was involved in the trial of Tom Owens here recently who was tried for murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Ed Smith on January 14.

Owens was indicted and tried for murder in connection with the trial there was considerable argument whether Smith died from the gunshot wound, from fright, or from some unknown cause.

Owens, Smith's landlady, is alleged to have shot Smith following a fight with Smith's son, over some difficulties incident to the tenant's crop. The bullet caused just a skin wound in Smith's arm. "It was just barely under the skin, between the skin and the muscles," Dr. J. G. McCall, examining physician, testified at the trial. "There was not any considerable blood from that wound."

### RUMORS AS TO WATER TAXES DENIED BY GRAY

According to County Judge Courtney Gray various unfounded rumors have been circulated recently in regard to the possibility of Brown county assuming any liability for damages that might be incurred by Brown County Water Improvement District No. 1 and to the effect that all of Brown county will, in the future, be forced to help pay taxes that will be required to retire the bonds issued to pay for the dam at Lake Brownwood.

Because of these rumors, Judge Gray has issued the following statement:

"It has come to my attention that numerous reports have been circulated throughout the county to the effect that the Commissioners' Court had agreed to assume any and all liability for damages, of every character, incurred by Brown County Water Improvement District No. 1, and that in the event the lake dam should be destroyed or washed away, the county would assume a major or a part of the cost of the reconstruction of the reservoir. Only property within the water district is now, or will be, liable for the tax necessary to discharge the water bonds."

### COTTON STABILIZATION CORPORATION PLANS TO SELL HALF HOLDINGS

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 11.—Directors of the cotton stabilization corporation re-elected last night and announced that under the direction of the Farm Board, which dictates its policies, the corporation would proceed with the sale this year of one half its 1,300,000 bales of cotton. The cotton was purchased from the co-operatives in 1930 by the Farm Board. Since 500,000 bales additional will be turned over to the Red Cross, as provided by the recent Congress, stabilization stocks will be reduced to 150,000 bales at the end of this year, it was announced.
