## Marr criticized on slow search for Police Chief

A tranquil City Council meeting turned heated as councilmen grilled City Manager Dave Marr Wednesday about his nondisclosure of a list of 10 Muleshoe Police Chief finalists.

An article in the May 26 Amarillo Globe News disclosed the names of the 10 finalists, including Jay Livingston, who has served as the acting chief of police in Muleshoe since the resignation of Chief Julian **Muleshoe City Council** 

Dominguez Nov. 17.

Councilman Cliff Black, livid that Marr failed to release the list of finalists to the council before he released it to the news media, demanded an explanation of Marr's refusal to hold a previous executive session to disclose the information to council members.

State of Texas statutes require that executive sessions may be called for personnel, legal, and real-estate purposes

Marr countered that the legal limitations on the use of executive sessions prevented its feasibility in discussing the list with the council, and stated that a file of police chief applicants has been available to councilmen in the manager's office throughout the search.

Marr is solely conducting the search.

Muleshoe Mayor Robert Montgomery said that Marr's failure to inform the council was "poor judgement," but that it was "a lack of protocol, not a lack of policy."

According to the city charter, the city manager is responsible for the recommendation of a police chief to the council for approval or rejection, but is not necessarily obligated to inform the council of preliminary search status, Montgomery said.

The following is the list of 10 finalists for the position of Muleshoe Police Chief:

■ Jay Livingston of Muleshoe, who has served as acting police chief of the department since November.

■ Walter Yerger of Amarillo, an 18-year veteran of the Amarillo Police Department. Yerger teaches law enforcement classes at Caprock High School in Amarillo, and has served as police chief at Amarillo College. He was a charter member of the Potter-Randall Special Crimes Unit, and a deputy in Hemphill County.

■ Michael Mezger, the Canyon Police Department's school liaison officer at Canyon High School. Mezger was a former Marine, and has worked at the West Texas A&M University

## **Lutheran Church** testament to heritage

LARIAT—Sunlight pours through stained glass windows, enveloping the alter of St. John Lutheran Church in a sea of scarlet and gold hues.

Members will celebrate the 75th anniversary of the church Sunday, when internationally broadcasted "Lutheran Hour" speaker Oswald Hoffman will address the congregation.

The church was established in 1921, three years before the town of Lariat was incorporated. The church has proved a stronghold in the community and has played a prominent role in the history of Lariat.


Lariat served as a railway switch where area farmers hauled hand-harvested maize heads to be loaded onto railcars in the 1920s. Driven by an influx of German immigrants, the population of the Switch grew, as did the demand for an elevator, gin, grocery store, and post-office. An interest in community spiritualism led to the emergence of the Church of Christ and St. John Lutheran churches.

The late Boone Allison, who would eventually play a major role in the development of Lariat, came to the community as a young man in search of employment. The early months of Allison's life in the community were spent lopping off the heads of maize stalks. He gradually progressed to managing the grain elevators in Lariat for 32 years.

With agriculture the mainstay of Lariat even today, St. John has undergone many changes. Despite fluctuations in prosperity in the community, the church has progessed from meeting in a small school house and holding services in German, to meeting in a spaciously remodeled sanctuary that also houses a small printing operation. Members of the congregation spend one day each month printing Bibles in braille for some 30 countries internationally.

Ernest Ramm, a Lariat farmer born in 1930, recalled attending services in the church as a boy.

## Planting deadline leaves little hope for dryland cotton

Well aware that it was a futile effort, dryland cotton farmers in Bailey County were forced to complete planting this week to make the June 1 deadline to be eligible to collect federal crop

With virtually no pre-plant moisture, there is little hope of making a dryland crop.

"There's not enough moisture to make a crop," said Marvin McCall, manager of the Maple Coop Gin. "At this point, they're planting because they have to."

McCall estimated farms in southern Bailey County need four inches of "real slow rain" soon to have a chance to make a crop.

Typical federal crop insurance this year would pay 65 cents a pound for 50 percent of the average yearly production.

Farmers can delay the planting, which reduces the insurance payment rates by 1 percent per day.

It costs dryland farmers about \$11.50 per acre to put the seeds in the ground (not including herbicides and pesticides), according to Bailey County Extension Agent Curtis Preston. Most county farmers plant about 1,500-2,000 acres.

Muleshoe insurance agent Ronnie Holt said insurance is just a stop-gap measure.

"They're not farming for the insurance money," said Holt, who also grows cotton. "It's not a lucrative deal by any means. We're in a serious predicament."

#### Interim hospital administrator starts Monday

Jim Bone will take over as interim administrator of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District Monday.

The hospital district has been without an administrator since May 17, when Richard Murphy resigned to take a job at another hospital.

Bone is an employee of Lubbock Methodist Hospital. MAHD pays Lubbock Methodist \$6,000 a month to provide an administrator, who oversees both the Muleshoe Area Medical Center and Muleshoe Area Healthcare Center.

Bone previously served as the interim manager at Permian General Hospital. He is not considered a candidate for the permanent position, according to hospital district officials.

Lubbock Methodist is currently searching for a permanent replacement, subject to the approval of the health district's board of directors.

After graduating from Muleshoe High School in 1990, Adelaido Godinez signed on for a twoyear stint with the Army to help pay for his college education.

He never dreamed six years later he'd earn a degree from one of the most respected academic institutions in the country.

Saturday, 2nd Lt. Godinez was one of 902 cadets who graduated from the U.S. Military Academy in West Point, NY. He was one of just 61 enlisted personnel to graduate, earning a bachelor's degree in Latin studies.


In return for an education comparable to any Ivy League school, the 24-year-old former MHS football captain and class president will serve a five-year obligation as an officer in the New Cadet Army. He can re-enlist for a longer tenure.

After a 45-day leave this summer, Godinez will be stationed at Fort Hood, Texas, where he will serve as an infantry platoon leader.

"It's in tune with our mission, which is to tory. provide the nation with the leaders of character," said Godinez, who finished in the top third of his class.

Godinez served for two years in the Army before entering the academy, where SAT scores routinely run well above 1200. A high score on the standard Army entrance exam identified him as a candidate for the academy.





## Helping others see the Light

Members of St. John Lutheran Church of Lariat are helping the blind to see the Light.

Since 1972, men and women in the church have been printing books in Braille for some 30 countries internationally.

Mary Alice Ramm, a volunteer in the Lutheran Braille Workers organization, said more than 40 St. John volunteers work one day each month printing individual books of the Bible in Braille. The workers print approximately 30 books per month.

Many people in thirdworld nations are afflicted with blindness because of diseases and malnutrition, making the organization's purpose more valuable and crucial to those who are unable to access the Bible.

"Our mission is to bring Christ to the nations in all languages," Ramm said, adding that the workers at St. John are currently printing the book of Joshua in Swahili.

The printing process includes the use of a 25-yearold clothes washer to press the images onto the pages. Sheets of thick paper are placed between metal plates, then pressed through the rollers of the clothes washer. The result is a page covered with raised patterns that symbolize the letters of the alphabet. The pages can only be read fifty times before they become unintelligible.

California, the Lutheran Braille Workers organization provides Lutheran churches around the world with printing plates and work orders for the printing of the books. The Lutheran workers, who rely

on donations and pledges to buy the paper for the books, then print, bind and ship the books all over the world.

Lutheran groups from Rhea and Clovis also use the Lariat facility to print Braille Bibles.

two doors on the church," Rammremembered. "That was because the women and girls sat on the left side of the church, while the men and boys sat on the right side. We didn't sit as families in church then."

Ramm is the longest standing member of the church, joining in 1931. He said that efforts to assemble a history book of the church have been slowed, since those first years of its history were recorded in German. After World War II, a prominent anti-German sentiment lead to the cessation of German services, Ramm said.

St. John Lutheran Church is one of the few remaining establishments in Lariat, whose population has dwindled to approximately 30.

Remodeled in 1994, St. John is home to approximately 160 members, largely from Farwell and Lariat. The church also draws members from the Oklahoma Lane, Bovina, Rhea, Clovis, and Muleshoe communities.

A result of the reformation by Martin Luther, the Lutheran denomination originated in Germany, although its members now include all nationali-

Holt said most dryland farmers production rate from last year was zero, and some have been zero for the last three to four years.

Once insurance adjusters declare the crop ruined, an alternative crop, usually grain sorghum. Farmers usually have to wait about 10 days before planting an alternative crop, although the United States Department of Agriculture is considering a proposat to shorten the waiting period to seven days.

Insurance payments and income from alternative crops helps farmers stay afloat in bad years.

The drought has left farmers with high debts and dry fields.



## Money shifted to cover loans

Drought has been so widespread and long-lasting that the United State Department of Agriculture's emergency fund account of \$109.3 million had been depleted with five months left in the current fiscal year.

Within the past few days, \$56 million has been shifted to provide sufficient funds to take care of current and expected loan applications, according to a May 29 press release from U.S. Congressman Larry Combest.

Combest is also asking the Department of Agriculture to narrow the 25-day release date down to seven days, so farmers can clear crops from their fields into a shorter period once they have failed, rather than having to wait almost four

## It Is a Fine Epitaph: "Forgiven!"

I his fine new book My Mother's Favorite Song, John William Smith tells a story well worth hearing:

"I have never seen it, but I am told there is a grave in or near New York City with a marker that bears a singular inscription. It is one word-Forgiven!

"I am intrigued by the story

and my imagination is carried away with possible explanations for this mysterious reminder . . . .

"Who put it there, I ask? What was forgiven? Was it murder, adultery, betrayal? Surely it must have been some great wrong to warrant such a foreboding, yet victorious, farewell. What kept him unforgiven 'till death? Was it because there was no penitence? Or perhaps the crime was so great that it separated the forgiver and the forgiven-either physically or emotionally-and no opportunity ever presented itself. The forgiver may have had such a hardened heart against the trespasser that only death brought softening. Perhaps forgiveness was tendered, but the offender felt such guilt that it could not be accepted. The possibilities add to the mystery.

"When my time comes, I would like all those who knew me and loved me-and maybe especially those I have offended and who perhaps didn't love me as much as either of us would have liked-to get together and put a marker over me that said-Forgiven. I'm sure we would all be better for it.

"Yes, it would be much better to do it while we are all alive, but I am not so naive as to hope that our pride will always allow for that. Sometimes the wrongs run too deep, and the pain and the betrayal cannot be forgotten. Our Father knows the limitations of human forgiveness, and it is by His grace that death brings release.

"And the burdens that are laid down in death are not only those of the deceased. No, at every funeral, all of us who pass by emit a sigh of relief and place gently in the coffin all the wrongs we have felt, and our tears wash forever away the burdens of the years as we write-Forgiven-upon the memory in our heart.

"Of course it is our Father who erects the final marker-who sets in place the stone and writes His final epitaph over those who are called to Him. Does He not stamp Forgiven on the life of all that are His? Is that not His final assessment?

"By the power of the blood of Son, I declare person-FORGIVEN.
