LINDBERGH BABY IS FOUND DEAD IN BRUSH NEAR HOME

IDENTIFICATION OF BODY IS MADE LATE TODAY BY GRIEF STRICKEN FATHER

BY BATES RANEY, United Press Staff Correspondent. HOPEWELL, N. J., May 12.—(UP)—Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., infant son of the world-famous aviator, was found dead today at Mt. Rose, N. J., near the Sourland Mountain home from which he was kidnaped 73 days ago.

The tragic end to an international search came with an official announcement at the Lindbergh home of the pitiful discovery. The announcement was made by Col. H. Norman Schwartzkopf, who has been in charge of the kidnaping investigation since the baby was stolen from its crib on the night of March 1.

SKELETON BENEATH BRUSH
The body, reduced to skeleton, was found by William Allen and Orville Wilson, who were driving along the road from Trenton on what is known as Mount Rose Hill. The body was beneath a pile of brush, Schwartzkopf said.

IDENTIFICATION BY GARMENT.
The discovery was made at 3:15 p. m., and identification was furthered by discovery of a flannel undershirt and band which, compared with the clothing known to have been worn by the child the night of the kidnaping, left no doubt as to his identity.

ATTEMPTS BURY INDICATED
The child was lying on his face, and from his position, indicated that attempts had been made to conceal or bury it. In his forehead was a hole about the size of a 25-cent piece.

The body was taken to the Lindbergh home, where Colonel Lindbergh completed the tragic identification. **OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT**
In his official statement, Col. Schwartzkopf said: "We have to announce that apparently the body of the Lindbergh baby was found at 3:15 p. m., today by William Allen, colored, of Trenton, who was riding on the Mount Rose road toward Hopewell.

"He was riding with Orville Wilson on a truckload of timber. They stopped the truck and found the baby."
DEAD MANY WEEKS
State police first examined the body, and then went to the Lindbergh home and obtained garments by which they might compare the cloth to the fragments of material found near the body. A comparison convinced them they had come to the end of the trail. Condition of the body indicated that Lindbergh's baby son had been dead for many weeks.

TRENTON, New Jersey, May 12.—(AP)—Governor A. Harry Moore of New Jersey late today said he had been informed by Colonel H. Norman Schwartzkopf of state police that the kidnaped Lindbergh baby had been found dead near the famous flier's estate at Hopewell, New Jersey.

Schwartzkopf informed the governor, the latter said, that the body was found by neighbors near the Lindbergh home.

JERSEY CITY, N. J., May 12.—(UP)—Gov. A. Harry Moore said at his residence tonight that Col. H. Norman Schwartzkopf of the New Jersey state police, had told him the Lindbergh baby had been found dead.

Gov. Moore said he had no other knowledge than the information that Col. Schwartzkopf had given him.

NEWSPAPER MEN CALLED
TRENTON, N. J., May 12.—(UP)—A report gained wide circulation here today, without confirmation by the Lindbergh family, that the kidnaped Lindbergh baby had been found dead.

Col. H. Norman Schwartzkopf late today requested all newspapermen assigned to the Lindbergh kidnaping case to report immediately to the home of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh at Hopewell. He gave no reason for the request.

Today's action on the part of the superintendent of police in charge of the Lindbergh investigation marked the first time since March 1, the night Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., was kidnaped that newspapermen had

DEATH CLIMAXES NATION'S TRAGEDY

ASSASSINATED PRESIDENT OF FRANCE BURIED

BY RALPH HEINZEN, United Press Staff Correspondent. PARIS, May 12.—(UP)—Heavy, rain-laden skies cast mourning over all France today as the nation buried its murdered president, Paul Doumer, with the fullest military and civil ceremonial.

The funeral procession left the Elysee Palace at 8 a. m. as a million persons lined the route to Notre Dame Cathedral and the Pantheon, the nation's political shrine. The Prince of Wales, the King of the Belgians, the Duke of Aosta, Prince Paul of Serbia, and diplomats of 40 nations walked in the rain behind the hearse. Ambassador Walter E. Edge represented President Hoover.

After mass at the Cathedral, Doumer's body was taken to the Pantheon and placed on a catafalque. A smoking urn stood at each corner of the catafalque. Injured war veterans grouped on the sides carried historic battle flags. Premier Andre Tardieu's funeral oration was broadcast. Thousands of troops then paraded past the Pantheon and dipped their flags in honor of Doumer.

Eight black horses drew the hearse through the dismal streets. Thousands of troops marched to the beat of muffled drums. Robed barbers, members of the academies and university faculties, parliamentarians and the cabinet led by President Albert Lebrun and Premier Tardieu and Doumer's family kept pace with the solemn funeral tread.

Elaborate Precautions.
Most elaborate precautions, similar to those enforced when Doumer's successor was elected at Versailles, were taken to prevent possible attempts at violence. Early this morning police made a house to house inspection of balconies along the route where bombs or arms might be hidden.

The funeral procession was two miles long, which meant that the mounted troops at the head of the line arrived at Notre Dame before the final delegations left the Elysee. Schools and business houses were closed. Mourning was observed throughout the nation.

The most solemn part of the ceremony took place at Notre Dame, where the president's body was placed on a catafalque 17 feet high, draped in black, beneath a canopy of black lined with the tricolor of France. Candles cast the only light on the scene.

Requiem mass was said by Cardinal Verdier, archbishop of Paris. The procession then climbed the hills above Paris to the Pantheon, where Doumer's body will rest until it is removed to the family cemetery for burial beside his sons who died in the World War.

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ATTACK BEGUN BY DEMOCRATS ON BILL TODAY

BY LYLE C. WILSON, United Press Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON, May 12.—(UP)—Decision to defer senate consideration of the tax bill until tomorrow came today as a group of influential democrats opened formal warfare on the tariff rates in the \$1,000,000,000 revenue measure.

Senators Harrison, Miss, Walsh, Hull, Tenn., Costigan, Colo., and George, Va., offered in the senate a minority report denouncing the tariff law and urging that the duties be stricken from the bill.

Their challenge was directed as much against their own party as the republicans. Democrats from Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona and Kentucky joined republicans from California, Washington, Oregon and Michigan in arranging vote trades which procured protection for coal, oil, lumber and petroleum.

Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee had intended to call up the tax bill at 2 p. m., today but agreed to postpone his motion, thus giving Senator Glass, democrat, Virginia, another day for consideration of his bank regulations bill.

MILLER RANCH CASE IN COURT

NEWKIRK, Okla., May 12.—(UP)—A life insurance company's attempt to collect a \$199,000 mortgage on the famous 101 Ranch of Oklahoma was taken under advisement today by a district court judge.

Colonel Zach Miller, sole survivor of the three Miller brothers, who homesteaded the vast ranch and grew fabulously wealthy contested the action, brought by the John Hancock Life Insurance Company, of Philadelphia.

Colonel Miller and his wife, Margaret Blevins Miller, contended they were entitled to an exemption of 160 acres of the land, the original homestead of the Miller family. The ranch white house, in which many of the nation's celebrities were entertained during Oklahoma pioneer days, is located on this plot.

The case was taken under advisement by Judge Claude Duval. The life insurance company's mortgage is one of several pending against the ranch and the Miller's estate.

STATE DEFICIT IS LESS THAN WAS EXPECTED

AUSTIN, May 12.—(UP)—A decrease of \$11,000,000 in the estimated deficit of Texas government for the biennium ending August 31, 1933, and an over-appropriation of \$2,046,781 by the Texas legislature were indicated today in a report compiled by state auditors.

In April, 1931, auditors estimated the state's deficit at the end of the present biennium would total \$11,990,076, new revenues and new economies have since entered state government, and by the end of the biennium a deficit of but \$354,110 is anticipated.

Taxes on cement, sulphur, natural gas and cigarettes, coupled with savings resulting from disclosures of forgeries and extortional fee charges, are partly responsible for the improvement, the report said.

Appropriations originally planned by the 42nd legislature total \$53,741,003. From the amount finally appropriated, Gov. Ross Sterling scaled off \$3,621,897 with his veto pencil.

GASTON MEANS ARRESTED AGAIN

WASHINGTON, May 12.—(UP)—Gaston B. Means, former investigator of the department of justice, was arrested late today on a charge of drunkenness and disorderly conduct, 24 hours after he had been released on \$50,000 bond on charges of defrauding Mrs. Evelyn Walsh McLean of \$104,000 in connection with the Lindbergh baby kidnaping.

Means was arrested after an altercation with Lee Somers, a Washington Times reporter, in a downtown drug store. An assault charge also was placed against the former justice department investigator. He posted bail of \$65 and returned to his suburban home accompanied by his wife.

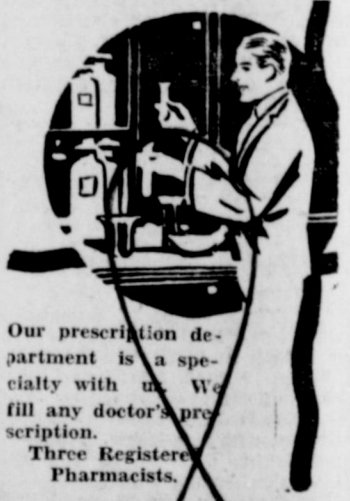

More Dam Rumors

THE CONSTRUCTION of the big dam which is to impound Lake Brownwood is nearing completion, and nothing has occurred to cause anxiety either to contractors or engineers as the work on it has progressed, but during the last few days a brand new flood of rumors has been released and a great many people have become uneasy lest the whole project collapse with catastrophic consequences.

It isn't necessary to undertake to answer any or all of the rumors that have been circulated about the dam project recently, because they do not merit that much attention. It is sufficient to say that the progress of the work at the dam has been eminently satisfactory to the Water Board and its engineers, the original plans for the project having been followed with relatively no changes, and the developments from week to week having been as expected.

And in the meantime, an illustration of what the dam will mean in the matter of flood prevention has been given during the past few days. Even in its uncompleted condition the dam has been holding back a veritable flood of water, which otherwise probably would have spread over much of the Bayou valley and caused much damage.

Society's Revenge

IF IT IS TRUE that a conscience can be an instrument of torture Theodore Lilly, sentenced to life imprisonment, should go through an endless inquisition. Lilly, who was holding up a grocery store when a little eight-year-old boy entered, heartlessly shot down the child. The Detroit judge who sentenced the murderer decreed the fact that his state does not have capital punishment.

The only objection to conscience as an avenger of wrong is the fact that those who commit the gravest sins have been hardened, usually, by such a series of encroachments that their suffering is less keen than those whose errors are few. It is only at the beginning of wrongdoing, it would seem, that conscience makes a coward of a man. Certainly Lilly had nothing to warn him of the moral wrongness of his act.

Houston Theater Man Seeks Quash All Indictments

HOUSTON, Tex., May 12—(UP)—On the ground that a Brownsville grand jury contained a felon, attorneys for Will Horwitz, theater owner and six other defendants filed a motion today to quash all indictments charging violation of the federal lottery laws.

Horwitz, his wife and five employees of radio station XED at Reynosa, Mex. opposite McAllen, are under indictments returned at Brownsville several weeks ago. The Tamaulipas state lottery had been advertised over XED, of which Horwitz is part owner.

Ed Wintree, attorney for the defendants, set forth in his motion he had information Winfield Killiam, a member of the Brownsville grand jury, had been convicted of a felony at Laredo on April 3, 1928.

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DAMAGES DONE SUNDAY BY RAIN HAIL AND WIND

Damages to property and crops by rain, cloudbursts, hail and wind, Sunday are reported in some parts of Brown county and in several surrounding counties. Damages were not great at any particular point in the section, it is thought.

Four inches of rain fell at May in the northern part of the county in a few minutes Sunday morning. The heavy downpour was accompanied by considerable hail which beat down some small crops and the leaves from trees. Several out-houses and sheds were blown down and others were blown from their foundations.

Small out buildings were blown down at Comanche, Sidney and other places in Comanche county. About a 3 inch rain fell there. Rochelle Flooded. Two and one-fourth inches of rain fell at Rochelle between 7:30 and 9 o'clock Sunday night. The rain fell in torrents and flooded that section for several minutes. No damage by wind or hail was reported.

While other parts of the area were having the small storms and heavy rain, Brownwood had only 1/2 of an inch rain. Most of the rain here fell Sunday night, although a light sprinkle was received Sunday morning. There was 5/8 of an inch rainfall here Saturday, which brought the total for Saturday and Sunday to 2 1/8 of an inch.

Heavy rain along the water shed of Jim Ned Creek and Peacan Bayou put the Bayou at Brownwood on about a 20 foot rise Sunday night. Gates at Brownwood Dam were not closed and the water came through to Brownwood Waters of the stream was not out of banks at any time.
