The hospital district situation has changed since the following column was written, as indicated by another item in this paper. The bill is not being ignored. It will be considered. Nevertheless, the column is being used because of other information it contains.

Is it true that the bill on creation of Muenster Hospital District will not be permitted to come out of this session of the Texas Legislature? That remark has been made a number of times lately, and an apparent blackout of information regarding progress of the bill points to a possibility that such a fate is in the planning.

Despite suspicious signs, however, it is hard to believe that the statements are true ... because they imply an assumption by one man that he has the right to decide by himself what should actually be decided by the several hundred people of the area concerned. This column is most reluctant to believe that Senator Ralph Hall would violate his responsibility as an impartial representative of the people, or that he would expose himself to the charge of taking over the jurisdiction which belongs to the public.

According to state law, the function of the legislature is not to decide whether a hospital district will be created but rather to permit people of the area concerned to decide that question for themselves. Its responsibility is to decide on the validity of conditions applying to the proposed district and, if they are in order, allow the people concerned to bring the issue to a vote. Failure of the legislature to act in this matter is definitely not a case of being impartial. Rather it is obvious partiality favoring those who oppose a district.

A brief summary is in order here to clarify the present situation. The bill originally presented specified an area including the Muenster school district, the Cooke County portion of the Saint Jo school district (formerly Bulcher), the Myra school district, and the west half of the Era school district. Justification for that area was claimed by the fact that the proposed district, with a third of the county's hospital facilities, could reasonably ask for a third of county area especially since that area included much less than a third of the county population and less than a fifth of the county valuation ... also that area generally is included in the Muenster trade area.

Opposition was organized and the legislature was told that people of the Myra and Era districts did not wish to be included. The bill was amended accordingly and was approved by the House of Representatives.

Supporters of the hospital district were disappointed to lose a large portion of the proposed area representing about a fourth of the anticipated valuation, but were relieved to think that the area problem had been settled and the bill in its amended form was due for early passage by the Senate and could be submitted for a vote.

Since then local opposition has been at work insisting that people of the Muenster area do not want a district. Concerning some, that statement is correct. On the other hand it is equally true that many people of the Muenster area do want a district.

But the all important fact is that the area has been sufficiently reduced to make the hospital district unquestionably a local issue. This is our own affair now. No one can claim, as before, that our proposed district over reaches its rightful limits. This concerns Muenster people and the only fair solution now is to let them decide the issue by voting. In justice the only decision left to the Senate now is to let the people of Muenster have their say.

This column sincerely hopes that Senator Hall will think through this matter carefully and disregard the pressure that has been applied on him, then introduce the bill to his branch of the legislature, thereby permitting us local people to decide on this very vital issue. We hope he will understand that he can't wrong anyone by turning this matter over to us. Our own vote will be the ultimate fair decision. But he can be very unjust by declining to let us have that vote.

City to Ask for More Realistic Pay for Services

Inequities and unrealistic charges for water and sewer services and certain other services were changed by the Muenster City Council in its meeting Monday night.

Members of the council decided that certain services, formerly free, should be paid by persons receiving the benefit, and not by the city's operating fund.

Hereafter customers will be charged \$1.00 for having a city employee turn water off and on for faucet repair or other such reason. It was pointed out in the meeting that for many years homes have been built with a cut off separate from the city's cut off at the meter. Many persons apparently do not know they have that cut-off, or just don't bother, but ask city employees to make two trips for their convenience. Hereafter they will be charged \$1.00 for that service. If water is cut off and on for non payment of bill the charge is \$2.00, because bookkeeping work is also involved.

Jerry Klement Gets Fellowship For Year's Study

Jerry Klement, Muenster native, associate county agent in Tarrant County and leader in 4-H Club work, has been named one of six county extension agents in the nation to receive a fellowship for a year of study in the Washington, D.C. area.

The fellowship of \$3,000 will be provided by the National 4-H Service Committee, Inc., and Massey-Ferguson Inc., manufacturers of farm machinery.

Only three Texans have been among the 113 agricultural extension service workers to receive the award since the program was inaugurated in 1931.

Klement is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Klement, Rt. 2, Muenster. He attended Arlington State College and graduated from Texas A&M University. He has worked as associate county agent with 4-H Club work in Tarrant County the past 16 months after being assistant county agent in Denton County.

The fellowship program begins in August with a week in Chicago where the group will study at the National 4-H Service Committee. They will be in Washington September 1.

Hospital District Hearing Slated Monday, 7:30 p.m.

The bill on creation of Muenster Hospital District is due to receive consideration in a senate committee of the Texas Legislature next Monday.

Senator Ralph Hall of this district advised by telephone Tuesday afternoon that he has arranged for a hearing on the bill before the Counties Committee of the Senate at 7:30 p.m. next Monday night. Persons who wish to present pertinent information for or against the bill are welcome at the hearing.

Hall will present the bill before the committee, which will decide whether it will be presented for a final vote on the Senat floor.

The bill in its present form was approved by the House of Representatives on March 29 after the original bill was amended to confine the district area to the Muenster School District and the Cooke County portion of the Saint Jo School District.

Independent School District Okayed at Lindsay

Residents of the Lindsay School District in their special election last Saturday voted more than two to one in favor of changing their school district from common to independent status. The count was 129 to 57.

Principal reason for the change is to allow means whereby the district can increase its tax revenue to meet demands of program expansion and enrollment increase.

The previous tax rate of \$1.00 per \$100 of valuation remains unchanged, however the newly created independent district has authority to appoint an equalization board with power to raise and/or equalize existing valuations.

With the changeover the district will increase its school board membership from three to seven persons. The new board will be appointed by the county school board and will be qualified to serve until the regular trustee election next year.

What Will City Do About Library?

What to do about the local public library is a problem that has the city council concerned. The library, which is sponsored by the local court of Catholic Daughters of America has been located in the city hall and is outgrowing its space.

So what's to be done in the future? Will the city pay all or part of the rent in the next location? Will the city, in effect, take on a substantial part of the expense of maintaining a public library? A more vital problem: can the city afford that addition to its budget? Giving free space was all right, but is the city willing or able to take on an additional expense item?

A committee of three has been appointed to study the problems and recommend a solution. They are Gene Hoebeck, Mike Sloan and B. J. Swirczynski.

Donald Rohmer Gets Scholarship

Continuing with highlights jotted in a diary kept by Mrs. Rudy Hellman on her trip to the Holy Land. Previous installments told about Beirut,

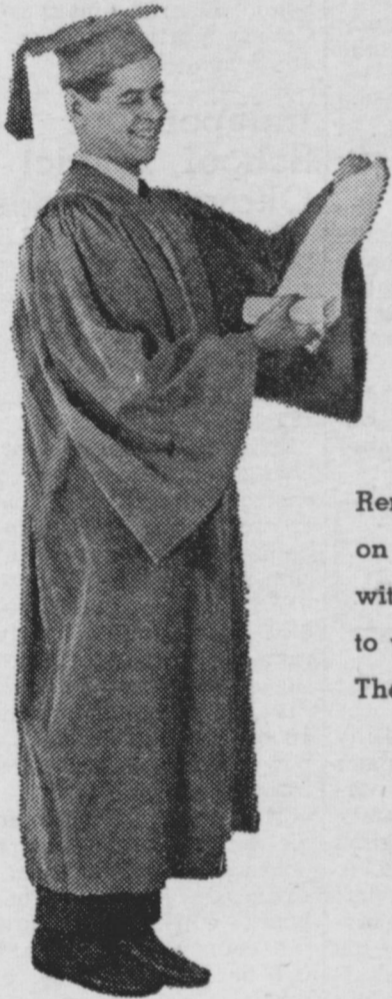

Hospital Reviews Services Added

In observing National Hospital Week, May 9-15, Muenster Memorial Hospital presents a brief summary of special services established during the year and three months that it has been in operation. A drug room has been set up in the hospital to insure an adequate supply of drugs on hand. The drugs are ordered as needed from the local pharmacy and other drug houses.

Selective menus are offered to make meals more pleasant for the patients. Selections are made from lists that are submitted to patients the day before.

Two 16-hour nurse's aid courses have been given for present and prospective nursing personnel. Seventeen ladies have completed the course and four of them are now on the hospital staff. Inservice Education, including group discussion, movies and educational material from drug firms and research institutes, is a part of the "on the job training" for hospital personnel.

FM music, which played throughout the rest of the hospital since its opening, has been extended to the operating room, in keeping with the current theory that music there is beneficial to both the patient and the hospital personnel.

A fire safety guide has been written for the entire staff and fire drills are held regularly. Special instructions are also being prepared through which the hospital can function more efficiently in case of disaster.

Children patients have a new accommodation since one of the rooms has been converted to a pediatric room presenting a colorful atmosphere geared to a child's level. Some features are a small table and chair set donated by friends, Mother Goose plaques, a toy chest and toys, along with a colorful bed spread and a rocking chair.

A special courtesy to lady patients, and a cheering and refreshing expression of community spirit, is a corsage made and given by members of the Hospital Auxiliary. Those are personal and professional touches added for the purpose of making the hospital a more pleasant place to stay. More improvements will be added as ideas and opportunities present themselves.

Statistics on average daily census, patient days and number of births are as follows for the fifteen months of the hospital's operation. Reflected in the figures is the fact that Dr. Laughlin left here on June 19, Dr. Hejduk arrived on August 15 and Dr. Kralicke arrived on October 30.

ing systems presents another problem. People ask for larger meters, which are more expensive. Until now the city installed as requested. Hereafter an additional charge will be made to compensate for difference in cost between the two sizes. That applies to a new installation and is additional to the regular \$20.00 permit charge. In case a small meter is replaced by a larger one there is no permit charge but installation cost in addition to the cost for different size.

Another problem is connected with the larger meters. Normally they do not measure a small flow of water, so a special charge will be made to compensate for water that slips past the meter.

Street repair made necessary by special work for customers likewise will be charged to the customer; for instance extending a new water line or changing size of a line across pavement. In such cases customers will be charged 60 cents per square foot for pavement repair.

An effort was made also to establish a more realistic sewer charge. Since normal sewer use is directly proportional to water use, exclusive of outside watering, the council decided on that method of charging. Hereafter the charge is 25 percent of the average water charge for months of November through March. Those months are used to determine the charge because little if any outside watering is done, so practically all the water used goes out of the sewer. The minimum charge of \$1.30 per month still applies when one fourth of the water bill falls below that figure.

For commercial customers the sewer charge is one fourth of the current monthly bill, or the minimum of \$1.80, unless the customer is watering outside. In that case the charge is based on volume used during low watering months, as for residential use.

A change of delinquency date was also adopted. Formerly bills mailed out on the 15th became past due on 5th of the following month. That date is moved forward to the 25 of the same month. This change is effective with this month's billing. The next bills mailed out will be subject to penalty charge if not paid by the 25th.
