Mr. Neeb compared tax rates with area districts and noted that Muenster is at the bottom of the scales. "Muenster's tax rate is the lowest and that makes the budget tight," he concluded. The board approved the audit.

The board also listened to bond consultants John Martin and Leon Johnson of Southwest Securities as they explained that the bond buyers index is at an all time low. "A great time to borrow - bad time to buy," they noted, saying that Texas school bonds are rated AAA, with good credit rating, and are much in demand, giving the lower interest rates.

The consultants went onto explain that a bond election is a peoples' election. One needs

to focus that the bond is for the children, their best interest and their needs.

"Most people are pro-school, but if they don't vote, the negative vote takes over," noted the consultants, who gave 6 points to remember when pushing for a bond election: What do we need?; Why do we need it?; What's the plan?; What's the cost?; Where's the Election?; and Where can one get more information?

"The School Board is leaning toward a bond issue," Steve Copper superintendent noted, "but that has not been decided."

# County Appraisal District Board member retires on a sour note

In her last meeting as a member of the Cooke County Appraisal District held on Dec. 12, Betty Buttolph made a thought-provoking statement to the board. Mrs. Buttolph noted that it was, and is, her goal to provide Cooke County taxpayers with the best representation on the board of directors. To do this Buttolph said she attempted to solicit the best professional advice and to ask the pertinent questions.

Buttolph said that other members of the CCAD board disagreed with her analysis of what requirements were necessary to assure a CCAD staff who had the taxpayer as their foremost responsibility. Other members of the board labeled Buttolph as a "non team player", which Buttolph remarked actually meant that she didn't go along with some of the issues, recommendations or discussions that were being made.

"I would strongly recommend, that if you are interested in your tax burden in Cooke County, that you obtain a copy of the minutes of the board meetings for the years 1996 and 1997," Buttolph stated. "I believe you will be amazed at some of the decisions that were made by the board which are contrary to what you, the taxpayer, thought your representation was providing for you. More specifically, the entities which have contracted with the CCAD budget.

"A letter dated Feb. 16, 1997 addressed to the Chairman, CCAD Board of Directors alluded to the irresponsible behavior of the board of directors as it pertained to the taxpayers' money. This was in regard to board member (Ken) Kaiser, by memo dated Feb. 14, 1996 offering (Will) Presson the use of a pick—up truck (owned

by the District), for his use in his official duties, plus a salary of \$47,100 per year. (Who ever heard of a job offer being set forth in a memo, which was not approved by the board of directors, but subsequently (after the fact), agreed to by four of the members, with the non team-player disagreeing). In October of 1996 [Bob] Eggleston colluded with the chief appraiser for use of a new leased 1997 Ford Explorer, which was not authorized initially by the board of directors, but subsequently approved for the use of the chief appraiser, by the board, with one abstention. After dogmatic controversy and a discussion with the Attorney General's Office, by the 'non team-player', it was determined that the lease of the vehicle was illegal.

To this statement Mr. Cole replied, "First off I thought that article in the paper was in extreme poor taste. I expressed my views to the other people involved here. I did not have any part of that particular thing, I do not know how my name got in it and I'm sorry that it did. I think our problems on this board should have been aired in this room. I don't think it was right of the newspaper to air them as they did."

Cole went on to say that he felt that the board hired the only person available who met every expectation that they had for the district. He feels that the CCAD is now the model rather than the laughing stock of their industry. With the help of the CCAD employees he hopes to bring the district to near perfection.

Mr. Presson declined to make any comments on the record about Mrs. Buttolph's statement claiming he didn't want to play the game. He suggested people check with members of boards of taxing entities to see if they are happy with his work with the CCAD. Ken Kaiser stated that the information in the statement was old news and he felt it was time to get on with life, not to rehash old battles. "I feel embarrassed for Betty," he said. "It made me uncomfortable. Not by content, the content is all very well documented by meetings. We have public meetings."

Kaiser claims that the meetings all followed the open records acts, minutes were made in open sessions with seconds done. "Nothing underhanded went on," he said. Present members of the CCAD board of directors are Stephen Cole, Ken Kaiser, Betty Buttolph, Robert Eggleston, and Arthur Felderhoff. In January Buttolph and Eggleston will step down and Donna Doty and Jane Carlton will take their places.

# Berry pursues county judge position

Byron Berry, a Cooke County business owner, licensed C.P.A. and attorney, announced last week his candidacy for County Judge. Mr. Berry, a sixth generation Cooke County resident has been an active civic worker, serving on steering committees for Leadership Gainesville, Adopta-School, and the Chamber of Commerce Political Relations Committee.

"Anyone who knows me, knows of my commitment to this country. As Country Judge I will provide conservative financial policy, energetic leadership and be a workhorse for the country and programs for our youth."

Berry was given consideration for the position upon the death of former Judge Paul Hesse earlier this year. During considerations, Berry's business experiences as a C.P.A. were strongly noted by Commissioner Richard Brown. Also brought to light was the fact that Judge Hesse had considered Berry as his successor should Hesse run for state representative. After several stalemate votes the

commissioners appointed Russell Duncan to fill the remaining term of Judge Hesse.

"I have talked to Rusty Duncan about my candidacy and thanked him for the job he has done in filling Judge Hesse's term. I think Rusty has done a great job and understand he wants to honor his pledge to finish out the term. I see Rusty's time as Judge as a bridge from Paul Hesse's to mine and I see my time as a bridge to the next century. The big question that has come to me has been 'why are you running for such a low paying position?". The answer is that right now is a time in my life when I have the knowledge to lead this county and the energy to follow through with what needs to be done. I want to take action not just react to what will be confronting this county as we finish up this century and start the next."



# Peale discusses Red River Boundary with officials

The Texas Red River Boundary Commission met Friday, December 12 in Austin to discuss and respond to the most recent proposed agreement between the States as to the boundary along the Red River.

The Commissions were created by both the Texas and Oklahoma Legislatures to negotiate an identifiable boundary between the States along the Red River. The actual legal boundary between the States along the Red River. The actual legal boundary between the States is the gradient boundary line along the south bank of the River. This is an artificial line that moves when the river moves. The boundary thus cannot be identified or marked permanently causing a number of problems that have plagued the residents of the Red River Valley since the boundary was created in 1819.

Texas proposed the vegetation line be adopted as the boundary in September of 1996 which proposal was adopted in concept by the Oklahoma Commission at that time. Since that time the Commissions have traded proposals pertaining to language and details of the Compact.

Both Commissions agree that any change in the legal boundary will not affect private property orights. Private property rights. Private property rights. Private property rights. Due to the differences in vegetation along the 540 mild distance from the Arkansas Border to the Texas Panhandle the Commissioners determined that care must be taken to insure that the definition is

appropriate for all portions of the river. A definition was adopted by the Commission which will be submitted to the Oklahoma Commission as part of a revised Compact.

Both Commissions have agreed that the vegetation line will not be appropriate for the area within Lake Texoma, but have agreed that the south bank as it existed prior to construction of the Denison Dam will remain as the boundary. The Texas Commission discussed what boundary should be used for the Texoma area and determined the most easily identifiable boundary would be the I-35 Bridge on the West end and the US 75 Bridge on the West end and the US 75 Bridge on the south end. The area between the bridges is that area that is a part of or affected by Lake Texoma where the boundary should remain the same under the Texas Commission's view.

Commission Member, Pat Peale of Gainesville reported that she would be discussing on behalf of the Commission the proposals with local officials in the Texoma area during the next several weeks and report back to the Commission prior to submission of a revised Compact to Oklahoma.

# Bertha and Ervin Hamric served Muenster community for 33 years

original location was just north of where the Gymnastic Sports Center is now.

J.M. Weinzapfel soon began construction of a new and modern building to accommodate Hamric's and The Charm Shop, adjacent to the Muenster State Bank.

On Oct. 13, 1956 the businesses celebrated their grand openings in the newly completed facility. There was always a friendly and trusting atmosphere between the two separate enterprises who shared the same building without a full dividing wall.

Bertha and Ervin happily and successfully operated the business until June, 1970 when Ervin died suddenly of heart failure. Following his father's death, Dan Hamric joined the firm and assisted his mother until 1978 when he returned to the teaching profession. Bertha continued with her staff of employees until June 1980 when she sold the store to Jane and Roy Monday.

Ervin is remembered by customers and employees for the many store fixtúres and display items that he built. Once when they were at Market in Dallas, he admired a

wagon wheel table in the Levi Company showroom. Upon return home, he located a similar wagon wheel owned by the father of Maurice "Chili" King. He bought the wheel and built the table that identified the front entrance near the south door. On Oct. 12, 1956 the day before the store's grand opening, he proudly brought in his wagon wheel table.

"If that old wheel could talk," mused Bertha, "it could relate many interesting conversations that passed over it through the years." Customers and sales representatives delighted in pausing for a few moments and a quick cup of coffee.

"We always received good encouragement from J.M. Weinzapfel and frequently relied on his sage advice. He always reminded us to keep a good stock. You can't sell from an empty wagon,' he would say. Sometimes when I might hesitate at Market, Ervin would say to me 'You can't sell from an empty wagon."

Pausing for a moment, in a reflective mood, Bertha Hamric smiled and said 'One of my favorite memories was an incident when we had been in business about six months. A lady we knew well (from out-of-town) came in to shop, bought things for her husband and

"I really hurt when I sold the business that had been a part of my family for 33 years," said Bertha Hamric, then quickly added with a smile, "But I have such wonderful memories! We became acquainted with so many families, watched their children grow up and got to know several generations.

"It was interesting to watch the change in fashions, and styles; and watching the changes in prices since 1955, looking back, comparing prices now sometimes comes as a shocker.

"It was fun, too, at Market! Ervin and I tried to avoid buying two items exactly alike."

future that sustained us for 33 years.

Then there were funny things sometimes. And sometimes there were day-brighteners. Like the man who came in and announced he wanted to buy a brown suit. He emphasized the brown color. Nothing we showed him was just right. Then he saw a navy suit on display. There, he said. That I like, that's just right. He bought the suit, walked out with a big smile, saying 'that is a good looking brown suit I'll be wearing. His wife phoned with her pleasure, I've been trying to tell him (unsuccessfully)."

"We sold a lot more than clothing. We also sold service. There was that one Christmas Eve after 8:00 p.m. when a grandmother called us in a panic. She had forgotten to buy just enough gifts to go around, in her large family. So Ervin met her at the store, filled her order, beautifully gift wrapped, and both left smiling."

Bertha Hamric remains an active, interested participant in the community she loves. She is a member of the Muenster Historical Commission, the Muenster Museum, the Chamber of Commerce, the Muenster Hospital Auxiliary, the Catholic Daughters of America, and formerly served on the Centennial Committee. She also relishes a good day when she can play golf.

Bertha Hamric closed this interview with an appeal and an alert (not in the sense of a warning or doom) to local residents, buyers, customers. She emphasized the extreme urgency of "Buying At Home." She hopes that they will realize that falling prey to slick "out-of-town values" in preference to home town values is a double edged sword. "Hometown merchants need hometown customers for survival When Ervin and I were in business, we had a deep appreciation for the support from customers, locally and from a wide circle of friends in the surrounding trade area. We could not have made it without both of them. I urge all of you: Please shop at home, because the local retail, establishment needs you for its survival. We all have to Hang In There. We'll make it together! Think Quality! Where can you find better than we find here? Maybe you can buy some things cheaper, but you can't buy quality. The maxim remains: You just get what you pay for!!"

# What is El Nino?

In Spanish, El Niño means "the little baby" and is a reference to the Christ child. It was so named by fisherman off the coast of South America because the weather phenomenon tends to occur around Christmas.

El Nino is a naturally occurring but irregular climate cycle born in the Pacific Ocean. Warmer than normal surface waters, a huge pool of it that currently is up to 10 degrees warmer than normal in some parts - shift from one sector of the ocean to the other. That pool of hot water is currently farther north and east than during normal El Ninos. In fact, it's off the west coast of Mexico.

Called the second largest

Called the second largest factor in worldwide weather patterns (next to the seasons), El Nino's waters force changes in oceanic and atmospheric conditions and weather patterns. It produces a huge concentration of tropical rainfall which affects the frequency, severity and direction of storms in the Pacific. That, in turn, can make both the monsoons of India and the winter flooding in California much more severe than usual, and Pacific waters on the South American coast are a foot higher than normal

#### Weather report

From mid-December to mid-January, we should see warmer than normal temperatures, and above average rainfall for the period.

Variable cloudiness should move over Texas skies this weekend, with precipitation confined to the northeast. Early next week, rains should return statewide.

Prospects are good for dry weather Christmas day and into the weekend. However on December 28, rain and snow could occur in the north.

Variable cloudiness, mild temperatures and scattered precipitation are likely the last week of December.

Fair, mild weather is expected to start the New Year, with rain and cooler temperatures dominating the area by the 5th and 6th.

Prospects are good for warm, dry weather January 7-9 followed by continued mild temperatures and a chance of rain on the weekend of the 10th and 11th.

January 12 through 18 should see variable cloudiness and scattered showers.

In the summer following an El Niño, the effects are usually just the opposite. If it's warm and wet in the winter, it's often dry and cool the next summer. That effect has been dubbed either "La Niña" (the little girl) or "El Viejo" (the old man) by the scientific community.

There have been three outlandishly large El Niños in this century: 1905-1906, 1972-1973, and 1982-1983. Even the last of these could not be predicted. But today, with a lot of data now coming from satellites, ocean buoy sensors and other sources, computer models have been built that forecast potentially severe climatological changes from this El Niño.


