LIFTING OF EMBARGO ON ARGENTINE CATTLE WILL **BE FOUGHT BY CONNALLY**

Speaking before approximately 2,900 members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in their annual convention recently in San Antonio, Senator Tom Connally declared that he would fight ratification by the Senate of the proposed United States-Argentina Sanitary Convention, which would lift the embargo on the shipment of Argentine

cattle into this country. After a brief review of the cattle the Roosevelt administration, in which he told of the benefits to ranchmen afforded by the cattle relief act of 1934, Connally attack-

"There is pending before the committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate, the so-called United States-Argentina Sanitary Convention, which vitally effects the safety and security of our cattle industry. I am opposed to the ratification of this convention," he



TURKEYS PROVE VALUE

TO GROWERS IN TEXAS

The last Department of Agriculture census in 1935 showed that 114,000 farms had flocks out of 500,-00 in Texas. Though no definite figure has been released since then, the number is known to have increased above 2,000, according to estimates of turkey-egg shipping ssociations over the State.

The 3,000,000 turkeys in Texas constitute about 15 per cent of the nation's total of 18,000,000 birds. Value of turkeys alone in the state in 1937, not counting eggs was approximately \$6,000,000, as the average bird weighed fourteen pounds and sold for about 14c a pound.

Shipment of dressed turkeys from Texas to out-of-state markets is becoming an industry of importance for some sections. About 1,300 cars were shipped in 1937, valued at around \$4,000 a car, approximately the same total shipped in 1936.

Dressing plants usually locate in cities near the major turkey producing sections. These are Brownwood, Brady, San Antonio, Cuero, Yoakum, Dallas, Ft Worth, and Denison. About 93 per cent of the shipments go during the holiday season of November and December, 7 per cent in January and February.

District supervisors of the Farm Security Administration report more and more interest on their clients' farms in turkeys. The trend seems general over the State as a whole, and an increase in the population can be expected this year.

The new farm act, recently enacted by Congress, provided for the establishment in one of the cotton-growing states, a cotton research laboratory. Purpose of the labora-

tory will be to find new uses The Cotton for cotton, and through research increase cotton consumption. Laboratory The laboratory also will deter-

mine the best grades of cotton to plant, and provide other data to aid the cotton farmer. The work is badly needed, and Congress acted wisely in making provision for such a governmental agency.

United States Senator Tom Connally has pointed out a number of times that such a research daboratory for cotton should be established in Texas, largest cotton producing State in the union. He also has warned that Texas should present a united appeal for the station, rather than a hap-hazard attempt by many sections of the State, which probably would lead to confusion and would certainly risk loss of the station for Texas.

Now the Texas Congressional delegation has submitted to Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace a memorial giving five reasons why the laboratory should be established in Texas. The reasons are:

1. Cotton is now grown all the way from California to the Atlantic Coast. Texas is located in almost the exact center of the cotton area.

2. Texas produces nearly one-third of all the cotton produced in America.

3. Cotton in the western area is produced under different conditions as to climate and soil from the eastern area. Texas is so located that it meets both conditions, The eastern half of the State is typical of eastern cotton production and the western part of the State is typical of the western production of cotton. In fact, Texas produces all types and is typical of the entire area.

4. Texas is located in the east-west axis and produces cotton under practically all conditions, and thus the institution could best serve all cotton producers.

5. The State of Texas exports nearly 90 per cent of its cotton. The trend of cotton production in recent years has been toward the west.

It is further pointed out that as a practical proposition, the western area is less interested in adjustment program than the eastern area. There is, therefore, more disposition to criticize an adjustment program. Much of this criticism and dissatisfacton would be eliminated if the research institution were located in the area which is most interested to the export phase of the program.

The Congressmen have presented a strong case for Texas. Fortunately for the State, all of the cotton-growing commonwealths are located in the "Solid South" where there is no particular reason for playing politics. Texas should have an excellent opportunity to secure the research laboratory. Certainly no other State can present so strong an argument for it.

regulation of corporations doing business in more than one State. Clark pointed out, upon leaving, that under the present law, any State can exclude from its borders any corporation which does not comply with its

bill would provide for Federal

Presumably under the proposed measure, Federal authority would supersede the State in the regulation of foreign corporations doing business in Texas, which would include most of the larger corporations now in Texas, and certainly a majority of those with which the State has difficulties.

More and more is the trend toward centralization of authority in Washington. That Capital City, once far removed from the thoughts of resident and officials of States so far away as Texas has gradually assumed so many strictly State duties that no state official can properly conduct the business of his office without more or less frequent visits to Washington. Not all of this assumption is bad, to be sure. In many cases in which the Federal government is giving assistance, furnishing money or directing activities, such acton came as a blessing more or less in disguise.

Accepting Federal aid when it is beneficial, and surrendering to Federal direction in internal matters; those two things are quite different. Where an infringement of state rights is involved, Texas should make every effort to protect its interests.

and weather conditions were such that the whole production area of the Southwest came into harvest at about the same time. Furthermore, depression had caused a substantial reduction in the number of box cars available for grain loading, while the increased movement of other freight throughout the country last summer took cars that might otherwise have been used for the wheat.

The railroads, needless to say, planned for months ahead to perfect the complicated system that moved the crop with the absolute minimum of delay. Unprecedented, steps were taken to make sure that every available, car would be on hand in wheat shipping centers. The only car, shortages were of brief duration and were reported by two railroads operating small branch lines of limited

facilities. Time after time the railroads have accomplished Herculean tasks equally well. Had they failed, farmers and shippers would have suffered losses running into the

With employment on its way back to where it was when WPA first appeared, Washington had little confidence that its \$250,000-000 contributed anything to a fundamental solution of the problem. WPA last month offered an account of what the nation has been getting or its money-a tatal of \$8,671,078,-685 granted by Congress for relief. More than half of this amount has been allocated to WPA, making it New Deal's greatest spending agency. Wages and salaries accounted for 85 per cent of money well under the 5 per cent maximum allowed by law.

The report summarizes the acomplishments of more than 150,-000 projects up to October 1, 1937. Visible to the naked eye were 11,-106 new public buildings (including 115 new armories), 43,870 miles of new highways, 19,272 new bridges, more than 11,500 miles of new roadside drainage ditches and 54,244 drawings, easel paintings, murals and sculptured works. Not so obvious were 128,057,654 school lunches served, 18,272,529 books catalogued and 24,099,607 rodents



A. It required all votes to be cast at the county seats and provided that the elections last four days.

A. Edmund J. Davis, the Republican candidate, was elected goveror in November, 1869, over A. J. Hamilton by a reputed majority of about 800, according to the finding of the military headquarters. The Democrats claimed that the returns were fradulently handled, nd a committee of the convention that framed the 1876 constitution reported that it was unable to find he returns of the 1869 election and that they they had been taken out of the State by General Reynolds.

Q. When did Edmund J. Davis become governor of Texas?

A. Davis took the oath of office. Jan. 17, 1870, for the four year term, as provided in the new constitution, but could only serve as provisional governor until that constitution was approved by Congress during which time General Reynolds continued as military gover-

Q. What radical action was taken by Reynolds as military governor after Davis took the oath of

A. He hurriedly called the legislature to convene on Feb. 8, appointed Ben Butler, a "carpet bagger", speaker of the house epresentatives, required members to take a more stringent test oath all contests in favor of the radicals.

A. Although General Reynolds let his hand-picked legislature know that he would like to be elected to the United States Senate, Morgan Hamilton was elected for the short term, ending 1871, and also Webster Flanagan, lieutenant-gov-ernor, was chosen as the other senator, for the term ending in

A. It provided that "All elections for State, district and county officers shall be held at the county seat of the several counties, until otherwise provided by law; and the polls shall be open for four days, from eight o'clock a. m. until four c'clock p. m. of each day."

Q. What proclamation did Governor Davis issue governing voters under this provision?

A. Before the election in 1872, he issued a proclamation requiring voters who did not live in the county seat at which they voted, by members of the senior and leave immediately after casting their ballots.

The principal reason for the lack of development of domestic manga nese, Washington hearings have shown, has been the camparatively low metallic manganese content of American ores. It was also brought out that the 1935 reciprocal trade pact with Brazil cutting the mangatariff rate in half and applying also to other foreign sources, principally Russia and Africa, had stagnated domestic production just when new concentrating processes were giving promise of making managnese mining here worth the effort and investment.

Besides the Miller bill there are concurrent resolutions in House and Senate calling upon the Secre tary of State to remove manganese from the commodities coming under the Brazil agreement and to exclude it from proposed new tariff treaties. Testimony before the Senate Military Affairs committee was to the effect that, with only that tariff protection a domestic industry utilizing several new "concentrating" processes would de velop within a few years to the point of making this country selfsufficient in manganese. It was pointed out, though, that American ores could not be developed or short notice for "emergency" use.

With the success of these moves, the Council's report said, Texas would be in position to bid for a large share of the 68,000,000 manhours of employment and \$24,000,-000 in payrolls that compilation of such domestic manganese reserve would bring, and a favorable offical attitude toward those undertaking this and kindred developmental enterprises would be im portant factor in attracting this, as well as other types, of industrial investment.






