

Carport fire threatens Otto home

Reportedly nobody was home when a vehicle parked in a carport of a home just northwest of Muenster burst into flames Saturday, June

14. The fire was at the residence of Cathy Otto on County Road 316. Muenster Fire Chief Herbie Knabe said that 16 members of the Muenster Volunteer

Fire Department were at an all day training session north of Muenster when they got the fire call around 4 p.m. It took them about six minutes to arrive on the scene. They had their trucks with them, which saved the time of having to go to the department to get them.

Knabe said that the fire in the carport/storage building was full blown when they arrived. "We stopped the fire before it got into the house," he said. "It burned the door of the utility room off and the heat melted plastic in the utility room, but we got water on it before it started to burn." There was some smoke damage to the home's interior. A hole was cut in the roof to vent the smoke. Knabe said the house appeared to be burning at one point, but it was only smoke. It took about 30 minutes to get the fire under control. They were on the scene around an hour and a half including mop up time, he noted.

Saint Jo and Myra Volunteer Fire Departments assisted at the fire and Lindsay Volunteer Fire Department brought a tanker with water since the nearest fire hydrant was 500 feet away and the fire hoses don't reach that far. Knabe estimated damage done by the fire to be about \$50,000.

Rock costs District \$60,000

A large layer of solid rock that was discovered about six feet below the surface at the construction site of the Muenster ISD cafeteria/classroom project site, added \$60,000 to the foundation cost of the building.

According to Muenster Superintendent John Kaufman, there was a miscommunication between the contractor and architect, with one operating what they were told and the other by what was in the draft. "An unforeseen cost expense," was how Kirk Dawson of Kibler Construction described the situation.

The drop in the level of the land forced the construction

of piers that the building will sit on. The Muenster ISD Board of Trustees approved the change order for the \$60,000.

At the monthly meeting on Wednesday, June 11, the Board was introduced to new Athletic Director and Head Football Coach Allen Cross. Coach Cross gave a brief presentation on his coaching philosophy.

A total of 61 student transfers were approved, which included 13 each from Era ISD and Gainesville ISD, 11 from Sivells Bend, seven from Saint Jo, six from Lindsay, and five from Forestburg. Last school year, 13 transferred out of the Muenster

District, with five each going to Lindsay and Saint Jo, and one apiece to Gainesville, Valley View, and Era.

Other action items approved were: amend fuel cost in the 2007-08 budget from \$24,500 to \$48,500; the 2008-09 technology plan for the District, which included a \$145,950 budget, needs assessment, goals, objectives, and strategies; and to increase the golf coaching stipend to \$1500.

Monthly reports included:
• Elementary - Current enrollment for grades Pre-K through 6th for the next school year is 244, down 10 from this time last year. Large-

Youths bake to benefit Sawyer

For the past three years, two young ladies, Megan Schumacher and Brienne Sandmann of Lindsay, have spent a part of their summer helping others. Their third annual benefit bake sale is set for Tuesday, June 24 through Friday, June 27 from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Marilyn's Classy Cuts, 124 E. Sixth Street, Lindsay.

Baked items for sale will include pies, brownies, cookies, muffins, cinnamon rolls, and breads.

This year, the money earned will be donated to Randall Sawyer of Era who

has a very rare form of cancer called Langerhans. According to his wife Krystal, only one in 560,000 adults are diagnosed with this disease. It is mostly found in children, she noted. Krystal said that there are three varieties and Randall's doctors told him they feel that the one he has is the "better" of the three to have.

In April, it was chest pain that first prompted Randall to go to the doctor. Tests showed that his heart was fine. His physician ordered a bone scan that showed a tumor on his sixth rib. He was sent to Baylor and underwent surgery on

May 20 to remove a portion of the rib with the tumor.

Krystal said that first the surgeon accidentally removed the wrong rib, so Randall has a portion of the sixth and seventh ribs removed. He has an appointment with his oncologist earlier this week and had tests done that will determine the next step of treatment. She said that blood work and a CT scan should show how far the Langerhans has progressed in his body. They should get the results by Thursday, she said. The three possible treatments are chemotherapy if tests indicate it

Al died at the age of 99 at 7:35 p.m. on Monday, June 9, 2008 at Muenster Memorial Hospital.

Born Feb. 21, 1909 in Muenster, a son of Robert and Agnes Swirczynski Yosten, Al grew up and lived in the Muenster area all his life. He attended Sacred Heart School through the eighth grade. Preparation for possible future rescue calls began Saturday, June 14 for the Muenster Volunteer Fire Department and Cooke County EMS. There were 29 participants in the all day rescue class that began with lessons on the ins and outs of using the new rescue equipment and safety precautions. The training was held at Wolf Ridge Wind Farm north of Muenster for rescue from their wind generator towers. Herbie Knabe, chief of the Muenster Volunteer Fire De-

partment, said that Florida Power and Light purchased two sets of Tractel rescue equipment at a cost of about \$3,000 each. They are also providing the education and training courses at no cost. After the morning classroom time, the participants took part in on the ground training. They each went into a nacelle that was still on the ground to see what they are like inside, and what a rescue might involve. Future training is planned and will involve actual rescue training.

March natural gas production

Texas oil and gas wells produced 504,649,395 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for March 2008, up from the March 2007 preliminary gas production total of 491,363,149 Mcf. Texas production in March 2008 came from 136,840 oil and 81,337 gas wells.

has gone into the body; radiation if it was in soft tissue around the rib; or monitoring if it is felt they got all of the cancer. Randal has two children, one eight and one seven, and he and Krystal have a two-year old. Randal is unable to

work at this time. If there are no more treatments required, he will likely be released to go back to work in a month or two. If more treatments are required, that could change. Krystal said he has applied for short-term disability, but hasn't received any yet.

Randal is the son of Randy and Beverly Sawyer. His wife is the former Krystal Jankiewicz, daughter of Cindy and Pat Walterscheid of Muenster. He is employed through Spraylat in Gainesville and Krystal works at the Cooke County Courthouse.

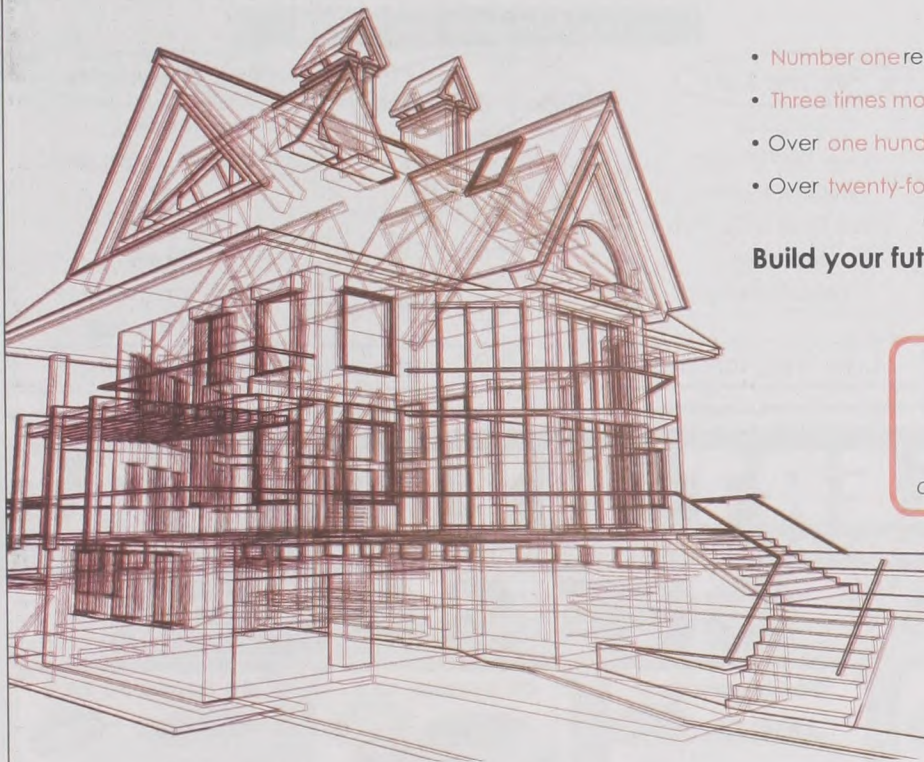

Texas Football makes its picks for '08

The 49th annual edition of *Dave Campbell's 2008 Texas Football* is available on the news racks. The bible among high school sports magazines, Campbell's is quickly picked up and viewed by sports fans who want to know how their teams stand in the upcoming season.

The Muenster Hornets were placed in District 13-A along with returning Lindsay, Era, Collinsville, and newcomer Blue Ridge, who dropped down from 2A. Last year's Eagles of Valley View stepped up to 2A, while the Saint Jo Panthers will play 6-man football.

The Pirates of Collinsville were Campbell's pick to lead the District, and they will represent Division I. The Knights were placed 2nd, followed by Muenster, Blue Ridge, and Era. Blue Ridge has an enrollment of 182, while Era has 133 students.

Collinsville was last season's Division II Area Finalist with a 4-1 district record. "Team speed and senior leadership" are the Pirates' strengths, with "a fearsome backfield." Quarterback Mitch Lawdermilk "has the potential for a 2000 yard season." Collinsville has six offensive and eight defensive starters returning.

The Knights of Lindsay return 5 and 4 starters from a Division 2 Bi-District Finalist season. The player to watch is defensive lineman Jeremy Perry. Top juniors returning are Ross Jones and Ryan Haverkamp, with Robert Arend named top sophomore.

Other prospects are quarterback Nick Bezner, offensive linemen Casey Shauf and Blake Hunter, and running back Josh Mueller.

Coach Cody Bounds noted that the team graduated a good senior class and the Knights will have to fill holes at a number of skill positions as they rebuild. Key losses included Keith Hermes (LSU) Garrett Block (West Texas A&M), Mason Ward (Ole Miss), Dillon Ott, and Nathan Martin.

The Muenster Hornets are rebuilding from a 1-4 district record, with eight offensive and nine defensive players returning. The key lost player named was Charles Womble, but Garrett Hennigan, Chase Serna, Andrew Yosten, and Colton Steelman were also seniors on the team.

The magazine listed two players to watch - Corey Reynolds and Matt Flusche. The top sophomore is Garrett Walterscheid, with other prospects Taylor McGrew, Paul Crabtree, Jeffrey Schniederjan, T.J. Acuna, Jeremy Lutkenhaus, and Eric Hellman named. "The team returns all of their top performers from a year ago," the article concluded.

The Blue Ridge Tigers dropped down from a winless 2A season. "The graduating class of 2006 is still haunting Blue Ridge, who enters another year of rebuilding."

The Era Hornets return 7/7 starters from a 4-6 season. Key losses were Aaron Fortenberry (UNT) and Tony Miller (SW Oklahoma State). Players to watch are R. J. Metzler, Trey Dunn, and Dillon Hughes.

Coach J.D. Henderson noted the "team should be stronger with the return of QB Metzler and the influx of good young players."

The Sacred Heart Tigers of TAPPS Division IV, District 1, are listed along with Amarillo Arbor Christian and Watauga Harvest Christian. Amarillo San Jacinto and Fort Worth Lake Country are also part of the district, but are not mentioned in the magazine.

The Tigers have five offensive and four defensive starters returning from a 1-2 District record. Player to watch was Dylan Flusche, with John Krawietz and Kyle Knabe the top juniors and Matt Hesse top sophomore. Other prospects named were Sam Sparkman, Tommy Torcellini, and Zach Zanchetta.

The 2008 campaign could be a rebuilding year for Sacred Heart. Coach Dale Schilling "admits that he could have trouble replacing his quarterback and middle linebacker. The top candidate under the center looks to be sophomore QB Hesse."

The Lions of Arbor Christian lost just three players from last year's Regional playoff team that was 6-4 on the season and 3-0 in district.

The Saints of Harvest ended '07 3-7 and have 7/7

starters returning to the field.

Concerning other teams in the area, Saint Jo was placed in Division I, District 11 in their first 6-man season, and ranked #1 in the district. Greenville Phoenix charter is the other team in the district. Three teams originally aligned to this district - Dallas 1 Am, Rowlett Advantage, and Irving Universal Academy - will not field teams in 2008.

The Forestburg Longhorns are placed 3rd in Division II, District 9, behind Ladonia Fannindel and Gold-Burg. Byers is also in the district. The Horns were 1-4 last season. Still a very young program, Forestburg "will have strong senior leadership and may benefit from being in such a small and equally inexperienced district."

Valley View moved up to District 10AA and is the smallest school in the six team district (223-428). Coach Terry Felderhoff saw last year's Eagles hard hit by graduation and could expect

a "building year." Pilot Point, Pottsboro, Aubrey, Callisburg, and S&S round out the district.

The Gainesville Leopards were placed 5th in a six team district. Celina, the smallest populated school (479) is ranked 1st, and Sanger (745) is in last place in District 9-AAA.

A feature article *The Art and Science of Realignment* attempts to explain UIL's logic in the placement of teams. This year, there are 225 2A schools and 163 11-man schools in Class A.

The proposed split conference plan has an enrollment range of 100-154 for Class A, Division II; 155-199 for Class A, Division I; 200-429 for the Class AA divisions; 430-979 for 3As; and on up.

Texas Football magazine went on sale in the area Tuesday afternoon. Besides covering 1,300 Texas high schools, the magazine has a recruiting section, college section, NFL section, and eight feature stories.

Multiple pasture systems can save money

In a grazing situation, producers need to be concerned about two organisms – the plant and the animal. Therefore, they must understand the growth and development of both. The two are in a constant state of change. The animal's requirements change with different stages of growth and/or lactation. The nutritive level of forage will vary with the class of forages, plant maturity, and the season. The amount of forage varies with management level, season, and climate conditions.

Complicating matters even more is the changing economic environment. Live-stock producers are highly affected by increased fertilizer and fuel costs. Economic viability may hinge on the way pastures are managed.

Understanding how different pasture management systems work, producers can stretch their fertilizer dollars and lengthen the grazing period by months to reduce reliance on hay, yet maintain livestock nutrition.

Dr. Gerald Evers, Texas AgriLife Research forage management scientist, has suggested the usefulness of a three pasture system. This system would consist of a hay meadow (about 40% of open pasture), a pasture to be over-seeded with ryegrass-clover (also about 40% of open pasture), and a third pasture used for feeding hay and calving (about 20% of open pasture).

The hay meadow should

never be over-seeded with annual ryegrass because it would delay the spring growth of perennial warm season grasses, like bermudagrass. The hay meadow should be fertilized according to recommendations. After one cutting (depending on producer hay need and weather conditions) the meadow could be grazed until September. Any growth should be removed by grazing or a hay harvest during the month of September. If moisture permits, some additional nitrogen at this time would help to produce a standing hay crop to be grazed by mature, non-lactating livestock after first frost.

The pastures should be overseeded with ryegrass and clover or vetch. They can have any type of summer grass on them. It is critical to select a legume that is adapted to the soil type and

has the potential to reseed so it does not have to be replanted each fall.

Both the hay meadow and the overseeded pastures may be subdivided to allow rotational grazing. Rotational grazing will increase the amount of usable forage even further.

The success of this system is dependent on fall rainfall to grow a fall standing hay crop and get ryegrass and clover established. It is important to store excess hay in a manner that protects it from the weather.

TDA market recap

For the week ending June 14, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were mostly \$2 to \$5 per hundredweight lower under pressure from higher grain prices. Fed cattle prices declined \$1 per hundredweight.

Cotton and grain prices were sharply higher. Ongoing concerns about the wet weather and flooding in the Midwest caused corn prices to rise and helped pull wheat and grain sorghum markets higher. Cotton prices rose after USDA reduced its estimate of stocks remaining at the end of this marketing year.

As for futures markets, finished cattle, cotton, wheat, and corn closed the

week higher, while feeder cattle and lumber were lower. Weather during the week was hot, dry, and windy for most of the state, though some locations in East Texas reported as much as two inches of rain. Topsoil moisture was rated mostly short to very short statewide. The dry weather stressed crops with most acreage reported in good to fair condition.

Wheat harvest is 51% complete, slightly ahead of the average pace. Cotton planting stands at 94% complete, slightly ahead of average. The corn crop is 51% tasseled compared to the 57% average by this date.

Red meat production climbs

From January to March 2008, commercial red meat production was 12.5 billion pounds, up 6% from 2007. Accumulated beef production was up 2% from last year, veal was down 16%, pork was up 12% from last year, and lamb and mutton production was down 7%. Source: NASS
