

HAVE NARROW ESCAPE WHEN LANDING MADE

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., June 18 (AP)—Delayed by a stop in Louisiana for fuel this morning, William S. Brock and Edward F. Schlee completed their round trip coast-to-coast flight this afternoon, landing at the Jacksonville municipal airport 16 hours and 50 minutes after leaving San Diego, Calif., last night.

On arriving here the men disclosed that they had come down at Tallulah, Louisiana, at 9 a. m., today, to take on 50 gallons of fuel, thus explaining the delay in their arrival.

Culmination of the trip allayed fears for the safety of the men. They had not been sighted since leaving San Diego until 11:30 a. m., today, when their ship was reported passing over Thomasville, Georgia.

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Charter Amendment Election Is Called Here For July 25

City Council, meeting in called session Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, voted, unanimously to call a charter amendment election for July 25, also an election on the same date to determine whether or not City Council shall have the authority to issue City of Brownwood refunding bonds in the amount of \$111,000 for the purpose of refunding outstanding warrant indebtedness existing against the city at the present time. Three charter amendments will be voted on at this election, these being: First, amending the charter so that not more than \$10,000 in warrants can be issued by City Council in any one year; second, making the city plan commission a permanent committee acting in an advisory capacity to the City Council, with their election and term of office to be controlled by ordinance, and third, that the charter shall be amended so as to reduce the city's part in permanent street paving from one-fourth to one-tenth.

Calling of this special election followed extensive study and consultation on the part of City Council and in calling the election, Council hopes for the hearty support of the voters. The desire of City Council to issue the refunding bonds to care for the outstanding warrants followed the 1930 report of A. N. Thomson & Company, auditors, this firm having recommended that these bonds be issued. According to Mr. Thomson it is the only way by which the city will be able to place its finances on a business like basis, thus making it possible for the city to adopt and follow a budget in each and every department of the government.

Refunding Bonds Question

The ordinance outlining the question that will be presented the voters on July 25th, in regard to the refunding bonds, follows: "An ordinance providing for the submitting to the qualified property owning taxpayers of the city of Brownwood the question of whether the city of Brownwood shall have the authority to issue City of Brownwood refunding bonds in the amount of \$111,000 for the purpose of refunding outstanding warrant indebtedness existing against the city at the present time."

MORROW WINS NEW JERSEY'S ELECTION EASY

NEWARK, N. J., June 18.—(AP)—Out distancing his nearest opponent by more than 250,000 votes, Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow is the Republican nominee for United States Senator, double victor in a primary election in which he stood for repeal of the eighteenth amendment and state control of liquor. In the principal contest, for the long term, Morrow was nominated in a four-cornered fight in which he carried a majority of the total vote carrying all 21 counties.

Representative Franklin W. Fort, who ran as a dry with the backing of the state anti-saloon league was second. Former Senator Joseph S. Frelinghuysen, advocate of modification of the liquor laws and federal control of liquor traffic ran third. John A. Kelly, who sought the nomination as "the original wet Republican" was a poor fourth. Kelly was Morrow's only opponent for the short term.

With 313 of the state's 334 districts missing the vote was: Morrow 358,736. Franklin W. Fort 105,038. Joseph H. Frelinghuysen 41,896.

Opposed by Wet

Morrow will be opposed for election next fall by Alexander Simpson, wet Democrat, who was nominated for the six year term without opposition and for the unexpired term of former Senator Walter E. Edge by Miss Thelma Parkinson, the only democratic candidate for that term.

Fort and Frelinghuysen conceded Morrow's nomination a few hours after the polls closed and early returns indicated an emphatic victory for the Ambassador. Both sent telegrams congratulating him on his victory and pledging their support in the fall election.

The returns indicated that Morrow had carried many of the dry rural districts from which Fort was expecting his chief strength.

Ambassador Morrow sat quietly in his Englewood home reading Herodotus while the votes indicating his victory were being counted. He refused to comment, saying he would wait until the complete vote was tabulated.

"However," he said smilingly, "I seem to have carried my own ward."

Thanks Neighbors

He expressed great pride in the vote given him by his neighbors in Englewood.

Despite the overwhelming defeat of Fort, Dr. James K. Shields, superintendent of the anti-saloon league is still in the fight and "we are here to stay."

Morrow opened his campaign May 15 with an address in which he declared that if elected he would be prepared to support a resolution submitting to the states a constitutional amendment which would restore to the states the power to determine their policy toward the liquor traffic. He said: "I look forward to the time when the old leaders in the temperance movement will appreciate that they have not reached a final solution of a world old problem by the present eighteenth amendment. "I look to the time when the

moral teachers of the country will realize that in the battle for a great social reform there was wisdom in the old system of experimenting in 48 laboratories rather than in one."

During his campaign he visited every county in the state but made only three prepared addresses. One of these was devoted to a discussion of the London naval treaty which he helped draw up as a delegate to the recent London conference. He urged ratification of the treaty both as a peace move and as a guide to naval construction.

Probi's Name Nominer

The prohibition party nominated Dr. James Gilbert Mason for the long term and Miss Esther H. Elferth for the short term. Henry Jager was named by the Socialist party for both terms.

Fort was formerly secretary of the Republican National committee. He has been a fishing companion of President Hoover and was leader of the floor forces which nominated the President at the 1928 convention.

At a campaign meeting Morrow was praised as presidential timber by Dr. John Grier Hibben, President of Princeton University and by former Governor Edward G. Stokes. Twice statements were issued from the White House denying that President Hoover favored a particular candidate.

Morrow, and Amherst classmate of Calvin Coolidge and a lawyer was a partner of J. P. Morgan & Company before being appointed Ambassador to Mexico by Coolidge in 1927. He is the father-in-law of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh.

To Return To Mexico

NEWARK, N. J., June 18.—(AP)—Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow, who yesterday won the Republican nomination for United States Senator, plans soon to return to Mexico to complete his work interrupted by the London Naval Conference, to which he was a delegate.

It was said at Morrow headquarters that he probably would leave for Mexico on June 24.

Mexico Rejoices

MEXICO CITY, June 18.—(AP)—There was great rejoicing in Mexico today among Americans and Mexicans alike at Ambassador Dwight Morrow's overwhelming victory in the New Jersey senatorial primary elections yesterday.

Election returns were furnished in bulletin form by the foreign correspondents' club and newspapers to many Mexicans and Americans who sat up late to hear them.

Hood And Tubbs Cases Are Docketed For June Thirtieth

Trials of two burglary cases against Curtis Hood have been set for Monday, June 30, according to Judge E. J. Miller, who stated Wednesday he wished all witnesses subpoenaed in these two cases to be present on that date. Hood is now at liberty on bond following his indictment by the grand jury.

Other cases set specifically for that date are the liquor cases against C. R. Tubbs, Sr., and C. R. Tubbs, Jr.

He stated that all witnesses in the cases of L. L. Phillips and George M. Dikes had been excused until that time. Phillips is charged with chicken stealing charge and Dikes is held on a liquor charge.

This is the third case set for this week which had to be postponed because of illness of witnesses.

LIGHTNING KILLS 6

BUCHAREST, Rumania, June 18.—(AP)—A dispatch from Schoarsch near Fagarasch, Transylvania, today said that three persons were killed and six fatally injured when lightning struck the tolling bells of a church sheltering a crowd in a terrific storm there.

Three peasants, frightened by the storm, climbed the church belfry and swung the bells with their hands in signal to the remainder of the crowd to kneel and pray. Just as they knelt lightning struck the belfry and the three were killed.

The church caught fire and six died later of burns received. A large number of others were burned badly. The peasants remaining rooted to the spot.

Cuba Protests

HAVANA, June 18.—(AP)—The newspaper El Mundo says editorially today that signing of the Hawley-Smoot tariff measure brings to an end the long established and beneficial influence of Pan-Americanism upon the relations of Cuba with the United States. The paper declares that the new tariff will destroy the traditional ties of friendship heretofore existing between Cuba and the United States, which henceforth will be regarded by Cubans as an avowed enemy in their commercial intercourse.

DEMOCRATIC EXECUTIVE BODY ARRANGES FOR JULY PRIMARY

The regular meeting of the Brown County Democratic Executive Committee was held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the county court room with Dr. T. H. Taylor court reporter. A scheduled program had been arranged by the chairman and it was followed exactly.

After filling vacancies in the committee it was decided by the committee to continue the custom which has been used in the past of selecting the officers by a majority of votes. By using this method it will be necessary to again hold a second primary for some of the offices. It was brought out by the chairman that many counties had changed this year and that they were using the plurality system of selection instead of the majority system.

The committee meeting moved off in perfect harmony. The re-districting and changing of voting boxes made it necessary to change some men who had been transferred into another box by the abolishing of two voting boxes in the county.

Election Judges
It was decided that the precinct chairman of each voting precinct should act as judge of the election at that box in both the first primary and the run-off.

It was also decided that the delegates to the county convention to be held on August 2, should be chosen by writing the names on the official ballot. A space will be left for the selection of the delegates and they will be chosen in this manner instead of holding a precinct convention.

The certificates from district and state chairmen were presented and accepted. The official certification from the state committee was received Monday by the chairman and he stated that it was nearly one week late in arriving. Following this the applications from the district, county, and precinct office seekers were presented and accepted.

Following came the drawing of the names of the 106 candidates seeking the 35 offices listed on the official ballot. The names of all the candidates were placed in a hat and drawn to determine the order by which they would appear on the ballot.

The chairman was next instructed to appoint a ballot committee of five members which is as follows: Thompson, Harris, Page, Wilson and Salyer.

Candidate Assessments
Next the ballot assessments for all candidates were announced. It was announced by the chairman that offices had all made reports of earnings for the last calendar year and that the assessments had been set at the usual rate of taking 1-2 per cent of the earnings as the fee to be divided equally among the candidates.

Using same basis for assessment used for 1928 in accordance with Article 3108 of the Election Laws the assessments should be as follows: County Clerk, \$181.25; County Attorney, \$94.50; Judge \$152; Collector \$144; Assessor, \$157.50; Sheriff \$168.75; Superintendent \$99; Treasurer \$90; District Clerk \$108; Commissioners \$81; Justice of Peace One \$30; Public Weigher One, \$15; Constable One, \$15; Other public weighers \$10; Surveyor \$10; Other constables and justices \$3. Resolved by the Brown County Democratic Executive Committee that the Chairman be instructed to notify candidates of the appropriate assessments.

Following the adoption of the assessments as stated in the Chairman's report the next question discussed was the allowance for the election per diem of each box which should be based upon the vote cast. The report as given by Mr. Taylor as to the amount for the boxes is as follows:

The election judge should receive a minimum of \$4 for each primary and clerk \$2 for each primary. Two judges and one clerk to hold the elections in most of the boxes. In the larger boxes, by getting efficient men, a small number, say six, can be used and the per diem increased to cover the over time. Using the same officials for the second primary will partially compensate for the heavy vote in the first primary. The following should be the per diem for the boxes in 1930: Ward Four, \$30; Ward Three, and Ward One, \$26 each; Ward Two and Bangs, \$24 each; Blanket, May and Zephyr \$20 each; Cannon, \$16; Jones Chapel, Mt. View, Cross Cut, Clio, and Brooksmith, \$12 each. Other boxes, \$10 each—for each primary. The chairman then distributed copies of the revised election laws of Texas to each precinct chairman and designated special sections for study.

Meet Again August 2
The next meeting of the body was set for 10 o'clock on August 2, at which time the votes will be canvassed. At 2 o'clock the same afternoon the county convention will be held.

It was announced that ballots would be printed and supplies ready for distribution by the county clerk on Friday, July 18.

The absentee voting law was then discussed and it was announced that out of county voting should be done during the period prior to ten days before the election. The voters should appear before a notary of the public and establish his voting qualifications before casting his vote and mailing it to the county clerk. The county clerk should be written for an official ballot. Anyone who is to be away on election day should go before the county clerk and cast his vote in the usual manner.

The official ballot for county and district officers showing the candidates names in the order in which they appear is as follows:
District Attorney: Johnson, South; Representative: Davis, Wesley, Chambers; County Judge: Gray, Sweet, Butler; County Attorney: Wilson, Wilkison; District Clerk: Ashmore, Cole, Foresythe; County Sheriff: Denman, White; Tax Collector: Snider, Meek; Tax Assessor: Seward, Hill Moore, Karr; County Treasurer: Lewis, Pain, Mullins; County Superintendent: Swindle, Brandon; Commissioner One: Gyer,

Nunn, Thompson, Maedgen; Commissioner Two: Morrison, Stewart, Moore, Phillips; Commissioner Three: Thompson, Bird, Timmins; Commissioner Four: Palmer, Medcalf, DePriest, McCaughey, Martin; Constable one: Kitchep, Pitts, Woods.

The rest of the precinct candidates are unopposed as is the county surveyor and county clerk who are not included. The only ones seeking these offices is Ragsdale for surveyor and Burleson for clerk.

Eight candidates were initiated into the organization. Friday night and open house was held and a program was presented to the visitors. A team from Burkett gave a fancy drill and readings and musical numbers were given. A little play was also presented at the close of the program.

Burleson State Officer District And County Clerks

County School Board to Meet Friday Afternoon

The County School Board meeting will be held Friday afternoon at the office of the County Superintendent. At that meeting regular routine business will be discussed. County Superintendent J. Oscar Swindle said this morning that besides the regular business the board would be glad to hear petitions or wishes of anyone interested in county school affairs. He said that the meeting was to be an open meeting and everyone wanting to present matters before the board to be present at that time.

Given Two Years On Forgery Charge

Pete DeArmond was given two years in the penitentiary by a jury Tuesday morning in district court after pleading guilty to forgery of a check. He was arraigned and after making his plea the prosecution asked the minimum penalty, which was granted. He was tried and sentenced along with Roy Ford an hour and thirty minutes before the beginning of the Ervin trial.

TOMBIRD ERVIN GIVEN 5 YEARS

Tom Bird Ervin was given five years in district court Tuesday following a plea of guilty to the charge of robbery with firearms in connection with the robbery of the First National Bank here last year. Ervin was arrested at Wichita Falls last fall during the robbery of the Brownwood State Bank. He was returned to Brownwood by city officers and placed in jail. The jury in his trial was out less than fifteen minutes this afternoon before returning.

Following Ervin's return he made a statement implicating himself in the robbery of the Brownwood State Bank as well as the First National Bank here and a bank at Richland Springs. His statement also implicated Lloyd Champion in the robbery of the First National Bank and C. A. McNeil in the robbery of the First National Bank and the bank at Richland Springs.

It was largely through the testimony of Ervin that McNeil is now under a sentence of 40 years from Brown county and 25 years from San Saba county. Champion pleaded guilty to the robbery and was given 6 years.

Ervin was brought into court Tuesday morning and the selection of a jury started shortly before noon. The jury panel was completed before noon and the testimony started after the lunch hour.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD WOODLAND HEIGHTS PATRONS IN MEETING

A meeting between the Board of Trustees, Brownwood City Schools, and a group of school patrons from the Woodland Heights District, just south of the city limits, was held Monday night at Senior High School, with A. N. Thomason, president of the Brownwood school board, presiding.

The object of the meeting was to discuss, in an informal way, the proposed consolidation of the Brownwood and Woodland Heights districts. A large number of patrons in the Woodland Heights district have expressed a desire to bring the district into the city school system and last night's meeting was called to allow one and all to discuss pro and con any consolidation program.

A score or more Woodland Heights patrons attended the meeting and all indulged in a round table discussion of school problems. Mr. Thomason stated Tuesday morning that no definite action of any kind was taken and that no proposition had been made the Woodland Heights district - by the city school board, nor had the Woodland Heights people submitted a proposition or asked to be taken into the Brownwood school system.

Woodland Heights recently voted bonds for the building of a new school and it is understood that their building project will be carried to completion during the summer months.

Needs a Queen Bee, So He Orders One From Store

Even queen bees may be bought if one knows that he must have one or lose all of a good hive of bees which have been very nice about furnishing honey for some time, says A. M. Henry of 510 Durham Street. Mr. Henry found the queen that all of his big hive of bees were leaving because the queen had died and left them orphans. He needed a queen immediately as he had to keep the bees shut up to keep them from leaving and bees are just not any good if you have to keep them locked up so that they can not make the honey, he says.

So Mr. Henry went to Montgomery Ward & Company's store here and had them to order a pure-bred tested Italian queen bee from their store in Fort Worth. He is now looking for the bee most any day as in the order it was explained that the queen was needed immediately and for her to be rushed to the assistance of Mr. Henry at once. He says that he will put her with the rest of his bees and then let them out so they can work while there are plenty of flowers growing so that he will have plenty of honey for winter use.

This is considered quite an unusual order by employees at the store. Many of them knew that bees could be ordered through the company, but said that this was the first instance that they knew of when they were ordered. They are also anxious for the bee to arrive so they can see how she is mailed and what she looks like.

Two-in-One Egg Is Latest Product

Add one more to the stories of unusual eggs. This is one it is learned from Bluford Adams and he has the double egg shell still intact at his store to establish the authenticity of the story. This big two-in-one egg was brought to Brownwood by Mr. Crisp of the Blanket community and Mr. Adams, who has handled thousands of eggs in his career as a merchant, says that in all his egg experience he never saw one egg exactly like it before. This is a hen egg. It is a big one. The outer shell measures eight inches in circumference one way and nine inches the other. In the big shell is a smaller egg—of about the ordinary hen egg size. The space between this and outer shell was filled with white of egg, with no yolk. The enclosed egg, otherwise a normal egg, contained two yolks.

Session Is Held by Commissioners

Commissioners court met in regular session Monday at the court house. Some tax renditions were reduced. It was decided to move a house owned by Sid Crow which is in the right-of-way of Highway No. 7.

It was decided to furnish all wire and posts to build a new fence for the Brown County Fair Association where the highway will divide the property. It was also decided to grant a sum of \$300 to the Association for the building of a board fence.

Bids from five firms were considered for moving houses along the new highway route through North Brownwood. These bids will be decided later. Bids on houses along the right-of-way were taken as advertised and after some discussion some of the houses were sold. It was also decided to enlarge one drainage structure on Highway No. 129.

Good Crops In The Western Section Of Brown County

L. L. Hemphill of the western part of the county was in Brown-

wood Tuesday and stated that crop conditions in his section were good. Mr. Hemphill said that the cotton prospects there were as good as he had seen in many years and that he believed "that" unless something happened a good crop would be grown. He said that many in that section were threshing this week until the rain halted work in the grain fields.

In speaking of the grain he said that there was very little in that section as the land was mostly sand and did not raise good grain.

In speaking of the feed stuff he stated that the section was almost assured of a good crop as it was practically made and that a present it seemed that nothing could keep the farmers from making a big crop of feeds. He said that every-

one in that part of the county was elated with the feed prospects. In speaking of the melons he said that the sand was ideal for melon raising but that only a few had been planted. There are a few small patches of melons, he said, and all these are in good shape and show a prospect of a good crop.

There has been ample rain in the section, which is near Thrifty and the farmers are all rejoicing over the good season that their cotton has received. Mr. Hemphill said that most of them had their cotton up and that some were already chopping their cotton. Some, however, have not gotten their crop up as they were late in planting and have just completed their plowing.

First Horse Theft Case in the Court Here in 15 Years

A charge which used to be as common as that of automobile stealing is at present but which has not been known here for many years again brought into district court Tuesday when Roy Ford was sentenced for horse theft. The first case of this nature in Brown county was tried over fifteen years ago. Roy Ford was indicted by the grand jury on charge of the theft of the horse and when arraigned in Judge Miller's court pleaded guilty and was given two years in the penitentiary by the jury.
