

## Burglar hits Sacred Heart Catholic Church

Sometime between 6 p.m. Sunday, March 28 and 7 a.m. Monday, March 29, Sacred Heart Catholic Church was burglarized. Church officials reported the break in at 7 a.m. Monday morning.

According to Muenster Chief of Police Bob Stovall, the perpetrator(s) climbed a wooden fence to get to a southeast door which was accessed. Locks on two doors were forced to gain entry. A drill was used on the center of the locks and then the door forced open, causing damage.

Once inside, the thief went to an area where a safe

is kept behind locked doors. The keys were kept nearby and the thief used them to gain access to the safe. Chief Stovall commented that it appears that the location of the keys and the safe were known by the perpetrator(s). Nothing was ransacked. An unsuccessful attempt was made to drill into the safe.

Although nothing was taken from the safe, approximately \$30 was stolen from the candle money. The money box there was broken into by breaking off a hinge.

An estimate on property damaged during the burglary is not yet available.

## KMB launches Spring beautification efforts on April 10 clean-up

Keep Muenster Beautiful (KMB) President Elaine Schilling announced that the organization is geared up and ready for its Spring 2010 clean-up and beautification campaign. Their hope is to win the Governor's Community Achievement Award (GCAA) in 2011. Dr. Schilling said that should KMB be fortunate enough to win again, they will continue the pedestrian walk along Hwy. 82. It is their goal to see it run all the way to Main Street.

Only 10 deserving communities in Texas will be recognized with a GCAA. Communities are judged based on their population size. The divisions have changed from previous years' competitions and Muenster will have more competition. Muenster has the opportunity to win \$90,000 this time. The amount in the past was \$65,000.

The efforts of these communities to involve citizens, businesses, schools, local government, and youth to keep their city, county, or region beautiful will earn them a share of \$2 million in landscaping monies from Texas Department of Transportation. These prizes are designated for landscaping along

state-maintained highways in their communities.

"This is our big money year and we'd like to see a good turn out," remarked Dr. Schilling. "With all the wind, trash has blown into fences and waterways. It's a good time to get everything looking nice for Germanfest." If anyone has questions, contact her at 759-4995.

On April 10, KMB will be conducting its trash pickup around the parameters of Muenster as well as the local highways.

The date of the Spring planting has been changed to that same day, April 10, so lots of help will be needed. That is when KMB dresses up the KMB planters and flowerbeds around town with beautiful flowers.

All Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Golden Oldies, Muenster ISD and Sacred Heart Catholic School students, and all other residents are invited and encouraged to meet at the City Park that morning at 9 a.m. to be assigned a work area. Everyone will meet at the Park again at noon to enjoy a hot dog lunch courtesy of Muenster State Bank.

## Muenster Hospital Board authorizes issuance of \$1,400,000 revenue bond

With the construction of Muenster Memorial Hospital's new addition well underway, the Board of Directors adopted a resolution authorizing the issuance of \$1,400,000 in Muenster Hospital District Revenue Bonds to fund the project. The Board was unanimous in their vote of 6-0. Members present were Mary Dangelmayr, Danny Walterscheid, James Walterscheid, John Aytes, Ronnie Weinzapfel, and Kenny Klement. The bonds end Jan. 15, 2030. The Board approved the loan to be made from Muenster State Bank.

Heller reported that work is really progressing on the new addition. The pit for the hydrotherapy pool is poured and the pool has arrived.

The District had a short period of being "debt-free" as the note for the purchase of the CT scan in July 2006 was paid off 17 months early.

Bills accrued in the process of bringing the Hospital into compliance for ADA, and for access to the helipad, and for employee parking on the north side of the Hospital were approved. Administrator Lynn Heller explained, "When we started the construction, we realized that we were not going to have a way to move people in wheelchairs to the helipad except to take them out the Emergency Room door all the way around to the street and back down to the parking lot. We got out there and designed the ramp."

During the month of February, the Hospital District had net revenues of \$586,505 with operating expenses of \$542,398 for a net operating revenue of \$44,107. Ad valorem taxes totaling \$168,476 were collected and interest and depreciation for Saint Richard's Villa totaling \$2,669 brought the excess of revenues over expenses to \$209,913.

There were no bad debts written off in February since the District had contracted with a new company for debt collections. Administrator Heller said that after 60 days from the first billing with no contact or payment, the account would be turned over to the collection company. When requested, a billing program will be established, he said.

Board President Kenny Klement expressed some concern over this. He felt that in some cases where there are problems with insurance, that might not be sufficient time to resolve the issue. Heller noted that the patient could notify the Hospital of the problem to delay the turn over to collections. It was agreed to try the process and see how it works.

The Schedule of Contribution Accounts was discussed. Mary Dangelmayr chairs the David Bright Scholarship Fund. There is currently \$8,669.77 in that fund and \$14,751.50 in the Dr. Josh Phillips Scholarship Fund. She asked direction on scholarship amounts and how many to give out this year. The Board voted to give four scholarships in the amount of \$1,500 each for the David Bright Scholarship which goes to someone studying to work in the medical field.

The Phillips family will be contacted to see what their wishes are for that scholarship fund.

Administrator Heller proposed that the Board consider using the services of Marketing Consultant Steven R. Jolly. "As we get into having a rehab facility going, and promoting that in conjunction with the Wellness Center, we've got an opportunity to do something that's really first class," he explained. "I don't want to do something half-way on this deal. What we've got here is very special."

Some areas that Jolly would cover are developing and marketing pieces, image building, advertising, etc.

After some discussion, the Board requested that Jolly be asked to make a presentation to the Board before they make a decision to invest in his services.

In other business:

- Board President Klement certified unopposed Board candidates John Aytes and James Walterscheid.
- Canceled the May election since there was no opposition.
- Discussed persons to contact to serve in the unfilled

## Beware - fire dangers still exist

Rain visited the area frequently this winter and at times snow and ice spent time here also, making it a very wet winter. The ground is still soggy in many places.

Does that mean there are no worries when burning outdoors? No. There is still a lot of tall, dry grass that could ignite and spread quickly in the high winds that are typical with early Texas Springs. Ice caused many tree limbs and branches to break creating potential kindling for a wildfire. Cooke County Emergency

Management Coordinator/Fire Marshal Ray Fletcher said that the green-up now occurring helps to reduce the fire danger on days with high wind and low humidity, but when there is a fire, it is difficult for the fire trucks to get around in muddy fields.

"It's never a good idea to burn on a very windy day," cautioned Fletcher. "Not only could the embers blow out into a grassy area and start a wildland fire, they could also blow onto a roof or against a building and start a structure fire! With winds

in the 20s and 30s, embers could be blown 50+ feet, and it's hard to control a fire doing that."

Firefighters ask that you move any fire fuel away from your home and out buildings. Keep grass and weeds mowed and trimmed to keep fire from spreading.

Remember to call the Cooke County Sheriff's dispatch prior to any control burn or burning a large brush pile. This is a courtesy to your local firefighters so that they are not answering calls when someone reports your control burn as a fire.

Mrs. Stoffels died at the age of 86 Monday, March 22, 2010 in Arlington.

Born Nov. 3, 1923 in Shidler, Oklahoma, one of the two children of John Riley and Mary Calloway Prather Slaton, Wilda's family moved to Saint Jo when she was very young. Wilda grew up in Saint Jo and completed high school there. She married Albert Nick Stoffels on Sept. 3, 1941 at St. Mary's Church in Gainesville. She lived in Muenster since their wedding.

Wilda and Albert were members of Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Muenster. Albert died on Dec. 7, 2007.

Wilda worked diligently as a mother, wife, and homemaker. She was very busy raising and caring for four daughters and a son. Wilda worked briefly in the sewing factory prior to her employment as a cook at Muenster Memorial Hospital where she served some 24 years. She became a dietary supervisor after working there for several years.

Wilda really enjoyed crocheting, oil painting, sewing, writing short stories and poems, gardening, and cooking at home and for others. She and the girls were deeply involved with making their own Christmas decorations and making treats for the family. Wilda enjoyed singing, and in fact, had been a member of the Saint Jo High School Choir. She was a great lady, wonderful wife, mother, and grandmother, and loved visiting with the family, cousins, and friends. The last months of her life, Wilda lived at an assisted living center in Arlington near her daughter Gloria.

Survivors are daughters and spouses Annette Stoffels of Wolfe City, Betty and Robert Miller of Muenster, Gloria and Vic Culpepper of Arlington, and Karen and Don Sicking of Gainesville; son and wife John Albert and Terry Stoffels of Spring Hill, Florida; and 12 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by her husband, parents, brother Delbert Slaton, and cousin (reared with the family) Faye Kennedy.

Assisting during the funeral Mass were altar servers Butch Fisher, Alvin Hartman, and Sylvan Walterscheid. The First Reading was given by granddaughter Alicia Culpepper. Jacque Miller, granddaughter-in-law, gave the Second Reading. Prayers of the Faithful were read by Carolyn Jowers, granddaughter. The eulogy was given by Robert Miller who remembered that Wilda and Albert lived most of the married life on a farm west of Muenster. He spoke of her "24 year career in the dietary department of Muenster Memorial Hospital... She was well known for her great chocolate meringue pie with the super flaky crust."

"The Stoffels children may have gotten their sense of humor from their father, but their creative nature and talents came from their mother... Wilda was a great seamstress, making most of her children's clothes, including her daughters' prom dresses and Betty's wedding dress and veil."

"After their retirement, Albert and Wilda enjoyed keeping the yard and raising flowers..."

Robert closed with a poem entitled "As You Grew" written by Wilda for her children.

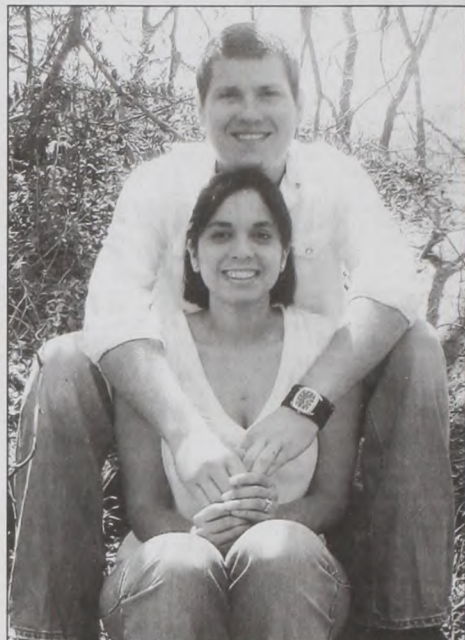
Each contestant will use Texas natural fibers - cotton, wool, and leather - to create a quilt block to be submitted to TDA. A panel of judges will select the win-

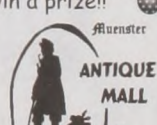

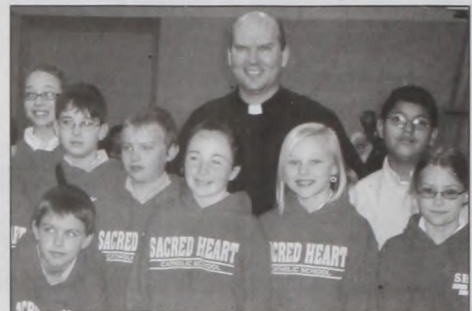

## NCTC calls for Art Show entries

Area painters, sculptors, photographers, and other artists should be putting the final touches on works they plan to enter for judging in this year's annual community art exhibit sponsored by the Visual Arts Department of North Central Texas College.

The theme for the 2010 exhibit is "Americana," according to Jimmy Staples, Art Department coordinator. Entries are not required to reflect this theme, but Staples said that an additional award will be given to the work which best does so.

Entries in this year's exhibit will be accepted on Friday, April 16, from 4-7 p.m., and on Saturday, April 17, from 10 a.m. to noon, in the Student Activity Center on NCTC's Gainesville Campus.

All entries will be on display to the public April 19-23, also in the Student Activity Center from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m., with a reception and awards ceremony scheduled from 6-8 p.m. on April 23 in the NCTC Little Theater adjacent to the exhibit area.

"We invite all local and area art lovers to join us that evening as we recognize this year's winners, mingle with local artists and art lovers, and enjoy refreshments and

wonderful hors d'oeuvres prepared by Labeth Nall and staff of NCTC's Great Western Dining Service," Staples said. "Many of the works will be available for sale, so visitors can pick up a piece of art that's 'just right' for their home or office to enrich their lives."

"Art is a powerful medium and without it, human beings would be incapable of balance. We often overlook how dependant we are on the arts to create harmony in our daily lives. From an economic standpoint, art is often seen as a luxury; however, if we had to be without art for a day, we would realize it is much more than a luxury."

Juror for this year's exhibit will be Paige Davidson of Gainesville. An accomplished artist, Davidson is owner of Paige Davidson Studio in downtown Gainesville and markets her own handmade line of one-of-a-kind art, accessories, handbags, and baby gear.

Works by adult and college student artists may be submitted under four media categories, including: A - Ceramics, Sculpture, Metals, and Jewelry; B - Acrylic, Oil, and Watercolor; C - Pastel, Pencil, and Pen; D - Amateur and Professional Pho-

tography, Original Digital Art. All two-dimensional art should be matted and/or framed as necessary and be ready for hanging. No kits, copies, or molded wares will be accepted.

A fee of \$10 will be charged for each individual work entered in the adult/college student division. Entries are limited to three selections per category. Artists are required to meet two terms of eligibility. First, the work should be fully original in concept and, secondly, should have been completed within the past two years.

The Youth Division has been split into five categories according to school grade—K-2, 3-5, 6-8, 9-10, and 11-12. The top entries in each category will receive awards from Gainesville Area Visual Arts, the Cooke County Arts Council, NCTC, and other sources. There is no entry fee, but there is a limit of three works per school per grade level or one work per individual (home school or club) per grade level.

At the awards ceremony on April 23, recognition and prizes will go to top entries in each division. Special awards will be given to the artwork that best portrays the exhibit theme, in addition to a "Best of Show" and "Peoples' Choice" award.

Also, Staples said the NCTC Art Department is pleased to announce that Donna Howell-Sickles will, for the third year, be awarding an NCTC art major with a \$500 scholarship.

Howell-Sickles is a local artist who has achieved international acclaim for her art, particularly her unique representations of the American cowgirl. In 2008, she was inducted into the Cowgirl Hall of Fame in Fort Worth.

Turning to this year's exhibit theme, Staples said that his Design class students collectively selected an exhibit theme, then each student created a design reflecting that theme. Out of that pool, the Exhibit Committee selected their favorite design to serve as the exhibit theme.

Not unlike the culinary and musical arts," he pointed out, "the visual arts often have artists working within self-imposed parameters of regionalism. I found a bit of irony in that my Design class this year again selected a theme that referenced region and culture. Perhaps I shouldn't, since region and culture have, and always will be, significant areas for artists to look to for the conceptualization and inspiration of their work. 'Americana' does have the potential to be a much broader topic than last year's theme, which was 'Texas Tradition,' and I suspect we will see many unique interpretations derived from it."

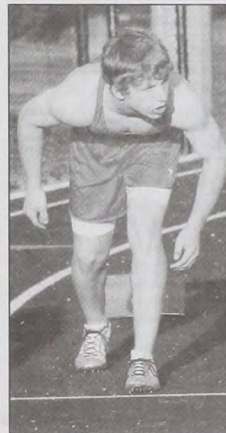

## UN admits flaw in report on meat and climate change

One of the authors of the 2006 United Nations report claiming meat production is responsible for 18% of global greenhouse gas emissions, more than transportation, is acknowledging that the comparison is flawed in light of recent research by an American scientist, the BBC reports.

Dr. Frank Mitloehner from the University of California at Davis, author of the published study, "Clearing the Air: Livestock's Contribution to Climate Change," says it is simply not scientifically accurate to blame livestock for climate change.

Mitloehner traces much of the public confusion to the 2006 report, "Livestock's Long Shadow," published by the UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), which he says overstates the role livestock play in greenhouse gas emissions.

"This lopsided analysis is a classical apples-and-oranges analogy that truly confused the issue," Mitloehner says. He presented his findings at a recent American Chemical Society Conference in California which was reported on by AMI.

Pierre Gerber, a policy officer with FAO, told the BBC he accepted Mitloehner's criticism.

"I must say honestly that he has a point - we factored in everything for meat emissions, and we didn't do the same thing with transport," he said.

AMI has long contended that attempts to apply these global numbers to the U.S.

are misleading because the vast majority of global greenhouse gas emissions attributed to livestock production result from deforestation and converting rain forests and other lands to grow crops or pasture. Such changes do not occur in the U.S., which has seen an increase in the total acreage of forested land over the last several decades even while total agricultural production has increased.

In fact, according to EPA, in 2007 only 2.8% of U.S. greenhouse emissions came from animal agriculture. This number has remained nearly constant since 1990, which is impressive considering U.S. increases in meat production of almost 50% over the same time period.

"The fact that greenhouse emissions have remained nearly constant while industry production has increased shows that U.S. livestock and meat producers have taken responsible steps to protect the environment, such as improving feed efficiency, implementing better manure management strategies, and using cropland more effectively," noted AMI President and CEO J. Patrick Boyle.

"We've accomplished this feat all the while providing the most abundant, safe, diverse, and affordable meat supply in the world."

Boyle concluded, "AMI looks forward to FAO's completion of a more comprehensive analysis of emissions from global food production at the end of this year."

## CATTLE RAISERS SUPPORT REVISIONS TO WATER QUALITY STANDARDS

The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA) on March 17 supported the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality's (TCEQ) proposal to revise the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards.

The revisions will provide more flexibility for the state to implement surface water quality standards and reduce excessive and unnecessary government regulation. This should save ranchers time and money while still protecting water quality.

In comments submitted to TCEQ, TSCRA applauded the agency for taking an appropriate and methodical approach to this revision and basing its decision on sound science and common sense.

"Texas ranchers are stewards of our natural resources and take pride in making sure they are abundant and protected," said Dave Scott, TSCRA president and rancher. "TSCRA advocates the responsible management and use of our state's natural resources. Lessening costly and unnecessary government regulation will allow more ranchers the freedom to preserve and protect our natural resources for the next generation."

According to TCEQ, this revision will save taxpayers \$1 million over three years.

## Support grows for a choice on the estate tax

Senate Republican Whip Jon Kyl (R-Ariz.) wants taxpayers to have options on how to pay for an estate tax.

"I think there is a likelihood for bipartisan agreement on this," he told *The Hill*. "And that's what you do retroactively for those who died in between the first of this year and the effective date of the [new] bill."

Under the senator's plan, beneficiaries could choose to either abide by current law or agree to whatever Congress passes. The deal would likely be for estates created before the year end.

Democratic staffers with the House Ways and Means Committee have indicated support for this initiative.

"I think most lawmakers agree that people... should

probably have an option to utilize either the existing law or the new law, whatever those terms might be," Kyl said.

The estate tax is currently repealed, but assets sold from estates face an onerous tax because of how their value is calculated.

It is unclear if Congress will address the calculation problem.

Kyl seeks to create a 35% tax on estates worth more than \$5 million. It would include a less menacing calculation for taxing assets sold from estates.

The senator thinks his bill could pass by Memorial Day, assuming it includes offsets that Democrats and Republicans can support.

## County Agent's Report

### Stripe rust becoming evident in Texas wheat

According to Dr. Ron French, Extension, small grains pathologist, stripe rust has been observed around the State. Heavy levels have been reported in the College Station area, while trace to low levels have been diagnosed in around Abilene, Chillicothe, Rockwall County, and Grayson County.

Stripe rust develops in early spring favored by cool temperatures and high humidity. Primary symptoms consist of narrow orange-yellow stripes on leaves, sheaths, awns, and glumes. Severe infections affect yield by reducing kernel numbers, weight, and overall quality.

Infections are initiated from wind-borne spores carried either from long distances or from nearby alive hosts. Spores germinate at temperatures between 37°F and 59°F, and infection is favored by free moisture (rain or dew) and temperatures between 50°F and 59°F. Pathogens may be found in "hot spots" in a field, so good monitoring is essential. For infection to occur, leaves need prolonged wetness, especially overnight, and temperatures must be favorable for spore germination and fungal activity.

Yield potential, price, weather, variety resistance, and fungicide costs need to also be taken into account prior to making treatment decisions. Generally, treatment is warranted when the rust level in crop gets to 1% leaf coverage but before it covers 5% of leaf area.

Another scenario is to consider treating when 10% of the crop is infected.

## TDA market recap

For the week ending March 27, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were mostly steady to \$3 higher per hundredweight. Demand remains strong, especially for lighter-weight stockers for grazing. Fed cattle prices were lower in spite of higher wholesale beef prices.

Cotton and grain markets ended the week lower as weak export sales, a stronger dollar, and ample global supplies pressured prices.

As for futures markets, feeder cattle, fed cattle, cotton, wheat, and corn were lower, while lumber was higher.

Much of the state received rain last week with amounts ranging from a trace to 1.5 inches. Topsoil moisture supply was reported in mostly adequate to surplus except for short conditions in parts of the High Plains, Trans-Pecos, Edwards Plateau, and South Texas.

Winter wheat progressed well with 4% of the acreage headed compared to 7% on average by this date. Corn planting was again delayed by wet fields, especially in the Blacklands region. The crop is now 39% planted compared to 50% on average, with 11% of the acreage emerged. Grain sorghum planting advanced to 26% complete, also well behind the normal pace. Pastures were reported in mostly good to fair condition.

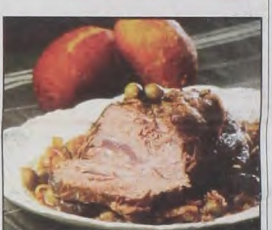
