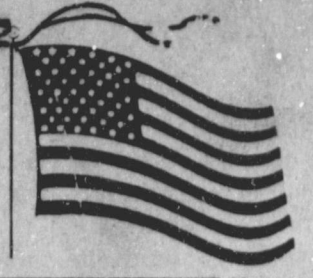

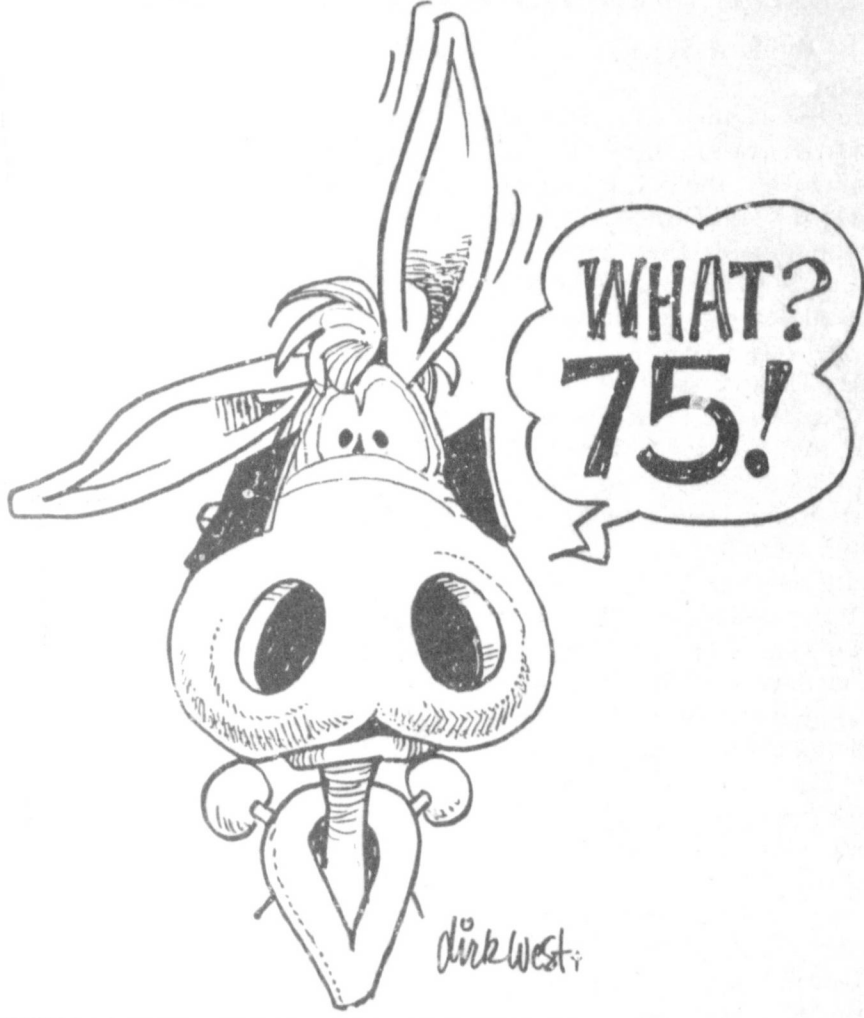

Heart Group Food Festival This Week

The American Heart's Food Festival, September 11-17, has the theme of "trim the fat and cut cholesterol for life." The American Heart Association Diet describes the latest recommendations of medical scientists and provides a step-by-step guide to eating with your heart in mind by trimming fat and cutting cholesterol.

"The body can get all of the cholesterol that it needs by making it, but we also ingest cholesterol directly from foods of animal origin such as meat, poultry, seafood and dairy products," said Janie Moynihan, president of the Bailey County division of the AHA.

What is recommended on the AHA diet? "Foods low in cholesterol, saturated fat and sodium are all a part. The first step to a heart-healthy diet is variety," Moynihan said. Bailey County Fair Best Of Show Entries

At the time you are reading this, the 1988 Bailey County West Plains Fair will almost be history, as will the 75th birthday celebration for the City of Muleshoe.

This year, 113 adult and youth exhibitors entered the fair, to show 390 exhibits.

This breaks down to 85 adults with 306 entries; 13 youth with 27 entries; 15 4-H youth with 57 entries.

For Field Crops, adults had 11 entries and youth, three; in horticulture, adults had 57 entries; youth, four and 4-H members, 14.

Adults had 35 culinary entries; youth, three and 4-H, four; 55 entries in the canned goods were by adults; two for youth and seven for 4-H members; in textiles, it was 78 adult entries; two for youth and 15, 4-H.

Twenty-seven items were entered by adults in fine arts; youth, five; and 4-H, thirteen; hobbies/crafts showed 43 entries by adults; eight by youth and four by 4-H members.

It was a perfect night for football -- and a perfect night for the Muleshoe Mules to even out their season football record at 1-1. Hosting the Shallowater Mustangs on their home field at Benny Douglass stadium, the Mules held onto a two touchdown lead and defeated the Mustangs by a score of 14-6.

It was the Mules all the way in the first half, with all the scoring by both teams coming in the first half of the game.

Mule Quarterback Jeff Hicks was awesome in the first half connecting on seven of nine passes, with one interception.

Some 87 passing yards were recorded in the first half, with Steven Sandoval being Hicks' favored receiver. He caught 71 of the passing yards.

QB Hicks scored the first TD with 6:62 left in the first quarter on a QB sneak for 10 yards and into the end zone. Daniel Olivas made it a 7-0 game. The TD came after 12 plays were taken 86 yards to the end zone.

At the end of the first quarter, it was Muleshoe 7-Shallowater 0.

Muleshoe's second touchdown came at 7:25 of the second, when Daniel Olivas outraced the Mustangs on a seven yarder, and into the end zone, then kicked the extra point. The second TD covered 85 yards in seven plays, with two of those being long yardage passes from QB Hicks to Estevan Sandoval.

Timmy Taylor put the Mustangs in the scoring column in the second quarter by connecting on two field goals.

At 3:03 of the second, Taylor put the ball through the uprights from 26 yards out; he then came back with :01 left to play in the half and connected on a 31 yarder. He had failed at :07 of the second on a 37 yarder that went off to the right, but a five yard penalty against the Mules gave him another try, which was five yards closer, and went through perfectly for three more points.

Shallowater's quarterback had 12-27 passes for 138 yards, and one interception.

They had 216 offensive yards and three penalties for 35 yards. They punted four times and lost one fumble.

The Mules had penalty troubles all night, with 102 yards assessed in penalties. Most of the Mules passing yards came in the first half of the game.

During the second half, the Mule defense dominated the game, making numerous sacks of the Mustang quarterback, recovering a fumble, and an interception, and holding the Mustangs out of the end zone.

Leading pass receiver for the Mules was Sandoval; while Michael Dunham was leading carrier, with eight carries for 45 Cont. Page 6, Col. 3

Listen up, wrestling fans!! Big-time wrestling is coming to Muleshoe, and will be at the Bailey County Civic Center on Tuesday, September 20.

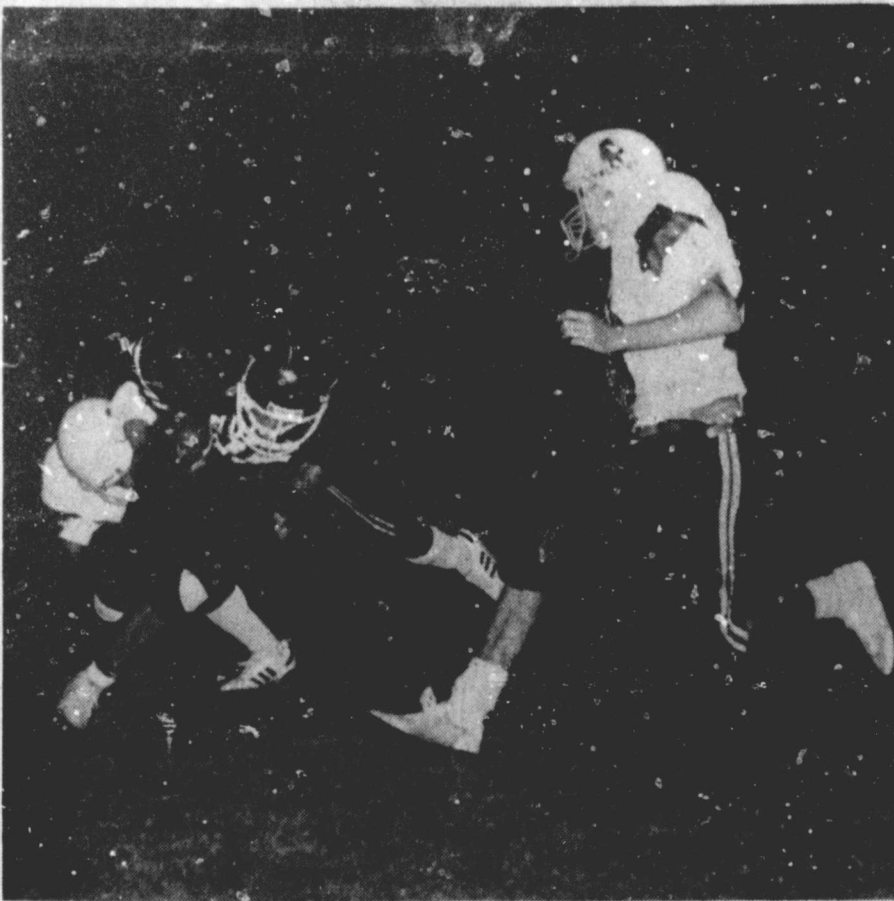
Wrestling gets underway at 8 p.m., sponsored by the Muleshoe Rotary Club.

In Profile

Sheriff Notes 'Similarity' In Military, Law

(Editor's note: Jerry Hicks was rural-born and rural-raised. But, he went on to a distinguished career in the U. S. Air Force. After completing that career, he wasn't ready to "just sit down," so in 1976, embarked on his second career--and from all appearances it will be more 'distinguished' than that of his first one. He is currently Bailey County Sheriff.)

Jerry Hicks was born in Dickens County (TX) to T. B. and Martha Hicks, and grew up in a rural setting. He graduated from Patton Springs High School at Afton, and moved to Muleshoe in March, 1955, with his parents. His father was employed with Hicks Tractor Co. at the time.

A year and a half later, Jerry joined the U. S. Air Force. Through a 'fluke' Jerry became a navigator. He was asked what he wanted to do in the Air Force. "My intent, always, was to be a pilot. I had worn reading glasses in high school because of eye-

strain," said Jerry. "And, I let the recruiting officer talk me into putting navigator down first, with pilot as a second choice."

He said he didn't know there was a shortage of navigators and was destined to become a navigator for four years.

Starting as a navigator on a transport, Jerry flew all over the world for the next four years -- from New Delhi to Bangkok.

"It was probably one of the most educational things I have ever done," added the sheriff.

"And, even though I had qualified on the tests both as a navigator and a pilot, I wouldn't take for my years as a navigator. From the time I got my wings and commission, it took another four years to become a pilot."

After becoming a pilot, he did not spend a lot of time actually stationed overseas, but his first overseas duty station was Vietnam. In 1969, he was assigned to duty in Tripoli, Libya, and was there only nine months before

Khadafi took over in a coup, and all Americans were 'kicked out.'

The sheriff said he had had a busy weekend, and on Monday morning heard plane after plane taking off. He checked and found that all American were restricted to the base, as all European planes were quickly flying back to Europe from the training base at Tripoli.

As Americans had been 'invited' to leave the country, he was sent to England for two years, and from there to Korea.

He grinned as he said his two year tour overseas stretched out to four years before he got back to the U. S.

When asked how many hours had he spent continuously at the controls of a plane. He said eight hours. That may not sound so bad, but consider that he was in full flying regalia, including a helmet and oxygen mask, and strapped into a seat for eight hours, accompanied by nothing except his thoughts and careful

listening for any 'different' sound in his F-100, such as the squeaks and groans, as it flew along.

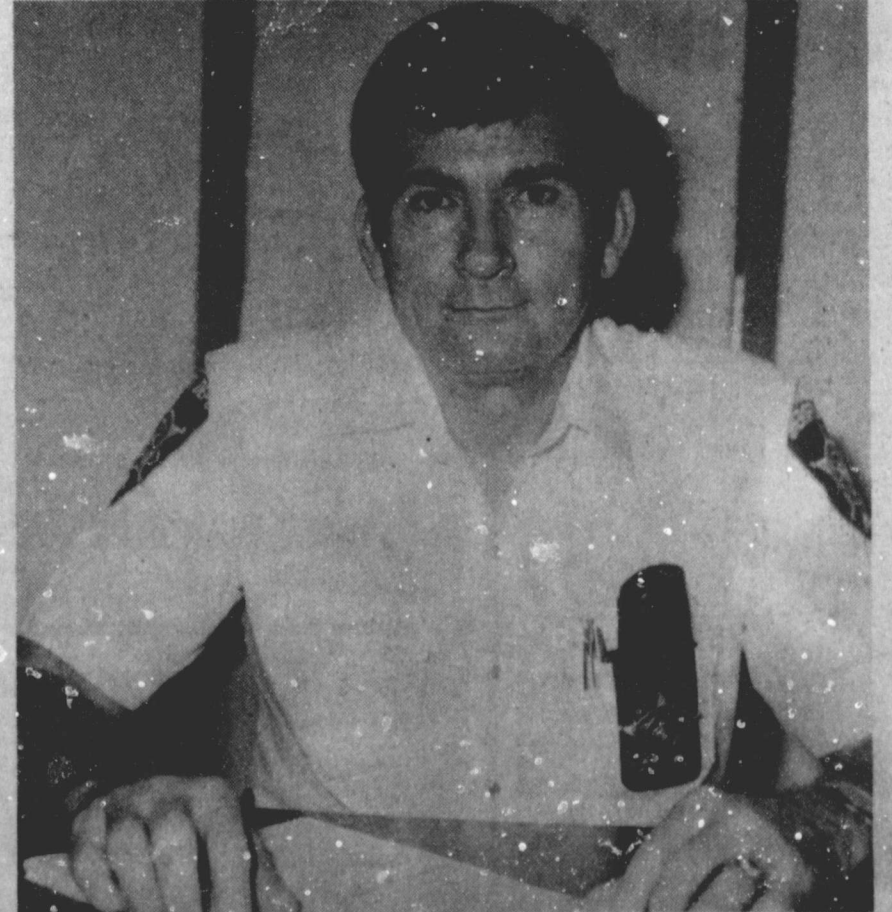
"You hear every sound, magnified, when you are flying over water," he said.

His eight hour flight was from Myrtle Beach, North Carolina to Spain. And if that was not bad enough, he arrived in Spain at sundown, and flew out the next morning to Saudi Arabia, another seven hour flight.

During his 21-year career in the U.S. Air Force, he also managed to get a complete education in business administration.

During his years in the Air Force, he also talked a bit about his experiences as a pilot-trainer, and his reactions to the experiences.

When he completed his Air Force career, he moved back to Muleshoe in 1976 and went to work for John Crow at Crow Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

Mrs. Hail is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Beck Allen of Muleshoe.

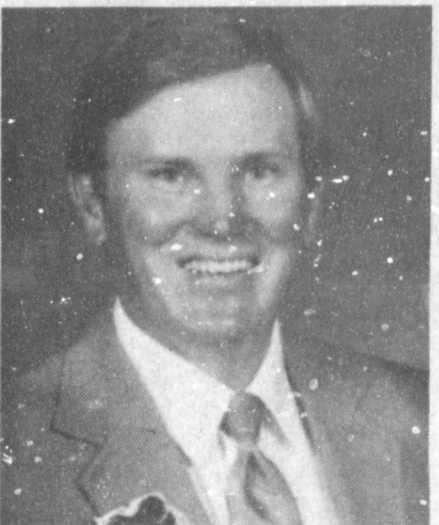

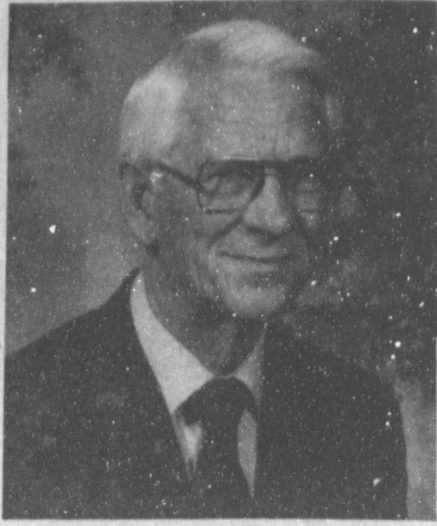

Pork Producers

Asked To Vote

In Referendum

On Wednesday and Thursday, September 7-8, the nation's pork producers will make what is likely to be their most important single business decision of the year. A vote in the pork referendum, scheduled for those two days, will determine the future of the present pork checkoff which provides funding for the many promotion and research programs that benefit pork producers.

All pork producers and eligible family members are encouraged to cast a ballot in the referendum at their local county extension office September 7 or 8. Any person who has raised two or more hogs for sale since November 1, 1986, is entitled to vote.

The referendum was authorized by the Pork Promotion, Research and Consumer Information Act of 1985. Its purpose is to determine the continuance of the 100 percent checkoff program which provides funds for pork research and promotion. The checkoff is at the rate of 25 cents per \$100 on all hogs and pigs as well as all imported hogs and hog products.

The National Pork Board is made up of 14 pork producers and one importer, and is responsible for the collection and disbursement of funds collected

under the pork checkoff program. Approximately 70 percent of checkoff funds are invested in major promotion programs that reach millions of consumers each year.

The referendum will be the best opportunity for producers to voice and express opinion on the 100 percent pork checkoff and set the stage for the future of the pork industry.

All producers should remember to cast their vote on September 7 or 8 at the Bailey County Extension office in the courthouse.

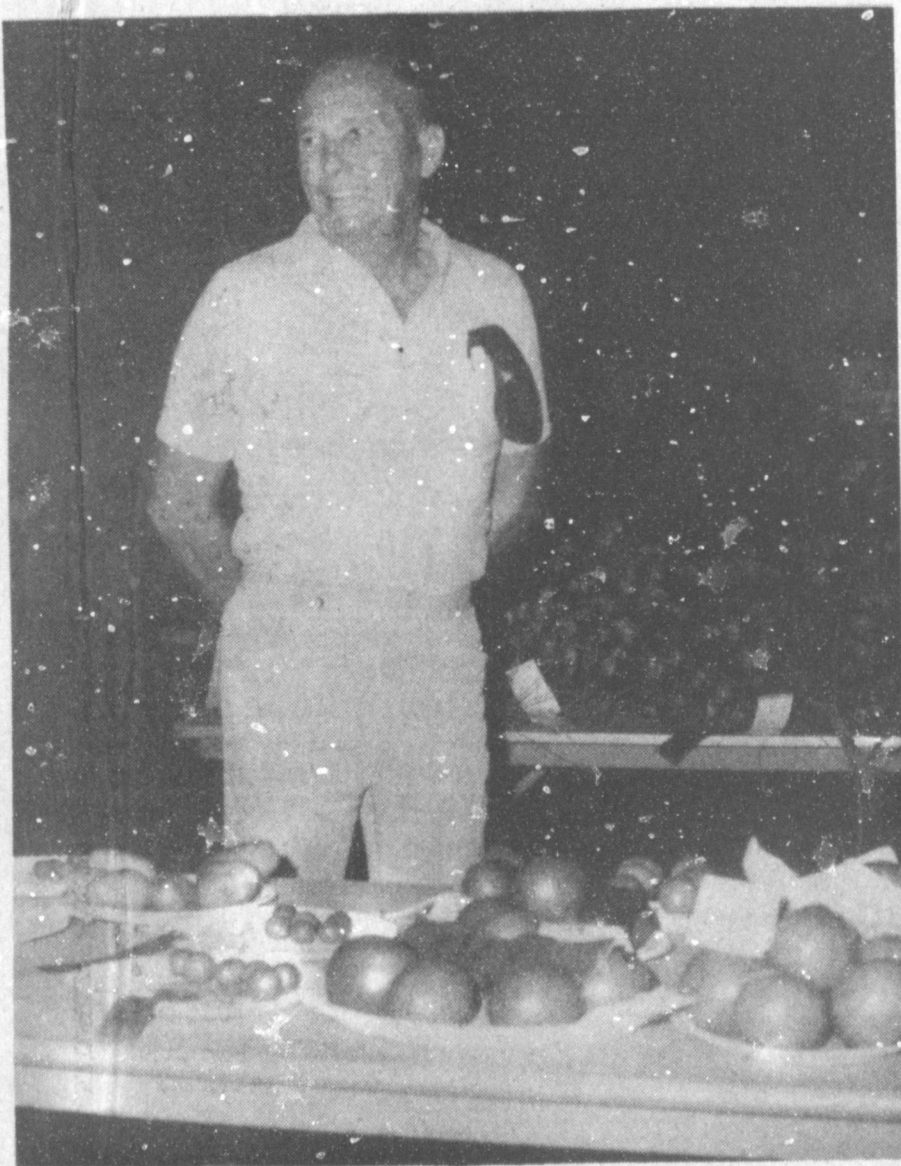

The other two bridesmaids dresses were in teal, the same style.

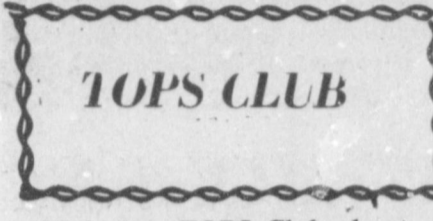

Chevrolet.

However, he still felt a nagging need. When he was stationed at Fort Worth, he considered becoming an officer at Dallas, citing a lot of similarity between the military and law enforcement.

"After spending 21 years in other than a 'normal' occupation, it's hard to settle down," he added.

He was spending a lot of time with the late Ray Lynk, who had also retired from the Air Force, then moved here and became a Muleshoe City Police Officer. His longtime friend encouraged him to try law enforcement -- so Jerry Hicks became a uniform Muleshoe City Police officer, quickly working through the ranks to lieutenant. He then served as Acting Muleshoe City Police Chief from January to late July, 1981, after Chief Johnny Richards resigned to move from Muleshoe.

"Once you get into it (law enforcement), it's hard to get away from it," he said. "Law enforcement is funny. When you go to work every day, you never know what you'll be getting into before the day is over.

"Most contacts officers have are negative, as they are dealing regularly with the burglaries, with the domestic problems, with juvenile problems, with accidents and everything else that any officer faces every day.

"But, even with all the negative approach, you have a chance to help people in a way no one else can. The officer is the one who gets the call when there's a guy with a gun at the door, trying to break in."

Jerry Hicks left the police department in July, 1981 to become an adult parole officer in Lubbock.

But, it didn't take him long to find that law enforcement was strongly ingrained in his blood.

He became a deputy sheriff for former Bailey County Sheriff Bob

The Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center, located on FM 1294, just east of I-20 at the Shallowater exit, will be the site of this year's program.

Field tours of research projects will begin at 11 a.m. and will feature five major stops, said Dr. David Bender, associate professor in vegetable research and field day chairman.

The stops will highlight sorghum breeding, oilseed improvement, results of studies on Russian wheat aphid, findings of the farming systems research program, types of cotton developed for high fiber quality; and a stop at the vineyard, demonstrating the rootstock effects on adaptability, winter survival, yield, and quality of grapes.

Other features of the field day include displays of equipment, farm supplies and information booths.

The field day is a cooperative presentation of TAES, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the High Plains Research Foundation, Texas Forest Service and the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Agricultural Research Service.
