Something to ponder very seriously is an article in Human Events by Reed Irvine entitled "Press Freedom Doesn't Guarantee a Free Society." Whenever writers and publishers exploit that freedom to spread damaging reports—whether true or false—about a government or a person, they can cause great and irreparable harm.

The tradition of freedom of the press in this country is assumed to date back to the birth of the nation. Founding fathers took it for granted that the country would be safe as long as people are able to know what is going on. The trouble, however, is that as the result of biased reporting or withholding facts the people still may not know what actually happens.

Irvine says "I am going to suggest some reasons for thinking that a free but irresponsible press may bring about not only its own destruction but the destruction of all other freedoms as well."

For instance, the Russian press was never freer than in the eight month period leading up to the Revolution. The Bolsheviks used the freedom that Kerensky gave them to topple Kerensky and substitute a totalitarian government that wiped out freedom of the press and almost all personal freedoms besides.

A similar situation existed in Cuba before Castro took over. Despite dictatorial tendencies, Batista allowed the press to remain free and his political enemies used it in establishing Castro in power. But when the bearded one took over he lost little time in calling a halt to the freedom. This fact, as definitely as any other, marked Castro as a Communist. The Reds have insisted from the beginning that people must not be permitted to read anything but the official party version on any issue.

Another version of the same old story applies to Indochina. In that case it was not so much the local press as the foreign press, including the American, that helped bring about the sad conditions that now prevail in Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos. "The irony," according to Irvine, "is that our news men played a very important role in bringing about our involvement in the Vietnam War, and they played an equally important role in ending our involvement on terms that were certainly less than honorable."

Back in 1963 three American reporters in Saigon boasted that they would bring down President Diem. Their method was to charge Diem of persecuting Buddhists, then to use vicious publicity when a few monks set fire to themselves. The world was bitter toward Diem. Even the Pope got involved.

Later investigation by the respected writer Marguerite Higgins disclosed that the charges against Diem were all false. But it was too late. The trio of irresponsible reporters later said that their opposition to Diem derived from their lack of confidence in his ability to successfully fight the Vietcong, that things would go better with him out of the way.

Contrary to their judgment things really fell apart after Diem was assassinated. The country went through a series of weak governments and communists exploited the confusion. With such troubles prevailing, President Johnson sent in American troops to help Vietnamese defend their homeland against aggression from North Vietnam.

One of the worst examples of misuse of the free press, according to Irvine, was the reporting on the Tet offensive of 1968. Few events of history reveal the power of the press so clearly, he says.

The battle was widely reported as a decisive defeat for our side, but the fact is that the Vietcong were virtually wiped out. "It was as much a victory as the Battle of Midway in World War II." To make matter worse, TV reporters had picked the scenes which made our side look especially bad. For the

Dr. June R. Welch, coming here next Wednesday as speaker of the Chamber of Commerce banquet, will find a warm welcome. As one who spent his earlier years in Gainesville, he is almost home folks. And as a writer who has concentrated on the Lone Star State, he is a special kind of Texas.

The good doctor's Texas pedigree is as long as a well rope. He has degrees from TCU, UT Arlington and Texas Tech, besides George Washington University. He practiced law for 15 years, was assistant city attorney in Fort Worth and city attorney of Grand Prairie. He was academic dean of the University of Dallas, then chairman of its history department for the past six years.

Along with all that he is an author specializing in the history of Texas. One of his eight books, "Texas: New Perspectives" is a high school textbook in 500 Texas districts. "The Texas Courthouse" is a fixture in lawyer's waiting rooms. Two of his books are novels "Dave's Tune" and "And Here's to Charley Boyd". His latest, just coming off the press, is "Going Great in the Lone Star State".

Other tidbits about Dr. Welch: he was LBJ's secretary when Lyndon was a senator, and has been voted outstanding professor of the year several times by UD students. "Other goodies also will be on the banquet program. Meeting Set on 4-Lane Road to Replace Overpass

The contract for construction of a four lane surface road to replace the two lane overpass here hopefully will be let in July. That was the message from a Mr. Lanford of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation when he met last Friday night with the Muenster city council.

His purpose was to arrange a meeting Thursday night of this week with landowners whose property will be needed for the project's right of way. The man is eager to proceed now with details which will clear the way to construction with a minimum of delay.

The road will be a continuation of the 4 lane Highway 82 which now narrows to two lanes just west of Main Street, and it will connect with the 4 lanes starting at the Elm bridge just west of town. Besides being more adequate for the highway traffic load the road will provide more convenient access to the city park and a short cut to the hospital for traffic from the west.

McDonald Quits Local Police Job

Police Chief James McDonald last Friday submitted his resignation to the Muenster City Council prior to its regular monthly meeting. The resignation is effective on April 1, leaving the council a reasonable time to locate his successor.

McDonald said he is leaving Muenster to accept a similar position at Wolfe City, also that his decision was influenced by a petition asking the council to dismiss him. A hearing on that petition was on the meeting agenda for the purpose of determining whether petition charges were justified. However McDonald did not wait for the council decision. He chose to avoid further friction here by accepting the job that was offered to him.

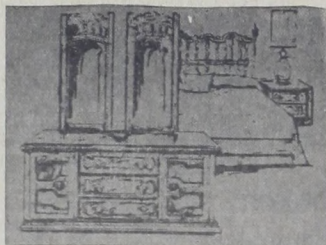

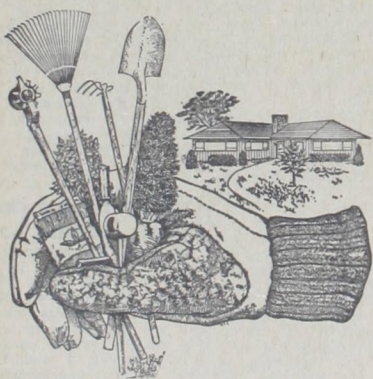

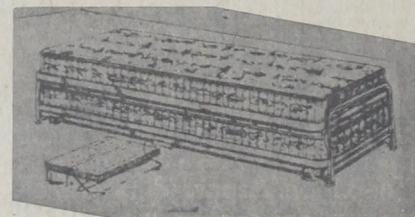

"The Mental Health Association is the largest citizens' voluntary advocacy organization in the United States fighting mental illness and promoting mental health," said Camfield. Since the organization is non-governmental, its entire support must come from contributions, such as those collected in May. The original and continuing purposes of the association are to: improve attitudes toward mental illness and the mentally ill; improve services for the mentally ill; and work for the prevention of mental and emotional illness and promotion of mental health.

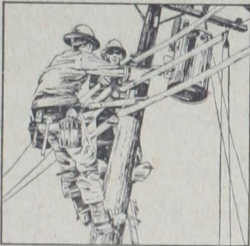

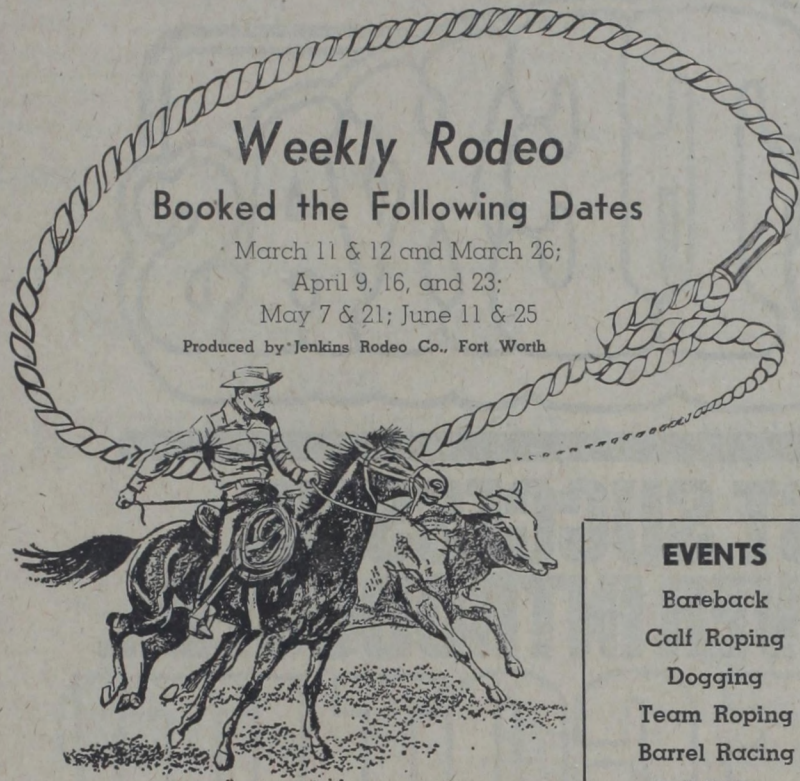

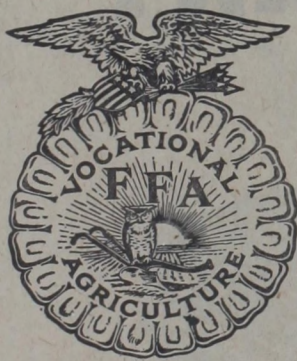

"Further certified assurances were asked that the person operating and servicing the vehicle would be equipped with steel-toed boots, safety goggles, and

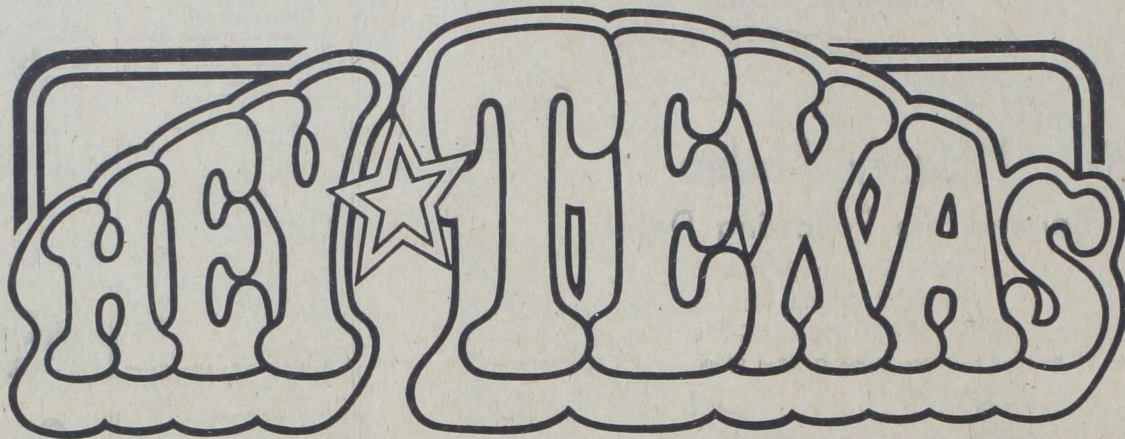
crash helmets in compliance with the Occupational Safety and Health Act.

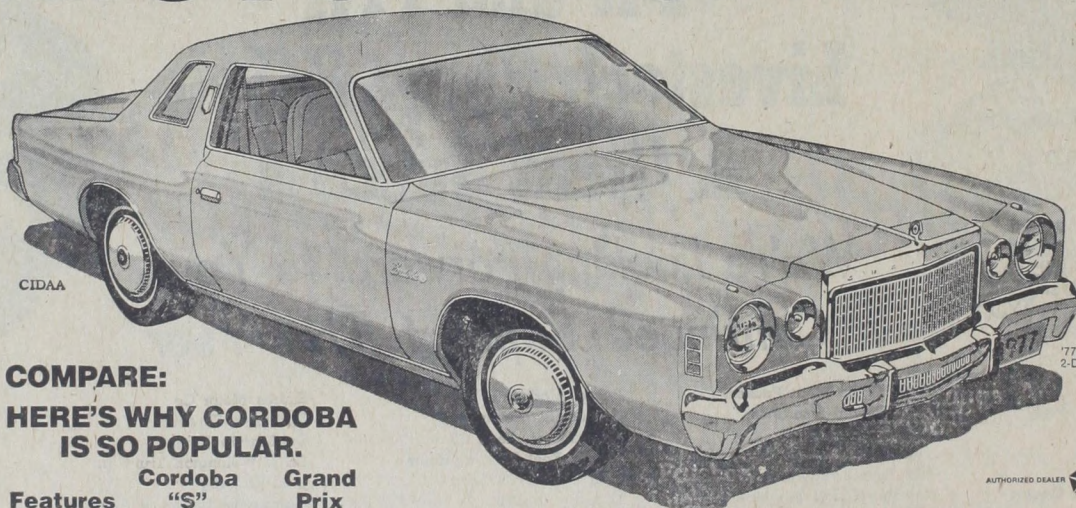

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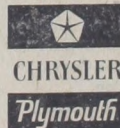

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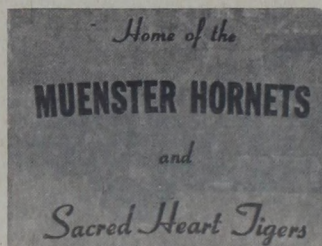

TV Program Will Feature Texas A&M Saturday 10 p.m.

Texas A&M University will be featured in a half-hour special produced by KDFW-TV (Channel 4, Dallas-Fort Worth) for telecast at 10 p.m. Saturday, March 12.

The production provides an overview of the fast-growing university and emphasizes students, school spirit and academic programs. Included are "man-on-the-street" interviews with numerous students who were asked by KDFW-TV newsmen to give their observations on such topics as "Aggie Spirit" and the quality of the education they are receiving at Texas A&M.

Production of the special was prompted by the centennial observance of Texas A&M, the state's first public institution of higher learning. Founded 100 years ago as an institution designed to teach the agricultural and mechanical arts and with only six students on hand for the first classes, Texas A&M today has an enrollment of 28,000 — fastest-growing university in the nation throughout the 70's — and offers degrees in more than 80 fields. That 28,000 enrollment includes almost 9,000 girls.

A program on Child Abuse will be presented on March 17 in the Hospital Meeting Room sponsored by Muenster Hospital Auxiliary. "Lift a Finger", an audio-visual presentation prepared by three service centers of Texas Department of Education, will be presented by Mr. and Mrs. Tom Fluker of Gainesville, both of whom have done graduate studies in guidance and counseling.

Subject matter of the program is concerned with legal and moral obligations to report incidents of abuse and an explanation of the legal procedure of reporting and its handling after the report.

The primary message is aimed at making others conscious of symptoms of abuse and is intended to point out what to notice.

A pre-program questionnaire will be available to encourage discussion. The program is primarily an educational device.

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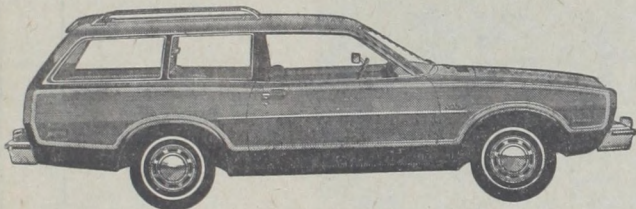
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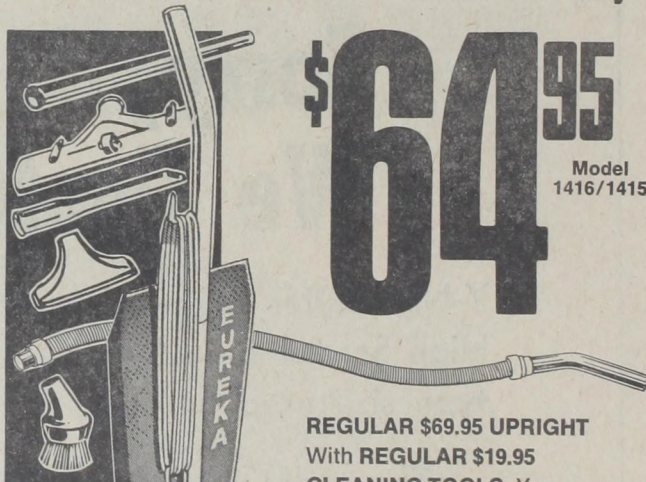
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
